This memorandum has two purposes, united only by the common bond of asking for money.

First, through lack of communication or a budgeting error, Gail (Nordling) Thibodeau was not included in the House Resources Budget, as she should have been. She was approved by the leadership to be hired as Resources Committee staff, but no money has been allocated to cover that expense. On the enclosed budget print-out you will note that the committee has \$4,249 in the unallocated category. According to Sharon Sturrock in legislative accounting it will take an allocation of \$13,600 to cover Gail.

However, in phone conversation with Representative Phillips today, he expressed the concern that the committee budget not exceed the \$74,000 cap, and that perhaps Gail could be funded through another source. He suggested as a personal secretary to Rep. Fanning. Rep. Phillips also said he had thought Gail was included in the original House Resources budget, although that was not the case.

At any rate, Gail's employment has been approved by Reps. Fanning, Fuller and yourself, but the funding still needs to be settled. There are a couple of reasons the problem is just now coming to light. Gail was off the month of August (therefore funding would only be five months), and the staff has just received its first print-outs from Accounting.

The second money problem involves the subsistence summit meetings that the Resource Committee staff is arranging. These meetings, the first one of which will take place on Saturday, September 26, are leadership meetings and are to be funded from the leadership budget, which is why we are addressing the question to you.

Our problem is that there is concern that if we expend state money (on communication, travel, per diem, etc.) then the meeting is a public one. It is the intention of Reps. Fanning, Sutcliffe, Barnes and Adams that the meetings be informal gatherings of specific

invited participants, a phenomenon which occurs daily in all branches and aspects of state government. We have gotten an informal, oral opinion from Billy Berrier to the effect that the meetings have to be public. One of his assistant attorneys has expressed a contrary view, says the statute is really not very clear, and has not been definitively contested. He also surmised that if we spent the money, a supposedly aggrieved party could bring suit to have the funds refunded.

So our question is, do we spend the money, hold the meeting, and take our chances, or would you prefer some other approach? Please let us know as soon as you can on this particular question.

Your staff suggested, and we agree, to proceed in the following manner:



Subject: Sunset Review of the Alaska Renewable Resources Corporation

After a public hearing on oversight review of ARRC, the House Resources Committee determines that ARRC has not satisfactorily served the "public need", in order to justify its continued existence. Although the Committee concurs that there are few sources of high risk equity financing available to Alaskan entrepreneurs, both the concept and structure of ARCC are flawed.

The House Resources Committee will not introduce new legislation at this time, and the Committee declines to specify what, if any, alternative to ARRC should be pursued. Legislation to amend the ARRC statutes is presently before the Senate. When, and if, this legislation appears before the House Resources Committee, it will be given the appropriate scrutiny.

The House Resources Committee concurs with and submits the Division of Legislative Audit Review of the Department of Revenue Alaska Renewable Resources Corporation, dated November 13, 1981, as its findings and recommendations in accordance with A.C. 44.66.050.

SUBJECT: Discussion of Legislative
Oversight Responsibilities
as Related to Sunset Audits

As required by "sunset" legislation, your Committee has been assigned the oversight review of the Guide Licensing and Control Board and the Alaska Renewable Resources Corporation. In addition to the audit reports released earlier by this Division, the following information may be helpful.

According to AS 44.66.050, the standing committee of legislative jurisdiction as provided in Rule 20 of the Uniform Rules of the Legislature shall hold one or more hearings to receive testimony from the public and other parties that have associated responsibilities or interests. In addition, the Committee shall consider Legislative Audit's report, the agency's proposed budget, the agency's program performance report, and any other tools that might assist it in evaluating the conduct and activities of the agency being terminated.

It is important to note that the terminating agency shall have the burden of demonstrating a public need for its continued existence during the public hearings.

The determination of "public need" for continued existence shall take into consideration the following factors set out in AS 44.66.050(c):

1. The extent to which the board, commission or program has operated in the public interest.

2. The extent to which the operation of the board, commission, or agency program has been impeded or enhanced by existing statutes, procedures, and practices which it has adopted, and any other matter, including budgetary, resource, and personnel matters.
3. The extent to which the board, commission or agency has recommended statutory changes which are generally of benefit to the public interest.
4. The extent to which the board, commission or agency has encouraged interested persons to report to it concerning the effect of its regulations and decisions on the effectiveness of service, economy of service, and availability of service which it has provided.
5. The extent to which the board, commission or agency has encouraged public participation in the making of its regulations and decisions.
6. The efficiency with which public inquiries or complaints regarding the activities of the board, commission or agency filed with it, with the department to which a board or commission is administratively assigned, or with the office of the ombudsman have been processed and resolved.
7. The extent to which a board or commission which regulates entry into an occupation or profession has presented qualified applicants to serve the public.
8. The extent to which state personnel practices, including affirmative action requirements, have been complied with by the board, commission or agency to its own activities and the area of activity or interest.
9. The extent to which statutory, regulatory, budgeting or other changes are necessary to enable the agency, board or commission to better serve the interests of the public and to comply with the factors enumerated in this subsection.

