STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

HB 251

May 2, 1986

Dear Mr. President:

The House and Senate Joint Committee on Labor and Commerce has considered the Sunset Review of the Board of Veterinary Examiners, and recommends that the board be continued for three years, until June 30, 1989. The House Labor and Commerce Committee introduced HB 251 to provide the three year continuation.

As required by AS 44.66.050(c), the Committee submits the following findings:

(I) The extent to which the board has operated in the public interest.

A. The board has served the public interest by examining and licensing qualified applicants, and proposing changes in regulations to improve the enforcement of statutes and the quality of veterinary care. The Board has held an average of three board meetings and two examination sessions a year for the past two calendar years.

B. The Board has enhanced the practice of veterinary care by adopting regulations concerning:

1. The maintenance of competency of practitioners through continuing education;
2. The establishment of standards for the practice of veterinary medicine;
3. The disbursement of prescription drugs;
4. The establishment and control of activities relating to veterinary technicians.

II. The extent to which the operation of the Board has been impeded or enhanced by existing statutes, procedures, and practices which it has adopted, and any other matter, including budgetary, resource and personnel matters.

A. The addition of a public member to the Board has enhance the public's confidence. The Board consists of four licensed veterinarians and one public member.

III. The extent to which the Board has recommended statutory changes which are generally of benefit to the public interest.

A. The Board has proposed changes regarding temporary licensing and permits. To improve veterinary care, the Board has proposed to add a new section to the statutes concerning emergency treatment of animals. These proposals are under review by the Department of Law.

IV. The extent to which the Board has encouraged interested persons to report to it concerning the effect of its regulations and decisions on the effectiveness of service, economy of service, and availability of service which it has provided.

A. The Board advertises proposed regulation changes in major newspapers in Anchorage, Fairbanks and Juneau. It does not actively solicit comments on its operations and services.

V. The extent to which the Board has encouraged public participation in the making of its regulations and decisions.

A. See IV. above.

VI. The efficiency with which public inquiries or complaints regarding activities of the Board, with the department to which the Board has been assigned or with the office of the ombudsman have been processed and resolved.

A. In the last three years there has been one complaint filed against the Board with the Ombudsman. The complainant did not believe the Board would take action on the complaint. The Ombudsman office found this to be an unsubstantiated complaint.

B. There have been no complaints filed with the Attorney General's office.

VII. The extent to which the Board has presented qualified applicants to serve the public.

A. The Board has issued 59 licenses, temporary permits, and temporary licenses in the last three fiscal years.

B. The Board requires foreign medical graduates to have qualifications equal to all other applicants. Foreign graduates must pass the examination of the American Veterinary Association's Education Commission for Foreign Veterinary Graduates.

VIII. The extent to which state personnel practices, including affirmative action requirements, have been complied with by the Board.

A. The Human Rights Commission and the Equal Employment Opportunity office have received no complaints related to the Board's activities.

IX. The extent to which statutory, regulatory, budgeting, or other changes are necessary to enable the Board to better serve the interests of the public and to comply with the factors enumerated in this section.

HB 251 cont'd

A. The Joint Labor and Commerce Committee has no recommendations concerning the Board's compliance with the public need factors as enumerated in this statute.

As required by AS 44.66.050(d), the Committee submits the following findings:

(1) an identification of the problems or the needs that the programs and activities of the Board are intended to address.

Testimony indicated that the supply of veterinarians in the state is growing, yet there is still a need for large animal practitioners, veterinarians who specialize in fisheries and practitioners willing to live in the Bush.

(2) a statement, to the extent practicable, of the objectives of the program of the Board and its anticipated accomplishments.

The Board shall continue to protect the public by issuing licenses only to qualified veterinarians who are competent to practice in Alaska.

(3) an identification of any other programs having similar, conflicting or duplicate objectives.

There are none.

(4) an assessment of alternative methods of achieving the purposes of the program.

There are none under consideration.

(5) an assessment of the consequences of eliminating the Board, or of funding it at a lower level.

If the Board were eliminated, the Division of Occupational Licensing would assume its duties. They would be required to hire the expertise equivalent to the veterinary board in order to do this; a fiscal note would be involved, and the Division recommends the Board be continued.

(6) a justification for the recommended continuation or extension of the Board, and an explanation of the manner in which it avoids duplication or conflict with other efforts.

The Board serves a legitimate purpose in regulating veterinarians in this state. Veterinarians practice medicine, which requires a great deal of training and stringent qualifications. The Board should be continued to insure that Alaska gets qualified, competent veterinarians.
