


Dear Senator Croft:

This is in response to your recent inquiry to my office regarding the State's position on the proposed Arctic-Alaska International Conference.

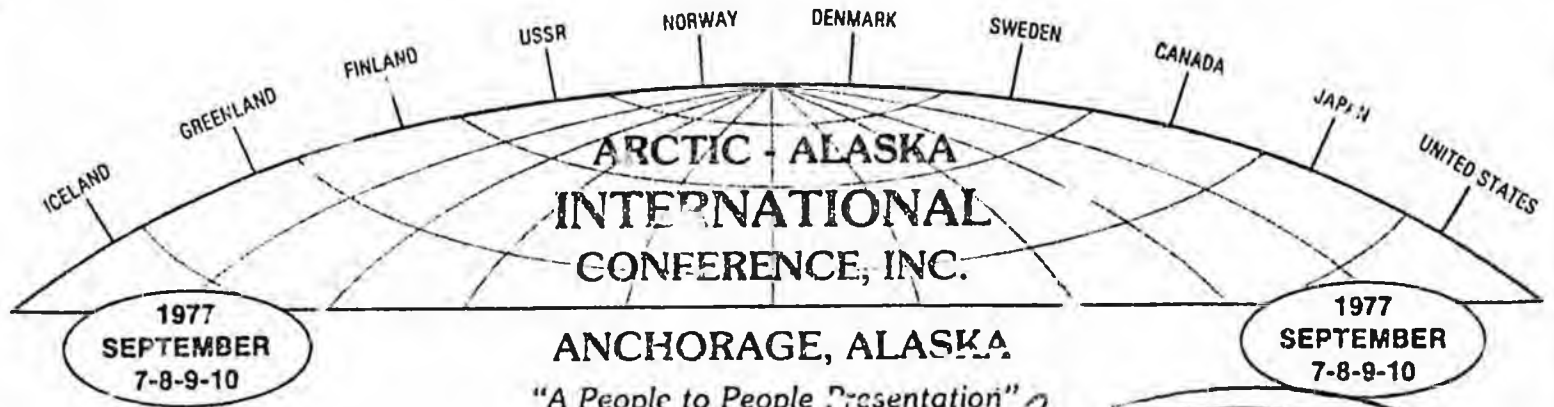
As I am sure you are aware, federal, state, and local governments, have received much correspondence recently from George Byer regarding potential interest to host and bear the cost of this proposal. Upon investigation, there seems to be a singular lack of enthusiasm expressed both at the federal and state level for hosting such an enterprise at this particular time. I want to make it clear I do not oppose the conference; what I do oppose is the state spending such a large amount of money for an Alaskan conference when many questions still remain unanswered regarding who will plan and coordinate the agenda and what are the public purposes which will be addressed by this gathering.

As I am sure you are aware, the State of Alaska is hosting the 1977 Western Governors' Conference, and also the Arctic Research Interest group is conducting a Siberia-Alaska Conference during this year in Alaska. Since there is little interest at the federal level for the Arctic-Alaska International Conference, it is clear that the burden of planning and coordinating this event will fall to the State and place a tremendous additional State expense in both monetary and personnel considerations. It is for this reason that I am not advocating the state host this conference. To express interest in serving as a host for a conference that we feel has an unenthusiastic response at both the state and federal level would be premature. Perhaps at a later date such a gathering could be most appropriately held in Alaska.

Dear Jay...

President Carter has asked the governors to join the First Lady and him in their plans for a people exchange program. 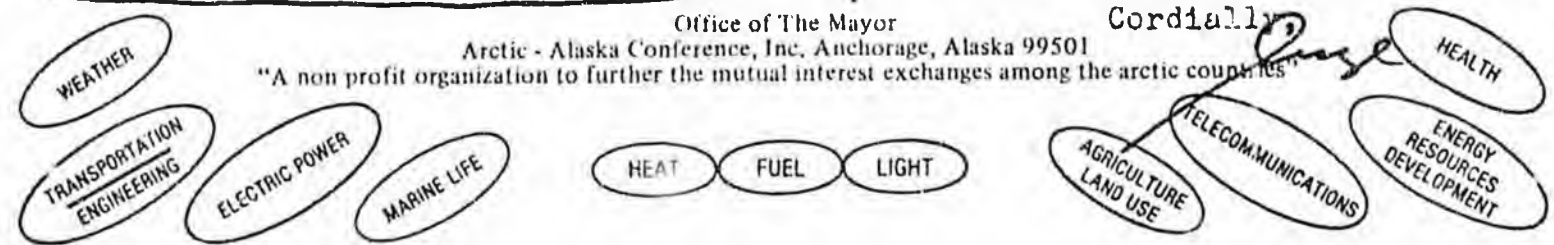

