FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION**Analysis**

SB90 expands the ability of minors, particularly those aged 16 and older, to consent to certain behavioral and mental health services without requiring parental or guardian approval under specific circumstances. The bill allows unaccompanied homeless minors and those living independently to access healthcare services with appropriate documentation. It also permits minors to seek outpatient behavioral and mental health treatment for up to five sessions without parental consent, with provisions for continued treatment if obtaining parental consent would be detrimental to the minor's well-being. Additionally, the bill clarifies that parents are not financially responsible for services obtained under these provisions and updates existing laws to reflect these changes, ensuring greater access to critical healthcare while balancing parental rights and minor protections.

The Division of Behavioral Health does not anticipate a significant operational impact.
