FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

This legislation creates a new special nonresident postsecondary student sport fishing, hunting, hunting and trapping, trapping, or hunting, trapping, and sport fishing license for qualifying half-time and full-time students enrolled in an Alaskan postsecondary institution under AS 14.43.830(a). The fees for these new special nonresident postsecondary licenses are tied to the same fees for resident licenses under AS 16.05.340(a)(1) – (6). Under this bill, the department would be limited to offering these special nonresident licenses as annual licenses, because there is no short-term resident license offered under AS 16.05.340(a)(1) – (6).

Additionally, eligible nonresident postsecondary students would not qualify for the \$5 resident license fee for applicants under the federal poverty guidelines. As stated in the bill, eligible nonresident postsecondary students would only qualify for resident license fees above the federal poverty guidelines.

Furthermore, applicants purchasing a special nonresident postsecondary student hunting license are still subject to the nonresident intensive management surcharge of \$30 under AS 16.08.340(k). Qualifying applicants would also still be subject to all other nonresident rules and regulations such as requirements for hunting tags, guide requirements, and limited harvest and hunting areas, minimizing any loss of revenue for the Division of Wildlife Conservation.

Current license applications do not require an applicant to identify if they are enrolled as a half-time or full-time student. Without that information, it is difficult for the department to determine the actual fiscal impact. The department assumes there is a minimal number of nonresidents attending a qualifying institution in Alaska that would be eligible for this new license. The loss of license revenue for the Division of Wildlife Conservation and Division of Sport Fish, along with the additional workload for Division of Administrative Services to process the applications, would be de minimis. Therefore, the department expects minimal fiscal impact and submits a zero fiscal note.

Resident license fees are as follows:

- Resident sport fishing license: \$20
- Resident hunting license: \$35
- Resident hunting and trapping license: \$55
- Resident trapping license: \$25
- Resident hunting and sport fishing license: \$50
- Resident hunting, trapping, and sport fishing license: \$75

Comparable nonresident licenses are as follows:

- Nonresident annual sport fishing license: \$100
- Nonresident hunting license: \$130
- Nonresident hunting and trapping license: \$375

There are no combination sport fishing and hunting/trapping licenses for nonresidents.
