**INTRODUCTION, FIRST READING, AND REFERENCE  
OF HOUSE BILLS****HB 284**

HOUSE BILL NO. 284 by the House Rules Committee by request of the Governor, entitled:

"An Act relating to the Multistate Tax Compact; relating to apportionment of income to the state; establishing a state sales and use tax; relating to taxes levied by cities and boroughs; relating to the corporate income tax; authorizing the Department of Revenue to enter into the Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Agreement or substantially similar agreement; relating to the oil and gas production tax; establishing an infrastructure maintenance surcharge on oil; establishing a pipeline corridor maintenance fund; and providing for an effective date."

was read the first time and referred to the Finance Committee.

1. Fiscal, Dept. of Revenue

The Governor's transmittal letter dated January 26 follows:

"Dear Speaker Edgmon:

Under the authority of Article III, Section 18 of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to a comprehensive fiscal plan.

For too long, Alaska's economic growth has been stymied by uncertainty and volatility. We are one of the few states that depend so heavily on a single commodity, subject to daily price swings, to fund state government. This bill is one part of a comprehensive fiscal plan to stabilize state finances, limit spending growth, share responsibility among Alaskans, major industries, and nonresidents, attract investment, and restore rules-based payment of the annual Permanent Fund Dividend.

Alaska needs a better path than a simple "tax-and-spend" approach: raising taxes just to support government growth. Alongside this bill, I am proposing a one-percent spending cap to rein in growth and avoid unnecessary increases in the burden on Alaskans. The plan also includes a Government Sunset and Reauthorization process designed to review agencies on a consistent schedule to measure their performance and determine if they are meeting the needs of Alaskans. Finally, one of the most important features of this plan is a proposed constitutional amendment to implement the 50/50 split between the Permanent Fund Dividend and funding state government operations, returning to a rules-based system for paying Alaskans' annual dividend.

This bill contains a seasonal sales tax set at four percent from April 1 to September 30, and at two percent from October 1 through March 31. All who benefit from Alaska's public services – residents, workers, and visitors – will share in supporting those services. The sales tax sunsets in 2034, as Alaska's fiscal position improves. The bill also temporarily raises the minimum tax floor for oil and gas production from four percent to six percent. It returns to four percent in 2032 or the calendar year following average daily throughput reaching 650,000 barrels per day. Additionally, this bill contains a \$0.15 per barrel surcharge to fund operations and maintenance costs related to the Trans Alaska Pipeline Corridor. Finally, this bill implements a market-based sourcing rule for corporate income tax and the corporate income tax is eliminated in 2031. These changes are intended to encourage investment in Alaska.

Alaska has prosperous years ahead. Starting in Fiscal Year 2033, Alaska is projected to see higher revenue due to expected increases in pipeline throughput and the Alaska LNG Project. This comprehensive

plan is designed to bridge the next seven years by stabilizing state finances, limiting spending growth, restoring a rules-based PFD, and sharing responsibility through targeted, time-limited revenue measures that support investment and predictability.

I urge your prompt and favorable action on this measure.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT. It is the intent of the legislature that the commissioner model the biennial report required under AS 16.05.050(c), added by sec. 2 of this Act, on the Department of Fish and Game's Professional Publication No. 08-01, titled "Economic Impacts and Contributions of Sportfishing in Alaska, 2007.

**\* Sec. 2.** AS 16.05.050 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

(c) The commissioner shall produce and disseminate to the public a biennial report on the economic impacts of sport fishing in the state.

**\* Sec. 3.** AS 16.05.130 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

(i) Money accruing to the state from the sport fishing angler access surcharge imposed by AS 16.05.340(I) shall be deposited in a separate account known as the sport fishing angler access account within the fish and game fund. The department shall allocate money in the angler access account to production and dissemination of the biennial report on the economic impacts of sport fishing in the state required under AS 16.05.050(c) and programs intended to directly benefit license purchasers through the development and improvement of access to and services and facilities for lakes, ponds, or waterways not related to motor or power boat use. In allocating money from the account, the department shall apportion \$1 from the surcharge imposed on each license by AS 16.05.340(I) to the production and dissemination of the biennial report required under AS 16.05.050(c).

**\* Sec. 4.** AS 16.05.340(i) is amended to read:

(i) If the commissioner determines that residents of the state are entitled to obtain licenses for sport fishing, including sport fishing for anadromous king salmon, in Yukon, Canada, for the same fees that are charged to residents of Yukon for comparable sport fishing licenses, the commissioner may adopt regulations authorizing residents of Yukon to receive

(1) nonresident annual sport fishing licenses for the fees charged to residents under (a) **and (l)** of this section for a resident sport fishing license; and

(2) nonresident anadromous king salmon annual tags for the fee charged to residents under (a) of this section for a resident anadromous king salmon tag.

\* **Sec. 5.** AS 16.05.340 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

(l) In addition to the fees for a sport fishing license set out in (a) and (d) of this section, each person who purchases a sport fishing license shall pay a sport fishing angler access surcharge as set out in this subsection. The purpose of the surcharge is to provide funding for angler access of sport fisheries not related to motor or power boat use. A person who is eligible for a \$5 resident hunting, trapping, and sport fishing license under (a)(6) of this section or a free license under AS 16.05.341 is exempt from payment of the surcharge imposed under this subsection. The surcharge authorized by this subsection shall take effect on the date established by regulation by the commissioner. The amount of the surcharge attached to each sport fishing license must be clearly disclosed on the sport fishing license. The amount of the sport fishing angler access surcharge to be paid under this subsection for each sport fishing license is as follows:

(1) resident sport fishing license	\$5
(2) resident hunting and sport fishing license	5
(3) resident hunting, trapping, and sport fishing license	5
(4) nonresident 14-day sport fishing license	26
(5) nonresident seven-day sport fishing license	21
(6) nonresident three-day sport fishing license	11
(7) nonresident one-day sport fishing license	6
(8) nonresident annual sport fishing license	41
(9) special nonresident military small game and sport fishing license	5
(10) special nonresident military sport fishing license	5"
