We, the members of the Community School Committee, Ft. Greely, Alaska, are vitally concerned about the needs of the Ft. Greely School students. These needs were first identified in 1969 by Mr. William L. Stormer, Director of School Assistance in Federally Affected Areas, H.E.W. An extensive study was conducted by Mr. James Woofter, Acting Chief of School Construction, H.E.W., in 1975. This study delineated the necessary improvements needed to upgrade the Ft. Greely School. During 1976-78 time frame, the cause of school improvement at Ft. Greely has received continual "lip service" but little else in the way of positive action. (See Enclosure 1) Everyone from the Federal to the state level has recognized the problem but no one has done anything about it. The losers in this political battle are the children--civilian and military students who are receiving a substandard education because of defects in the present facility.

It is our belief that the modernization of the education facility at Adak Naval Station was a positive step in the right direction and it is our hope that it will serve as a model in the legislature's efforts to upgrade the Fort Greely facilities. As you know, the legislature, in its 1978 session, authorized the expenditure of two million dollars for the construction of elementary classrooms at Adak. That was the first time that state monies have been spent on a H.E.W. facility.

The Alaska Committee of the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges has added further impetus to our situation (See Enclosure 2). Our conditional accreditation status specifically highlighted our three major problem areas.

I. The lack of an adequate gymnasium has forced the Ft. Greely School to satellite its Physical Education program onto the military at Ft. Greely. A stop-gap arrangement has

1. A request for assistance has been received from Mr. Frank Brocato, Principal for the on base Fort Greely School, to obtain command support for needed school improvements.
2. The Fort Greely School is a Health, Education and Welfare School staffed by the State of Alaska. Funding for the schools physical plant is through H.E.W. and Congress. Fort Greely School serves all military dependents in grades Kindergarten through eight and local Delta Junction students in grades seven and eight.
3. The present physical plant does not meet needed requirements for physical education, auditorium space, or cafeteria facilities. Fort Greely facilities are utilized by the school on a mutual arrangement for athletic training and competition and auditorium space as an interim measure; however, post facilities for troop use are also limited and this arrangement imparts on post morale and efficiency. The hot lunch program served in most schools is not provided at Greely and a Class A soup and sandwich lunch is fed in lieu of. Construction of a school gymnasium and cafeteria is a vital requirement if the school is to meet the educational needs of our dependent children at Fort Greely.
4. Recommend this matter be addressed to the State Board of Education and Alaska Congressional Delegation for resolution.

Dear General Kroesen:

We need your help in getting the long-recognized needed improvements for the Fort Greely school off dead-center.

The Fort Greely School is a Health, Education and Welfare School staffed by the State of Alaska. Funding for the school's physical plant is through HEW and Congress. The school serves all military dependents in grades kindergarten through eight and local Delta Junction students in grades seven and eight.

I am told that Mr. William L. Stormer, Director for School Assistance in Federally Affected Areas, Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) has been aware of the construction needs for the Fort Greely School since 1969. An extensive study was made in July 1975 by a team headed by Mr. James Wooster, then Acting Chief of School Construction of HEW. This study group recommended numerous construction needs to the Department. Despite numerous letters about the study 1976 to and by Senators Mike Gravel and Ted Stevens, Congressman Don Young, plus Mr. Stormer and others, little progress has been made in improving the Fort Greely School.

The present physical plant does not meet needed requirements for physical education, auditorium space, or cafeteria facilities. Fort Greely facilities are used by the school on a mutual arrangement for



athletic training and competition and auditorium space as an interim measure; however, post facilities for troop use are also limited, and this arrangement impacts on post morale and efficiency. The hot lunch program served in most schools is not provided at Greely and a Class A soup and sandwich lunch is fed in lieu of. Construction of a school gymnasium and cafeteria is a vital requirement if the school is to meet the educational needs of our dependent children at Fort Greely.

The long harsh winter environment, the relative isolation of Fort Greely, and the perception that nothing is being done to correct the problems have an adverse effect on the post population and the school staff.

Any help you can give us would be appreciated.




The Alaska Department of Education considers the provision of adequate school facilities to be basic and essential to the successful delivery of educational programs, and to this end I wish to focus attention on the need for additional facilities at two of the on-base school locations in Alaska.