In your March 21/77 letter to Senator Croft relative to the States' position on the Arctic-Alaska Conference, you stated, "I do not oppose the conference-- what I do oppose is the state spending such a large amount of money-----"...

In response to your... "there seems to be a singular lack of enthusiasm expressed both at the federal and state level"... This statement is entirely without foundation and shows a complete lack of informed knowledge. For example, the 1/18/77 letter by the Assist. Secretary for the Dept. of Commerce to Senator Stevens indicates enthusiastic interest in these words... "see the conference as a good forum for discussion and cooperation between participating countries" "subjects are of great interest within the department... will be glad to help publicize the conference and furnish advice on request"...

The State Department position is committal with the interest of the governor. Letters of praise and their 76 invitations to the Arctic countries were sent following the states' assured interest in your White House contacts and the wire to President Ford. The states' personnel position is the same, enthused only if the governor shows interest. And since the conf. was acceptable by you last year, your premature statement appears without reason or fact.

If you consider \$25,000 as requested in Senator Croft's bill, a big amount of money, then you have no valued judgement of the merits, interest or benefits which the conf. would create for Alaska. And to say "the event will fall to the state and place a tremendous additional state expense in both monetary and personnel consideration," again shows uninformed awareness. The U. of Ak both from Fairbanks and Anchorage, passed on to you, indicate their interest and support by offering top people to assist as has Norway's Dr. Sollie, Mr. Oelen, Minister of Finance, Dr. Untersteiner of the U. of Wash., Arctic Inst. of N. America, oil cos, RCA, Fed. of Natives, Chambers of Commerce, legislators among others. This offering of assistance indicates no tremendous expense or personnel by the state. All these responding letters you have to observe if any state personnel have been asked to serve other than they would in their regular line of duty. And as for the conferences' "public purposes", one only needs to read the 76 resolution passed, without contest, by Alaskas' Legislature and signed by you as to commitment and its purpose. "Who will plan and coordinate the agenda"... again shows the lack of communicative interest in learning more about the efforts, planning, coordination and direction taken since

the 76 resolution passed both by the state and city of Anchorage and endorsed by President Ford. Money that would be provided by the Croft bill, could then hire an exec. dir. and a program coordinator to follow-up and carry on the accomplishments that have been formulated to include the various people for assistant, committees for needs and functions.

I have kept you informed of all of this by any number of letters and asked that you call to further discuss matters but neither the letters or the calls were ever acknowledged. Your only letter to me dated April 30, 1976 so stated "Kind a copy of the telegram I have recently sent President Ford urging action by the State Department in initiating this proposal... Please let us know if we can be of further assistance in this matter"... This assurance is the committal agreement by you to me to go forward with plans and since I have never had any other suggested direction from you, efforts toward the full conference realization became my responsibility as anyone from reading your mentioned letter would assume.

Over the many months since then foreign countries, embassies, diplomats, cabinet levels, federal agencies, legislators, educators as well as the private sector and among others have been contacted or in turn contacted me. A vast variety of interests and need for returned calls and letters which is by any ones' imagination a full time, dedicated and sincere endeavor.

And to allow me to continue on and on without the common courtesy or the expected propriety of a governor on a matter of this magnitude, without first consulting me or advising me of your changed attitude or reason to cancel, is unprecedented in matters as important as a state involving foreign delegates.

Certainly I am entitled to more than to learn second hand by Senator Crofts' letter of your proposed cancellation of the conference which has now placed me in a very embarrassing, humiliated and deformational position and disrespectful of my ability as a conference coordinator in the eyes of others. For of late, a letter to the First Lady with various planning letters to others, are apologies I do not intend to make on your behalf. And add to this no concern for the need to properly carry on, spending my own money, is in denying the conference, is depriving me of an appropriate opportunity to recover my just due me expenses.

