FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2024 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

House Bill 398 makes possession of a schedule IA and IIA controlled substance within a specified distance of a daycare center, homeless shelter, or a treatment and rehabilitation center a class B felony. Secs. 1-2.

The bill also makes possession of a schedule IIIA, IVA, VA, or VIA controlled substance within a specified distance of a daycare center, homeless shelter, or a treatment and rehabilitation center a class C felony. Secs. 3-4.

Section 5 of House Bill 398 requires municipalities to post signage at the named facilities stating that the facility is a drug-free zone. This provision has no impact on the court system.

The changes that expand the scope of the A and B felony drug crimes may result in more criminal cases being filed, and may lead to increased litigation relating to possession of certain drugs near protected locations and facilities. Nonetheless, the court system anticipates that it can absorb the additional workload without fiscal impact.
