A BILL

6 For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to proposed supplemental or special
7 appropriations; and providing for an effective date."

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 * Section 1. AS 37.07.100 is amended to read:

10 Sec. 37.07.100. PROPOSED SUPPLEMENTAL OR SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS.

11 The governor from time to time may transmit to the legislature pro-
12 posed supplemental or special appropriations in accordance with AS
13 37.07.070 which in the governor's judgment are necessary. However, if
14 the governor finds that an emergency situation necessitates the pro-
15 posal of supplemental or special appropriations, the governor may
16 transmit them to the legislature at any time. The governor shall
17 accompany each proposal with a statement of the reasons for it, in-
18 cluding the reasons for its omission from the budget. An appropria-
19 tion proposed under this subsection must comply with the appropriation
20 limit under art. XV, sec. 29(a), Constitution of the State of Alaska.

21 * Sec. 2. AS 37.07.100 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

22 (b) By March 15, the governor shall determine and report to the
23 legislature the actual rate of inflation for that fiscal year and the
24 projected rate of inflation expected for the entire fiscal year. The
25 determination shall be based on the change in the calendar year aver-
26 age United States consumer price index for all urban consumers. If
27 the governor determines that the projected rate of inflation for the
28 fiscal year exceeds six percent, the governor may transmit to the
29 legislature proposed supplemental or special appropriations in

1 accordance with art. XV, sec. 29(b), Constitution of the State of
2 Alaska.

3 * Sec. 3. This Act takes effect July 1, 1991, if amendments to the
4 Constitution of the State of Alaska relating to an appropriation limit are
5 approved by the voters in 1990.