The Legislative Audit reports have addressed these issues individually but only to the extent allowed by restricted audit scopes detailed within the reports.

The Law further states that the committee of reference shall, not later than the 60th day of the legislative session, submit a report to the presiding officer of each

house. The report is to include a summary of findings as to compliance with the "public need" factors enumerated above together with recommendations as to each of the following:

1. An identification of the problems or the needs that the programs and activities of the board, commission or agency are intended to address.
2. A statement, to the extent practicable, of the objectives of the program of the board, commission, or agency program, and its anticipated accomplishments.
3. An identification of any other programs having similar, conflicting or duplicate objectives.
4. An assessment of alternative methods of achieving the purposes of the program.
5. An assessment of the consequences of eliminating the board, commission or program and consolidating its activities with another program, or of funding it at a lower level.
6. A justification for the recommended continuation or extension of the board, commission or program, and an explanation of the manner in which it avoids duplication of or conflict with other efforts.
7. Any other information which, in the opinion of the committee, would improve the performance of the board, commission or agency with respect to its representation of and responsiveness to the public interest.

The committee of reference may introduce a bill providing for the reorganization or continuation of the agency being terminated as stipulated in AS 44.66.050(e).

Thank you for your letter of July 14, 1981. First, as a point of correction, Warren Olson is the chairman of Alaskans for Equal Fishing and Hunting Rights. Sam McDowell is a director of Alaskans for Equal Fishing and Hunting Rights and also president of the Izaak Walton League of America, Anchorage Chapter.

The chairman and directors of Alaskans for Equal Fishing and Hunting Rights have reviewed your letter, and after consultation with a number of the members and sponsors, have joined in this reply to your invitation to negotiate the subsistence issue. We cannot participate in these meetings. This decision is based on the fact that we have no authority to negotiate or compromise on this issue. The members of our organization are working together to pass the initiative. We are not delegated the right to dilute or even discuss dilution of the position established by the initiative.

Our position is based on the following points:

1. The position of Alaskans for Equal Fishing and Hunting Rights is clear and precise. The initiative is the exact and total statement of our position. (Copy Included).

The clear intent of the initiative is that of "individual equality for personal consumptive users of fish and game," and to repeal existing laws relating to subsistence use of fish and game. We will not compromise this principle which we believe is one of the basic rights which constitute the essence of our country.

2. Over 1500 Alaskans are currently circulating the initiative. Our claim of support is verified by those who circulate and are signatory to the initiative, and the validity of our representation is limited to that position. These people have repeatedly stated that, if we do less than stand firm, they will feel betrayed....We will not betray them!!!! We have neither the desire, the authority, nor the belief that a compromise can be made between such equality and any priority.
3. This issue is one of full public concern and right. The initiative meets that concern by establishing this equal right. We believe that the only proper forum for this issue is a totally open public participation. We do not shrink from open dialogue on the merits of our position, and are prepared to defend our stand at any public forum. At any such meetings we will need no special invitation to participate in full view of our members and the public.
4. We will continue to support only the full individual equality of all personal consumptive users of Alaska's Fish and Game, and, as necessary, present this position to the Alaska public for their vote, through the initiative. This issue will be taken to the highest level possible.....The citizens of Alaska.

For further clarification of our position during the course

of your deliberations, we would refer you to the United States Constitution, the Alaska State Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and the Declaration of Independence.

I am requesting for Representative Fanning a legal opinion regarding the authority under which the proposed Delta II agricultural land disposal is to take place in February next year.

Specifically, AS 44.33.475 requires that certain legislation be recommended by the Agriculture Action Council, and then passed into law before a proposed agricultural development project can be implemented. We would like to know in what legislation this project is authorized, what are the boundaries of the project as required by AS 44.33.475(b)(1) and what are the specific tasks required by subsection (b)(2).

