**A BILL**

**FOR AN ACT ENTITLED**

**1 "An Act making appropriations for the operating and loan program expenses**  
**2 of state government, for certain programs, and to capitalize funds; making**  
**3 appropriations under art. IX, sec. 17(c), Constitution of the State of Alaska,**  
**4 from the constitutional budget reserve fund; and providing for an effective**  
**5 date."**

**6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:**

**7 \* Section 1. ALASKA HOUSING FINANCE CORPORATION. (a) The sum of**  
**8 \$50,000,000 from the available unrestricted cash in the general account of the Alaska housing**  
**9 finance revolving fund (AS 18.56.082) is anticipated to be transferred to the general fund**  
**10 during fiscal year 1999 by the direction of the board of directors of the Alaska Housing**  
**11 Finance Corporation.**

**12 (b) All unrestricted mortgage loan interest payments, mortgage loan commitment fees,**  
**13 and all other unrestricted receipts received by or accrued to the Alaska Housing Finance**

1 Corporation during fiscal year 1999 and all income earned on assets of the corporation during  
 2 that period are appropriated to the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation to hold as corporate  
 3 receipts for the purposes described in AS 18.56. The corporation shall allocate its corporate  
 4 receipts among the Alaska housing finance revolving fund (AS 18.56.082), housing assistance  
 5 loan fund (AS 18.56.420), and senior housing revolving fund (AS 18.56.710) in accordance  
 6 with procedures adopted by the board of directors.

7 (c) The following amounts are appropriated to the Alaska Housing Finance  
 8 Corporation (AHFC) from the sources indicated and for the following purposes:

15 \* **Sec. 2.** ALASKA INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND EXPORT AUTHORITY. The  
 16 sum of \$16,000,000 from the available unrestricted cash in the Alaska Industrial Development  
 17 and Export Authority revolving fund (AS 44.88.060) is anticipated to be transferred to the  
 18 general fund as directed by the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority. The  
 19 transferred money shall be deposited in the general fund when received during fiscal year  
 20 1999.

21 \* **Sec. 3.** ALASKA PERMANENT FUND CORPORATION. (a) The amount authorized  
 22 for transfer by the Alaska Permanent Fund Corporation under AS 37.13.145(b) is appropriated  
 23 from the earnings reserve account (AS 37.13.145) to the dividend fund (AS 43.23.045(a)) for  
 24 the payment of permanent fund dividends and administrative and associated costs.

25 (b) After money is transferred to the dividend fund under (a) of this section, the  
 26 amount calculated under AS 37.13.145 to offset the effect of inflation on the principal of the  
 27 Alaska permanent fund is appropriated from the earnings reserve account (AS 37.13.145) to  
 28 the principal of the Alaska permanent fund.

29 (c) The amount required to be deposited under AS 37.13.010(a)(1) and (2) during  
 30 fiscal year 1999 is appropriated to the principal of the Alaska permanent fund in satisfaction  
 31 of that requirement.

1 (d) The interest earned during fiscal year 1999 on revenue from the sources set out  
2 in AS 37.13.010 while the revenue is held in trust, escrow, or otherwise before receipt by the  
3 state is appropriated to the principal of the Alaska permanent fund.

4 \* **Sec. 4.** ALASKA PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION. The unexpended and  
5 unobligated balance on June 30, 1998, of the Alaska Public Utilities Commission receipts  
6 account for regulatory cost charges under AS 42.05.254 and AS 42.06.286 for fiscal year 1998  
7 is appropriated to the Alaska Public Utilities Commission for fiscal year 1999 expenditures.

8 \* **Sec. 5.** ALASKA SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY FOUNDATION. The unexpended  
9 and unobligated balance in the Alaska science and technology endowment earnings reserve  
10 on June 30, 1998, is appropriated to the Alaska Science and Technology Foundation to award  
11 as grants under AS 37.17.030(d) for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1999.

