FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

This legislation creates two crimes related to airbag fraud. The bill creates a class A misdemeanor for knowingly installing, or selling counterfeit airbags or vehicles with counterfeit airbags. The bill creates a Class C felony where the airbag fraud results in the death or serious injury of another.

New crimes generally result in additional workload for the Office of Public Advocacy and though the Agency is unable to absorb significant workload increases, the agency does not anticipate many appointments based on this legislation and submits a zero fiscal note accordingly.
