Operation of the Convention

The Constitutional Convention of 1973 (CC 73) has the potential of becoming a landmark for the people of Louisiana. As indicated in PAR's report, "Constitutional Convention 1973—A Preview," published in July 1972, Louisiana has the second longest state constitution in the United States, a vast, unwieldy document which was condemned as a "crime," even as it was being enacted in 1921. The over 500 amendments that have been tacked on since have added enormously to its confusion, complexity and bulk.

The present convention is charged with the responsibility of drafting a new constitution for the State of Louisiana. The proposed constitution is to be completed by January 4, 1974 and submitted to the voters no later than the November 4, 1974 general election, according to the Governor's decision.

Membership

The convention is composed of 132 delegates, including:

- 105 elected, one from each state House of Representatives district.

• 12 appointed by the Governor to represent the following interest groups:

Agriculture
Civil Service
Consumers
Education
Industry
Judiciary
Labor
Law Enforcement
Professions
Racial Minorities
Wildlife and Conservation
Youth

• 15 appointed by the Governor from the public at large.

Delegates must be at least 18 years old, electors and residents of the state; in addition, elected delegates must be residents of the district from which they were elected. Public officials were permitted to run for delegate positions. If a vacancy occurs, the Governor is to appoint a replacement, who is to have the same qualifications as the delegate he replaces. Delegates are paid \$50 a day for every day of attendance at convention or committee meetings; they are prohibited from accepting any other payments for the work they perform in the convention.

Structure of the Convention

The convention is organized on the legislative model, with a permanent presiding officer, standing committees, provisions for additional committees and subcommittees, and an administrative and research staff.

Standing procedural committees concerned with the operations of the convention are: Rules, Credentials and Ethics; Style and Drafting; Legislative Liaison and Transitional Measures; and Public Information.

Substantive committees assigned

responsibility for specific parts of the constitution are: Bill of Rights and Elections; Executive Department; Legislative Powers and Functions; Judiciary; Local and Parochial Government; Revenue, Finance and Taxation; Education and Welfare; and Natural Resources and Environment.

Another group of steering committees having broad intracommittee tasks in procedural and substantive areas are: the Executive Committee, which acts as the executive board of the convention and handles convention administrative and financial matters; the Committee on Committees which made all the assignments of delegates to other committees; the Coordinating Committee which resolves conflicts among substantive committees; and the Composite Committee which will be holding hearings throughout the state before the substantive committees complete their work in order to elicit views on major constitutional issues and stimulate public interest on the issues.

All committees are to consist of at least 10 and no more than 30 members; the committees presently range from 10 to 23 members each.

No delegate serving on the Executive Committee shall serve as chairman or vice-chairman of any substantive committee.

Convention rules provide that delegates will serve on one and only one substantive committee and no more than one procedural committee. During the initial phase of the convention, delegates were permitted to indicate the substantive committee on which they wanted to serve, and assignments were made on the basis of delegate preferences.

Procedural committees are each required to have representation from

each of the eight congressional districts in Louisiana.

The effect of the above restrictions on committee assignments and chairmanships is to prevent any small group from exercising excessive control over the convention and to diffuse power and responsibility among all of the 132 delegates. When committee assignments were made the spirit and intent of the rules were carried out; no delegate serves on more than one substantive committee, and the requirement for representation from all congressional districts has insured board participation in procedural committees. Since the steering committees are staffed in part by officers of the convention and partly by chairmen of other committees, there are some delegates who hold seats in one substantive, one procedural and one or two steering committees, but this occurs in few cases.

The convention may, if it desires, sit as a "Committee of the Whole," during which delegates may engage in more informal debates and discussions and nondelegates may present their views to the convention as a whole.

A table showing the committees, their responsibilities and their membership is on pages 8 to 13.

Officers and Key Staff Members of the Convention

The officers of the convention are: chairman, first vice-chairman, three vice-chairmen, secretary and treasurer. The duties of each officer are as follows:

Chairman: Acts as the presiding officer, supervises the convention staff, appoints committees for special func-

tions, and acts as chairman of the Executive Committee. He is also an ex officio nonvoting member of all substantive committees.

First vice-chairman: Presides in the absence of the chairman, performs other duties as designated, serves on the Executive Committee and serves as a nonvoting member of the Rules, Credentials and Ethics Committee.

Three vice-chairmen: Preside in the absence of the chairman and first vice-chairman when needed, serve on the Executive Committee, and each serves as a nonvoting member on one of the following procedural committees: Style and Drafting, Legislative Liaison and Transitional Measures, and Public Information.

Secretary: Carries out all duties pertaining to the official records of the convention, serves on the Executive Committee, is responsible for calling the roll and reading all proposals and other items of business to the convention, and handles the printing and distribution of official convention papers and documents.

Treasurer: Responsible for the convention budget and financial transactions and serves on the Executive Committee.

Convention Staff

The constitutional convention, unlike its 1921 predecessor, will be supported by a full-time staff, including professional researchers with the capability of studying constitutional and legal provisions and of providing

research material to the committees and subcommittees.

The convention was empowered under Act 2 of 1972 to hire a research director to supervise at least 14 full-time research assistants. The assistants must have at least a bachelor's degree and 1 year of law school or comparable experience.

By the third week of February most of the authorized staff had been hired, equipment had been procured, the assembled working papers of the 1970-71 Louisiana Constitutional Revision Commission had been transferred, and the research staff had begun its work.

In addition, the research staff is to consist of four research supervisors, who are to be the deans or their designees of the LSU, Tulane, Loyola and Southern University law schools; 11 legislators appointed by the Governor (six from the House, five from the Senate) and four members of the Louisiana State Law Institute. No compensation is to be paid to these staff members for their service.

The chief clerk and the sergeant at arms, and their respective staffs were hired to assist in conducting the convention. Both positions are appointed by the chairman, subject to the approval of the convention, and both have important roles in the day-to-day operations of the convention.

The chief clerk, who is not permitted to be a delegate, is the chief administrator and parliamentarian of the convention. All the duties of the secretary may be delegated to the clerk except service on the Executive Committee and certification of official papers.

The sergeant at arms and his assistants are charged with the primary responsibility of maintaining order and decorum in the convention and com-

mittee proceedings, insuring that absent delegates are reminded to attend convention and committee meetings, signing for and delivering delegates' correspondence and assisting the convention and committee chairmen as needed.

Public Access to the Convention

Convention and committee meetings and hearings are open to the public and news media. Convention and Committee of the Whole proceedings are to be recorded verbatim and transcribed. Committee procedures may be recorded verbatim. The Executive Committee may hold executive sessions when considering personnel matters, but no action may be taken during executive session. Such sessions are open to all delegates but not to the public or news media.

The convention rules provide a designated area for news media when the convention is in session, but state that only delegates and staff members will be allowed on the convention floor during sessions.

Committees and subcommittees are authorized to hold meetings and hearings at places throughout the state as they desire, and the rules require committees to hold public hearings on those items which may go into the constitution.

Committee Meetings

Committee meetings can be called by the chairman or a majority of the committee members, but at least 4 days' notice of the meeting must be

given committee members when the convention is not in session. At least 24 hours' notice must be given for meetings called while the convention is in session.

Notice of committee meetings must be filed with the secretary of the convention. Persons interested in being notified of committee meetings can request the secretary to notify them of such meetings. See the "Where To Find it Guide," page 55.

Information about convention and committee meetings will also be available through the news media.

Writing the Constitution

Convention rules establish the procedure for drafting and voting on constitutional provisions, including a timetable, which is shown on page 6. Those propositions intended to become a part of the constitution will be called "proposals." Matters of general interest, which are not intended to be part of the constitution will be called "resolutions."

A proposal may be introduced by a delegate or delegates or by a committee on behalf of a majority of its membership.

Committee proposals prepared and approved by the several committees prior to July 5, 1973, shall constitute the first proposals to be introduced in the convention. No proposals may be introduced by delegates or committees after the first 60 days following July 5, 1973. Amendments to proposals may be submitted at any time.

All proposals must go through three readings, which are to take place on three separate days. The introduction of a proposal, when it is first read to

the convention by the secretary, is called the first reading.

After the first reading, proposals are referred by the chairman to the appropriate substantive committee, which begins the second reading. Referrals of proposals to committees are to take place on the day following introduction. All proposals must have a public hearing before committee action may be taken, and such hearings are required to be publicized. After hearings and deliberation, committees will report the proposals to the convention in one of the following manners: favorably, unfavorably, with amendments, without action, without action with recommendation that they be referred to another committee or reported by substitute. The convention then votes to approve, reject or return for reconsideration the committee reports. If a proposal is approved, it is then sent to the Committee on Style and Drafting and engrossed (putting the proposal into revised form).

The third reading precedes final passage and enrollment. A proposal that is passed (by affirmative vote of at least 67 of the 132 convention delegates) is then enrolled, referred once more to the Committee on Style and Drafting, approved in its finally styled form, and enrolled.

Convention rules specify minimum time limits for delegates to receive and familiarize themselves with the contents of the proposals. Printed copies of proposals must be distributed to the delegates at least 48 hours before final action may be taken on a proposal.

If any amendments are offered, they are to be submitted in writing, printed and distributed to all delegates before being voted upon.

After all proposals have gone

through the above process and been individually adopted and put into the finished document, the final draft of the entire constitution must be approved by a majority of the delegates. The convention is authorized to submit, in addition to the proposed draft constitution, any alternative proposals that it deems advisable, so that the voters may be able to exercise their choice on individual controversial issues instead of voting for or against the entire document.

