FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION**Analysis**

This bill creates the new crime of organized theft. A person commits the crime of organized theft if the person individually or jointly commits a felony level theft in coordination with three or more people who have committed two or more felony level thefts. Organized theft is a class A felony.

The bill also makes it theft in the second degree to steal medical records or other medical information. Theft in the second degree is a class C felony.

Finally, the bill makes theft of mail theft in the third degree which is a class A misdemeanor.

It is unclear how many additional cases or litigation the Criminal Division will see if this bill were to become law. However, it is anticipated that, the Criminal Division can absorb that additional work within its existing budget.
