6 For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to state response actions and plan-
7 ning involving the release or threatened release of
8 oil or a hazardous substance; and establishing the
9 Alaska State Emergency Response Commission; and
10 providing for an effective date."

11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

12 * Section 1. AS 26.23.020(g) is amended by adding a new paragraph to
13 read:

14 (11) use money from the oil and hazardous substance release
15 response fund, established by AS 46.08.010, to respond to a declared
16 disaster emergency related to an oil or hazardous substance discharge.

17 * Sec. 2. AS 26.23.040 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

18 (f) The Alaska division of emergency services shall establish
19 the oil and hazardous substance response office and perform related
20 duties under AS 46.08.100 - 46.08.190.

21 * Sec. 3. AS 26.23.050(b) is amended to read:

22 (b) Whenever, and to the extent that, money is needed to cope
23 with a disaster, the first recourse shall be to funds regularly appro-
24 priated to state and local agencies. The second recourse shall be to
25 funds available in the disaster relief fund or, for oil or hazardous
26 substances discharges, the oil and hazardous substance release re-
27 sponse fund, as the governor determines appropriate. If money avail-
28 able from these sources is insufficient, and if the governor finds
29 that other sources of money to cope with the disaster are not

1 available or are insufficient, the governor may, notwithstanding any
2 limitation imposed by AS 37.07.080(e), transfer and spend money appro-
3 priated for other purposes or, in situations involving natural disas-
4 ters, borrow from the United States government or other public or
5 private sources for a term not to exceed two years.

7 Sec. 26.23.215. RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER PLANNING STATUTES. To the
8 extent that the state emergency plan, interjurisdictional plans, and
9 local plans prepared under this chapter relate to action required to
10 avert damage from a release of oil or a hazardous substance, the plans
11 must be substantially equivalent in relevant respects to the emergency
12 plans prepared or approved by the Alaska State Emergency Response
13 Commission under AS 46.04.200 - 46.04.210 and AS 46.13 and use the
14 same incident command system used in those plans.

6 directing a person or persons to take action the department believes
7 necessary to meet the emergency, and protect the public health, wel-

9 granted to the oil and hazardous substance response office under
10 AS 46.08.140. However, if the situation for which the department
11 declares an emergency develops into a catastrophic oil discharge, as
12 defined in AS 46.04.900, or becomes a declared disaster emergency
13 under AS 26.23, the division of emergency services, Department of
14 Military and Veterans' Affairs, shall exercise the authority of the
15 department under this subsection and the department's activities shall
16 be subject to the approval of the division. An order issued by the
17 department under this subsection remains valid after the emergency
18 develops into a catastrophic oil discharge or becomes a declared
19 disaster emergency until the order is rescinded or modified by an
20 order of the division of emergency services, Department of Military
21 and Veterans' Affairs.

23 (c) During a period of emergency declared under (a) of this
24 section, each state agency, including, when appropriate, the division
25 of emergency services, Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs
26 [UNDER THE AUTHORITY CONFERRED BY AS 26.20], shall take whatever
27 action the department finds necessary to meet the emergency [,] and to
28 protect the public health, welfare, or environment. However, if the
29 situation for which the department declared an emergency develops into

1 a catastrophic oil discharge, as defined in AS 46.04.900, or becomes a
2 declared disaster under AS 26.23, each state agency, including the
3 department, shall take whatever action the division of emergency
4 services finds is necessary to meet the disaster and to protect the
5 public health, welfare, or environment.

6 * Sec. 10. AS 46.04.080(a) is amended to read:

7 (a) The actual or imminent occurrence of a catastrophic oil
8 discharge constitutes a disaster emergency under AS 26.23 without a
9 declaration of disaster by the governor under AS 26.23.020. The [.
10 HOWEVER, THE] department shall augment and support [PERFORM THE DUTIES
11 OF] the Alaska division of emergency services, Department of Military
12 and Veterans' Affairs, in the performance of the division's duties
13 under AS 26.23.040 and AS 46.08.100 - 46.08.190 as they apply to
14 catastrophic oil discharges. During a response to a catastrophic oil
15 discharge, the [THE] department shall consult and coordinate its
16 duties [UNDER THIS SECTION] with the Alaska division of emergency ser-
17 vices and act under directives of the division.

19 (a) The department, when feasible, shall enter into contracts
20 with persons or private organizations to provide the personnel, equip-

24 feasible, the department may establish and maintain at ports, harbors,

5 (4) identify actions necessary to reduce the likelihood of
6 catastrophic oil discharges and significant discharges of hazardous
7 substances.

