5 A BILL

6 For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to the Office of Child Advocacy;
7 and providing for an effective date."

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 * Section 1. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS. The legislature finds that

10 (1) there is a need to build public response to the problems con-
11 fronting Alaska's population, specifically young people, so that maximum
12 community and human resources are mobilized to provide services for youth and
13 to assure them their full rights as human beings;

14 (2) there exists a demand within the state for development oppor-
15 tunities for children, and lay and expert opinions hold that the availability
16 of child development experience can be a significant and positive factor in
17 the development of adult personality, talent and character;

18 (3) too little is known about the optimum type and content of this
19 experience and in fact realizes that there may be no optimum, but rather a
20 need for a variety of programs tailored to fit the needs of children from
21 diverse backgrounds;

22 (4) because Alaska is geographically remote from major United
23 States population centers where much existing research is in process in the
24 field of child development, it is vital that Alaska provide various diverse
25 models for child development and that there needs to be established a
26 clearinghouse for the exchange of information and ideas, and periodic state
27 conferences on child development, and that progress be made toward periodic
28 evaluation of model projects in this field; and

29 (5) availability of child development programs will permit more

1 parents to participate in the economic life of the community, will thus make
2 available new talent in our economic life, and will relieve some households
3 from a cycle of economic dependency upon government.

4 * Sec. 2. AS 47 is amended by adding a new chapter to read:

5 CHAPTER 45. OFFICE OF CHILD ADVOCACY.

6 Sec. 47.45.010. OFFICE OF CHILD ADVOCACY. There is created in the
7 Office of the Governor the Office of Child Advocacy to act as a coordin-
8 ating body for services for children from prenatal to age 18. The Office
9 of Child Advocacy is administered by a director appointed by the board of
10 directors with the approval of the governor. Staff may be employed in
11 accordance with appropriate budgets.

12 Sec. 47.45.020. BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR THE OFFICE OF CHILD
13 ADVOCACY. There is created a board of directors for the Office of Child
14 Advocacy. The board consists of the Alaska State Council on the Coordin-
15 ation of Community Child Care plus four members not more than 18 years
16 of age appointed by the governor for a term of two years each, or until
17 the youthful member attains the age of 19 years.

18 Sec. 47.45.030. POWERS AND DUTIES OF BOARD AND DIRECTOR. (a) The
19 board of directors for the Office of Child Advocacy shall determine policy
20 and establish program priorities, and shall serve as a child advocacy
21 agency in the state. The board shall

22 (1) coordinate public and private programs and priorities
23 which affect children and child development;

24 (2) develop guidelines to improve children and child develop-
25 ment services throughout the state, including the development of program
26 standards, training for paraprofessionals and professional personnel and
27 monitoring and evaluation procedures;

28 (3) assist local communities in the initiation of child
29 development programs including information about pertinent legislation

1 and funding and consultant resources;

2 (4) identify, coordinate and develop a comprehensive plan for
3 the use of public and private resources, including the services of
4 volunteers;

5 (5) provide leadership in recommending legislative change
6 which affects the provision of children and child development services;
7 review existing state policies as they relate to, and affect the legal
8 status and well-being of children;

9 (6) develop innovative approaches for involving parent-
10 consumers on both the state and local level in program planning and
11 policy making.

12 (b) The director shall carry out the policies and programs set out
13 by the board of directors.

14 Sec. 47.45.040. COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES. Members of the board
15 of directors for the Office of Child Advocacy receive no salary but are
16 entitled to per diem and travel expenses authorized by law and other
17 boards and commissions.

18 Sec. 47.45.050. DEPARTMENTS TO ASSIST OFFICE OF CHILD ADVOCACY.
19 The Department of Health and Social Services, the Department of Education,
20 the Department of Labor and all other departments and agencies of the
21 state which have programs or services pertaining to children shall coop-
22 erate with the Office of Child Advocacy and shall furnish technical
23 assistance and personnel, if available, upon request.

24 * Sec. 3. This Act takes effect July 1, 1972.
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
