Analysis

HB 23 amends the crime of criminal use of a computer, a class C felony, by adding the prohibition of installing a keystroke logger or other device that can track another person's entries or keystrokes.

This is a new crime and a felony, and would have an indeterminate fiscal impact to the Department of Law.