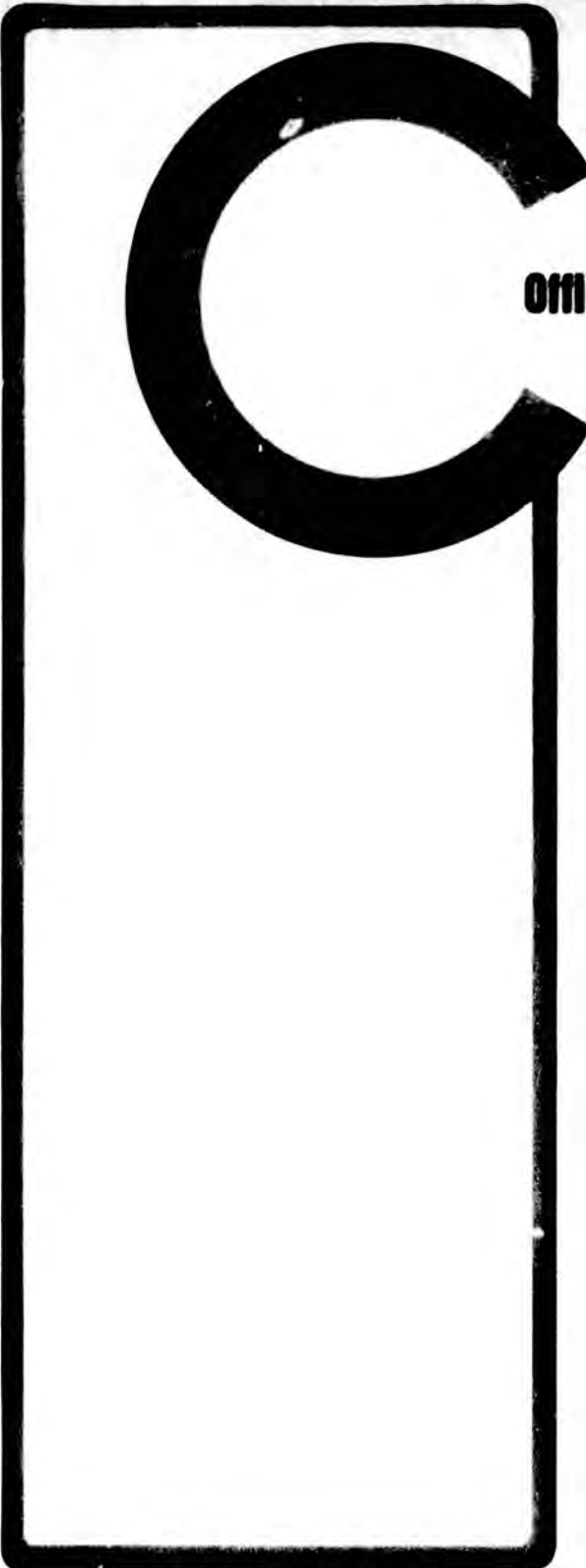
The proposed final draft and alternatives must be forwarded to the

Governor on or before January 4, 1974, and he will decide whether to call a special election for approval of the new constitution or have it included in the 1974 general (congressional) election. The Governor's decision is to be announced before February 3, 1974. In any case, the latest that voting may occur on the adoption of the new constitution is November 4, 1974, with the constitution, if ratified, to become effective no later than midnight December 24, 1974.

Timeline

January 5, 1973	Convention convenes, organized, adopted rules and adjourned.
January 5, 1973- July 3, 1973	Staff hired and progress reports on constitutional matters. Committees and delegates begin proposals with the assistance of staff as needed.
June 22, 1973	Deadline for mailing draft of committee proposals to delegates.
July 5, 1973	Convention reconvenes, and proposals are introduced with those from committees having first priority.
July 5, 1973- September 3, 1973	Committee and delegate proposals introduced and processed. No proposals may be introduced after September 3.
July 5, 1973- January 4, 1974	All draft proposals are debated, hearings are held and the constitution is put into final draft form.
January 4, 1974	Deadline for submitting draft of proposed constitution to Governor.
February 3, 1974	Deadline for Governor to announce whether a special election will be called for constitutional ratification or whether it will be a part of the next general election.
November 4, 1974*	Next general election (congressional) at which proposed constitution can be submitted for voter ratification.
November 24, 1974*	Deadline for promulgation of election results.
December 24, 1974*	New constitution, if ratified, becomes effective at midnight.

*Governor may call a special election prior to November 4, 1974. If called, the new constitution, if ratified, would become effective on the date of the special election. General election laws provide that returns are to be promulgated within 10 to 20 days after the election.

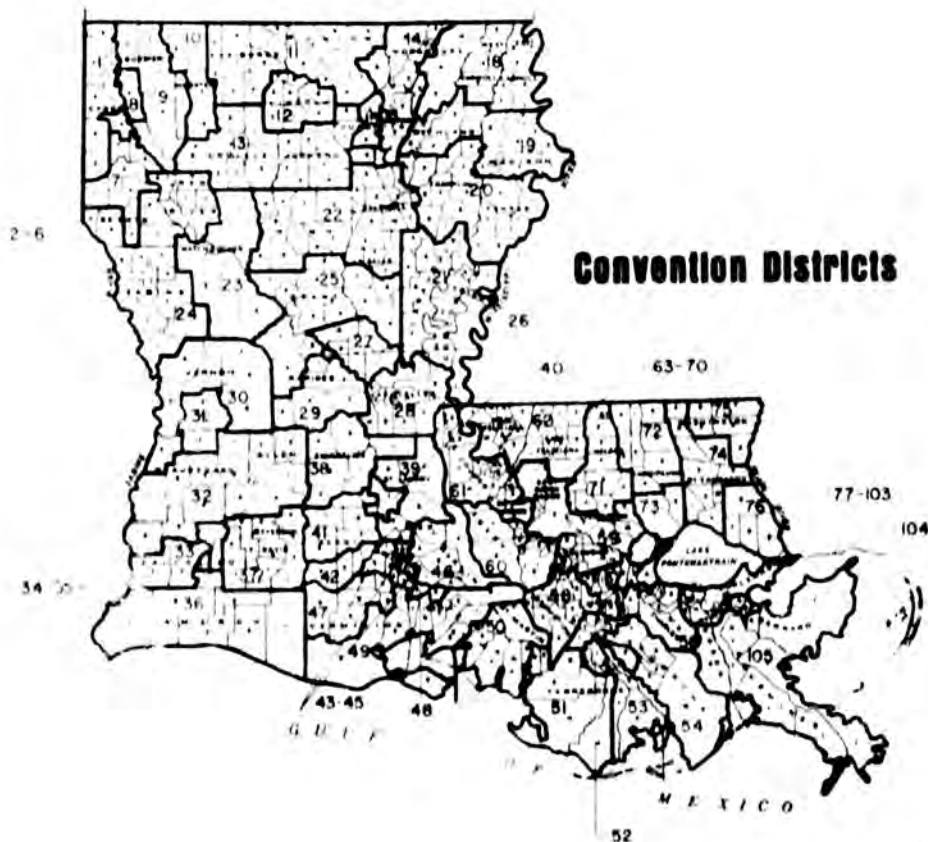

Characteristics of Delegates

Compared to the 1972 Legislature, the constitutional convention membership is older, has had more prior experience in elective and appointive public office, includes more women, is better educated and includes a higher proportion of blacks and republicans (12 blacks compared with eight in the Legislature and six Republicans compared with four in the Legislature).

Public Service Experience

About 20 percent of the delegates are currently serving in the state Legislature, and 30 percent have had some legislative experience. Many delegates have served in more than one public service position. While a smaller proportion of the delegates have held elective local offices than those in the 1972 Legislature, a far larger proportion have served on boards and commissions, in political party offices and in local public service posts. The representation of such groups as tax assessors, law enforcement officials and educators has contributed heavily to

the local public service employment categories.

Age

Delegates' ages range from 19 to 72, with a median age of 49 and an average age of 46. The median and average age of members of the 1972 House of Representatives was 44, while the median age of members of the 1972 Senate was 42 and the average age was 44. Education

Convention delegates are an extremely well educated group, 93 having

graduated from college and another 30 having had some college education. Only three delegates have had no formal education beyond the high school level. College graduates include 51 with law degrees and 7 with medical degrees, and several have undertaken graduate studies, with 15 masters' and 1 doctorate degree having been completed thus far. Fourteen of the delegates have attended advanced business or professional schools as a part of their career development.

Sex

The ratio of females to males is five times greater in the constitutional convention than in the Legislature, with a higher proportion of appointed than elected delegates being women.

Where to Find It

The convention headquarters is located in the State Capitol, and most committee meetings and staff activities will continue to take place in and around the capitol until the convention convenes for formal sessions in July 1973. Key offices currently in the capitol building include those of the convention chairman and chief clerk and the research staff. (The research staff is expected to relocate to offices in the LSU Law Center in April 1973).

The chairman, House Speaker E. L. "Bubba" Henry, will continue to use the House speaker's office on the first floor of the capitol. His telephone number is (504) 389-2392.

The chief clerk also occupies an office on the first floor of the capitol and will continue to do so throughout the convention. The telephone number is (504) 389-2137.

The convention public relations office and research staff are also located in the capitol building and their respective telephone numbers are (504) 389-5034 and 389-6141.

Current plans envision that formal sessions, beginning on July 5, will be

held in the White House Inn's "Independence Hall," with staff activities taking place in the "Treaty Room." The White House Inn is located at 1575 N. General information about the convention may be obtained from the public information office. Specific information about committee hearings and meetings, if unavailable from the public information office, may be obtained from the chief clerk. As the various substantive committees begin to hold hearings on issues throughout the state, information will be available through local news media. For persons or groups having an interest in particular committee activities, the chief clerk's office will provide advance notification of hearings and meetings. Interested parties should forward a written

request for advance notification of those activities in which they are interested to the chief clerk.

Official publications of the convention, to be available from the office of the chief clerk, include the Rules of the Convention, the Convention Calendar, the Convention Journal and proposals.

The Rules of the Convention have been previously published and are expected to have a second printing.

The Convention Calendar will be printed periodically and will include scheduled meetings and hearings and the status of various proposals and items on the convention agenda.

The Convention Journal will be printed daily and will comprise the primary official record of convention proceedings. It will include convention and committee meetings and hearings, actions taken, the text of amendments to proposals and the record of delegates' individual votes on final approval of all proposals.

Proposals will be printed individually as they are generated.

