A BILL

6 For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to payment for podiatrists' services
7 under the state medical assistance program."

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 * Section 1. AS 47.07.030(b) is amended to read:

10 (b) In addition to the mandatory services specified in (a) of
11 this section, the department may offer only the following optional
12 services: case management and nutrition services for pregnant women;
13 personal care services in a recipient's home; emergency hospital
14 services; long-term care noninstitutional services; medical supplies
15 and equipment; clinic services; inpatient psychiatric facility ser-
16 vices for individuals age 65 or older and individuals under age 21;
17 physical therapy; occupational therapy; chiropractic services; treat-
18 ment of speech, hearing, and language disorders; adult dental ser-
19 vices; prosthetic devices and eyeglasses; optometrists' services;
20 podiatrists' services; intermediate care facility services, including
21 intermediate care facility services for the mentally retarded; skilled
22 nursing facility services for individuals under age 21; and reasonable
23 transportation to and from the point of medical care.

25 Sec. 47.07.035. PRIORITY OF MEDICAL ASSISTANCE. If the depart-
26 ment finds that the cost of medical assistance for all persons
27 eligible under this chapter will exceed the amount allocated in the
28 state budget for that assistance for the fiscal year, the department
29 shall eliminate coverage for optional medical services and optionally

 - 4 (3) [(2)] adult dental services;
 - 5 (4) [(3)] emergency hospital services;

 - 8 (6) [(5)] optometrists' services and eyeglasses;
 - 9 (7) [(6)] occupational therapy;
 - 10 (8) [(7)] prosthetic devices;
 - 11 (9) [(8)] medical supplies and equipment;
 - 12 (10) [(9)] clinic services;
 - 13 (11) [(10)] physical therapy;
 - 14 (12) [(11)] personal care services in a recipient's home;
 - 15 (13) [(12)] long-term care noninstitutional services;
 - 16 (14) [(13)] inpatient psychiatric facility services;
 - 17 (15) [(14)] intermediate care facility services for the
18 mentally retarded;
 - 19 (16) [(15)] intermediate care facility services;
 - 20 (17) [(16)] pregnant women, and children five years of age
21 or younger, with a household income that does not exceed 100 percent
22 of the federal poverty level;
 - 23 (18) [(17)] individuals under age 21 who are not eligible
24 for benefits under the federal aid to families with dependent children
25 program because they are not deprived of one or more of their natural
26 or adoptive parents;
 - 27 (19) [(18)] skilled nursing facility services for persons
28 under age 21;
 - 29 (20) [(19)] aged, blind, and disabled individuals who,

1 because they do not meet the income requirements, do not receive
2 supplemental security income under Title XVI of the Social Security
3 Act, but who are eligible, or would be eligible if they were not in a
4 skilled nursing facility or intermediate care facility, to receive an
5 optional state supplementary payment;

6 (21) [(20)] individuals in a hospital, skilled nursing
7 facility, or intermediate care facility whose income while in the
8 facility does not exceed 300 percent of the supplemental security
9 income benefit rate under Title XVI of the Social Security Act, but
10 who, because of income, are not eligible for the optional state
11 supplementary payment;

12 (22) [(21)] individuals under age 21 under supervision of
13 the department, for whom maintenance is being paid in whole or in part
14 from public money and who are in foster homes or private child-care
15 institutions.
