BILL NO. HB 179

Analysis

HB 179 would adopt a class C felony for animal cruelty if a person, acting with criminal negligence, contemporaneously fails to care for five or more animals, and causes the death or severe pain or prolonged suffering to five or more animals.

This bill would have an indeterminate fiscal impact to the Department of Law.