This type of inconsiderate attitude toward my long, untiring and dedicated efforts on Alaskas' behalf, is not acceptable and I expect not only a prompt apology but a full repayment of monies spent, by me, on the needs and essentials relative to the conference.





As Chairman of the Senate Community and Regional Affairs Committee, and in an effort to derive insight into the above referenced bill, I have made contact with the following people to receive input regarding the Arctic-Alaska International Conference:

The feedback I received was overwhelmingly favorable to the prospect of an Arctic-Alaska Conference to promote relations between Arctic Nations. However, there do appear to be two concerns: That the spectrum of the Conference is too broad in scope and needs to be reduced to a format more specific in perspective; and, secondly, that the necessary steering committees, on both the pertinent Conference subjects and the overall Conference organization, need to be formed. It surprises me that all this effort must be expended so early in the Conference timetable, but apparently that is the way these international Conferences are done.



Additionally, we would not hear from nations, national leaders, international leaders or others on the basis of a Mayor or a single Municipality trying to put on such a conference.

Doug Weiford also contacted me in regards to a request for you for advance funding for travel. George, I am prohibited by every ordinance and regulation in the Municipality from doing such a thing and I have so advised Doug.

The key in my opinion still rests with the State government and official endorsement and official invitation coming from the Governor of Alaska. Until I hear something positive from that end, I am afraid I cannot do much more from here. I know this may sound a little discouraging to you, but I am sorry that I don't feel I am in the position to do anything differently.

Dear Mr. Byer:

This is in reply to your letter of December 30, 1976.

Please be advised that with an additional year to study the merits of an Arctic Countries Mutual Interest Exchange Conference as being promoted by you, it is the decision of this office not to request funding for the conference through the State Legislature.

Likewise, in discussing the prospects for the conference with local and federal officials, they have indicated to me they do not plan to actively promote the conference. And, officials of the U. S. Department of State have expressed serious misgivings for the conference from the information available to them.

Mr. Byer, I am well aware that you received statements last year expressing initial interest in the conference. However, I feel certain that prospective State involvement has been exaggerated, and I regret any communication that may have misled you to feel the State would support the formation of this conference. I also appreciate your enthusiasm, your devoted efforts and your good intentions. However, with the current financial situation of the State and the fiscal restraints the Governor has found necessary to impose, we cannot in good conscience support this conference. Since you are not physically residing in Alaska and therefore may not be completely familiar with the current State financial situation, I am enclosing a copy of the Governor's budget message to the Legislature for you.

I have a copy of a letter to you of July 19 from the Governor's Office and I am perplexed that after receiving that letter you would again have stationery printed listing the Governor as an international host without permission to do so. In addition, the Tenth State Legislature has convened and elected its officers; John Lader is now President of the Senate and Hugh Malone is the current Speaker of the House.

Today I spoke with Theodore Sellin, Polar Affairs Officer, State Department, Washington D.C., 101-202-632-8997. Since the proposed conference is of an international flavor, I inquired from Mr. Sellin the State Department's position regarding the above referenced conference. Mr. Sellin submitted the following. He informed me that he had been contacted by Mr. George Byers requesting federal funds for this undertaking, but since this was a "non-governmental" conference per se, despite the language incorporated into the material that has been distributed by Mr. Byer, no funds could be provided.

Mr. Sellin stated that the idea behind Mr. Byer's proposed conference was an attractive possibility, however, at this time he felt the proposal lacked sufficient preparation and organization, particularly for a projected conference of this magnitude. He commented that he had an opportunity to meet with Mr. Byer and suggested that Mr. Byer postpone the conference (it was originally scheduled to take place during the Bi-Centennial) permitting Byer to narrow the scope of the conference, because as it stood it was too broad in its makeup.

Mr. Byer commented that the approach taken by Mr. Byer in setting up this conference is somewhat reverse of the method generally employed. Generally, extensive planning and organizing is conducted, at the same time acquiring funds for your conference. Once this is prepared, then the foreign ministries are approached soliciting their attendance at the conference, providing them with an itemized agenda depicting the events of the conference. Conversely, in this case, the countries were notified of the conference, and subsequent to that there was an attempt to acquire needed funds for the conference.

