3 IN THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA

4 SEVENTH LEGISLATURE - FIRST SESSION

5 Relating to the issuance of a permit  
6 for the trans-Alaska pipeline.

7 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES:

8 WHEREAS at the recent hearings held under the auspices of the Depart-  
9 ment of the Interior in Washington, D. C. and Anchorage regarding the  
10 proposed trans-Alaska pipeline, Alaska's Governor has made clear the state's  
11 position -- the pipeline must be built in order that the state be enabled  
12 to take care of its human needs; and

13 WHEREAS the Governor has made it known the state's position is that  
14 the pipeline can be built with minimal environmental change; and

15 WHEREAS he has pointed out to the hearing panel that the state is doing  
16 and will do everything necessary to ensure adequate and strictly enforced  
17 environmental protection programs; and

18 WHEREAS the state is moving forward in a positive manner to ensure the  
19 ultimate protection of our great land by considering such safeguards as the  
20 creation of a geologic-geophysical division in the Department of Natural  
21 Resources, creation of a Department of Environmental Conservation, establish-  
22 ment of a joint federal-state commission on land-use planning, the establish-  
23 ment of reserves to protect Alaska's critical habitat zones, strict enforce-  
24 ment of ballast discharge laws, state monitoring of the pipeline construction,  
25 and strong measures regarding the safe navigation of our waters by the oil  
26 tankers; and

27 WHEREAS the testimony taken as a whole at the Washington and Anchorage  
28 hearings clearly indicates the correctness of the Governor's position that  
29 the Prudhoe Bay to Valdez route is not only the most feasible route for the

1 pipeline but that it can be constructed without environmental degradation to  
2 any appreciable degree; and

3 WHEREAS by far the majority of Alaskans who testified at these hearings  
4 desired to have the pipeline built and viewed it as an economic necessity;

5 BE IT RESOLVED by the Alaska House of Representatives that it supports  
6 the clear and concise position of the state, as presented by Governor Egan  
7 at the recent Interior hearings; and be it

8 FURTHER RESOLVED that the House of Representatives urgently requests  
9 the Department of the Interior to issue the pipeline permit in the most  
10 expeditious manner possible after a review of the testimony from the impact  
11 report hearings.

14 Secretary of the Department of the Interior; the Honorable Henry M. Jackson,

16 Committee; the Honorable Wayne N. Aspinall, U. S. Representative and Chair-  
17 man of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee; and to the Honorable  
18 Ted Stevens and the Honorable Mike Gravel, U. S. Senators, and the Honorable  
19 Nick Begich, U. S. Representative, members of the Alaska delegation in  
20 Congress.