12 \* **Sec. 6.** ALASKA SEAFOOD MARKETING INSTITUTE. An amount equal to the  
13 unexpended and unobligated balance on June 30, 1998, of the fiscal year 1998 general fund  
14 receipts from the salmon marketing tax (AS 43.76.110) and from the seafood marketing  
15 assessment (AS 16.51.120) is appropriated from the general fund to the Alaska Seafood  
16 Marketing Institute for marketing Alaska seafood products during fiscal year 1999.

17 \* **Sec. 7.** CONSTITUTIONAL BUDGET RESERVE FUND. (a) Amounts equal to the  
18 deposits in the budget reserve fund (art. IX, sec. 17, Constitution of the State of Alaska) for  
19 fiscal year 1998 that were made from subfunds and accounts in the general fund by operation  
20 of art. IX, sec. 17(d), Constitution of the State of Alaska, to repay appropriations from the  
21 budget reserve fund are appropriated from the budget reserve fund to the subfunds and  
22 accounts from which they were transferred.

23 (b) If the unrestricted state revenue available for appropriation in fiscal year 1999 is  
24 insufficient to cover the general fund appropriations made for fiscal year 1999, the amount  
25 necessary to balance revenue and general fund appropriations, up to \$700,000,000, is  
26 appropriated to the general fund from the budget reserve fund (art. IX, sec. 17, Constitution  
27 of the State of Alaska).

28 (c) The appropriations in (a) and (b) of this section are made under art. IX, sec. 17(c),  
29 Constitution of the State of Alaska.

30 \* **Sec. 8.** DISASTER RELIEF AND FIRE SUPPRESSION. Federal receipts received for  
31 disaster relief are appropriated to the disaster relief fund (AS 26.23.300).



1 Southeast energy fund (AS 42.45.040) 40 percent

2 Power project fund (AS 42.45.010) 20 percent

3 \* **Sec. 12.** INFORMATION SERVICES FUND. The sum of \$55,000 is appropriated to  
4 the information services fund (AS 44.21.045) for the Department of Administration, division  
5 of information services programs, from designated program receipts.

6 \* **Sec. 13.** INSURANCE AND BOND CLAIMS. The amount necessary to fund the uses  
7 of the state insurance catastrophe reserve account described in AS 37.05.289(a) is appropriated  
8 from that account to the Department of Administration for those uses.

9 \* **Sec. 14.** INSURANCE FEES. The unexpended and unobligated balance on June 30,  
10 1998, of the Department of Commerce and Economic Development, division of insurance,  
11 general fund program receipts from insurance fees under AS 21.06.250 is appropriated to the  
12 Department of Commerce and Economic Development, division of insurance, for operating  
13 costs for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1999.

14 \* **Sec. 15.** MARINE HIGHWAY SYSTEM FUND. The sum of \$27,358,100 is  
15 appropriated from the general fund to the Alaska marine highway system fund (AS 19.65.060).

16 \* **Sec. 16.** MOTOR FUEL TAX. The following estimated amounts from the unreserved  
17 special accounts in the general fund are included within the general fund amounts appropriated  
18 by this Act:

19 Special highway fuel tax account (AS 43.40.010(g)) \$25,100,000

20 Special aviation fuel tax account (AS 43.40.010(e)) 5,400,000

21 \* **Sec. 17.** OCCUPATIONAL LICENSING. The unexpended and unobligated balance on  
22 June 30, 1998, of the Department of Commerce and Economic Development, division of  
23 occupational licensing, general fund program receipts from occupational licensing fees under  
24 AS 08.01.065 is appropriated to the division of occupational licensing for operating costs for  
25 the fiscal year ending June 30, 1999.

26 \* **Sec. 18.** OIL AND HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCE RELEASE PREVENTION  
27 ACCOUNT. The following amounts are appropriated to the oil and hazardous substance  
28 release prevention account (AS 46.08.010(a)(1)) in the oil and hazardous substance release  
29 prevention and response fund (AS 46.08.010) from the sources indicated:

30 (1) the balance of the oil and hazardous substance release prevention mitigation  
31 account (AS 46.08.020(b)) in the general fund on July 1, 1998, not otherwise appropriated by

1 this Act;

2 (2) the amount collected for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1998, estimated  
3 to be \$12,300,000, from the surcharge levied under AS 43.55.300.

