FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

This bill establishes the crime of mail theft. A person is guilty of mail theft if they take mail or an article within mail from a post office, postal station, mail receptacle, authorized depository, or mail carrier or after the mail has been left in or near a mail receptacle or mail depository. Mail theft also includes a person buying, receiving, retaining, concealing or disposing of mail with the knowledge that the mail was stolen.

It is unknown how many additional cases will be referred to the Criminal Division if this bill were to become law. However, at this time, it is anticipated that the Criminal Division can absorb the additional cases within its existing budget.