In our research we have not been able to obtain satisfactory answers to the above questions. This has led us to seriously question whether or not the Ag Council is, indeed, authorized to implement Delta II.

John Manley asked that I comment briefly on the issues raised in your work order request. I have already discussed the matter with him, I believe to his satisfaction.

As I understand his question, his enquiry starts with the provisions of AS 44.33.475 which provide:

"AS 44.33.475. AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS.
(a) Before January 15 of each year the council shall report to the governor and the legislature concerning the activities of the council during the current fiscal year. The report shall contain recommendations for the development of agriculture in the state during the next fiscal year.

"(b) An agricultural development project recommended under (a) of this section may not be implemented unless authorized by law. The report required by (a) of this section shall include recommended legislation which

"(1) sets out the type of agricultural development to be accomplished and, if state land is to be developed for agricultural production, describes the boundaries of the land to be developed;

"(2) defines specific tasks to be performed by appropriate state agencies to the extent the tasks are identifiable at that time; and

"(3) grants to the council sufficient authority to insure cooperation of all state agencies involved in the implementation of the agricultural development project."

John was of the view that legislation authorizing an agricultural action project needed to be cast in the format of the second sentence of sec. 475(b).

In my view, it seems clear that the legislature has required that a project be "authorized by law". This requirement is stated in the first sentence of (b).

The remainder of subsec. (b) establishes only the format of the report of the council to the legislature. There is no requirement in the law that legislation authorizing such a project be cast in the format of the report.

I am advised that the authorization for the Delta II project is contained within the appropriation act.

If I may assist further, please advise.

On behalf of Rep. Fanning, I am requesting a legal opinion regarding the proposed land disposal in the Delta II project.

Specifically, our concern is that AS 44.33.475(b)(1) requires that proposed legislation describing an agricultural development project

"sets out the type of agricultural development to be accomplished and, if state land is to be developed for agricultural production, describes the boundaries of the land to be developed;"

We presume this requirement was met in the Alaska Agriculture Action Council's first annual report to the Legislature (Jan. 15, 1980). The same metes and bounds description contained in that report appeared in the ill-fated HCS CSSB 59, vetoed by the governor in June of 1980. So, both the report and the Senate bill described, as they were originally proposed, Delta II, East and West.


However, the AAAC, citing revised soil surveys which indicate less Class II and Class III soils in the project area than was originally anticipated, has expanded Delta II West to approximately 35,000 acres, or about three times its original size.

It seems to us that, while the law is somewhat nebulous at AS 44.33.475, the AAAC is still not authorized to implement a project on state land unless it describes the boundaries of the land it proposes to use.

Therefore, our request asks three basic questions: 1) is there another document, which we have missed, in which the AAAC has properly described the additional 20,000+ acres into which it has expanded its project; 2) if not, then, is this an unauthorized project; and 3) what actions can the Resources Committee, Rep. Fanning or the Legislature take to stop the disposal, if they determine that is necessary?

This is a request on behalf of Rep. Fanning for draft legislation that will address the following problem:

The statute enabling the establishment of agricultural development projects, AS 44.33.475, mandates that the Alaska Agriculture Action Council (AAAC), when it wants to start a project, must, in its annual report to the legislature and the Governor, propose legislation that describes the boundaries of any state land involved in the proposed project. Yet, in the case of the Delta II project, when the 11th Legislature passed a bill establishing the project, the Governor vetoed the bill citing a separation-of-powers conflict; he claimed the executive branch has the power to classify land, and that the legislature does not (see attached.)

It has been pointed out to me that if this was a case of constitutional separation-of-powers, rather than statutory, then the Governor would have a valid argument. However, as the conflict is in the statutes, which the Legislature creates (and can therefore amend or abolish as it sees fit), the point is not well taken. Furthermore, the Legislature seems to have been remiss in not contesting that part of the veto message at the time it was delivered.

Another problem, it seems to me, is that AS 44.33.475 leaves a rather wide loophole that allows the administration to set up agricultural development projects with little legislative oversight. The statute merely says the AAAC has to propose the legislation, not that the legislation has to pass, or even be introduced in the Legislature. It does not say the AAAC has to stick by its proposal, as described in their annual report, or that authorization need be anything more than a budget line item. The restriction that a project cannot be implemented unless authorized by law doesn't seem, in reality, to carry much weight.