Constitutional Convention of Louisiana of 1973

Committee Resolution No. 1

By Mr. Stagg on Behalf of the Temporary Committee on Rules

A RESOLUTION

To provide for the standing rules of the Constitutional Convention.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Louisiana Constitutional Convention of 1973 that the following be adopted as the standing rules of the Convention until otherwise amended or rescinded as herein provided:

CHAPTER 1

General Provisions

Quorum and Majority

Rule No. 1. Call to Order. The Convention shall convene at such time as ordered on the preceding working day by a majority of the delegates and the chairman shall call the Convention to order at that time. If a quorum is in attendance, the chairman shall cause the Journal of the preceding day to be read unless otherwise ordered by the Convention, to the end that any mistake may be corrected.

Rule No. 2. Quorum. Sixty-seven delegates to the Convention shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Rule No. 3. Roll Call. The secretary shall call the roll at the opening of each session of the Convention and announce whether or not a quorum is present. He shall announce the names of the delegates absent with leave of the

1 Convention and the names of delegates absent without leave,
2 and enter the names of all those present and absent upon the
3 Journal. If a voting machine is provided, the machine shall
4 be used whenever a roll call or a vote by yeas and nays is
5 directed by or in accordance with these rules.

6 Rule No. 4. Quorum Calls. A quorum call may be demanded
7 by any delegate during any session of the Convention. When,
8 upon such call, it is found that less than a quorum is pre-
9 sent, the chairman shall order the doors of the Convention
10 closed and direct the secretary to call the roll of the Con-
11 vention and to note the names of the absentees. After such
12 roll call the names of the absentees shall again be called
13 and those for whose absence no excuse, or an insufficient
14 excuse, is made, may, by order of a majority of delegates
15 present, be sent for and taken into custody by the Sergeant-
16 at-Arms, or by his assistants appointed for the purpose,
17 and brought to the floor of the Convention.

18 Rule No. 5. Absence from Convention Service. No delegate
19 shall absent himself from the service of the Convention while in
20 session without obtaining leave of the Convention. Leave for
21 absence from a daily session may be obtained from the chairman
22 as provided in Rule 34.

23 Rule No. 6. Absent Delegates. At any time the Conven-
24 tion is in session, whether upon first convening of the day's
25 session or at any time after the hour has arrived to which the
26 Convention stood adjourned, the chairman is authorized to
27 send the Sergeant-at-Arms for any or all absent delegates as
28 the majority of such delegates present shall agree.

29 Rule No. 7. Expense of Compelling Attendance. Any
30 expenses involved in compelling the presence of an absent
31 delegate shall be borne by such delegate, unless such excuse
32 of non-attendance has been made as a majority of a quorum
33 shall judge sufficient, in which case the expense shall be
34 paid out of the appropriated funds to the Convention.

35 Admission to Floor

1 Rule No. 8. Persons Admitted. No person shall be
2 admitted on the Convention floor while the Convention is in
3 session or during the period five minutes before the time
4 set for the convening of each session or the period five
5 minutes after the adjournment of each session, except that
6 delegates and members of the Convention staff may remain on
7 the floor. Representatives of the news media shall be ad-
8 mitted to the floor as provided in Rule 11. Written messages
9 may be delivered to the delegates by a sergeant-at-arms from
10 persons outside the restricted area. The Convention floor,
11 for purposes of these rules, is defined as the entire enclosed
12 seating area of the delegates.

13 Rule No. 9. Restrictions on the Convention Floor. One
14 chair shall be allowed each delegate on the Convention floor
15 and no other chairs shall be permitted in this section.

16 Rule No. 10. Special Permission. Special permission to
17 sit on the Convention floor may be granted by the chairman of
18 the Convention to visiting officials of other states or of the
19 United States or of foreign countries.

20 Rule No. 11. News Media. A designated place in the Con-
21 vention Hall shall be provided for the news media, who shall
22 have free access thereto. Accreditation of members of the
23 press and of members of any news media for admission shall be
24 administered by the Chairman. No member of the press or of
25 any news media shall conduct any interview with a delegate on
26 the Convention floor while the Convention is in session.

27 Rule No. 12. Administration of Rules. The Chairman of
28 the Convention shall provide for the administration of the
29 rules governing admission to the Convention as provided
30 herein.

31 Rule No. 13. Regulation of Convention Area. The Chair-
32 man shall have the regulation and control of such parts of
33 the Convention Hall and its passage or any other places of
34 general assembly as are or may be set apart for the use of
35 the Convention, its officers and employees.

1 Rule No. 14. Restrictions on Non-Delegates. No motion
2 shall be deemed in order, except a motion to suspend the rules
3 or a motion to go into the Committee of the Whole, to admit
4 any person not a delegate to the Convention floor to present
5 any petition, memorial or address, or to read same, except in
6 the Committee of the Whole as may be provided by the Convention
7 in accordance with Rule No. 65.

8 Rule No. 15. Open Meetings. All meetings of the Conven-
9 tion shall be open to the public and the news media.

10 CHAPTER 2

11 Officers, Employees, and Duties

12 Officers

13 Rule No. 16. Convention Officers. The officers of the
14 Convention shall be a Chairman, who shall be Chairman of the
15 Convention, a First Vice-Chairman, three Vice-Chairmen, a
16 Secretary, and a Treasurer. There shall be an Executive Com-
17 mittee which shall be composed of the officers of the Convention
18 and sixteen delegates, with two delegates to be elected from each
19 congressional district in which they resided at the time of quali-
20 fication or appointment. Such voting shall be in separate con-
21 gressional caucuses. The Chairman of the Convention shall serve
22 as Chairman of the Executive Committee. No member of the Executive
23 Committee, other than the Chairman of the Convention shall serve on
24 the Committee on Committees nor shall the Executive Committee serve
25 as the Committee on Committees. The officers of the Convention
26 shall be delegates to the Convention and shall each be elected in
27 separate elections by a majority vote of all the delegates of
28 the Convention.

29 Employees

30 Rule No. 17. Convention Employees.

31 A. A Chief Clerk and a Sergeant-at-Arms shall be employed
32 by the Chairman of the Convention subject to the approval of
33 a majority vote of the entire Convention; they shall not be
34 delegates to the Convention.

35 B. All other employees, necessary to aid the Convention,

1 shall be employed by the Executive Committee of the Convention
2 in accordance with Act 2 of the 1972 Regular Session.

3 Executive Committee

4 Rule No. 18. Duties. The Executive Committee shall:

5 A. Employ a research director, research assistants,
6 secretarial and/or clerical personnel and such other employees
7 as it deems necessary, in accordance with provisions of Act 2
8 of the 1972 Regular Session. The Executive Committee shall be
9 a committee on administration, which shall consider research
10 materials and personnel, convention budget and finance and
11 other administrative details, facilities and physical
12 arrangements for the Convention, for committee hearings and
13 for the staff, outside grants and assistance to the Conven-
14 tion, purchases and rental of equipment, supplies and services,
15 printing and related matters.

16 B. Assist the Chairman of the Convention in the assign-
17 ment of delegates to their seats.

18 C. Serve as the executive board of the Convention in
19 all matters requiring official sanction.

20 D. Assist the Chairman of the Convention in his capacity
21 as supervisor of the research staff of the Convention.

22 E. Any other provision in these rules to the contrary
23 notwithstanding the Executive Committee may, when performing
24 the duties assigned it in this rule, with respect to personnel
25 matters, meet in Executive Session but no committee action shall
26 be taken while in Executive Session.

27 F. Any delegate may attend any executive session held by
28 the Executive Committee or any other committee.

29 The Chairman

30 Rule No. 19. Duties. The Chairman shall be the presiding
31 officer and the Chief Executive Officer of the Convention,
32 and as such, Chairman of the Executive Committee. He shall:

33 A. Preside at sessions of the Convention and exercise the
34 usual powers and perform the usual duties of a presiding
35 officer;

- 1 B. Preserve order and decorum;
- 2 C. Speak to points of order, and subject to an appeal to
3 the Convention, decide all points of order;
- 4 D. Confine delegates in debate to the question, prevent
5 personal reflections, and determine the order of recognition
6 when two or more delegates rise at the same time;
- 7 E. Designate the First Vice-Chairman to preside in his
8 absence and establish the order of the Vice-Chairmen to preside
9 in the absence of both the Chairman and the First Vice-Chairman;
- 10 F. Name a delegate to preside as chairman on each occasion
11 when the Convention sits as a Committee of the Whole;
- 12 G. Assign, with the assistance of the Executive Committee,
13 the delegates to their seats;
- 14 H. At the request of at least twenty-seven delegates, a
15 recorded yea and nay vote shall be ordered by the Chairman;
- 16 I. Sign all official documents of the Convention,
17 attested by the Secretary;
- 18 J. Make corrections of the official journal of the
19 Convention, if necessary, attested by the Secretary with
20 notification of any substantive changes being made to the
21 Convention at large;
- 22 K. Direct the Convention in its official activities,
23 including naming delegates to perform duties connected with
24 the business of the Convention;
- 25 L. Not engage in debate when sitting as Chairman, nor
26 shall he vote on appeals from his rulings;
- 27 M. Maintain general control of the Convention Hall,
28 its environs, and all rooms set apart for use of the Con-
29 vention;
- 30 N. Sign all warrants;
- 31 O. Supervise the Convention staff, provided that he may
32 delegate certain of this function to members of the staff;
- 33 P. On his own initiative or at the direction of the
34 Convention appoint such special committees as may be neces-
35 sary to perform special functions.

1 First Vice-Chairman

2 Rule No. 20. Duties. The First Vice-Chairman shall serve
3 as First Vice-Chairman of the Convention, and as such, shall:

4 A. Preside as acting Convention chairman, when requested
5 to do so by the Convention Chairman, or in the absence or
6 inability of the Chairman to serve;

7 B. Serve as a member of the Executive Committee of the
8 Convention, and carry out such other duties as are assigned
9 by the Chairman;

10 C. Serve as an ex officio member of the Committee on
11 Rules, Credentials, Ethics and Schedules, but shall have no
12 vote therein and shall not be counted for the purpose of
13 obtaining a quorum thereof.

