Alaska Youth First Program – State Funds: 100%

State general funds support this program, which serves youth ages 14 to 24 with career awareness and information, employability skills training, paid and non-paid work experience, applied academic training, and educator externships. The first four components provide youth with the skills to transition from school to postsecondary education and employment in Alaska's high-growth industries. Externships expose teachers to the occupations and working conditions in Alaska's high-growth industries, which teachers can integrate into their classrooms and curricula.