He suggested, because the idea behind the conference was good, that Mr. Byer should postpone the conference, permitting him time to reduce the perspective of the conference, establish an organizational criteria for the conference, create a steering committee to assist in organizing and delineating the specific objectives of the conference, acquire the funds, and then when he has a finished product, approach the respective government bodies for support and endorsement.

Mr. Sellin commented that once this product was presented, and it was determined that there was enthusiasm behind this conference, then the State Department would consider extending invitations through our Embassies to the concerned foreign ministries to transmit to the interested parties.

Rosalynn Carter's Ambitious Plan for World Peace

By TOM SMITH

Rosalynn Carter, America's new First Lady, is busily laying the groundwork for an ambitious plan to promote world peace — a people-to-people exchange between the U.S. and other nations around the world.

Under this program, dubbed "Friendship Force," which is still in the early, formative stage, planeloads of people, ordinary citizens from every state in the union, would be shuttled to "sister states" around the globe.

These grass-roots goodwill ambassadors would then invite people from the other countries to pay a return visit to their homes in America.

Friends of Rosalynn say she's "very excited" by the prospect of bringing people of the world closer together through these no-red-tape exchanges — and they say President Jimmy Carter is solidly behind her plan.

Mrs. Carter has already held one meeting with the man who helped her organize a similar exchange program between the people of Georgia and their sister state in Brazil, Pernambuco, while Carter was governor.

"She and I have agreed we will work on this together," said the Rev. Wayne Smith of Decatur, Ga., who met with Mrs. Carter in September to discuss the Friendship Force program. "She is very interested in helping to promote world peace."

"She thought that these citizen exchanges might be a way — something without government involvement, but with its approval and encouragement."

It's not yet known who will pay for the Friendship Force, or how much it will cost. The visits between the people of Georgia and Brazil were paid for by those involved.

In Washington, Rosalynn's transition staff says the Friendship Force plan is one of her top three priorities.

"It's an idea that she is very interested in and wants to pursue as First Lady," said Kathy Cade, 29, transition projects coordinator. "She has said it is something she really wants to do."

A longtime close friend of the Carter family, John Pope, 56, of Americus, said Rosalynn had discussed her Friendship Force program with him and his wife in November.

"She said she was anxious to get it going internationally, and got very excited talking about it," Pope said. "I think it's her baby, but Jimmy is right behind it and very much in favor of it."

"I am sure you will find that she is going to play a bigger part in trying to achieve things on an international level than any other First Lady," Pope added.

CARTER PROPOSES VISITOR EXCHANGE

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Carter asked the nation's governors Tuesday night to join him in creating a volunteer exchange program that would send Americans abroad and bring foreign citizens to the United States to promote common understanding.

"I think this is the kind of thing we can do that's a little above and beyond government, kind of nice, that perhaps you can help us with," he said at a White House dinner for the governors.

Carter said that as governor of Georgia, he and his wife, Rosalynn, worked on an exchange with a sister state in Brazil that led about 200 persons from each state to trade visits.

"We're going to try to do this on a nationwide basis," he said. The White House issued a statement dubbing the new project the "Friendship Force." It estimated that trips under the program would cost \$300 to \$400 a person for 10 days.

A staff for the project is being assembled and is to be based in Atlanta. The statement said Carter anticipated six or more exchanges this year, beginning July 4. By the end of 1978, the project envisions six or eight trips a year from most of the 50 states.

Perhaps our own state this first year would like to take just one airplane, and we've asked the State Department to give us advice, and we would like to have maybe a couple

hundred folks go from, say, Idaho, to perhaps Morocco, and let 200 Moroccans come back," Carter said.

"There won't be any public funds involved at the state or federal level and we're going to try to join in and raise enough money in private places to finance these trips."

Mrs. Carter has also written to the Partners of the Americas organization, which conducts similar people exchanges among Latin-American countries, asking for help in launching the Friendship Force, according to David

Luria, associate director of the Partners organization.