14 Vice-Chairmen

15 Rule No. 21. Duties. The Vice-Chairmen shall:

16 A. Preside in the absence of the Chairman and the First
17 Vice-Chairman in the order established by the Chairman as
18 provided in Rule No. 19E;

19 B. Serve as members of the Executive Committee and
20 carry out such duties as are assigned by the Chairman.

21 C. The Chairman shall designate Vice-Chairmen to serve
22 ex officio on each of the three remaining procedural commit-
23 tees, no Vice-Chairman shall have a vote on the committee
24 to which he is assigned and shall not be counted for the
25 purpose of obtaining a quorum thereof.

26 Secretary

27 Rule No. 22. Duties. The Secretary shall:

28 A. Exercise responsibility for the accuracy of the
29 Convention Journal of Proceedings, and the daily publica-
30 tion and distribution of the Journal;

31 B. Keep a verbatim written record and a sound record-
32 ing of all sessions of the Convention and of the Com-
33 mittee of the Whole;

34 C. Prepare a daily calendar of business and notices
35 of schedules of all committee meetings;

1 D. Receive, reproduce, number, and distribute all
2 resolutions, delegate and committee proposals;

3 E. Read to the Convention all proposals, resolutions,
4 petitions, memorials and communications;

5 F. Exercise responsibility for roll calls of the
6 delegates;

7 G. Attest where necessary all official documents of
8 the Convention;

9 H. Preserve and safeguard all original copies of official
10 documents and be responsible for the preservation of all
11 proceedings of the Convention and its committees, and see
12 that all records are properly preserved in archives of the
13 state;

14 I. Serve as a member of the Executive Committee;

15 J. Perform such other duties as may be designated by
16 the Chairman or the Executive Committee.

17 Rule No. 23. Delegation of Secretary's Duties to Chief
18 Clerk. Except for certification of official acts, documents
19 and vouchers, and service on the Executive Committee, the
20 Secretary may delegate his duties to the Chief Clerk, sub-
21 ject to supervision by the Secretary.

22 The Treasurer

23 Rule No. 24. Duties. The Treasurer shall:

24 A. Exercise responsibility for the accuracy of the
25 Convention's financial records and the monthly distribution
26 of financial statements to the delegates of the Convention;

27 B. Co-sign, with the Convention Chairman, all warrants;

28 C. Serve as custodian of all Convention financial
29 records;

30 D. Assist in the preparation of the Convention's budget;

31 E. File quarterly audits and the final audit of financial
32 records with the State Treasurer, Clerk of the House of Repre-
33 sentatives and the Secretary of the Senate;

34 F. Make financial records of the Convention available for
35 audit to the Louisiana Legislative Auditor quarterly and at

1 the end of the Convention;

2 G. Serve as a member of the Executive Committee, and carry
3 out such other duties as may be assigned by the Chairman.

4 Chief Clerk

5 Rule No. 25. Duties. The Chief Clerk:

6 A. Shall not be a delegate to the Convention;

7 B. Shall perform general administrative duties of the
8 Convention subject to supervision of the Chairman, and when
9 he assumes the duties of the Secretary as provided in Rule
10 No. 22, he shall do so under the supervision of the Secretary;

11 C. Shall be answerable to the entire Convention for
12 faithful execution of his duties and the smooth functioning
13 of the Convention in assembly as a deliberative body;

14 D. Shall serve as Parliamentarian of the Convention
15 and shall be advisor and counsel to the Chairman and committee
16 chairmen on all matters of parliamentary procedure; however,
17 all parliamentary rulings shall be the responsibility of,
18 and shall be made by, the Chairman or Committee Chairmen in
19 committee.

20 Rule No. 25.1. Signing of Checks. All checks shall be
21 signed by the Chairman or the first Vice-Chairman and by the
22 treasurer or the chief clerk.

23 Sergeant-at-Arms

24 Rule No. 26. Duties. The Sergeant-at-Arms shall:

25 A. Attend the Convention during its sitting, to execute
26 commands as directed to him by the chairman, including sign-
27 ing for and delivery of correspondence addressed to delegates;

28 B. Maintain order in the Convention Hall and execute
29 Rules of the Convention concerning admission to the floor;

30 C. Maintain order at committee hearings and assist
31 committee chairmen in their duties.

32 D. Exercise supervisory control over his assistants,
33 subject to direction of the chairman.

34 Rule 26.1. Vacancies. If a vacancy occurs in the office
35 of Chairman, the first Vice-Chairman shall temporarily preside

1 until the Convention elects a Chairman to fill the office in
2 the same manner in which the officer was first elected.

3 If a vacancy occurs in the office of any of the Vice-
4 Chairmen or in the office of the Secretary or Treasurer,
5 the Chairman shall appoint a delegate to exercise the powers
6 of that vacant office until the Convention fills the vacancy
7 in the same manner in which the officer was first elected.

8 CHAPTER 3

9 Delegates

10 Rule No. 27. Delegates Oath. No delegate shall be
11 qualified to serve unless and until he has taken the pre-
12 scribed oaths.

13 Rule No. 28. Recognition in Debate. When any delegate
14 desires to speak in debate or present any matter to the
15 Convention, he shall rise and address himself to the chair.
16 He shall not speak until recognized, and when recognized,
17 he shall confine himself to the question under debate.

18 Rule No. 29. Transgression of Rules. If any delegate
19 in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the
20 Convention, the chairman shall call the delegate to order;
21 in which case the delegate shall sit down and shall not
22 proceed without leave of the chairman or the Convention.

23 Rule No. 30. Limits on Debate. Delegates shall not
24 speak more than once to the same question, nor more than
25 fifteen minutes, without leave of the Convention,
26 unless the delegate is the mover, proposer or introducer
27 of the matter pending, in which case, either the delegate
28 and/or his designees shall be permitted to speak in reply,
29 but not until every delegate choosing to speak shall have
30 spoken, except where the previous question or the previous
31 question on the entire subject matter has been ordered.
32 When the previous question has been ordered, the mover,
33 proposer or introducer shall nonetheless have the right
34 to speak or reply as provided in Rule No. 26. The time
35 for reply shall not exceed a total of fifteen minutes.

1 Rule No. 31. Prohibited Behavior. No delegate shall
2 walk off of the Convention floor during roll calls, nor
3 shall any delegate in any way impede the business of the
4 Convention by interrupting delegates who are speaking, by
5 use of objectionable language, or by engaging in any way
6 in discourteous conduct.

7 Rule No. 32. Questions of Order. Every question of
8 order shall be decided by the chairman, without debate,
9 subject to an appeal. The chairman may call for the sense
10 of the Convention on any question of order, but when an
11 appeal has been taken from the decision of the chair, any
12 subsequent question of order which may arise from the
13 decision of such appeal by the Convention shall be decided
14 by the chairman without debate, and all appeals therefrom
15 shall also be decided by the Convention without debate.
16 Appeals from any ruling of the chairman shall be affirmatively put, and to overrule the chairman, shall require the
17 same vote required to suspend the rules. (See Rule No. 85.)

18 Rule No. 33. Answering Roll Calls. Every delegate
19 must be at his desk when a roll call is being taken, and
20 answers to roll calls from other locations on the Convention floor shall not be counted.

21 Rule No. 34. Absence from Daily Sessions. A delegate
22 may be excused from attendance at daily sessions only with
23 leave from the chairman, and no delegate shall be compensated for a day on which he is absent from Convention sessions.

24 Rule No. 35. Vacancies. By a vote of at least two-thirds of the delegates to the Convention, the seat of a
25 delegate may be declared vacant by the Convention if the
26 delegate has been absent for at least fifteen unexcused, consecutive, opening roll calls. In the event of the
27 death of, or written resignation by a delegate, the seat
28 may be immediately declared vacant by the Chairman. The
29 Chairman shall notify the Governor of any vacancy.

30 Rule No. 36. Voting in Person. No person other than
31
32
33
34
35

1 the delegate himself, will be permitted to vote to answer
2 any roll call or quorum call.

3 CHAPTER 4

4 Proposals

5 Rule No. 37. Proposal. Any original suggestion, prop-
6 osition, or draft intended to become a part of the Con-
7 stitution shall be referred to as a proposal. A proposal
8 introduced by a delegate shall be designated as a delegate
9 proposal, and a proposal submitted by a committee shall
10 be designated as a committee proposal. An amendment shall
11 be designated as an amendment.

12 Rule No. 38. Resolutions. All matters of general
13 convention business, other than proposals intended to be-
14 come a part of the Constitution, shall be proposed through
15 the instrument of a resolution, which instrument shall be
16 so designated and may be introduced at any time.

17 A resolution introduced by a delegate shall be designated
18 as a delegate resolution, and a resolution submitted by a
19 committee shall be designated as a committee resolution.

20 Resolutions shall be subject to the same rules of read-
21 ings, committee referral and adoption as proposals. Resolu-
22 tions shall contain a short title which shall be reflective
23 of its purpose and substance, and shall comply with the
24 form requirements of Rule No. 41.

25 Rule No. 39. Introduction. A proposal may be intro-
26 duced by a delegate or delegates or by a committee on behalf
27 of a majority of its membership.

28 Rule No. 40. Introduction of Committee Proposals.
29 Committee proposals prepared and approved by the several
30 committees of the Convention prior to July 5, 1973, shall
31 constitute the first proposals to be introduced in the
32 Convention and shall be introduced by the chairman of
33 each committee or his designee and shall bear the signature
34 of a majority of the members of the committee. These
35 proposals as far as completed shall be mailed to all

1 Convention delegates on or before June 22, 1973.

2 Rule No. 41. Form of Proposals. Delegate proposals
3 shall be distinguished from committee proposals and all
4 proposals shall be separately numbered. All proposals
5 shall be introduced or submitted in eight copies. All
6 proposals must be typed, double spaced on 8-1/2-by-14-inch
7 paper in a type face with excellent reproduction qualities.
8 A margin of one inch on the left and right side and at the
9 top and bottom shall be preserved. The lines on each page
10 shall be numbered consecutively from top to bottom at the
11 left margin, and the left typing margin shall be two spaces
12 to the right of the line numbers. Pages commencing with
13 page two shall be numbered at the top center of the page.
14 The original of all proposals shall remain in the custody
15 of the Convention. The secretary shall, as soon as any
16 proposal is printed, place it on the desks of the dele-
17 gates. The caption of each proposal shall be substantially
18 in the following form:

21 (Committee or Delegate) (Number)
22 Introduced by _____
23 (Name of Delegate or Committee Chairman)

24 Each proposal shall also contain a short title stating
25 concisely the general nature of its subject matter.

26 Rule No. 42. Deadline on Proposals. No proposals may
27 be introduced by delegates or committees after the first
28 sixty days following July 5, 1973. Amendments to proposals
29 may be offered any time.