The absence of adequate physical education, auditorium, and cafeteria space at the Fort Greely School has been discussed by various federal and state officials for some ten years. The sharing of physical education and auditorium space with the troops causes obvious scheduling problems and leaves both students and the troops with less than sufficient space for these activities. The absence of a cafeteria has caused the school to offer only a soup and sandwich lunch program, while most schools of this size have a full hot lunch program. The Delta/Greely School District would offer a full hot lunch program if facilities were available.

Another on-base school which is lacking adequate facilities is at Adak. The elementary school is currently overcrowded, with many classes being held in portable units which have surpassed their useful life expectancy, especially considering the very harsh climate at Adak. The basement of the main school floods, and the building has many other deficiencies. The present site is very restricted in size, indicating need for a new site for the facility. I understand that the number of dependents at Adak will be increasing in the near future, which will further crowd the school.

The need for the above facilities is well documented, and I urge you to make these facilities a high priority for funding as soon as possible, so that these federally-dependent children will have adequate school buildings, thus enabling teachers and administrators to expend more of their time and resources toward education.

Dear General Boatner:

I have forwarded your letter of 24 April 1978 regarding construction of a cafeteria and gymnasium for the Fort Greely dependent school, to the Chief of Staff, Army (copy inclosed).

I do not expect any immediate action on your request as the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) has a construction and repair backlog for dependent schools, including Fort Greely, in excess of \$200 million. They expect only \$16 million in Fiscal 1979 with which to attack the problem. I support Department of the Army's recommendation to the Secretary of HEW that the \$16 million be spread among schools at five Army installations with an average daily attendance far exceeding building design capacities. Four of these are FORSCOM installations -- Forts Bragg, Campbell, Stewart and Riley. The \$16 million, if spread among these installations, will only partially relieve the extreme inadequacy of facilities.

These schools have handled double sessions and severe overcrowding only because the installation commanders were able to furnish underutilized or excess Army buildings to house the extra students. I realize the extreme cold and isolation of Fort Greely may preclude your adoption of a similar interim solution for a cafeteria and gymnasium,

Even though I cannot give you a lot of hope for immediate resolution, I appreciate your letter which helps us to continue building a case for upgrading the inadequacy of dependent schools on military installations.



Dear General Boatner:

General Kroesen has asked me to keep you informed on the dependent school facilities situation.

In his letter of 24 May 1978, General Kroesen informed you that he had forwarded to General Rogers your letter of 24 April 1978 requesting assistance in upgrading the Fort Greely dependent school facility. General Rogers' reply, including correspondence from the Commissioner of Education to LTG Smith, is at inclosure 1.

In his letter, the Commissioner indicates a willingness to consider giving higher priority to upgrading our unsafe and inaccessible school facilities in Fiscal 1979 and 1980. This recognition of the problem can help the Fort Greely situation in the long run by reducing deplorable conditions at other military installations.

Currently the FY 79 Health, Education, and Welfare budget that will partially fund high priority construction is before the House Appropriation Committee and the Senate Appropriation Committee. I will keep you informed of progress that seems likely to impact upon your situation.



1. Reference your 24 May 78 letter concerning the need for additional facilities for the dependent school at Fort Greely, Alaska.
2. A copy of a recent letter from the Commissioner of Education on this subject is inclosed. For the past several months Army Staff members have had many discussions on the condition of these schools with staff members of the Senate and House Committees on Education and Labor, with staff members of the Office of Management and Budget, with civilian aides to the Secretary of the Army, and with members of Congress representing areas where the schools are located. In addition, this situation was mentioned in my posture statement submitted to the Congress with the President's budget for FY 79.
3. The situation at Fort Greely and other Army installations with regard to dependent schools maintained under Section 10, PL 81-815 is understood by the staff of Department of Health, Education and Welfare. We are advised that the recently completed survey of these facilities will reinforce requests to Congress for funds to correct unsatisfactory conditions at Section 10 schools.
4. When Congressional action on the FY 79 HEW appropriation is announced, we will ask the Secretary of Defense to chair an inter-departmental meeting on these schools. We hope to develop a memorandum of understanding with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and the Office of Management and Budget on these schools and develop a strategy to solve the problems. Your Headquarters will be kept advised of progress and developments.

Secretary Califano has asked me to thank you for your letter concerning our mutual problem of dependent schools on Army installations.