Luria, who's based in Washington, D.C., told The ENQUIRER: "The Carters first got involved in the exchange program when Jimmy, as governor of Georgia, was honorary president for the Partners organization in Georgia. He and Rosalynn took deep interest in the Brazilian-Georgian partnership, both officially and unofficially."

Booming Norway May Top Growth of All OECD States

OSLO—While most countries of the industrial world are still teetering between recession and uncertain recovery, the oil-fired economic boom in Norway continues to run on a full head of steam.

After chalking up a 6% growth in gross domestic product during 1976, Norwegian authorities now are confidently forecasting that the country will continue to surge ahead in 1977 with a growth-rate of between 7% and 8%.

If they hit this figure, and there seems no reason why they cannot, the Norwegians probably will wind up the year with the highest growth rate of all 23 states belonging to the Organisation for Economic Co-operation & Development, the major non-Communist industrial producers. They will be outstripping their Scandinavian neighbors.

Sweden is only targeting 2.25% growth this year, and Denmark expects only 1.75%.

During 1975, Norway, with a population of barely 4 million, passed the United States in per capita national income. With a continued upsurge in 1976 and 1977 the country may well end up this year as the wealthiest nation in the OECD on a per capita basis.

Moreover, although oil in the North Sea is giving Norway the margin which is pushing its growth rate from "solid" to "spectacular," even without oil the picture would still be healthy. Of the 7% to 8% rise forecast for 1977, well over half, an estimated 4.5% of this growth, will be in manufacturing, mining, construction and traditional economic activities. Around 3.5% will be in oil.

The gushing North Sea produced oil exports for Norway which totalled around \$700 million in 1975, rose to \$1.4 billion in 1976, and are figured to

hit around \$3 billion during 1977. Still, offshore oil activities accounted for only 3.1% of Norway's gross domestic product last year, and this figure is expected to rise to a mere 4.6% in 1976. Oil and all its related activities, in other words, are still only a small part of Norway's booming economy.

"Our main difficulty right now lies in our very high industrial wage rates," says Arne Oeien, director of economic policy planning at the Ministry of Finance. "We now have the highest wage rate per unit of production in the world except for Sweden, higher even than the United States. In shipbuilding, for example, our wage-rates are almost double those of Japan which, of course, is one of the reasons why our shipbuilding industry is now going into a slump, perhaps

even a permanent drop to smaller activity.

"We are anticipating in the coming years that about 10,000 workers will be moving out of our shipping and shipbuilding industries into other employment, either industrial or in our service industries which are growing."

Oeien said government planners believe that the key to the future lies in holding industrial wages close to present levels through trade union restraint in the next two years. Then, if the other industrial nations allow their wages to go on rising, Norway's competitive position will continue to be strong, which is critical since 40% of the Norwegian economy is export-based.

In addition to readjustments in shipping and shipbuilding, Oeien said there probably would be some cut-backs in the coming year in the textile and local clothing industry. High domestic costs are making it difficult for these industries to compete with cheaper imported products.

Despite these troubles, unemployment in Norway is now well below 1%, and the shifting of some 10,000 to 15,000 workers to different jobs is not

It appears that Mr. Oeien should have plenty to say at the conference about Norway's oil-fired growth rate, its per capita national income greater than U.S. and its well below 1% unemployment.

If for this alone, besides his economic planning and the N. Sea oil, could very well be worth, in interest and benefit to Alaska, the \$25,000 asked of the legislature for the conference and many times over. For no country can come up with these kind of figures without some use and value worth listening too. And by reaching out the Arctic Conference becomes a consensus of exchangeable ideas and mutual suggestions that could have far reaching results,...

regarded as a large social or economic problem.

"Our basic problems," says Oeien, "is to avoid getting in a situation of stagflation, such as Sweden, Denmark, Britain and other countries are going through—stagnation of growth coupled with continued inflation. We believe that we will be able to hold our inflation rate in 1977 down to 8%, which would put us under the OECD's probable average."

To keep its boom going while everybody else has fallen into recession, Norway has been borrowing heavily and deliberately overseas. The borrowing has been necessary to finance the heavy capital development requirements of North Sea oil, and because of the slump in world shipping which drove so many profitable Norwegian companies into the red. But the country is now carrying the heaviest overseas debt in OECD, measured on a per capita basis—well above \$10 billion. Of this, approximately \$5 billion is owed by the oil industry, and about \$3.5 billion by the shipping industry.