30 Rule No. 43. Printing. Each proposal introduced shall
31 be immediately printed and distributed to the delegates and
32 shall be available to the general public and other interested
33 parties. No final action may be taken on any proposals until
34 printed copies have been distributed to the delegates for at
35 least forty-eight hours.

1 Rule No. 44. Order of Processing. The order of Conven-
2 tion procedure in processing each proposal shall be as
3 follows:

4 A. Introduction, which shall constitute the first
5 reading.

6 B. Committee referrals: Committee proposals shall be
7 referred to the Committee offering the proposal. Delegate
8 proposals shall be referred by the Chairman of the Conven-
9 tion to the appropriate committee based on the subject
10 matter of the proposal. The chairman shall announce his
11 referral to the delegates and if no objection is raised,
12 the proposal shall be referred to the Committee designated
13 by the chairman; if objection is raised, the referral shall
14 be made by the Convention. Referrals shall be made the day
15 following introduction. Committee referral shall commence
16 the second reading.

17 C. Committee reports.

18 D. Consideration of and voting on the substantive com-
19 mittee report by delegates in general assembly.

20 E. If recommitment, reconsideration by substantive
21 committee or committee of the whole.

22 F. Reference to Committee on Style and Drafting.

23 G. Engrossment, which shall complete the second reading.

24 H. Third reading and final passage.

25 I. Enrollment.

26 J. Referral to Committee on Style and Drafting.

27 K. Convention approval of final styling.

28 L. Final enrollment.

29 Each of the three required readings shall occur on three
30 different days.

31 Rule No. 45. Order of Proposals. When a proposal
32 is up for third reading and final passage, it shall be
33 read, debated, and acted upon separately by sections.
34 Each section shall be considered a separate question for
35 the purpose of "limits on debate" provided for in Rule

1 No. 39.

2 Rule No. 46. Amendments. Amendments shall be sub-
3 mitted in writing, and a copy of every such amendment
4 shall be distributed to each delegate before a vote
5 occurs thereon.

6 Rule No. 47. Styling and Drafting. When all proposals
7 have been processed, the entirety of those adopted shall be
8 sent to the Committee on Style and Drafting for orderly
9 arrangement in the new proposed Constitution, to the end
10 that the document shall be properly coordinated and uniform
11 in style, and such final draft must be approved by a majority
12 of the delegates to the Convention.

13 Rule No. 48. Distribution. For the purpose of these
14 rules "distribution" shall mean that a copy of any document
15 is placed on the desk or chair of each delegate.

16 CHAPTER 5

17 Committees

18 Substantive, Procedural and Other

19 Rule No. 49. Substantive Committees.

20 A. The following substantive committees are hereby created:

21 1. Committee on Bill of Rights and Elections, which
22 shall consider the Preamble, Bill of Rights, Human Rights,
23 Obligations of Citizenship, distribution of powers, suffrage
24 and election, the amendment process, and future constitu-
25 tional conventions;

26 2. Committee on Executive Department, which shall
27 consider the offices comprising the executive department,
28 reorganization, term of the Governor and other elected
29 officials, and impeachment;

30 3. Committee on Legislative Powers and Functions, which
31 shall consider the Legislative Department, apportionment,
32 qualifications, regular and special session;

33 4. Committee on Judiciary, which shall consider the
34 judiciary, tenure and selection of judges, the Department
35 of Justice, district attorneys, sheriffs, clerks of court

1 and coroners;

2 5. Committee on Local and Parochial Government, which
3 shall consider local and parochial government, home rule,
4 special districts, consolidation of governments and
5 intergovernmental cooperation;

6 6. Committee on Revenue, Finance and Taxation, which
7 shall consider revenue, finance, taxation, assessors and
8 assessment, exemptions, state debts and management of state
9 funds;

10 7. Committee on Education and Welfare, which shall
11 consider public education, welfare, consumer affairs, civil
12 service, labor and industry; and

13 8. Committee on Natural Resources and Environment,
14 which shall consider public lands, minerals, water resources,
15 wildlife, environmental concerns, recreation and agriculture.

16 B. Other provisions that may not be covered by the areas
17 of responsibility shown above may be assigned by the Coordinating
18 Committee to the appropriate substantive committee.

19 Rule No. 50. Procedural Committees.

20 The following procedural committees are hereby created:

21 1. Committee on Rules, Credentials and Ethics, which
22 shall consider rules, credentials of delegates, ques-
23 tions of ethics, news media and employees, and shall
24 consider all questions on any procedural disputes referred
25 to it by the Chairman or by the Convention;

26 2. Committee on Style and Drafting, which shall have
27 control over literary style, consistency, arrangement and
28 numbering. The committee shall have authority to rephrase
29 or to regroup proposed language, but shall have no authority
30 to change the sense or purpose of any proposal referred to
31 it. When a proposal is referred to it in amended or in
32 conflict with a proposal already acted on favorably by the
33 Convention the committee shall at the third reading (Rule
34 4(d)) so notify the Convention of that inconsistency or
35 conflict and wait upon its instructions.

1 3. Committee on Legislative Liaison and Transitional
2 Measures, which shall maintain liaison with the legislative
3 branch and the Louisiana Law Institute and provide for co-
4 ordination of the transition of subject matter from the
5 Constitution to the appropriate law; and

6 4. Committee on Public Information, which shall con-
7 sider and implement measures to inform the people on the
8 actions, procedures, recommendations and activities of the
9 Convention. It shall plan and implement the report to be
10 given to the voters of Louisiana on the result of the
11 Convention's work, and shall direct the effort to obtain
12 approval of the new Constitution and the form and manner
13 of presentation.

14 Rule No. 51. Appointment of Committees.

15 The selection of delegates to serve on the substantive
16 and procedural committees shall be determined as follows:

17 Within twenty-four hours after the adoption of these rules
18 by the Convention, each delegate shall submit in writing to
19 the Convention the committee or committees in order of
20 preference to which he or she desires to be appointed.

21 A Committee on Committees shall select from among said
22 delegates the delegates to serve on each committee based
23 primarily on the preference of each delegate and giving
24 due consideration to the qualifications, experience and
25 residence of each delegate so as to provide as nearly as possible
26 a fair and balanced representation on each committee of this
27 Convention.

28 Rule No. 52. Committee on Committees.

29 The Committee on Committees shall be composed of the
30 Chairman of the Convention who shall be chairman of the
31 Committee on Committees and sixteen delegates, with two dele-
32 gates to be elected from each congressional district by
33 the delegates voting in the congressional district in which
34 they resided at the time of qualification or appointment.
35 Such voting shall be in separate caucuses.

1 No member of the Committee on Committees shall be elected
2 a Chairman or a Vice-Chairman of a substantive or procedural
3 committee.

4 Rule No. 53. Service on Committees.

5 Each substantive and procedural committee shall be com-
6 posed of at least ten delegates and no more than thirty. The
7 Committee on Committees shall determine the size of each sub-
8 stantive and procedural committee within such limitations. Each
9 delegate except the Convention Chairman shall serve on at
10 least one and only one substantive committee and may serve on
11 no more than one procedural committee. Each committee
12 shall elect a chairman, vice-chairman, and such other
13 officers as the committee deems necessary. No delegate
14 serving on the Executive Committee shall serve as Chairman
15 or Vice-Chairman of any substantive committee. The Chairman
16 of the Convention shall designate the date and place of the
17 original meeting of each committee at which committee meeting
18 officers are to be elected and each committee member is to be
19 notified in person or by certified mail of such designation.

20 The Chairman of the Convention shall be ex officio a
21 member of all substantive committees, but shall have no
22 vote therein and shall not be counted for the purpose of
23 obtaining a quorum thereof.

24 Rule No. 54. Coordinating Committee. The Coordinating
25 Committee shall be composed of the Chairman and First Vice-
26 Chairman of the Convention, and the chairmen of the respec-
27 tive substantive committees. The Coordinating Committee
28 shall consider any issues regarding overlap and/or
29 conflict which might arise concerning the jurisdiction of
30 any substantive committee or any subject matter; call joint
31 meetings of any substantive committees for the purpose of
32 discussing any overlap and/or conflict which might
33 arise and make recommendations to the respective substan-
34 tive committees as to possible resolution thereof and shall
35 assure that each provision of the Constitution of 1921,

1 an amended, shall have been considered by at least one sub-
2 stantive committee.

3 Rule No. 55. Other Committees. The Convention, by a
4 majority vote of the delegates present and voting, shall
5 have authority to create other committees, including special
6 advisory committees, as it deems necessary, and all sub-
7 stantive and procedural committees may create such sub-
8 committees as each deems necessary, provided that all such
9 sub-committees shall be created only by a majority vote of
10 the creating body.

11 Rule No. 56. Proposals. The various articles of the
12 proposed draft of a Constitution shall be prepared under
13 the direction and supervision of the respective substantive
14 committees. The research staff shall be assigned to the
15 respective committees by the Chairman of the Convention
16 after consultation with the chairman of the committee to
17 which the staff will be assigned.

18 Committee Meetings and Hearings

19 Rule No. 57. Quorum and Rules of Committees. A majority
20 of any committee constitutes a quorum. The rules of the
21 Convention shall be observed in all committees as far as may
22 be applicable, and, if applicable, may not be suspended. Any
23 committee may adopt its own rules of procedure. No committee
24 rule shall conflict with the Rules of the Convention, except
25 that any committee may establish a different rule with respect
26 to limits on debate.

