A BILL

FOR AN ACT ENTITLED

1 **"An Act establishing goals for public education and student performance."**

2 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:**

3 *** Section 1.** AS 14.03.015 is repealed and reenacted to read:

4 Sec. 14.03.015. MISSION FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION. The mission of the public
5 school system is to help ensure that all students succeed in their education and work, shape
6 worthwhile and satisfying lives, exemplify the best values of society, and be effective in
7 improving the character and quality of the world about them. It is the joint responsibility of
8 students, parents, schools, and the community to achieve the mission described in this section.

9 *** Sec. 2.** AS 14.03 is amended by adding a new section to read:

10 Sec. 14.03.017. GOALS FOR STUDENT PERFORMANCE. The public school system
11 shall be operated with the recognition that all students can learn. The goal of the system is to
12 develop successful students. A successful student will graduate and in the process of learning
13 achieve the following:

14 (1) a working knowledge of science, language arts, social studies, mathematics,

- 1 physical education and health, and fine arts;
- 2 (2) the ability to think logically and critically including the ability to
- 3 (A) think clearly about new information and ideas;
- 4 (B) solve problems through different ways of questioning and analysis;
- 5 (C) be open to new ideas and be curious about the world and self;
- 6 (D) have the skills needed to make good decisions;
- 7 (E) understand and use mathematical and scientific ideas;
- 8 (F) have good study skills and habits;
- 9 (G) process and integrate information;
- 10 (H) evaluate and improve ideas through discussions with other people;
- 11 (3) an acceptance of personal responsibility for sustaining a person economically
- 12 including the critical skills, competencies, values, and attitudes to be successful in the workplace,
- 13 including the ability to
- 14 (A) be confident, able, and prepared for opportunities in the local, national,
- 15 and international workplace;
- 16 (B) understand the value of and necessity for lifelong learning, including
- 17 the ability to teach oneself new skills to adjust to a changing workplace;
- 18 (C) show initiative, dependability, punctuality, and to strive for accuracy
- 19 and efficiency on the job;
- 20 (D) willingly accept advice, supervision, and criticism and to be a good
- 21 team member in the workplace;
- 22 (E) be safety conscious;
- 23 (F) be a critical consumer with skills for making informed choices;
- 24 (G) recognize how success in school relates to a person's future;
- 25 (4) the ability to communicate effectively including the ability to
- 26 (A) talk about feelings, ideas, and concepts with clarity;
- 27 (B) be a good listener;
- 28 (C) read, understand, and respond to written information faced in daily
- 29 life;
- 30 (D) appreciate the value of reading as a lifelong activity;
- 31 (E) write well for a variety of purposes and audiences;

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- (5) the ability to discover and nurture creative talents including the ability to
 - (A) appreciate the world around us;
 - (B) take part in activities that cut across fields of study;
 - (C) understand our world and its past, present, and future and be able to express this understanding in a variety of ways and with different media;
 - (D) respect and encourage the creative talents of individuals and groups;
 - (E) demonstrate the knowledge and skills needed to express ideas in literature, visual arts, music, dance, and drama;
- (6) knowledge of how to develop positive self-esteem including the ability to
 - (A) know how to set and achieve personal goals;
 - (B) be confident and flexible;
 - (C) recognize and appreciate personal talents and strengths;
 - (D) form satisfying relationships with others based on respect, trust, cooperation, and compassion;
- (7) the ability to master technological skills including the ability to
 - (A) communicate in the global society with computers, video, audio, and other technologies;
 - (B) use technology to gather, analyze, and evaluate information and opinions;
 - (C) critically evaluate information presented in the mass media;
 - (D) use computers to process and organize information;
 - (E) evaluate the uses of technology and its effect on society and the environment;
- (8) the ability to understand the values of health and fitness including the ability to
 - (A) understand the skills and apply the knowledge needed to promote physical and mental health;
 - (B) respond positively to life's social, environmental, and physical changes;
- (9) knowledge of the values of responsible citizenship including the ability to
 - (A) understand and participate in the democratic process;

- 1 (B) achieve the values, knowledge, and ethical behaviors needed to
2 participate in a democratic society;
- 3 (C) learn the skills and attitudes to be a citizen of the world who accepts
4 and respects differences in peoples and cultures;
- 5 (D) be aware of and appreciate languages other than English;
- 6 (E) achieve skills in leadership, cooperation, communication, and social
7 responsibility;
- 8 (F) understand one's relationship to the environment and be committed to
9 the wise use of resources;
- 10 (G) know parenting skills;
- 11 (H) understand the past.