But the pay-off of these borrowings will begin in earnest during 1977. With \$3 billion a year this year in oil exports from the North Sea, and output rising steadily, Norway is a pretty good credit risk.

Rosalynn Carter's Ambitious Plan for World Peace

By TOM SMITH

Rosalynn Carter, America's new First Lady, is busily laying the groundwork for an ambitious plan to promote world peace — a people-to-people exchange between the U.S. and other nations around the world.

Under this program, dubbed "Friendship Force," which is still in the early, formative stage, plane-loads of people, ordinary citizens from every state in the union, would be shuttled to "sister states" around the globe.

These grass-roots goodwill ambassadors would then invite people from the other countries to pay a return visit to their homes in America.

Friends of Rosalynn say she's "very excited" by the prospect of bringing people of the world closer together through these no red line exchanges — and they say President Jimmy Carter is solidly behind her plan.

Mrs. Carter has already held one meeting with the man who helped her organize a similar exchange program between the people of Georgia and their sister state in Brazil,

Pernambuco, while Carter was governor.

"She and I have agreed we will work on this together," said the Rev. Wayne Smith of Decatur, Ga., who met with Mrs. Carter in September to discuss the Friendship Force program. "She is very interested in helping to promote world peace.

"She thought that these citizen exchanges might be a way — something without govern-

ment involvement, but with its approval and encouragement."

It's not yet known who will pay for the Friendship Force, or how much it will cost. The visits between the people of Georgia and Brazil were paid for by those involved.

In Washington, Rosalynn's transition staff says the Friendship Force plan is one of her top three priorities.

"It's an idea that she is very interested in and wants to pursue as First Lady," said Kathy Cade, 29, transition projects coordinator. "She has said it is something she really wants to do."

Mrs. Carter has also written to the Partners of the Americas organization, which conducts similar people exchanges among Latin-American countries, asking for help in launching the Friendship Force, according to David

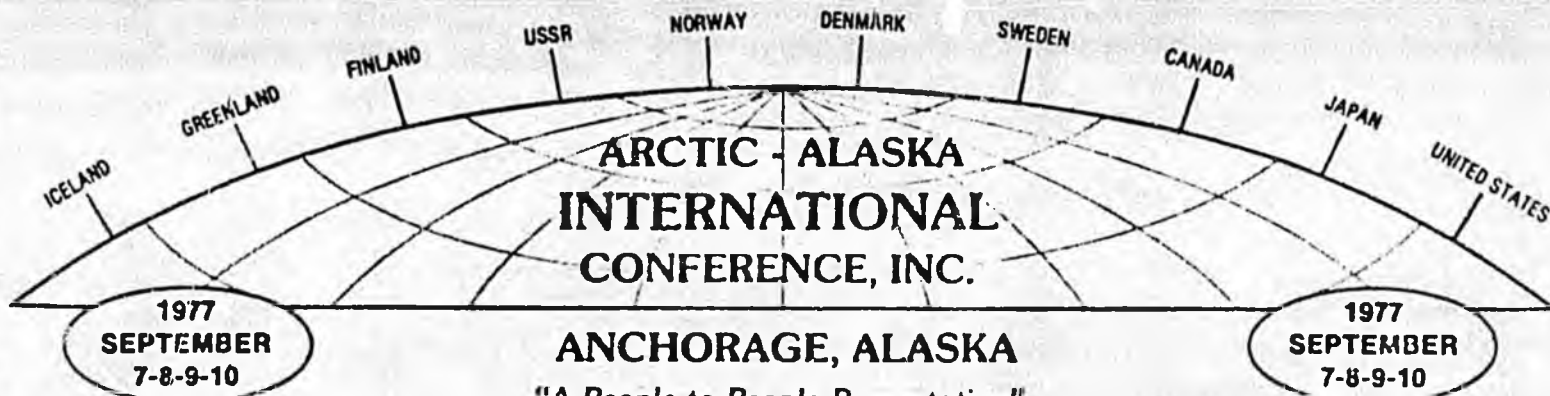
Luria, associate director of the Partners organization.