27 Rule No. 58. A. Public Hearings, Records. No committee
28 shall sit during sessions of the Convention or of the Commit-
29 tee of the Whole without special leave of a majority of
30 Convention delegates present and voting. All committee
31 meetings and hearings shall be publicized, shall be open to
32 the public, and may be recorded verbatim, including the testi-
33 mony of those wishing to be heard. Minutes of the committee
34 meetings shall be recorded. All committees shall, and are
35 hereby authorized to, hold public hearings as shown on a

1 committee or through a designated sub-committee, said hearings
2 to be conducted at such localities throughout the State as
3 the committee may designate.

4 B. Appearance of Delegates or Witnesses. Any person
5 wishing to be heard before a committee shall have a right
6 to be heard subject to the rules of that committee.

7 C. Testimony. Committees and sub-committees may take
8 testimony under oath or affirmation, and the chairman of any
9 committee or sub-committee is authorized to administer the oath.

10 D. Any person not a delegate appearing before a committee
11 or sub-committee shall identify himself by name and address
12 and shall state whether or not he is representing any other
13 person or interest.

14 Rule No. 59. Calling of Committees and Agenda. Each
15 committee shall meet at the call of its chairman, who shall
16 also set its agenda, subject to the approval of a majority of
17 the Committee. One-third of the members of a commit-
18 tee may in writing request the chairman to call a meeting
19 of that committee, and, upon his failure to do so within
20 forty-eight hours not including Saturdays, Sundays, and
21 legal holidays, a majority of the members of the committee
22 shall have the right to call a meeting of the committee and
23 set its agenda and place of meeting under the appropriate
24 notice requirements. Each proposal referred to a committee
25 must appear on the committee's agenda at least once.

26 Rule No. 60. Reports. All proposals submitted to a
27 substantive or procedural committee shall be reported from
28 that committee indicating committee action provided that a
29 majority of the committee membership present and voting must
30 approve the committee report; a minority report may also
31 be made by any member of a substantive committee.

32 No resolution, petition, memorial or proposal shall be
33 reported by a committee unless a public hearing on the
34 measure first has been held by the committee. No committee
35 shall report a measure to the Convention pursuant to a

1 procedure, referred to as a "round robin."

2 Rule No. 61. Form of Reports. The chairman of a
3 substantive committee shall write after each proposal or
4 resolution only the words "reported favorably," "reported
5 unfavorably," "reported with amendments," "reported without
6 action," "reported without action with recommendation that
7 it be recommitteed to the Committee on _____," "reported
8 by substitute," as the case may be, which report shall be
9 signed by the chairman. Should amendments be proposed,
10 such amendment or amendments shall be written on a separate
11 paper, original and two copies, numbered consecutively, and
12 attached to the proposal or resolution, and under no circum-
13 stances shall words or sentences be interlined on the body
14 of the measure, and the same be marked while in possession
15 of committee.

16 Rule No. 62. Notice of Committee Meetings. A. No
17 committee meetings may be held unless notice thereof is
18 given in the following manner: The chairman of the committee
19 or one of the members of the committee calling the meeting
20 under the authority of Rule 59 shall notify the Secretary
21 of the Convention of the time, date, place and agenda of the
22 committee meeting. Within twenty-four hours thereafter
23 the Secretary shall mail notices of such meeting to all members
24 of the committee, all persons who have filed written requests
25 for notice with the Secretary, and to all members of the Con-
26 vention who have introduced proposals on the subject matter
27 to be considered. The committee hearing shall not be scheduled
28 less than four days from the date of notice to the Secretary.
29 This rule shall apply only when the convention is not in
30 session.

31 B. Committee and sub-committee meetings called while the
32 Convention is in session may be called by the chairman or
33 by a majority of the committee members upon twenty-four hour
34 notice given by announcement from the floor of the Convention
35 and by posting the notice thereof on a designated bulletin

1 board in the vicinity of the floor of the Convention at least
2 twenty-four hours before such meeting.

3 Rule No. 63. Subcommittees. A committee, by the affir-
4 mative vote of the majority of its members, may provide for
5 the appointment by the committee chairman of sub-committee
6 composed of members of the committee. Reports of sub-com-
7 mittees shall be considered by the entire committee before
8 any committee recommends any action thereon by the Convention.
9 All rules applicable to committees shall be applicable to
10 sub-committees.

11 Rule No. 64. Records. All written records and reports
12 of committees of the Convention shall be subject to provi-
13 sions of the Public Records Act.

14 Committee of the Whole

15 Rule No. 65. Procedure. The Convention by a majority
16 vote of the delegates present and voting may resolve itself
17 into a Committee of the Whole for a specified time and pur-
18 pose. The motion of the Committee of the Whole shall
19 specify the maximum time during which the Committee shall
20 sit.

21 A. The chairman shall designate a delegate to serve as
22 chairman of the Committee of the Whole. The rules of pro-
23 cedure of the Convention shall apply insofar as applicable,
24 except that delegates may speak more than once unless the
25 chairman imposes limits on debate, actions will be governed
26 by a majority of those present and voting, matters cannot
27 be referred to other committees, no question may be laid
28 on the table, the previous question cannot be ordered, and
29 motions to adjourn will not be entertained.

30 B. Proposals in the Committee of the Whole shall be
31 read through, debated and acted upon by sections. All
32 amendments shall be in writing and reported to the Convention
33 by the chairman.

34 C. A motion that the Committee of the Whole rise shall
35 always be in order unless a delegate is speaking or a vote

1 is being taken. The motion is not debatable and shall be
2 decided by a majority vote of those present and voting.

6 Rule No. 66. Order. The daily business of the Conven-
7 tion shall proceed as follows:

- 17 8. Resolutions on Second Reading and Referral.
- 18 9. Proposals on Second Reading and Referral.
- 19 10. Reports of Committees Lying Over.
- 20 11. Reconsideration

21 Regular Order of the Day

- 22 12. Unfinished Business.
- 23 13. Special Order.
- 24 14. Resolutions on Third Reading and Final Passage.
- 25 15. Proposals on Third Reading and Final Passage.
- 26 16. Proposals on calendar for approval of final styling.

27 Rule No. 67. Change in Daily Order. The order of daily
28 business set forth in the above rule shall be adhered to
29 unless the consent of the convention shall be otherwise given
30 by majority vote of the delegates present.

31 Rule No. 68. Time of Committee Referral. Where appro-
32 priate, all petitions and memorials shall be referred to the
33 proper committees by the chairman as soon as read, where
34 reference may be necessary or is requested by a delegate.

35 Rule No. 69. Privileged Motions. When a question is

- 1 under debate, no motion shall be received except:
- 2 1. To fix the time to which to adjourn.
 - 3 2. To adjourn.
 - 4 3. To take a recess.
 - 5 4. To call for the Orders of the day.
 - 6 5. To lay on the table.
 - 7 6. For a Call of the Convention.
 - 8 7. To limit debate.
 - 9 8. To move the previous question on the entire subject
 - 10 matter.
 - 11 9. To move the previous question.
 - 12 10. To postpone to a day certain.
 - 13 11. To commit, refer, or recommit.
 - 14 12. To amend.
 - 15 13. To postpone indefinitely.

16 The motions listed in this rule shall take precedence in
17 the order which they stand arranged. All of them shall be
18 decided by the affirmative vote of a majority of those pres-
19 ent and voting, a motion for the previous question and the
20 previous question on the entire subject matter shall require
21 a vote of a majority of the delegates present and voting,
22 and a motion to postpone indefinitely requires the affirmative
23 vote of a majority of all delegates to the Convention. Before
24 calling for the vote on the previous question or on the pre-
25 vious question on the entire subject matter, the Chairman
26 shall announce the names of those delegates who have
27 requested to speak and shall state the number of amendments
28 or motions which are still pending. When a recess is taken
29 while a question is pending, consideration of such question
30 shall be resumed when the Convention reassembles, unless
31 it determines otherwise. No motion to postpone to a day
32 certain, or to commit, having been decided by the Convention,
33 shall again be in order on the same day or at the same stage
34 of the question. Whenever a proposal is being considered
35 and a motion is then made, either to postpone indefinitely

1 or to consult, any pending amendments to the proposal shall
2 first be in order before any vote is taken on any such motion.

3 Rule No. 70. Motions Not Debatable. A motion to adjourn
4 is always in order except when a motion to fix the time to
5 which to adjourn, or a motion to amend the calendar and
6 agenda, is pending. A motion to adjourn, a motion to lay
7 on the table, a motion for recess pending the consideration
8 of other business and all matters relating to questions of
9 order shall be decided without debate.

10 Rule No. 71. Withdrawal. Any motion may be withdrawn
11 by the mover at any time before decision, amendment or
12 ordering of the yeas and nays, except a motion to reconsider,
13 which may not be withdrawn without consent of the Convention.

14 Rule No. 72. Format of Motions and Seconds. Motions
15 shall be presented in the following manner:

16 A. No motion listed in Rule No. 69 need be in writing.
17 Where a motion is in writing the delegate shall attach his
18 or her name thereto before it is received by the Chairman or
19 read by the Secretary, or before it is debated, if debate
20 is in order.

21 B. No motion need be seconded.

22 Rule No. 73. Motion for Reconsideration. Any member
23 may move for a reconsideration of any question at the same
24 session of the Convention or the next succeeding session.
25 The Committee on Style and Drafting may move for reconsider-
26 ation on any subsequent day if one session day's notice of
27 its intention to do so is given in writing to the Secretary
28 and is entered upon the Journal. A motion to reconsider
29 shall be taken up in its regular order and shall be decided
30 upon by a majority vote of those members present and voting.

31 A motion to reconsider shall not be renewed on the same
32 day.

33 Rule No. 74. Motion to Call from the Table. A motion
34 which has been laid on the table shall be called from the
35 table only by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the

1 delegates to the Convention.

2 Rule No. 75. Division of a Question. Any delegate
3 may call for a division of the question, which shall be
4 divided if it includes propositions which are so distinct
5 in substance that, when one is removed or deferred, a sub-
6 stantive proposition remains for the decision of the Con-
7 vention. A motion to strike out and insert shall not be
8 subject to division within the meaning of this rule. The
9 limits on debate as set forth in Rule No. 30 of these rules
10 shall apply to the debate on each division of a question.

