Pursuant to adjournment, the Senate was called to order by President Bennett at 11:10 a.m.

The roll showed nineteen members present. Senator Sackett was absent on state business.

The prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Pastor Milton Hunt of the Resurrection Lutheran Church. Senator Kerttula moved and asked unanimous consent that the prayer be spread. Without objection, it was so ordered.

"Almighty and Most Gracious God, we give You thanks for the strength and vigor which You supply to us daily.

As we continue our legislative labors on this misty day, assist us to see the larger forest and not be caught up with telescopic views of only single trees.

And keep us in touch with the compass needle of our basic principles as the rush of business engulfs us almost like a tidal wave.

We conclude our prayer in the words of that morning prayer of John Baille, the great Presbyterian theologian.

'Let me put right before interest,
Let me put others before self.
Let me put the things of spirit before the things of the body. Let me put the attainment of noble ends above the enjoyment of present pleasures. Let me put principles above reputation. Let me put Thee before all else.'

In the name of Jesus Christ.

Amen."

Senator Kerttula moved and asked unanimous consent that the remarks by Senator Vic Fischer on the Anniversary of the Holocaust be spread in the journal. Without objection, it was so ordered.

"This week people all over the world are commemorating the Holocaust and it's appropriate for the Senate to also pause for a moment in memory of the 6 million Jews and millions of others; Russians, Poles, Czechs and many other peoples including Germans; peoples of all races, nationalities and religions who were systematically exterminated and murdered by Adolf Hitler and his Nazi regime.

Tuesday night, PBS showed two hours of films about the Holocaust. It showed the moment when American and British soldiers first came upon the death camps. It showed the tens of thousands of corpses they found - the people who were gassed, burned, suffocated, hanged and murdered in the most horrible ways. It showed the emaciated survivors, it showed dying women and children, it showed the mass graves. There were truly harrowing, horrible scenes of the victims of Facism. The film also showed the American and British liberators who made it possible for the few who did survive to stay alive. There was also a film the other night on the recent reunion of Holocaust survivors and American G.I.'s who liberated them. It was a truly marvelous uplifting scene of the remembrances and the dedication to the proposition: NEVER AGAIN.

I ask you now to stand for a moment of silence to commemorate the millions who died in the Holocaust. The tens of thousands of Germans, Swedes and others who risked their lives to protect Jews and others from the Facist dictatorship, and all those who fought in the war to end the Hitler horror.

At this time, I would also like that we all contemplate in a moment of silence the proposition that such inhumanity must never again come upon this earth."

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Senator Halford moved and asked unanimous consent that the journal for the one hundred fifteenth legislative day and Senate Supplement No. 77 be approved as certified by the Secretary. Without objection, it was so ordered.
