8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 • Section 1. AS 44.23 is amended by adding a new section to read:

10 Sec. 44.23.070. FISH AND GAME PROSECUTOR. (a) Within the  
11 Department of Law is the office of the special prosecutor for fish  
12 and game matters.

13 (b) The office of the fish and game prosecutor consists of at  
14 least one assistant attorney general appointed by the attorney general  
15 who is admitted to the practice of law in the state, familiar with  
16 fish and game statutes and regulations of the state, and experienced  
17 in trial practice, and at least one investigator experienced in fish  
18 and game investigation.

19 (c) The Department of Law shall set out separately the expenses  
20 of the office of the fish and game prosecutor as an independent sub-  
21 program or element of the Department of Law budget, which shall be  
22 submitted by the governor in accordance with the Executive Budget Act  
23 (AS 17.07) as part of his annual budget presentation to the legislature.  
24 The funds budgeted shall include sufficient travel expenses to allow  
25 the office to operate effectively in enforcing the fish and game laws  
26 of the state.

27 (d) The fish and game prosecutor shall

28 (1) review all reported violations of state fish and game  
29 laws;

(2) prosecute or oversee the prosecution of cases involving violation of state fish and game laws.

(3) coordinate the activities of the Department of Law in the enforcement of state fish and game laws.

(4) cooperate with the Department of Public Safety personnel responsible for enforcement of state fish and game laws.

(5) submit to the legislature an annual report of its activities including but not limited to the number of reported violations of the state fish and game laws in the period covered by the report, the number of fish and game cases prosecuted, and the disposition of those cases.

(a) The fish and game prosecutor may

(i) conduct investigations of fishing and hunting practices in the state, and

(ii) issue subpoenas to require the attendance of witnesses or the production of documents or other physical evidence, administer oaths, and conduct hearings to aid in investigation or inquiry. Service of an order or subpoena shall be made in the same manner as a summons in a civil action in the superior court.

\* Sec. 2. This Act takes effect July 1, 1975.

Travel:

To carry out the activities listed in RFP 270 we assume 25 trips each by the prosecutor and the investigating attorney for field travel at an average cost of \$124 per day for transportation and per diem; 4 trips out of state by the prosecutor at \$150 per day. Two administrative trips by the prosecutor and one by the investigator at \$200 per day, one trip each by the prosecutor and investigator for private meetings at \$200 per day and one trip out of state by the prosecutor at \$150 per day.

Contractual Services:

Department of Law offices in Anchorage are being assigned additional work which will have to be completed for the prosecution and defense. These fees are estimated at \$10,000 for the prosecution and \$5,000 for the defense. The Anchorage District Attorney's office will also incur some costs for the use of the telephone and other office equipment. The estimated cost of these items is \$1,000 per year.

an average cost of \$346 per trip for transportation and per diem; 2 trips out of state by the Investigator at \$550 per trip; two administrative trips by the Prosecutor and one by the Investigator at \$300 per trip; one trip each by the prosecutor and Investigator for instate meetings at \$300 per trip; and one trip out of state by the prosecutor at \$600 per trip.

Contractual Services - Department of Law offices in Anchorage are fully occupied; additional space will have to be acquired for the prosecutor and staff. Witness fees are budgeted 60% above the present average per prosecutor in the Anchorage District Attorney office; we anticipate fish and game cases will involve more out of state citizens than encountered in other offenses therefore the costs of witness transportation will be higher. Other items of expenditure are averaged from the present costs of operation.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS

SECTION 1. That there be enacted by adding a new section to the

Code of the State of Illinois, to read as follows:

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the State Board of Transportation and Public Utilities to regulate the business of wheels and tickets for the State.

2. The State Board of Transportation and Public Utilities shall have the right to issue orders and regulations to regulate the business of wheels and tickets for the State, and to enforce such orders and regulations. an average cost of \$346 per trip for transportation and per diem; 2 trips out of state by the Investigator at \$550 per trip; two administrative trips by the Prosecutor and one by the Investigator at \$300 per trip; one trip each by the prosecutor and investigator for instate meetings at \$300 per trip; and one trip out of state by the prosecutor at \$600 per trip.

Contractual Services - Department of Law offices in Anchorage are fully occupied; additional space will have to be acquired for the prosecutor and staff. Witness fees are budgeted 60% above the present average per prosecutor in the Anchorage District Attorney office; we anticipate fish and game cases will involve more out of state citizens than encountered in other offenses therefore the costs of witness transportation will be higher. Other items of expenditure are averaged from the present costs of operation.

SENATE BILL NO. 111

AN ACT TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF ALABAMA

SECTION 1. TO AMEND SECTION 1, ARTICLE 1, OF THE CONSTITUTION

AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

SECTION 2. THE RIGHT OF THE PEOPLE TO BE SECURE IN THEIR PERSONS, HOUSES, PAPERS AND EFFECTS, AGAINST UNREASONABLE SEARCHES AND SEIZURES, SHALL NOT BE VIOLATED, AND NO WARRANTS SHALL ISSUE, BUT UPON PROBABLE CAUSE, SUPPORTED BY OATH OR AFFIRMATION, AND PARTICULARLY DESCRIBING THE PLACE TO BE SEARCHED, AND THE PERSONS OR THINGS TO BE SEIZED.

\* Section 2. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

\* Section 3. THIS ACT SHALL TAKE EFFECT FROM THE DATE OF ITS PASSAGE.
