FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2016 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

This legislation prohibits a person under 19 years of age from possessing an electronic smoking device, e-liquid product, vapor product, or alternative tobacco product. It also prohibits a person from giving or selling these products to persons under 19 years of age. However, a person may give someone under 19 these products if they are approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to help with tobacco cessation or other medical purposes and prescribed by a health care professional, part of a tobacco cessation program, given by a pharmacist, or given to the person by their legal guardian. The penalties provided in the statutes amended by the legislation are violations.

The Department of Law does not anticipate a fiscal impact.