The Secretary has recently forwarded to the Congress our completed indepth study of Section 10 facilities. I am enclosing a copy for your information. As we conducted the study, it became very evident to me that a number of the Section 10 facilities represented particularly deplorable life/safety conditions. These are the very same situations for which you indicated concern in your letter. I have recommended to the Secretary that we consider revising our current funding priority system to make possible the immediate funding of the projects. As you know, our current priority system places a higher priority on the funding of projects which have been accepted for transfer by a local education agency. Although we remain committed to a policy of local education agencies accepting responsibility for the education of military dependents whenever possible, insuring a safe and accessible educational environment must take priority. The change in the priority system (outlined on page 21 of the indepth study) would allow us to direct the limited funds that we have available in the manner which you requested.


With respect to the future appropriation picture for Section 10, we will review the cost estimates contained in the study in developing our Fiscal Year 1980 budget and in considering possible adjustments to our Fiscal Year 1979 budget. We will be sure to keep you and your staff officers apprised of our progress.

Thank you for sending me the copy of your letter to Mr. Stormer, regarding the need for additional educational facilities at two of the on-base school locations in Alaska. Specifically Fort Greely and Adak.

After contacting Mr. Stormer's office, it is my understanding that under the present priority system there are seventeen projects with projected total costs of approximately \$100 million which are above Adak and Greely in priority. Dear Commissioner Lind:

This is in response to your letter concerning upgrading of school facilities at Fort Greely and at Adak.

An in-depth study of school construction needs on Federal property, (those under Section 10 of P.L. 91-353), including the facilities on Fort Greely and Adak Naval Station, was conducted by the United States Commissioner of Education. The findings of the study document a total estimated need of nearly \$200 million for remodeling, renovation, or new construction to bring all of these facilities up to present day requirements and standards.

The school facilities needs suggested on Fort Greely were to provide: 1) a kitchen facility; 2) a media center; 3) a physical activity area; and 4) correct all barrier-free design deficiencies and all life safety code deficiencies. Those suggested for Adak Naval Station were to: 1) construct a new elementary school; 2) repair and remodel the existing Adak school to serve as a Junior-Senior High School; and 3) correct all barrier-free design deficiencies and all life safety code deficiencies. Cost estimates for the work at Fort Greely are \$1.9 million and at Adak, \$13.3 million.

Recognition of construction needs established in this letter are the result of the serious nature of the life safety conditions in many of the Section 10 schools, including Fort Greely and Adak. The safety of children being educated in buildings under the cognizance of the U.S. Commissioner of Education is a priority concern. Secretary Callahan has stated publicly that meeting life safety and handicapped access standards on Federal property is clearly a Federal responsibility and requires immediate attention.

On the basis of the Secretary's statement, therefore, we will use our appropriated Section 10 funds to bring as many of the Section 10 buildings up to those standards as soon as possible. The balance of the unobligated FY 78 funds will take care of about one-half of the facilities and the rest will be accomplished with FY 79 appropriations. The majority of the buildings in this category will require relatively minor repairs and upgrading.

Certain Section 10 facilities, however, cannot be made life safe. An example is old wooden buildings with "unacceptable burn rates." Therefore, construction of replacement facilities is required. Since the current regulatory priority system precludes the Commissioner from targeting money toward this effort, steps are being taken to revise the regulations. When this is done and additional appropriations authorized, the needed construction can take place.

In keeping with Secretary Califano's directive, the facilities at Fort Greeley and Adak are scheduled to be adapted for the life safety and handicapped requirements in FY 79. The additions to the Fort Geeley building and the new construction and repair and remodeling at Adak are scheduled to occur after the emergency needs are met and additional funding is made available by the Congress.

We will keep you informed as we progress with this work.

Dear Governor Hammond:

As my departure from Alaska nears, I feel obligated to ask for your help in getting state support for long-recognized and much-needed improvements for the Fort Greely School.

As you are probably aware, the Fort Greely School is a Health, Education and Welfare School staffed by the State of Alaska. Funding for the school's physical plant is through HEW and Congress. The school serves all military dependents in grades kindergarten through eight as well as local Delta Junction students in grades seven and eight.

A significant disparity exists between the Fort Greely and Delta Junction Schools. The Delta Junction School is adequate in all vital areas while the present Fort Greely School physical plant does not meet needed requirements for physical education, auditorium space, or cafeteria facilities. Through mutual agreement, Fort Greely facilities are used by the school for athletic training and competition and auditorium space as an interim measure. Post facilities for troop use, however, are limited and this arrangement impacts on post morale and efficiency. The hot lunch program served in most schools is not provided at Greely, and a Class A soup and sandwich lunch is fed in lieu of this. Construction of a gymnasium and cafeteria is a vital requirement if the school is to meet the educational needs of the children that use the school.