This seems to have fostered the current situation, wherein the AAAC briefly describes the features of a proposed project in its annual report, with the funds requested in the Governor's


budget. Passage of those line items in the budget constitutes the authorization for the AAAC to proceed with the project. But, since no legislation describing the details of the project has passed, the head of the AAAC is bound only by the AAAC annual report in designing and implementing the project. And that report, Mr. Palmer tells me, has been determined to be binding only to a certain extent; The AAAC is free to alter the project plan if they "come up with something better."

It would be appropriate to have the language in AS 44.33.475 cleared up to affirm that the Legislature does, indeed, have the power to classify land, if it so chooses, and that the form and substance of a proposed AAAC project must be approved by the Legislature, and adhered to by the AAAC as it implements the project.

The House Resources Committee is seeking information as well as the opinions of various fishery management groups concerning the Department of Public Safety's new 120' patrol vessel and its placement. The boat, tentatively named the Woldstad, is scheduled to be delivered in late spring or early summer of 1982. It is intended to replace the Vigilant, the Department's "100' aluminum skiff" currently used to patrol the Bering Sea fisheries, where, as you may be aware, aluminum skiffs are not particularly efficient. The Vigilant has not been notably effective in enforcing regulations in those fisheries.

It has now become apparent that the Department intends to continue its patrols of those fisheries from its base in Kodiak. In other words, the Woldstad will have Kodiak as its home port, alongside the Vigilant and other, smaller patrol boats.


As the fishery management planners for the federal government, you are no doubt most familiar with the vulnerability of Bering Sea fisheries, and with the potential for devastation of those resources if not properly managed.

The National Marine Fisheries Service and the Coast Guard have extended their enforcement authorities to the state by a Cooperative Enforcement Agreement, and in light of that, it would seem to me that the most appropriate use of this highly sophisticated and useful enforcement tool would be of vital interest to the NPFMC.

Would you please comment on the effectiveness you would predict the vessel can have, based in Kodiak, as opposed to basing it in Unalaska?





Dear Mr. Lawler:

This will confirm our conversation earlier today regarding HB 231, "An Act relating to the the seizure of items used or in aid of fish and game violations."

The Department of Law supports the position expressed by the Department of Public Safety on this bill. In particular, Public Safety's comments regarding the impact of this proposal on the criminal justice system cannot be overstated. Because of the time delays inherent in pursuing fish and game violations in remote areas, and the additional time delays inherent in the criminal justice system, virtually every instance in which an item is seized would require an appearance in court to seek a judicial extension of the seven day period the bill would permit law enforcement officers to hold the item. This, in turn, would divert both field officers and district attorney resources from more substantive pursuits (i.e., the apprehension and prosecution of other criminal violations). In addition, it would further crowd already crowded court calendars.

Summarizing, it is the Department of Law's position that HB 231 would have a severe detrimental impact on the enforcement of the state's fish and game laws. Please communicate our views to the Natural Resources Committee at your convenience. Thank you.

RE: "Aleutian Chain Red Meat Preliminary Survey"

As you requested, I have reviewed the proposed ten point project description. Following are my comments pertaining to each item:

- 1) There wouldn't appear to be a great need to emphasize this question. The areas have been identified already in Tomlin's study. Also, land ownership and federal wildlife reserves dictate where it can occur.
- 2) Necessary. Should be stressed.
- 3 & 4) These points are questionable. In my opinion, the Tomlin study covered this area already. Due to timeliness of report and the fact that winter has set in, it might be difficult to fulfill this requirement.
- 5 & 6) These two points, unlike number three and four, can be completed as efficiently in winter as in summer. I would hope that the following possibilities would be explored: a) the possibility of air freighting cattle to the Orient, b) the possibility of shipping cattle to Seward to the Delta Barley Grain Federation and then butchered, c) the possibility of shipping Delta barley grain to the Aleutians, d) the possibility of transshipping frozen beef to the Orient on SeaLand, APL, etc. using Cold Storage facilities in Unalaska that are currently being used for fish.

- 7) Another excellent winter project. If you are not already aware, Aleut Shipping is actively pursuing setting up a freight feeder service out of Unalaska. I have talked with them concerning the possibility of red meat production in the Aleutians and they seem to feel there would be a way to move the meat, either frozen or on the hoof, from one place to another. Also, the other small freight service in the Aleutians, Western Pioneer, has shown interest in pursuing the possibilities of future involvement in the transport of red meat.
- 8 & 9) Necessary. This project could be the summation and overview of the integration between the fishing industry and the red meat industry; the integration between Interior Alaska agriculture and fishing and red meat in the Aleutians; and the integration between fish-waste and fish-meal production and the red meat industry.
- 10) Necessary.

