5 A BILL

6 For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to state support for education; and
7 providing for an effective date."

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 * Section 1. FINDINGS. The legislature finds that the present system of
10 providing basic state and supplemental financial support to school districts
11 is no longer equitable and directs the Department of Education to conduct a
12 comprehensive study of the funding provisions of AS 14.17. The legislature
13 further finds that during the period of study an alternative mechanism to the
14 existing foundation support program is desirable.

15 * Sec. 2. The operation of AS 14.17.021(a), 14.17.022, 14.17.023, 14.17.-
16 031, 14.17.041, 14.17.051, 14.17.056, and 14.17.082 is suspended from July 1,
17 1982, through June 30, 1984. During the period of suspension funding for the
18 basic state aid and supplemental equalization aid that otherwise would have
19 been provided under the provisions of AS 14.17.021(a), 14.17.022, and 14.17.-
20 023 shall be provided to school districts and for centralized correspondence
21 study in accordance with the provisions of secs. 3 and 4 of this Act.

22 * Sec. 3. For fiscal year 1983 the amount of state aid for each school
23 district and for centralized correspondence study is the following amount for
24 each pupil in average daily membership:

21 * Sec. 4. For fiscal year 1984 the amount of state aid for each school
22 district and for centralized correspondence study is the amount listed for
23 that district in sec. 3 of this Act for each pupil in average daily membership
24 plus five percent.

25 * Sec. 5. During the period of suspension under sec. 2 of this Act, a
26 school district may not reduce its special education budget below the amount
27 contained in the fiscal year 1983 budget the district submitted to the Depart-
28 ment of Education by May 31, 1982, except that if the department reduces the
29 district's total foundation entitlement due to insufficient appropriation,

1 then the district may reduce its special education budget in the proportion
2 by which the department reduced the district's foundation entitlement.

3 * Sec. 6. During the period of suspension under sec. 2 of this Act, a
4 school district shall continue to provide services to students in programs
5 of bilingual and vocational education commensurate with the needs of the
6 students and in strict accordance with applicable state and federal laws
7 and regulations.

8 * Sec. 7. This Act takes effect July 1, 1982.
