4 SIXTH LEGISLATURE - FIRST SESSION
5 A BILL

6 For an Act entitled: "An Act authorizing a program of state aid for local
7 school and other municipal purposes; and providing
8 for an effective date.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

10 * Section 1. AS 14.17.060(a) is amended to read:

11 (a) The average daily membership allotment for each district is
12 as follows:

13 (1) if the district is in the Southeastern or Southcentral
14 Senate Districts [DISTRICT]: \$215 [\$155] times average daily member-
15 ship;

16 [(2) IF THE DISTRICT IS IN THE SOUTHCENTRAL SENATE DISTRICT:
17 \$165 TIMES AVERAGE DAILY MEMBERSHIP;]

18 (3) if the district is in the Central and Northwest Senate
19 Districts and that part of the Southcentral Senate District lying
20 west of 152° west longitude: \$235 [\$175] times the average daily
21 attendance.

22 * Sec. 2. AS 14.12 is amended by adding a new section to read:

23 Sec. 14.12.025. STATE AID FOR DISTRICT SCHOOL FACILITIES. (a) By
24 October 1 of the fiscal year, the department shall pay to each city or
25 borough school district a sum of money according to the formula pre-
26 scribed in (b) of this section. The state aid authorized in this sec-
27 tion shall be utilized by the district exclusively for

28 (1) the construction, rehabilitation, repair and maintenance
29 of district school facilities,

1 (3) retirement of the principal and interest of outstanding
2 bonded indebtedness incurred by the city or borough for school district
3 facilities.

4 (b) Each borough or city school district is entitled to an alloca-
5 tion under (a) of this section according to the following formula:

6 (1) a basic allotment to each district according to average
7 daily membership, as follows:

Average Daily Membership	Basic Allotment
0 - 999	\$ 15,000
1,000 - 2,499	12,000
2,500 - 4,999	9,000
5,000 - 9,999	6,000
10,000 or over	3,000

14 (2) an additional amount to each district equal to \$50 times
15 the average daily membership of the district.

16 (c) Each district shall maintain financial records of the receipt
17 and disbursement of money received under this section. The records
18 shall be in a form required by the commissioner and shall be subject to
19 audit by the commissioner or the board at any time.

20 * Sec. 3. AS 14.17 is amended by adding a new section to read:

21 Sec. 14.17.215. STATE AID TO DISTRICTS AFFECTED BY STATE ACTIVI-
22 TIES. A school district which provides free public education to a
23 student whose parent works on or lives on state property shall receive
24 an additional yearly allotment under this chapter equal to the percentag
25 of the state average cost of education, as reflected in the audit report
26 of district schools for the prior fiscal year, per student times the
27 number of qualifying students in average daily membership, as follows:

28 (1) 50 per cent for a student whose parent lives on and
29 works on state property;

1 (2) 25 per cent for a student whose parent works on state
2 property;

3 (3) 25 per cent for a student whose parent lives on state
4 property;

5 (b) In this section "state property" means real property which is
6 owned by the state or is leased by the state and which is not subject
7 to taxation or payments in lieu of taxes by the state or a political
8 subdivision of the state; the term includes real property owned by
9 the state and leased from it, as well as improvements leased from it,
10 even though the lessee's interest, or an improvement on the property,
11 is subject to taxation by a state or a political subdivision of the
12 state.

13 * Sec. 4. AS 18.65 is amended by adding a new section to read:

14 ARTICLE 2. STATE AID FOR LOCAL POLICE PROTECTION.

15 Sec. 18.65.150. STATE AID TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS. During each
16 fiscal year the state shall pay to a city or organized borough of any
17 class which has power to provide for police protection and exercises
18 the power a sum to be used for protection services equal to \$5 per
19 capita for the population of the city or borough, as determined by the
20 latest figures of the United States Bureau of the Census or other re-
21 liable population data. If a borough exercises the power in the borough
22 area outside cities only, or within a service area only, the grant
23 authorized under this section shall be based on the population of the
24 borough area outside cities or the service area respectively.

25 * Sec. 5. AS 18.30 is amended by adding a new section to read:

26 Sec. 18.30.050. STATE AID TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS. During each
27 fiscal year the state shall pay to a city or organized borough of any
28 class which has power to provide for air or water pollution control
29 or both and exercises the power a sum to be used for control purposes

1 equal to \$1 per capita for the population of the city or borough, as
2 determined by the latest figures of the United States Bureau of the
3 Census or other reliable population data. If a borough exercises the
4 power in the borough area outside cities only, or in a service area
5 only, the grant authorized under this section shall be based on the
6 population of the borough area outside cities or the service area
7 respectively.

8 * Sec. 6. AS 18.55 is amended by adding a new section to read:

9 Sec. 18.55.975. STATE AID TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS. During each
10 fiscal year the state shall pay to a city or organized borough of any
11 class which has power to provide for land use planning and exercises
12 that power a sum to be used for the planning services equal to \$1 per
13 capita for the population of the city or borough, as determined by the
14 latest figures of the United States Bureau of the Census or other re-
15 liable population data. If a third class borough exercises the power
16 in the borough area outside cities only, or in a service area only, the
17 grant authorized under this section shall be based on the population
18 of the borough area outside cities or the service area respectively.

19 * Sec. 7. AS 19.20 is amended by adding a new section to read:

20 Sec. 19.20.100. STATE AID TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS. During each
21 fiscal year the state shall pay to a city or organized borough of any
22 class which has power to provide for road maintenance and exercises
23 the power a sum to be used for road maintenance purposes equal to
24 \$1,000 a mile for each mile of municipal road, street or highway main-
25 tained by the local government and for the maintenance of which the
26 state does not provide funds to the municipality.

27 * Sec. 8. AS 18.70 is amended by adding a new section to read:

28 **ARTICLE 4. STATE AID FOR LOCAL FIRE PROTECTION.**

29 Sec. 18.70.200. STATE AID TO LOCAL AREAS. (a) During each fiscal

1 year the state shall pay to a city or organized borough of any class
2 which has power to provide for fire protection and exercises the power,
3 or in which a regularly organized fire department functions, a sum to
4 be used for fire protection services equal to \$2.50 per capita for the
5 population of the city or borough, as determined by the latest figures
6 of the United States Bureau of the Census or other reliable population
7 data. If a borough exercises the power in the borough area outside
8 cities only or in a service area only, or if a regularly organized
9 fire department functions primarily within either area, the grant
10 authorized under this section shall be based on the population of the
11 borough area outside cities or the service area respectively.

12 (b) In (a) of this section "regularly organized volunteer fire
13 department" means a volunteer fire department registered with the state
14 fire marshal which has official recognition and financial support from
15 the city or organized borough in which it is located.

16 (c) In addition to the grants authorized under (a) of this
17 section, the state shall pay to a volunteer fire department registered
18 with the state fire marshal and serving an area not in an organized
19 borough or a city a sum for protection purposes equal to \$2.50 per
20 capita for the population served by the department, as determined by
21 the state fire marshal using the latest figures of the United States
22 Bureau of the Census or other reliable data. Grants shall be made on
23 the same basis to facilitate the organization of volunteer fire depart-
24 ments in an area not in an organized borough or a city, upon applica-
25 tion of the proposed fire protection group to the state fire marshal
26 and approval of applications according to standards of organization
27 and service prescribed by regulations promulgated by the state fire
28 marshal.

29 • Sec. 9. This Act takes effect July 1, 1969.