It is my feeling that this report should be written for the benefit of the private sector, not the legislature or the Department of Commerce. It should not be assumed that the State will choose to subsidize Aleutian projects as it has done in the Interior. The State will supply constitutionally mandated services and facilities, such as water and sewer, docks, harbors and schools. Subsidization of freight rates, State operated freight companies and low interest State loans should not be seen as potential for the development of a red meat industry in the Aleutians.

The goals of this study should be to enlighten the public sector to the potentials of the Aleutians. This study should whet the appetite of interested, creative companies to look deeper into the possibilities of the red meat industry. The coordination between Interior agriculture; the ten year agriculture plan for Alaska; the fish-waste, fish-meal study and the existing fishing infrastructure is essential. Each of these projects, standing alone, face major hurdles. However, if this study could show how they can all fit together, I think we will have succeeded in fulfilling the State's role in promoting agricultural development in the Aleutians.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS

The State of Alaska, Office of Special Industrial Projects, Department of Commerce and Economic Development, requests proposals for the award of a contract for the preparation of an "Aleutian Chain Red Meat Preliminary Survey." The purpose of this survey is to provide a preliminary assessment of the potential of growing beef cattle and sheep in the Aleutian Chain Islands for commercial markets.

Project Description & Scope of Work

The completed study shall include:

1. An identification of the most promising areas for such production.
2. Identification of the major landholders and discussions with each to ascertain the availability and price of their land for lease or purchase.
3. On-site meetings with the existing cattle growers to document their experience with sheep and cattle in the region, especially carrying capacity, quality, sources of feed, processing and current markets.
4. A tour and photographs of production sites.
5. Projection of potential new markets.
6. Projection of process flow and discussion of potential slaughterhouse and trans-shipment centers.
7. Description of what the freight rates might be to potential markets.
8. Discussion of possible development scenarios.
9. An outline of a course of action to be followed to determine viability of commercial red meat production on the Aleutian Chain.
10. A summary of findings and recommendations.

Proposal Requirements

Proposals must be submitted in written form and include the following:

1. Conceptual approach to individual work elements and the project as a whole.
2. Description of the process to be followed in completing the project, including project/management control.

3. Time schedule, cost estimates and personnel allocation for each work element and the total project.
4. Statement of interest in and qualifications for the project, knowledge and/or experience in the subject area, special capabilities, and any additional information about your firm that you believe is applicable to this proposal.

Project Completion Dates & Compensation

Work should begin in December, 1981 and be completed no later than March 1, 1982. Progress reports will be required by the State at appropriate times during the project. The final report will be presented to the Alaska State Legislature. Total compensation shall not exceed \$15,000.00.

Evaluation & Selection

The contractor will be selected by a committee composed of the Director of the Office of Special Industrial Projects and at least two other members of the Department of Commerce and Economic Development, according to standard State policy and procedures.

Proposals will be evaluated on the following major criteria:

1. Compensation required
2. Project concept and work plan
3. Experience of firm and assigned personnel with the subject area, and with preparation of material suitable for presentation to the Legislature.
4. Demonstrated ability to complete the project in a satisfactory and timely manner.

INTERIM COMMITTEE REPORT

November 15, 1981

The Resources Committee has continued work on a number of projects and issues, as well as to prepare background information on bills in Committee for the coming session. This report will be divided into two sections; the first reporting on specific issues on which staff and members have been working, and the second detailing expenditures the Committee has made to date.

ISSUES

Subsistence

The Resources Committee staff participated in the planning and implementation of two subsistence summit meetings, one in September and one in October, at the direction of Chairmen Fanning and Sutcliffe. The first meeting, held Sep. 26 in Anchorage, was attended by staff members J. Manly and B. Robinson. It laid the basic ground rules and set the agenda for the subsequent meeting, held on October 24 and attended by J. Manly and P. Lawler. The two meetings were funded by the House leadership budget, and Resources merely provided staff for organizational purposes.

The results of the second meeting were somewhat mixed, although that could have been predicted, considering the publicly-stated, uncompromising positions of some of the participants. While panel members did not come to any agreement on the basic issue of the subsistence priority, except to agree to disagree, they did unanimously pass three resolutions dealing with resource enhancement. The resolutions, directed at the Legislature, ask for specific programs or changes which would promote the enhancement of diminishing game resources. They address predator control, prescribed burning for habitat modification and mandatory sentencing for waste of fish and game meat.