8 (c) In preparing and annually reviewing the state master plan,
9 the commission [COMMISSIONER] shall

10 (1) consult with municipal and community officials, and
11 with representatives of affected regional organizations;

12 (2) submit the draft plan to the public for review and
13 comment;

14 (3) submit to the legislature for review, not later than
15 the 10th day following the convening of each regular session, the plan
16 and any annual revision of the plan; and

17 (4) require or schedule unannounced oil spill drills to
18 test the sufficiency of an oil discharge contingency plan approved
19 under AS 46.04.030 or of the cleanup plans of a party identified under
20 (b)(2) of this section.

11 eral of the Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs or a desig-

16 general of the Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs, or the

18 sioner of environmental conservation, or the commissioner's designee,
19 shall serve as vice-chair. Members of the commission other than those
20 from the designated state departments serve at the pleasure of the
21 governor for staggered terms of three years. Members of the commis-
22 sion serve without compensation but are entitled to per diem and
23 travel expenses authorized for members of boards and commissions under
24 AS 39.20.180.

25 Sec. 46.13.040. POWERS AND DUTIES OF COMMISSION. The commission
26 shall

27 (1) serve as the state emergency response commission re-
28 quired under 42 U.S.C. 11001 - 11005;

29 (2) designate, and revise as necessary, the boundaries of

1 emergency planning districts, using the boundaries of political sub-
2 divisions if appropriate;

3 (3) review, oversee, and facilitate the preparation and
4 implementation of emergency plans for hazardous substance response,
5 including the statewide and local plans prepared under AS 26.23;

6 (4) prepare, review, and revise the statewide and regional
7 master oil and hazardous substance discharge and prevention contingen-
8 cy plans required under AS 46.04.200 - 46.04.210;

9 (5) establish a local emergency planning committee for each
10 emergency planning district, and appoint, and revise as necessary, the
11 membership of each committee;

12 (6) supervise and coordinate the activities of local emer-
13 gency planning committees;

14 (7) establish procedures for receiving and processing
15 requests from the public for information under 42 U.S.C. 11044, in-
16 cluding tier II information under 42 U.S.C. 11022;

17 (8) perform other coordinating, advisory, or planning tasks
18 related to hazardous substance emergency planning and preparedness,
19 community right-to-know reporting, toxic chemical release reporting,
20 or management of hazardous substances;

21 (9) provide procedures and oversight to integrate, as
22 appropriate, hazardous substance response planning under 42 U.S.C.
23 11001 - 11005, federal contingency planning under 33 U.S.C. 1321 and
24 other federal laws applicable to hazardous substance discharges, and
25 state, regional, and local hazardous substance contingency planning
26 under AS 26.23 and AS 46.04.200 - 46.04.210;

27 (10) to the extent consistent with the constitution and law
28 of the state, perform all other functions prescribed for state emer-
29 gency response commissions under 42 U.S.C. 11001 - 11005; and

1 (11) adopt regulations necessary to carry out the purposes
2 of this chapter and 42 U.S.C. 11001 - 11005.

3 Sec. 46.13.050. AGENCY COOPERATION. The commission may request
4 data, reports, or other information from a state agency. To the
5 extent feasible and not otherwise prohibited by laws making specific
6 information confidential and nondisclosable, a state agency shall
7 cooperate with the commission and furnish the commission with the
8 information and assistance necessary to accomplish the purposes of 42
9 U.S.C. 11001 - 11005 and this chapter.

10 Sec. 46.13.060. EMERGENCY PLANNING DISTRICT BOUNDARIES. Bound-
11 aries for emergency planning districts are the regions designated by
12 the division of emergency services, Department of Military and Veter-
13 ans' Affairs unless otherwise designated by the commission.

14 Sec. 46.13.070. LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEES. The com-
15 mission shall establish and appoint the members of a local emergency
16 planning committee for each emergency planning district. Each commit-
17 tee must include, at a minimum, representatives from each of the
18 following groups or organizations: elected state and local officials;
19 law enforcement; civil defense; fire fighting; first aid; health;
20 local environmental, hospital, and transportation personnel; broadcast
21 and print media; community groups; and owners and operators of facili-
22 ties subject to the requirements of 42 U.S.C. 11001 - 11005.