I am told that Mr. William L. Stormer, Director of School Assistance in Federally Affected Areas, Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), has been aware of the construction needs for Fort Greely School since 1969. An extensive study was made in July 1975 by a team headed by Mr. James Wooster, then Acting Chief of School Construction of HEW. This study group recommended numerous construction needs to the Department. Despite numerous letters about the study in 1976 to and by Senators Mike Gravel and Ted Stevens, Congressman Don Young, plus Mr. Stormer and others, little progress has been made in improving the Fort Greely School. Earlier this year, I brought this matter to the attention of my commander at US Army Forces Command, Fort McPherson, Georgia, who in turn forwarded my letter to Headquarters, Department of the Army. I was informed that although our needs were recognized, the priority for limited HEW construction money was higher at other installations, I am prohibited by Army regulations, based on Federal statutes, from expending Army construction funds to improve the Fort Greely School. Colonel Bernard Jones, the representative on the State Board of Education, informs me that the Alaska State Commissioner on Education, Dr. Marshall L. Lind, visited the Fort Greely School this summer and has agreed to pursue a program to encourage state officials to upgrade the Fort Greely School even though it is an HEW facility. I am informed that the state has provided funds previously to upgrade other HEW school facilities in Alaska.

At the present time, I am convinced this is the only course of action that offers any possibility for near term upgrading. It is our hope that the state will eventually accept responsibility for the school from HEW.

I solicit whatever assistance you may deem appropriate to gain state financial assistance in upgrading the Fort Greely School.

My family and I have thoroughly enjoyed our assignment in Alaska and hope some day to return.

Your letter of October 3, 1978 concerning the construction needs at the Fort Greely School was appreciated.

The Alaska Department of Education and this office have been aware of the needs at Fort Greely for some time, and have recently been working toward acquiring the facilities from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. As you have noted, federal funds have long been awaited, and the near term availability of such funding appears bleak in light of the nationwide demand for the limited congressional appropriations for this purpose.

Therefore, in an effort to upgrade the facilities to a status which is minimally acceptable under state codes, thereby clearing the path for state ownership, the Department of Education has requested \$150,000 for code upgrade at Fort Greely as their Number Four statewide priority for FY-80. In addition, \$2,500,000 has been requested for a multipurpose room/kitchen and an additional \$300,000 for major maintenance.


I am expecting a funding level recommendation for FY-80 from the Budget Review Committee within a month. At that time we will be better prepared to say how many of the Department of Education's project requests this office will be able to recommend for legislative appropriation in FY-80. Unfortunately, the FY-80 funding level will be necessarily low, as our major construction programs are funded in odd-numbered fiscal years.

Dr. Marshall Lind, Commissioner of Education, has lent his support to the Fort Greely needs. The State Board of Education toured the facilities on September 8, 1978, at which time Colonel Bernard Jones stated his concerns for upgrading the facilities. Additional discussion of these needs took place at the October 19-20, 1978 State Board meeting in Anchorage.

Please be assured that I will give these needs my attention in preparing the FY-80 and future capital budgets.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate you on a most successful command assignment in Alaska, and to thank you for your contribution to the future of Alaska. Again, thank you for your support, and best wishes in your next assignment.

As requested, we have prepared an exhibit demonstrating the cost effectiveness of utilizing this proposed pool as a sprinkler system water supply for all High School properties.

Assumptions made are those outlined in the exhibit: values, rates, continuing inflation.

Projecting rates ten years is extremely difficult, due to cyclic pricing changes within the insurance industry. Presently property rates are at bottom and the trend to increasing rates is expected.

Of the comparative rates shown in the exhibit, the "current rate" is subject to the pricing pressure to increase. Sprinklered rates tend strongly to remain stable.

Summarizing the estimated premium savings over ten years, if the High School properties were to be sprinklered:

<u>Comparison</u>	<u>Savings</u>
Standard Rate - Sprinklered Rate	\$2,150,000
Current Rate - Sprinklered Rate	\$1,075,000

These may be considered the minimum and maximum premium savings, with actual savings greater than the minimum due to expectations of increased pricing.



House Bill No. 561, an Act providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$22,060,900 for the purpose of paying the cost of capital improvements for educational and library facilities, was introduced in the House on January 18, 1980 and was referred to the House Health, Education and Social Services Committee and the House Finance Committee.