11 Rule No. 76. Previous Question. A. Previous Question.
12 This undebatable motion is applicable only to the pending
13 amendment, or amendments, if more than one amendment is under
14 discussion; and it shall be admitted when ordered by a
15 favorable vote as provided in Rule 69, and when carried its
16 effect shall be to put an end to the debate and bring the
17 Convention to a vote on the pending amendments only, without
18 prejudice to further debate on, or subsequent amendments
19 to, the main question. If there has been any discussion
20 on the amendments, the proponent, or delegates designated
21 by him, shall have the right to close, even after the previous
22 question is ordered, which closing speech shall be limited
23 to fifteen minutes.

24 B. Previous question on the entire subject matter. It
25 shall only be admitted when ordered by a favorable vote
26 as provided in Rule 69, and when carried, its effect shall
27 be to put an end to all debate, and bring the Convention
28 or any committee to a direct vote--

29 (1) Upon the pending amendment and so on back to the
30 first amendment offered;

31 (2) Upon amendment reported by a committee, if any;
32 and,

33 (3) Upon the main question. But in all questions
34 involving length of time, amount of interest, questions of
35 quantity, and similar questions, such questions involving

1 the longest time, the largest interest or quantity shall
2 be put first regardless of the order in which motions,
3 amendments or substitutes, may have been made.

4 (4) The motion for the previous question and the
5 previous question on the subject matter shall, during the
6 consideration of any proposal, extend only to the individual
7 section under discussion in accordance with Rule No. 45.

8 On a motion for the previous question on the entire
9 subject matter, and prior to the ordering of the same, a call
10 of the Convention shall be in order; but after the Convention
11 shall have ordered such motion no call shall be in order
12 prior to a decision of the main question. On a motion for
13 the previous question on the entire subject matter, there
14 shall be no debate. All incidental questions of order,
15 arising after a motion is made for the previous question on
16 the entire subject matter, and pending such motion, shall be
17 decided whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate. After
18 a call for the previous question on the entire subject matter
19 has been sustained, the question shall be put and determined
20 in order as above, without debate on either amendments or the
21 main question, provided that the proponents of the amendments
22 and measure, or delegates designated by him, shall respec-
23 tively have the right to close the debate, after the previous
24 question on the entire subject matter is ordered, which
25 closing speeches shall be limited to a total of fifteen
26 minutes.

27 Rule No. 77. Adjournment and Recess. A motion to adjourn
28 or recess shall always be in order, except when, on a call
29 for the previous question and previous question on the entire
30 subject matter, the question shall have been ordered, or
31 when a delegate has the floor, and shall be decided without
32 debate.

33 Yeas and Nays

34 Rule No. 78. Yeas after Decision is Announced. When
35 the Yeas and Nays are taken on any question, no delegate

1 shall be permitted, under any circumstances whatever, to
2 vote after the decision has been announced by the chairman.
3 The names of absentees on all calls of the yeas and nays
4 shall be placed on a separate list.

5 Rule No. 79. Explanation of Vote. No delegate shall be
6 permitted to explain his or her vote except as hereafter pro-
7 vided. Any delegate may explain his or her vote in writing
8 or reasons for not voting in writing and request that such
9 explanation be made part of the record.

10 Rule No. 80. Tie Votes. When the Convention is equally
11 divided, the vote of the chairman shall be taken to break
12 the tie, provided that the chairman, in this event, shall
13 not have previously voted as a delegate on the question.

14 Rule No. 81. Recording the Vote. On the passage on
15 third reading of every proposal, section, or article the yeas
16 and nays shall be entered in the Journal, and no proposal,
17 section, or article shall be declared passed unless a majority
18 of all the delegates to the Convention shall have voted in
19 favor of the passage of same.

20 Special Orders

21 Rule No. 82. Consent. No proposal, resolution or other
22 subject shall be made a special order for a particular day
23 without the consent of two-thirds of the delegates present
24 and voting.

25 Rule No. 83. Precedence. When two or more subjects
26 shall have been specially assigned for consideration, they
27 shall take precedence according to the order of time for
28 which they were severally made or assigned, and said orders
29 shall at no time be lost or changed except by direction of
30 the Convention.

31 Rule No. 84. Change in Rules. Any standing rule of
32 the Convention may be rescinded, altered, or amended in the
33 following manner: notice shall be given in writing of the
34 motion therefor, which motion shall be referred immediately
35 by the chairman to the Committee on Rules, which shall file

1 its report to the Convention within twenty-four hours of receipt
2 of the motion. Two days after the filing of the proposed
3 change, the motion shall be considered by the Convention
4 with or without the report of the Committee on Rules, and
5 for passage shall require a favorable vote of a majority
6 of the delegates to the Convention.

7 Rule No. 85. Suspension of Rules. One or more rules
8 may be suspended for a specified purpose by the affirmative
9 vote of two-thirds of the delegates present and voting or
10 a majority of delegates to the Convention, whichever consti-
11 tutes the lesser number.

12 Rule No. 86. Consideration of Proposals without Com-
13 mittee Recommendation. After one day's notice the Conven-
14 tion, on motion passed by the affirmative vote of a majority
15 of the delegates present and voting, may require a committee
16 to return, with or without a recommendation, any proposal
17 referred to the committee.

18 Rule No. 87. Notice. Whenever notice is required to
19 be given by these rules, the following shall constitute
20 notice:

21 (a) If the Convention is in session, an announcement
22 made by the Secretary in open session shall constitute
23 notice for all purposes.

24 (b) If the Convention is not in session, the Secretary
25 shall give notice to the delegates by U. S. Mail, certified,
26 postage prepaid. The date of mailing said notice shall
27 constitute the date of the notice for all purposes under
28 these rules.

29 Rule No. 88. Authority. On any question of order and
30 parliamentary practice, when these rules are silent or in-
31 explicit, Brown's Manual of Legislative Procedure shall be
32 considered authority.

33 Rule No. 89. Name Abbreviation. In all correspondence,
34 news releases, memoranda and other similar writings, it shall
35 be permissible to refer to the Constitutional Convention

of 1973 by the abbreviation "C.C./'73."

Thompson, R. S. Thompson, Toca, Turnley, Ullo, Womack, Mills, Lottinger, Bagert and Henry and Mrs. Johnson and Senators Carter, Williamson, Jones, W. D. Brown, Bauer, Blair, C. M. Brown, J. H. Brown, DeBlieux, Duplantier, Duval, Dykes, Fontenot, Foshee, Gerald, Guillory, Hardy, Hickey, Jumonville, Kiefer, Kilpatrick, Knowles, Montgomery, Mouton, Nicholson, Osterberger, Peltier, Poston, Tassin, Tiemann and Windhorst.

AN ACT

To provide for the holding of a constitutional convention for the purpose of framing a new constitution; to fix the time and place for said convention; to provide for the qualifications and election or appointment of delegates thereto; to provide for the organization and staff of the convention; to place restrictions on said convention; to require the constitution as drafted and adopted by such convention, including any alternative provisions, to be submitted to the qualified electors for adoption, to provide the manner of such submission, and to provide with respect thereto; to fix penalties for violations in connection with the holding of elections; to provide with respect to the disbursement of the funds appropriated for the convention and for the retention thereof; to fix the effective date of the new constitution if approved by the electorate, and otherwise to provide with respect to said convention and the constitution prepared by it.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

Section 1. A. (1) A constitutional convention is hereby called, to convene on January 5, 1973 at 12:00 o'clock noon, which shall be held for the purpose of framing a new constitution for the state of Louisiana, subject to the terms, conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth.

There shall be one hundred thirty-two delegates to the convention. One delegate shall be elected from each of the districts from which members of the House of Representatives of the Louisiana Legislature were elected at the last election for members of that body. One delegate shall be appointed by the governor to represent each of the following: industry, labor, education, civil service, wildlife and conservation, law enforcement, the judiciary, the professions, consumers, agriculture, youth, and racial minorities. Fifteen additional delegates shall be appointed by the governor from the public at large.

(2) Each delegate to the convention shall be an elector of the state of Louisiana, shall be at least eighteen years of age and shall be a resident of the state of Louisiana. In addition, each delegate elected from a representative district shall be a resident of the district from which he is elected at the time he qualifies as a candidate for election as a delegate. Any public official of the governmental subdivisions of the state, whether holding office by election or appointment, if otherwise qualified, shall be eligible for election or appointment as a delegate to the convention.

(3) The election or appointment of any public official as a delegate to the convention and his service in the convention, or the appointment of any public official to the staff of the convention and his service on such staff, as authorized and provided in this Act, shall not be construed to constitute dual office holding within the prohibitions of the laws of the state. Provided, however, delegates elected from the representative districts shall be considered state elected officials within the scope of and subject to the provisions of Part III of Chapter 15 of Title 42 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, and all delegates and members of the staff who are not elected officials shall be considered as state employees within the scope of and subject to the provisions of Part II of Chapter 15 of Title 42 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, and provided further, that both the delegates to the convention and the staff of the convention shall be subject to the public bribery provisions of the laws of this state.

(4) Any attorney at law serving as a delegate to the convention shall be entitled to the absolute right of the continuance of any case in which he is bona fide counsel of record in any court of the state during his attendance upon the sessions and work of the convention.

B. (1) The election for the one hundred five delegates to the convention to be elected from representative districts shall be held at the congressional election to be held on Saturday, August 19, 1972. The governor shall make proclamation and give notice of the election to be held under this section not less than forty-five days before the date of said election as herein fixed. Each person desiring to become a candidate for election

as a delegate from a representative district shall qualify as a candidate from the particular representative district he seeks to represent by filing a statement of candidacy with the secretary of state not later than July 19, 1972. Qualification as a candidate shall be without regard to party affiliation. Except as herein otherwise provided, the election for which provision is hereinabove made shall be conducted and the results thereof published and promulgated in accordance with the general election laws of the state. All qualified electors shall be entitled to vote in the election in their respective election precincts and without regard to party affiliation.

