FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2022 LEGISLATIVE SESSION**Analysis**

This bill amends the crime of sexual assault in the first and second degree and redefines "consent".

Changes made to criminal laws can affect the number of people placed under the department's custody and the length of the term of imprisonment. Consequently, this can affect the number of people incarcerated and/or the amount of time an offender could be incarcerated.

DOC is not able to quantify the number of offenders placed in DOC custody, however, based on the current inmate population projections, recent trends and COVID-19 impacts, any changes in the inmate population would not exceed the department's daily maximum capacity of 5,387 beds within the next ten years. Therefore, a zero fiscal note is being submitted.

The assumptions in this fiscal note are based on assuming the criminal justice system returns to pre-Covid-19 operations within the next two years.