For the consideration of the House Health, Education and Social Services Committee, I am enclosing a copy of a letter from Mr. Eric E. Wohlforth, Wohlforth and Flint, Anchorage, State Bond Counsel for the State Bond Committee which concerns in part House Bill No. 561.

Mr. Wohlforth also indicates that the amount of bonds authorized be rounded to the nearest \$5,000. General obligation bonds of the State and nearly all other state and local governments are issued in the denomination of \$5,000, the standard unit.

Using House Bill No. 561 as an example, this would result in issuing less than the total amount of bonds authorized or in issuing one odd bond in the denomination of \$900 along with 4,412 bonds in the usual denomination of \$5,000.

In H. B. 560 providing for the issuance of general obligations bonds in the amount of \$18,100,000 for State facilities, I question the purpose of the bond issue which is stated as "paying the cost of energy conservation, code upgrade, and architectural barrier removal". These terms, no doubt, have meaning to architects or engineers but I think are not understandable to most of the general public. Accordingly, I would suggest the language be amended to words in more commonly accepted usage such as, for "code upgrade", if this is its meaning, "life and safety improvements to state facilities". I have no suggestion for "architectural barrier removal" as I do not know what is intended by this phrase.

In S. B. 343, "An Act providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$20,550,000 for the purpose of paying the costs of capital improvements for University of Alaska facilities", I question the item under Project entitled "(2) Perform major maintenance and repairs - Statewide - 950,000". Depending on the nature of the items in fact contemplated, this purpose may not be comprehended within the term "capital improvements" which is stated in the bond proposition.

In H. B. 561, "An Act providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$22,060,900 for the purpose of paying the cost of capital improvements for education and library facilities", I question the item under Project entitled "(7) Construct arctic entry and paint school - Nelson Island - 265,000". Painting would only, it seems to me, be an appropriate capital improvement in connection with the original construction of a building which may be the case here.



Dear Mr. Zharoff,

The following Capital Improvement project recommendations reflect the opinions of the Kodiak Island Borough Administrative staff. Do to the short response time allowed we were unable to obtain project nonimations or priority rebuttal reflecting the opinions of the Borough Mayor and Assembly. However, Mayor Wallin has reviewed this letter and several projects reflect her opinions.

1. Akhiok Elementary School. The existing school at Akhiok was a temporary building designed to last for a few years. Thus far this temporary expedient has been used for ten (10) years. This building should be replaced by the State.
2. Cape Chiniak Elementary School. The existing facility at Chiniak is operating at capacity increased enrollment requires an increase in school facilities. The proposed Job Corp Center will create additional school facilities needs for faculty member's dependent children.
3. Kodiak Boat Harbor Facilities. It is imperative that new boat harbor facilities be constructed at Kodiak. We can not afford to wait for the U.S. Congress and Corps of Engineers to act, as they have been promising this facility for over a decade. To date all we have seen from Washington are revised reports and lots of political rhetoric. Unfortunately we can not moor boats in a harbor constructed on Congressional rhetoric.

It is our feeling that low interest loans and direct construction grant aid will provide the most expeditious method of financing these urgently need harbor facilities. We will be happy to provide you with specific cost and need justification data prior to the January 1980 Legislative Session.

4. Rural Alaskan Economic Development. If we are to ultimately establishable economic stability in rural Alaska. The State should make low interest economic development loans available through the permanent fund or a revolving self perpetuating economic development fund.

5. Planning Grant Assistance. The State should provide 100% funding for the Planning grants when the issues have regional, State wide, or National significance such as the O.C.S. Planning Programs. We need plans prepared by and for the local Community rather than those prepared for us by Federal and State agencies. It has been our experience that the Federal and State planning considerations are not always the same as those of the local community. Since we have planning power and responsibility, provide us the funds to carry out those responsibilities. Funding levels for O.C.S. and Coastal Zone Programs should be at the 100% level with State agency coordination in work scoping project review.

6. MONASHKA DAM LOW INTEREST CONSTRUCTION LOANS AND DIRECT CONSTRUCTION GRANTS TO DAM CONSTRUCTION. STATE LOCAL ASSISTANCE IN RESOLVING LAND CLAIMS CONFLICTS IN WILMETH SHED AREA.

7. PAVE ROADS IN KODIAK URBAN AREA.

The citizens of Chiniak are in need of your assistance. We are facing a crisis situation at our school.

