4 FIFTEENTH LEGISLATURE - FIRST SESSION
5 Relating to Fetal Alcohol Syndrome
6 Awareness Week.
7 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:
8 WHEREAS fetal alcohol syndrome is one of the three major causes in the
9 United States of birth defects accompanied by mental retardation, and the
10 only preventable one; and
11 WHEREAS fetal alcohol syndrome can result in serious health problems,
12 such as heart defects, growth deficiencies associated with mental retarda-
13 tion, and developmental disabilities that retard a child's ability to walk
14 and speak; and
15 WHEREAS fetal alcohol syndrome has only recently been discovered to be
16 a major health problem and many questions regarding the illness remain
17 unanswered; and
18 WHEREAS, without exception, mothers of infants born with fetal alcohol
19 syndrome consumed alcohol during pregnancy; and
20 WHEREAS pregnant women who consume alcohol also risk having babies
21 with a series of other health problems, called fetal alcohol-related birth
22 effects, which include increased irritability and hyperactivity; and
23 WHEREAS fetal alcohol syndrome and fetal alcohol-related birth effects
24 can be prevented if pregnant women and women who plan to become pregnant
25 abstain from alcohol consumption; and
26 WHEREAS the Surgeon General has issued an advisory that pregnant women
27 and women who plan to become pregnant should not consume alcohol;
28 BE IT RESOLVED by the Alaska State Legislature that May 10 - 16, 1987,
29 is designated Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Awareness Week, and that schools,

- 1 health care organizations and practitioners, and other public and private
- 2 agencies observe the week with appropriate activities.