23 Sec. 46.13.080. DUTIES OF LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEES.
24 Each local emergency planning committee shall

25 (1) establish procedures for receiving and processing
26 requests from the public for information under 42 U.S.C. 11044, in-
27 cluding tier II information under 42 U.S.C. 11022;

28 (2) appoint a chair and establish rules by which the com-
29 mittee shall function, including provisions for public notification of

1 committee activities, public meetings to discuss the emergency plan,
2 public comments, response to the comments by the committee, distribu-
3 tion of the emergency plan, and designation of an official to serve as
4 coordinator for information;

5 (3) prepare and periodically review an emergency plan in
6 accordance with 42 U.S.C. 11003(a);

7 (4) evaluate the need for resources necessary to develop,
8 implement, and exercise the emergency plan, and make recommendations
9 with respect to additional resources that may be required and the
10 means for providing the additional resources;

11 (5) to the extent consistent with the constitution and law
12 of the state, perform all other functions prescribed for emergency
13 planning committees in 42 U.S.C. 11001 - 11005; and

14 (6) participate as a local advisory committee in the prepa-
15 ration of statewide regional contingency plans.

16 Sec. 46.13.090. EMERGENCY PLANS. (a) Each emergency plan must
17 include

18 (1) identification of facilities subject to the require-
19 ments of 42 U.S.C. 11001 - 11005 that are within the emergency plan-
20 ning district, identification of routes likely to be used for the
21 transportation of substances on the list of extremely hazardous sub-
22 stances referred to in 42 U.S.C. 302(a), and identification of addi-
23 tional facilities contributing or subjected to additional risk due to
24 their proximity to facilities subject to the requirements of 42 U.S.C.
25 11001 - 11005 such as hospitals or natural gas facilities;

26 (2) methods and procedures to be followed by facility
27 owners and operators and local emergency and medical personnel to
28 respond to a release of hazardous substances, and to a release of
29 substances on the list of extremely hazardous substances referred to

1 in 42 U.S.C. 302(a);

2 (3) designation of a community emergency coordinator and
3 facility emergency coordinators, who shall make determinations neces-
4 sary to implement the emergency plan;

5 (4) procedures providing reliable, effective, and timely
6 notification by the facility emergency coordinators to persons des-
7 ignated in the emergency plan, and to the public, that a release has
8 occurred, consistent with the emergency notification requirements of
9 42 U.S.C. 11004;

10 (5) methods for determining the occurrence of a release,
11 and the area or population likely to be affected by that release;

12 (6) a description of emergency equipment and facilities in
13 the community and at each facility in the community subject to the
14 requirements of 42 U.S.C. 11001 - 11005, and an identification of the
15 persons responsible for the equipment and facilities;

16 (7) evacuation plans, including provisions for a precau-

18 (b) The council consists of the adjutant general of the Depart-
19 ment of Military and Veterans' Affairs, the commissioner of environ-
20 mental conservation, a representative of the University of Alaska
21 appointed by the governor, the governor's senior science advisor, a
22 representative of the Prince William Sound Science Center in Cordova
23 appointed by the governor, and four other members, one from each
24 judicial district of the state, appointed by the governor, with broad
25 experience or expertise in one or more of the following areas: phys-
26 ical or biological science; oil technology, transportation, or manage-

13 Sec. 46.13.120. DUTIES OF THE COUNCIL. The council shall

14 (1) review and recommend to the Department of Environmental
15 Conservation research topics for it to pursue under its authority in
16 AS 46.03.020(a)(14);

17 (2) establish testing protocols to be used by the Depart-
18 ment of Environmental Conservation to evaluate the effectiveness of
19 hazardous substance spill technologies for use in the state;

20 (3) identify sources of money that may be available for
21 discharge-related research;

22 (4) make proposals to the governor and commission to en-
23 courage and fund prevention, response, cleanup, and mitigation of
24 future discharges of hazardous substances;

14 Sec. 46.13.130. INVESTIGATIONS; HEARINGS. (a) The council may
15 issue subpoenas, administer oaths, and conduct investigations related
16 to its duties.

17 (b) The council may compel the attendance of witnesses and
18 production of papers, books, records, accounts, documents, and testi-
19 mony, and may have the deposition of witnesses taken in a manner
20 prescribed by court rule or law for the taking of depositions in civil
21 actions when consistent with the duties assigned to the council.

22 (c) On a majority vote of the council, subpoenas and subpoenas
23 duces tecum may be issued and served in the manner prescribed by
24 AS 44.62.430(b) and (c) and court rule. The failure, refusal, or