The subsistence panel is currently adjourned to the call of the chair. It was generally felt that whether or not the panel reconvenes, with the passage of the peripheral issue resolutions, participants' time will not have been wasted.

Navigability

J. Manly has spent some time working on the issue of navigability of Alaska waterways, conveyance of submerged lands and access of outdoorsmen. The Hammond administration has chosen to ignore the 1 year deadline imposed in ANILCA ss 901(h), which has caused concern with Rep. Fanning. We are working with several sportsmen's groups, who will bring suit against the federal government.

Yukon Trip

J. Manly, P. Lawler and Rep. Grussendorf spent September 15 - 18 in Whitehorse, Yukon attending the Northern Resources Conference. This relatively important (for Yukoners) meeting is held every three years, and explores many aspects of resource development in our neighboring territory. Yukon is heavily dependent upon mineral development, and enjoys a greater amount of that than does Alaska, although the potential is clearly here. Other resources discussed included Beaufort sea oil, fisheries, energy consumption in the north, tourism, timber and so forth. Yukon seems to share many of Alaska's development problems, such as accessibility to resources, federal relations, native claims and inaccurate or poor image in the rest of the Country.

Whether it was actually worth the expense to the state to send five people to the conference (J. Ringstad from the Coal and Railroad Committee and C. Green from the state Office of Mineral Development also attended) may be open to question. We were somewhat disappointed that the conference did not discuss Alaskan problems and prospects to any significant extent. It was not nearly as international as we had been led to believe. The promotional brochure suffered a clear dearth of specific information about the subject matter of the conference, and telephone calls to Whitehorse were not as helpful as they might have been in clearing up our questions. The promotional information mentioned Alaska, but this, as it turned out, amounted to little of the program.

That is not to say that we did not, or will not, learn from the Yukoners' information. They had many things to say applicable to resource development and use in Alaska, and we expect to use the information we have obtained.

Oil Tax Credit Bill

This is a bill Rep. Fanning has J. Manly working on part-time which will direct some of the state's severance tax revenues into the private market for resource enhancement and alternative energy development. It still has some bugs to work out, but should be ready for introduction in January.

Alaska Miners

J. Manly attended one day of the Alaska Miners' Association convention in Anchorage, but missed the second day due to a coinciding subsistence summit meeting. It was helpful to meet some of the miners and get acquainted with their concerns, especially in light of the just released AG's opinion on 6(i). Miners were at first upset with the opinion, but after careful examination of the opinion, which substantially follows HB 350, they have pulled in their horns. Ken is working with them on a legislative approach to cleaning the problem up.

Alaska Fisheries Center

On September 16 and October 30-31, Rep. Sutcliffe attended meetings of the Alaska Fisheries Center Study group. The group was appointed by the Governor to assess the need for and feasibility of a fisheries research center as outlined in HB 313. The September 16 meeting was basically

organizational and took place in Juneau. Proposals for an analysis of Alaska fisheries research were reviewed and a contractor selected at the October 30-31 meeting in Seattle.

In conjunction with the October 30 and 31 Fisheries Center Study Group meeting, Rep. Sutcliffe attended the Seattle Fish Expo. At the Expo he met with other Alaskans involved in the fishing industry and reviewed the latest technological advances in the art of fish catching and processing.

Delta Agriculture

On October 2-4, Rep. Fanning and aide, P. Lawler, went to Fairbanks and Delta Junction to meet with farmers and tour the agriculture projects. From their meetings with a variety of people, they learned first hand of the recent problems with the barley harvest, about a need for better dissemination of university conducted research, and about problems with state loan programs. On October 27, Rep. Sutcliffe conducted a similar tour to familiarize himself with the Delta Projects and some of the associated problems.

Ag. Council

On October 16, G. Thibodeau (representing Eric Sutcliffe who is the House liaison to the Ag. Council) attended the Alaska Agriculture Action Council meeting in Anchorage. The principal topics of discussion were as follows: 1) Status of SB 162; 2) Pt. Mckenzie; 3) Status of Delta II; 4) 1981 Delta Production, and 5) Danish Agriculture.

Regarding Delta II, there was controversy as to the best method of utilizing both timber and ag. resources. February 13 was set as the sale date for both Delta West and East. Seeing as how the problems with the bison on the Delta I project have not yet been resolved, it seems rather precipitous to proceed with the Delta II sale in February. In light of that, the committee is investigating the matter more thoroughly.