4 \* **Sec. 19. OIL AND HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCE RELEASE RESPONSE ACCOUNT.**

5 The following amounts are appropriated to the oil and hazardous substance release response  
6 account (AS 46.08.010(a)(2)) in the oil and hazardous substance release prevention and  
7 response fund (AS 46.08.010) from the following sources:

8 (1) the balance of the oil and hazardous substance release response mitigation  
9 account (AS 46.08.025(b)) in the general fund on July 1, 1998, not otherwise appropriated by  
10 this Act;

11 (2) the amount collected for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1998, from the  
12 surcharge levied under AS 43.55.201.

13 \* **Sec. 20. RETAINED FEES.** The amount retained to compensate the collector or trustee  
14 of fees, licenses, taxes, or other money belonging to the state during the fiscal year ending  
15 June 30, 1999, is appropriated for that purpose to the agency authorized by law to generate  
16 the revenue.

17 \* **Sec. 21. SAFETY ADVISORY COUNCIL.** The amount appropriated for the 1998  
18 annual governor's safety conference (sec. 19, ch. 98, SLA 1997), plus the fiscal year 1998  
19 program receipts of the Alaska Safety Advisory Council (AS 18.60.830), less the amount  
20 expended or obligated for the 1998 annual governor's safety conference, is appropriated from  
21 general fund program receipts to the Alaska Safety Advisory Council for costs of the 1999  
22 annual governor's safety conference.

23 \* **Sec. 22. SALARY AND BENEFIT ADJUSTMENTS.** (a) The sum of \$4,675,260 is  
24 appropriated to the Office of the Governor, office of management and budget, for the fiscal  
25 year ending June 30, 1999, from the funding sources and in the amounts listed in (f) of this  
26 section to implement the monetary terms of the collective bargaining agreements listed in (b)  
27 of this section and for salary and benefit adjustments for executive branch, Alaska Court  
28 System, and legislative branch employees who are not members of a collective bargaining  
29 unit.

30 (b) Funding for the following collective bargaining agreements is included in the  
31 appropriation made in (a) of this section:

1 Alaska Public Employees Association for the Supervisory Unit;  
 2 Alaska State Employees Association for the General Government Unit;  
 3 Alaska Vocational Technical Center Teachers Association, representing teachers at the  
 4 Alaska Vocational Technical Center;  
 5 Alyeska Correspondence School Education Association, representing teachers at the  
 6 Alyeska Central School;  
 7 Confidential Employees Association;  
 8 Inlandboatmen's Union of the Pacific, representing the unlicensed marine unit;  
 9 International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, representing nonjudicial,  
 10 nonsupervisory, classified employees of the Alaska Court System;  
 11 International Organization of Masters, Mates, and Pilots, Pacific Maritime Region for  
 12 the Masters, Mates, and Pilots Unit;  
 13 Marine Engineers Beneficial Association, representing licensed engineers employed by  
 14 the Alaska marine highway system;  
 15 Public Employees Local 71 for the Labor, Trades, and Crafts Unit;  
 16 Public Safety Employees Association, representing state troopers and other  
 17 commissioned law enforcement personnel;  
 18 Teachers' Education Association of Mt. Edgecumbe, representing teachers of the  
 19 Mt. Edgecumbe High School.

20 (c) Funding for the following collective bargaining agreements is included in the  
 21 appropriations made to the University of Alaska in sec. 32 of this Act:

22 Alaska Classified Employees Association, representing certain employees of the  
 23 University of Alaska;  
 24 Alaska Community College Federation of Teachers, representing certain employees of  
 25 the University of Alaska;  
 26 United Academics, representing certain employees of the University of Alaska.

27 (d) Except as described in (e) of this section, the appropriation made in (a) of this  
 28 section is the net funding increase for salary and benefit adjustments after deducting cost  
 29 savings resulting from decreases in employer contributions to the Public Employees  
 30 Retirement System (PERS). For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1999, the PERS employer  
 31 contribution rate declines 1.57 percent for police and fire employees and .81 percent for all

1 other executive branch employees except University of Alaska employees.

