FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2017 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

This legislation prohibits a person under 19 years of age from possessing an electronic smoking product or a product containing nicotine. The legislation creates an affirmative defense for a person under 19 who possesses an electronic smoking product or a product containing nicotine if the substance is approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to help with tobacco cessation or other medical purposes, was being marketed and sold for that purpose and was prescribed by a health care professional, part of a tobacco cessation program, given by a pharmacist, or given to the person by their legal guardian.

The legislation also prohibits a person from giving or selling electronic smoking product or a product containing nicotine to persons under 19 years of age. However, a person may give someone under 19 these products if the substance is approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to help with tobacco cessation or other medical purposes, was being marketed and sold for that purpose and was prescribed by a health care professional, part of a tobacco cessation program, given by a pharmacist, or given to the person by their legal guardian.

SB 15 also sets parameters for when a person may operate a vending machine which dispenses electronic smoking products so that those products may not be purchased by persons under 19 years of age. For example, such a vending machine may be placed in an employee break room with a sign posted notifying those who have access to that room that possession of electronic smoking devices by persons under 19 years of age is prohibited.

The penalties provided in the statutes amended by the legislation are violations.

The Department of Law does not anticipate a fiscal impact.