Fish Waste Utilization

The committee has been following up on an appropriation to the Office of Commercial Fisheries Development for a fish waste utilization study. The purpose of the study is to determine the feasibility, site-specific, of a plant to produce fish meal for animal feed or fertilizer from fish processing waste.

Synopsis of conversation with Billy Berrier November 20, 1981
Regarding Permanent Fund Investment in AHFC

Manly

Berrier said it was basically a two-part question, with two answers. First, whether or not the trustees could invest permanent fund designated funds in AHFC, and second, whether or not interest income from the permanent fund could be invested in AHFC.

He said that given the tax exempt status of the Permanent Fund, and the prudent man rule governing investments of the trustees, it would be not prudent for them to invest in the AHFC bonds. The AHFC bonds are low-interest and federal tax free, and that tax free status is what attracts investors (usually large banks and insurance companies) to bonds that are generally returning 4% to 5% under other, taxable investments. Since the permanent fund is already tax free, there is no attraction for investing in tax-free bonds.

Regarding investment of interest income from permanent fund investments, Berrier said that since those funds are deposited into the general fund, and the legislature can do what it likes with the general fund, they could spend it on the AHFC. They, in fact, already do just that. The identity of the monies coming from the permanent fund is obscured once it goes into the general fund, however, so the fact that some or all of it may go to fund AHFC, in effect, is also obscured.

Conversation with Cheri Shelley November 24, 1981
regarding state employee and wife

Cheri said there is no way the man could be demoted, fired or disciplined because his wife raised hell over being denied a job in the same department. The supervisors could possibly make things uncomfortable for the guy in simple office social transactions, but couldn't effect his job. If they do take action against him, he should file a grievance - that's what the APEA is there for.

Regarding the wife, Cheri said she should go to the EEO to pursue her complaint. Although she didn't have anything to say regarding the allegation of sex discrimination, she did say that the department cited the nepotism rules of the Department of Administration, Division of personnel (rule 13-09 (1-3)) that is not valid, as it is superseded by the statutes, and the only statute regarding nepotism is AS 39.10.010, which has to do with the department heads (commissioners) not being allowed to engage in the practice.

33-6-105. Officer's failure to perform deemed a violation. The failure of any officer to perform an act, duty, or obligation required of him by this title in a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as provided in section 33-6-127.

✓ 33-6-106. Willful destruction of big game. (1) Any person who captures, kills, or destroys any of the big game animals of this state and removes from the carcasses or bodies with the intent to abandon the carcass or body thereof, only the head, claws, teeth, hide, antlers, horns or tusks, or any or all of such parts, or captures or mutilates any such big game animal while alive by removing or detaching any of the foresaid parts therefrom or any person who kills any such big game animal and thereafter abandons the game and makes no attempt to dress or care for the same is guilty of a felony and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as provided in section 33-6-127 (7).

(2) Any person who captures, kills, or destroys any small game birds and mammals of this state and detaches or removes from the carcasses or bodies, with the intent to abandon the carcass or body thereof, only the head, claws, teeth, hide, or feathers, or any or all of such parts, or captures or mutilates any such small game birds and mammals while alive by removing or detaching any of the aforesaid parts therefrom or any person who kills any such small game birds and mammals and thereafter abandons the game and makes no attempt to dress or care for the same is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as provided in section 33-6-127.

(3) The purpose and intent of this section is to protect the game animal of this state from wanton, ruthless, or wasteful destruction or mutilation for its head, claws, teeth, hide, antlers, horns, feathers, or tusks alone, or any of the foregoing, and the provisions of this section shall be so construed.

(4) The failure of any person to properly dress and care for any game animal killed by such person and, if reasonably accessible, within forty-eight hours, to take or transport to the camp of such person such carcass and there properly care for the same shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of this section.

33-6-107. Waste of wildlife meat. (1) No edible portion of wildlife, as defined in section 33-2-102 (3), (4), (14), (20), (28), (31), (33), (34), (35), and (42), shall be abandoned or permitted to go to waste. The failure of any person who hunts and takes wildlife to thereafter transport the edible portions of the meat obtained to his home for human consumption or provide for the human consumption under commission regulations pertaining to exportation, transportation, and donation of wildlife is unlawful.

(2) It is unlawful to use wildlife as bait unless otherwise provided by law or rule or regulation of the commission.

(3) The failure of any person who wounds or may have wounded wildlife to go to the place where the animal sustained or may have sustained a wound and make a reasonable attempt to track the animal suspected of injury and reduce it to possession is unlawful.

(4) Any person who violates any provision of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as provided in section 33-6-127.