2 (e) The amount of operating budget appropriations made in sec. 32 of this Act to the  
3 University of Alaska, the Alaska Court System, and the legislature includes any increase or  
4 decrease caused by changes to the PERS contribution rate.

5 (f) The appropriation made in (a) of this section is allocated to the following agencies  
6 from the following funding sources in the amounts listed:

28 operating within a region designated under AS 16.10.375.

29 \* **Sec. 24.** SHARED TAXES AND FEES. The amount necessary to refund to local  
30 governments their share of taxes and fees collected in the listed fiscal years under the  
31 following programs is appropriated to the Department of Revenue from the general fund for

 10 interest on revenue anticipation notes issued by the commissioner of revenue under AS 43.08  
 11 is appropriated from the general fund to the Department of Revenue for payment of the  
 12 interest on those notes.

13 (b) The amount required to be paid by the state for principal and interest on all issued  
 14 and outstanding state-guaranteed bonds is appropriated from the general fund to the state bond  
 15 committee for payment of principal and interest on those bonds.

16 (c) The sum of \$46,029,032 is appropriated from the general fund to the Alaska debt  
 17 retirement fund (AS 37.15.011).

18 (d) The sum of \$16,331,216 is appropriated from the Alaska debt retirement fund  
 19 (AS 37.15.011) to the state bond committee for trustee fees and lease payments relating to  
 20 certificates of participation issued for real property.

21 (e) The sum of \$8,871,807 is appropriated from the Alaska debt retirement fund  
 22 (AS 37.15.011) to the state bond committee for payment of debt service and trustee fees on

24 (f) The sum of \$5,005,283 is appropriated from the International Airports Revenue  
 25 Fund (AS 37.15.430) to the state bond committee for payment of debt service and trustee fees  
 26 on outstanding international airports revenue bonds.

27 (g) The sum of \$466,500 is appropriated from the Alaska clean water fund  
 28 (AS 46.03.032) to the state bond committee for payment of debt service and trustee fees on  
 29 outstanding clean water fund bonds.

30 (h) The sum of \$60,804,147 is appropriated to the Department of Education for state  
 31 aid for costs of school construction under AS 14.11.100 from the following sources:

4 of the employment assistance and training program account (AS 23.15.625) on June 30, 1998,  
5 is appropriated to the employment assistance and training program account for the fiscal year  
6 ending June 30, 1999.

7 \* **Sec. 27.** STATUTORY BUDGET RESERVE FUND. If the unrestricted state revenue  
8 available for appropriation in fiscal year 1999 is insufficient to cover the general fund  
9 appropriations made for fiscal year 1999, the amount necessary to balance revenue and general  
10 fund appropriations is appropriated to the general fund from the budget reserve fund  
11 (AS 37.05.540).

12 \* **Sec. 28.** STORAGE TANK ASSISTANCE FUND. The sum of \$4,364,800 is  
13 appropriated from the oil and hazardous substance release prevention account  
14 (AS 46.08.010(a)(1)) to the storage tank assistance fund (AS 46.03.410) for the fiscal year  
15 ending June 30, 1999.

16 \* **Sec. 29.** STUDENT LOAN PROGRAM. The amount from student loan borrowers of  
17 the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education that is assessed for loan origination fees  
18 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1999, is appropriated to the origination fee account  
19 (AS 14.43.120(u)) within the student loan fund of the Alaska Student Loan Corporation for  
20 the purposes specified in AS 14.43.120(u).

21 \* **Sec. 30.** TEACHER CERTIFICATION. The unexpended and unobligated balance on  
22 June 30, 1998, of the Department of Education, teacher certification general fund program  
23 receipts from certification fees under AS 14.20.020(c) is appropriated to the Department of  
24 Education, teacher certification, for operating costs for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1999.

25 \* **Sec. 31.** NONLAPSE OF APPROPRIATIONS. The appropriations made by secs. 1, 8,  
26 10(a), 11, 12, 15, 18, 19, and 29 of this Act are for the capitalization of funds and do not  
27 lapse.