(2) Delegates shall be elected by the qualified electors participating in the election. The candidate receiving a majority of the total vote in each district and candidates who are unopposed shall be declared elected. In the event no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast on August 19, 1972, a run-off between the two candidates with the highest number of votes shall be held on Tuesday, November 7, 1972. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes cast in the run-off shall be declared elected. In the event more than one candidate receives the highest number of votes in a district, the candidates in that district who have received the same number of votes, that number being the highest number of votes in the district, shall, under the supervision of the Board of Supervisors of Election, draw lots to determine who shall be elected as a delegate. If one of such candidates dies or withdraws the remaining candidates who received the same number of votes in the district shall draw lots and if only one such candidate remains he shall be declared elected.

Section 2. A. At the election for the one hundred five delegates to the constitutional convention elected from representative districts, it shall be the duty of the commissioners and the clerks of election to tabulate correctly and to make return of the legal vote cast therein the same as in the case of any candidate for any office.

B. Whoever violates the provisions of this section by intentionally making false, fictitious or fraudulent returns on the election of delegates to the convention, upon conviction, shall be imprisoned for not less than two years nor more than five years. Any fraudulent vote by a voter at the election of delegates shall subject said voter to prosecution and punishment as provided in the general election laws of the state. All other offenses, prosecutions, penalties and punishments arising out of or in connection with the elections provided for by this Act shall be governed by the existing applicable laws of the state.

Section 3. In the event of the death, inability or unwillingness of any elected delegate elected from a representative district to serve, whether before or during the convention, the governor shall fill such vacancy by the appointment of a person from the same representative district who possesses the qualifications hereinabove provided for delegates. In the event of the death or the inability or unwillingness to serve of any other delegate, the vacancy shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment.

Section 4. The convention shall have full authority to frame a new constitution for the state, including such alternative provisions as it deems appropriate, which shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection; however, the convention is prohibited from framing any article or provision whereby:

(1) The bonded or other indebtedness of the state or of any parish, municipality, district or other political subdivision or authority of the state shall be impaired;

(2) The terms of office of the members of the legislature or of any other elected or of any appointed official of the state or of any political subdivision thereof shall be reduced or shortened prior to the expiration of the term of office being held at the time of the adoption of the new constitution, or the salaries of any such official reduced prior to the expiration of the term of office being held at the time of the adoption of a new constitution; however, retention in office beyond the date of the general state election for state officials who will take office in 1976 shall depend upon the provisions of such constitution or upon provisions of law enacted pursuant thereto;

(3) The state capitol is removed or may be removed from Baton Rouge.

Section 5. A. The delegates chosen as herein provided shall meet in convention in the Chamber of the House of Representatives at the state capitol, or at such other suitable location in the capital city as shall be determined by the governor, at 12:00 o'clock noon on Friday the fifth day of January, 1973. The chief justice, or in his absence any associate justice of the supreme court designated by said court, shall attend the convention at the opening thereof and shall preside until a presiding officer has been elected. The Secretary of State shall attend the opening of the convention and call the roll of the delegates, whereupon the temporary presiding officer shall administer to the delegates the following oath:

"I hereby solemnly swear that I will support the constitution and laws of the United States; that I will well and faithfully perform all duties as a member of the convention, and that I will observe and obey the limitation of authority contained in the Act under which this convention has assembled. So help me God."

No delegate shall be qualified to serve as such unless and until he has taken and subscribed to the above oath.

B. After the oath has been administered the delegates shall proceed to effect the permanent organization of the convention and shall:

(1) adopt rules of procedure for the convention, which rules shall not be inconsistent with the provisions of this Act and which may, in the discretion of the convention, create and establish such substantive and procedural committees as the delegates may deem appropriate;

(2) elect from among their number a chairman, a vice chairman and such other officers as they deem necessary;

(3) elect from among their number an executive committee, the membership of which shall be determined by the delegates but which shall include among its members the chairman and vice chairman of the convention;

(4) take such other actions as they deem necessary to effect a permanent organization of the convention.

After completing these organizational activities the convention shall adjourn until July 5, 1973.

The rules of procedure adopted by the convention shall be subject to later change as the delegates shall provide therein. Provided, however, no delegate shall be allowed to vote by proxy.

C. As soon as possible after the members of the executive committee are elected, the executive committee shall employ a research director, research assistants and secretarial and/or clerical personnel in accordance with the provisions regarding the composition and qualifications of such staff in Subsection D of this section and may also employ such other professional, research, technical, clerical and stenographic employees as the committee shall deem necessary. In addition, the committee shall prepare, as soon as possible, a budget of salaries and other anticipated expenses of the convention, based on the amount of the appropriation for the convention and any other funds available for expenditure.

D. The staff of the constitutional convention shall include, but not be limited to, the following who shall not be delegates to the convention except as provided in Paragraph (5) and (6) below:

(1) a director of research, who shall possess at least the qualifications outlined below for research assistants;

(2) fourteen research assistants, who shall possess the following qualifications:

(a) a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university;

(b) not less than one year in an accredited law school or in substitute thereof, not less than two years work experience which shall include legal research or comparable work experience in a related field;

(c) is not an elected or appointed public official, except those listed below in Paragraphs (5) and (6);

(3) four research supervisors, who shall be the deans of the Louisiana State University, Tulane University, Loyola University and Southern University law schools, or a representative of any of such deans chosen by him from the faculty of the law school of which he is dean, all of whom shall serve without compensation;

(4) such secretarial and/or clerical personnel as the executive committee deems necessary and whose salaries shall be set by the executive committee;

(5) six members of the House of Representatives of the Legislature of Louisiana, who shall be appointed by the governor and who shall receive no compensation for such staff service.

(6) five members of the Louisiana Senate, who shall be appointed by the governor and who shall receive no compensation for such staff service.

(7) four members of the Louisiana State Law Institute, who shall be appointed by the governor and who shall receive no compensation;

E. The Secretary of State shall advertise for applicants for the staff of the constitutional convention and shall receive such applications for staff service prior to the first meeting of the convention. He shall present the applications he has received to the executive committee on the day the convention convenes. If the executive committee deems necessary it may receive additional applications after the convention convenes.

F. The convention also shall have full authority to use the facilities and services of any board, commission, department or agency of the state and of any political subdivision of the state, and all such agencies shall cooperate with the convention to the fullest extent in furnishing services, facilities and employees upon request. In addition, the convention may use the facilities and services of other persons and organizations.

G. The convention shall have full authority to accept grants, moneys, aid, facilities and/or services from public or private sources for the purpose of accomplishing its task of framing a new constitution and any such grants, moneys, facilities, services and donations, as well as the names of the donors thereof, shall be recorded in the record of the proceedings of the convention and such records shall be open to inspection by any person.

H. Working under the direction of the convention, the staff shall proceed immediately to perform the necessary research and to prepare a preliminary draft of a new constitution for the state. The staff shall complete this work on or before July 5, 1973.

I. The delegates shall reconvene July 5, 1973, to receive the report of the staff, to hold some public hearings and draft a proposed constitution for the state of Louisiana. The final draft shall be completed no later than January 4, 1974.

Section 6. The delegates to the convention shall receive a per diem of fifty dollars for each day of actual attendance at meetings of the convention or of committees thereof, but no delegate shall be paid a per diem after January 4, 1974. No delegate may accept any other compensation for work performed for the convention from any source while serving as a delegate and engaged in the work of the convention. However, where a delegate is engaged in regular, bona fide employment, should his employer choose to continue to pay the usual compensation while the delegate is engaged in the work of the convention, nothing herein shall prevent the said delegate from accepting that compensation.

Section 7. Any appropriation shall be used solely to defray the necessary expenses of the constitutional convention for which provision is made herein, including the payment of per diem of delegates, salaries and expenses of necessary em-

employees, supplies, materials and equipment, printing and reproduction of materials and all other necessary expenses incurred in connection with said convention and its work in drafting a new constitution for the state of Louisiana.

Section 8. A. Any funds appropriated shall be withdrawn from the state treasury in accordance with warrants signed by the chairman of the convention, and all checks for the disbursement of funds shall be signed by the chairman and the vice chairman of the convention or by the chairman or vice chairman and such other person as shall be designated by the convention.

B. For so long as the convention remains in existence and for so long thereafter as is necessary to assure the payment of all expenses incurred in connection with the work of the convention, no unexpended portion of the funds herein appropriated shall ever revert to the state general fund. The convention shall not be deemed to be a budget unit of the state and therefore shall not be subject to the provisions of Chapter 1 of Title 39 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes. The financial books and records of the convention, however, shall be subject to audit by the legislative auditor.

Section 9. A. The convention shall submit a proposed draft of a new constitution for the state to the governor upon completion of its work. At the discretion of the convention it also may propose and submit at the same time such alternative provisions as it deems appropriate. The constitution as drafted by the convention, together with any alternative provisions proposed for submission, shall be submitted to the people for their adoption or rejection. Within thirty days after submission of the proposed draft to the governor, he shall by proclamation call an election, to be held at the same time as the next regularly scheduled general election or, at the governor's discretion, at a special election to be held at a time fixed by him in his proclamation prior to the next regularly scheduled general election, for the purpose of submitting the proposed draft to the people for their adoption or rejection.

The election shall be held and the results shall be promulgated under the general election laws of the state. All electors duly qualified to vote in this state at the time of the election shall be entitled to vote without regard to party affiliation in their respective precincts on the proposition for or against adoption of the constitution and on the question or questions of adoption of such alternative provisions as may be proposed by the convention.

B. The convention may submit to the electors of the state the proposal of acceptance or rejection of the constitution or any alternative proposals in such form and manner as it may determine and may direct the proper election officials to take the necessary steps to effectuate the determination of the convention in presenting the proposal or alternate proposals to the electors.

C. The constitution, if ratified and adopted by the people in the election for which provision is made herein, including such alternative provisions as are adopted by the people at said election, shall become effective at twelve o'clock midnight on the thirtieth day after the date on which the Secretary of State promulgates the results of the election.

Section 10. If any provision or item of this Act or the application thereof is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions, items or applications of this Act which can be given effect without the invalid provisions, items or applications, and to this end the provisions of this Act are hereby declared severable.

Section 11. All laws or parts of laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 12. The necessity for the immediate passage of this Act having been certified by the governor to the legislature while in session, in accordance with Section 27 of Article III of the Constitution of Louisiana, this Act shall become effective immediately upon approval by the Governor.