The Federal Government has leased the old Chiniak Tracking Station from Koniag and will open its doors as a job corp center on October 15th of this year. Staffing of the facility will require sixty persons, many of them professionals. The offspring of both the job corp personal and job corp students will be attending our Chiniak school. The center intends to hire as many local people as possible but even with that effort the impact will be great. David McGuigans, the director, is projecting an increase of twenty-five to thirty students for our school, and it may well be more.

Our present facilities are meager. They consist of an eight year old temporary unit, modest living quarters for our sole teacher and his wife, and a small storage/t.v. room which joins the two facilities. The above is located at mile 41 of the Chiniak Road on a ten are plot of borough owned land. The structure stands on a minimum ammount of gravel fill. The filled area also accommodates a driveway and a playground.

The present studentbody consists of fourteen children, kindergarden thru eighth grade, and that is all the facility can handle. What will we do with the twenty-five or thirty more children that arrive in the Fall?

For months the Chiniak community has been working in earnest to solve this dilemma. We've been to the Kodiak School Board and school administration. We've talked to the Borough Assembly, Mayor Wallen, and job corp representatives. There's been some press coverage and a Chiniak School open house was held to which all of the above persons were invited. The response of everyone we've talked to has been the same; There are no moneys anywhere to accommodate this influx of students. Our only headway came last week when Chiniak was included in an all-inclusive bond. If it is passed Chiniak will receive \$150,000. The problem with the bond issue is that it may, or may not pass and of course it will not be in time to relieve our predicament. If a permanent school is to be built it must be started immediately. If its to be an atco unit the order must be placed now. Additional land fill is required to accommodate either.

The job corp is a fine program and we are optimistic about its addition to our community. But we wonder; Why wasn't an impact study done by the Federal Government? Why didn't Governor Hammond order one at the time he signed his support of the Chiniak sight?

We are a stable, working, tax paying community who want good quality education and accommodations for our new neighbors children as well as our own. But we need your help. We need your support and advice. We have exhausted all local avenues in search of a building fund. There is none. It has become apparent that we both need, and are deserving of either State or Federal moanys to curb the impact on our school. How can such an application be made? Where do we find a commitment, a possitive action toward readying our school for Fall?

Your support and any insight or advice you have to offer
will be greatly appreciated. Thank you for your attention.



I am a concerned parent with a daughter presently going to the Chiniak school. It is really a shame to see how run down + overcrowded this school has become. It is a small school + very much needed for our area as we are so far from Kodiak. True, we are on a road system but I believe there is also a limit of travel time a child is to be on a school bus. We need this school to eliminate a long, hazardous, + sometimes impossible bus drive to Kodiak. It is not unusual for my high school son to be on the bus 2 hours + it's app. a 50 mile trip. As you know the Job Corps will be in operation by the end of the year + this will drop at least 20 more school age children in our area. The Chiniak elementary school cannot handle the growing amount of residents, let alone a whole new group. I know there are native villages much smaller than our area which obtain funds for new schools + I'd sure like to know why we cannot get funds for a new Chiniak elementary + high

school. The high school children who live out here now would gladly give up all the big school activities to be able to attend school closer to home. My son has discussed quitting school just to eliminate that bus ride, & I would say the borough is contributing to lack of education in our case. The borough owns 10 acres the Chiniak school presently sets on a tract where we'd like a new school built if the state has 4 1/2 billion dollars in excess; it would seem a very small thing to ask a new school for Chiniak. We pay our taxes just like town & I don't feel we are asking too much to allow our elementary & high school children a decent education at a decent distance from home. Please help us get our school up to date & ready for the future.

I am writing to you concerning Steve Crawley, a student from Chiniak. Steve is a Junior at the high school here who must bus 90+ miles a day round trip to and from school. He would like to enter the Boarding Home Program and board in Kodiak while attending school. He inquired last year and this year and was refused because your office has maintained that an educational program was accessible to him.

It is my contention that the program is not as completely accessible as it should be. Steve must bus for two (2) hours to get to school and leave promptly at 3:30 p m. to bus two (2) hours to go home again. Inclement weather and road conditions tend to increase the busing time, leaves little time to study or for participation in other school activities, such as sports, that are an integral part of the high school's educational program. Therefore, Steve does not have access to the study time or extra-curricular activities that are available to other students at the high school. I feel that his request to be included in the State's Boarding Program is both justifiable and reasonable.


Dear John:


On behalf of Northern Alaska Health Resources Association (NAHRA), I am writing to encourage your support for HB 545, which would amend the child protection laws.