Luria, who's based in Washington, D.C., told The ENQUIRER. "The Carters first got involved in the exchange program when Jimmy, as governor of Georgia, was honorary president for the Partners organization in Georgia. He and Rosalynn took deep interest in the Brazilian-Georgian partnership, both officially and unofficially."

A longtime close friend of the Carter family, John Pope, 56, of Americus, said Rosalynn had discussed her Friendship Force program with him and his wife in November.

"She said she was anxious to get it going internationally, and got very excited talking about it," Pope said. "I think it's her baby, but Jimmy is right behind it and very much in favor of it.

"I am sure you will find that she is going to play a bigger part in trying to achieve things on an international level than any other First Lady," Pope added.

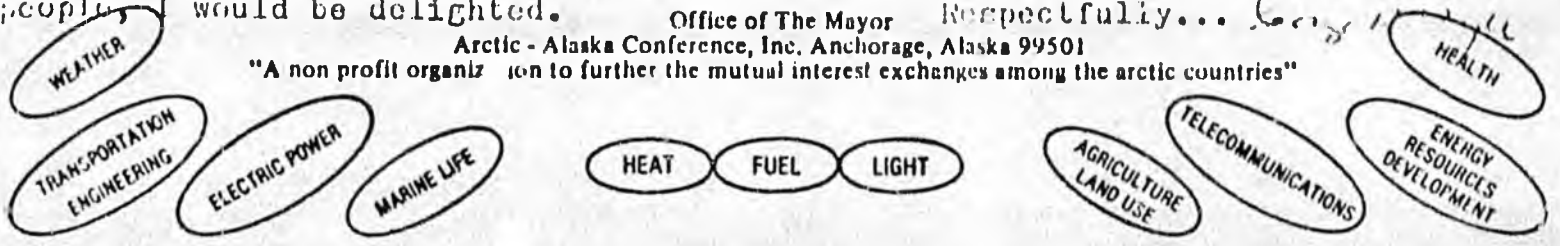

The Assistant Secretary's letter of March 15 to Senator Stevens, a copy of which you have, conveys the considered opinion of the Department on the feasibility of a conference such as that described in the Resolution. Your letter of April 5 suggests a much more modest international gathering of a planning nature. A preparatory meeting that would deal with the realities of such a demanding and complicated undertaking as that outlined in the Resolution would seem to be an essential early step.

The State of Alaska is, of course, at liberty to sponsor an international conference on the subjects it proposes, on a scale it desires, and at a time of its choosing. For our part, it would be virtually impossible to do more than offer advice and encouragement. Given the nature of the federal budget cycle, and the obligations already incurred, possible funding by the Department of State for an Arctic Country Mutual Interest Exchange Conference

could not have been anticipated for this or the next fiscal year. However, the Department would be prepared to transmit through its facilities abroad any invitations by the State of Alaska to intended participants in such a conference as Alaska decides to hold.

As for your letter to the mayor I feel I can clarify it since George is away on vacation.

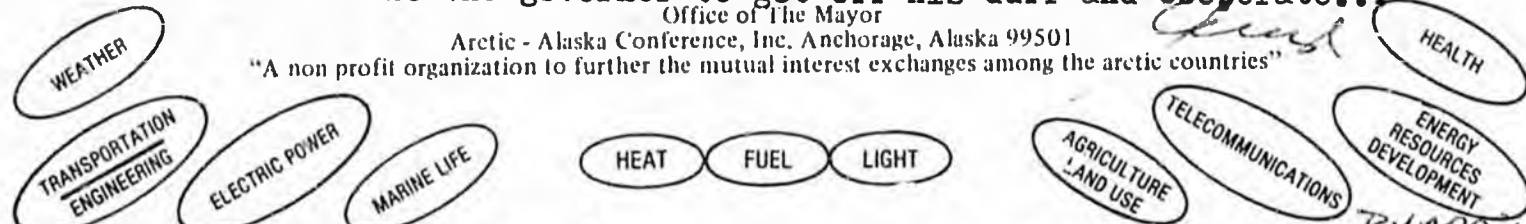