33-6-108. Failure to tag. All big game licenses shall have attached thereto a carcass tag, in such form as may be prescribed by the commission. When any person kills big game, such person shall immediately detach, sign, and date the carcass tag. Such tag shall be attached to the carcass of the animal before it is transported in any vehicle or while in camp or at a residence or other place of storage. Such tag shall be attached so that it may be inspected. Such tag, when so dated, signed, and attached to the big game lawfully taken or killed and lawfully in possession, authorizes the possession, use, storage, and transportation of the carcass, or any part thereof, within the state. Any person who fails to attach such tag, signed and dated as provided in this section, is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as provided in section 33-6-127. If the carcass tag is inadvertently or accidentally detached from the license or is lost or destroyed, it is unlawful to hunt with such license until the

licensee obtains a duplicate carcass tag upon furnishing the division of wildlife with satisfactory proof as to the inadvertent or accidental nature of the detachment, loss, or destruction.

33-6-109. Evidence of sex. Unless otherwise prescribed by the commission, no person shall have in possession or transport the carcass of any game animal, or any considerable portion of such carcass, unless natural evidence of sex is retained on the carcass. Such evidence shall be sufficient to enable the sex to be readily determined by ordinary inspection. Evidence of sex shall be antlers, horns, testes, scrotum, or udder. A violation of the provisions of this section is a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, the violator shall be punished as provided in section 33-6-127.

33-6-110. Inspection and possession of licenses. (2) It is the duty of every person while exercising the benefits conferred by any license, certificate, permit, pass, card, or stamp provided for in this title to have such license, certificate, permit, pass, card, or stamp on his person. Any person who fails to have a valid and proper license, certificate, permit, pass, card, or stamp on his person is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as provided in section 33-6-127.

This letter is to confirm our conversation of Saturday, August 29 regarding the subsistence summit meetings.

First, I would like to thank you for your understanding attitude in the matter. We try not to make too many errors here at the capitol, but when they do occur, it's helpful to have them worked out smoothly.

As I mentioned on Saturday, there have been a number of groups which have requested expanded representation. These include the ADF & G, the AFN, as well as commercial fishermen and others. Representatives Fanning, Adams and Barnes met in Anchorage and determined that the requests should all be addressed at the first meeting on September 26. Representative Sutcliffe, who is in Unalaska and could not make the meeting, agreed with that assessment by telephone.

It is the desire of the four representatives that the first meeting be an organizational and policy setting one, where ground rules are laid for the three meetings to follow.

It is their concern, as I am sure it is yours, that all parties to the controversy, including the commercial fisheries, be fairly and properly represented in these meetings. In the interest of keeping a small and manageable group, however, the representatives are forced to suspend your invitation, and will adhere to their original list of invited participants for the September 26 meeting.

Again, I thank you for your patience and understanding, and for your interest in seeing the issue fairly resolved. We will keep you posted as progress is made.

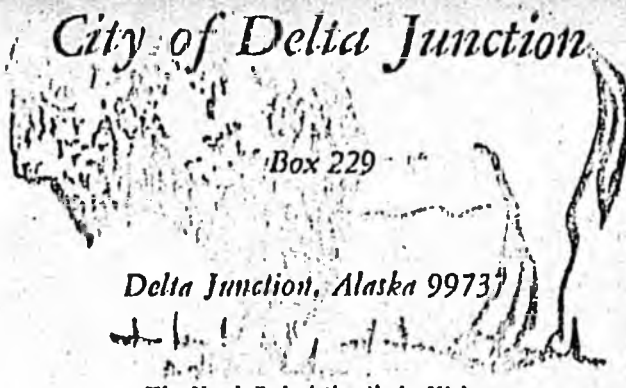


Briefly, here are the duties of the Pages:

There are five pages each in the House and Senate. Their general duties are to guard the chambers, allowing only those persons permitted by law to enter. They are to guard caucuses, assist the chief clerk's office and perform all duties related to the operation of the chambers. Pages deliver messages, deliver copies of bills and calendars to legislators' offices and floor desks, pick up daily newspapers, run errands, sometimes assist in the lounge, occasionally give tours of the capitol building, and other duties as requested.

Hours and salary: the chambers are to be opened and guarded seven days a week. Weekend hours are ten to four; and pages generally rotate weekends. Pages are scheduled for 5-day work weeks; however, all pages are on call and as the end of session nears they will be required to work longer hours. They are paid for seven days a week at the daily rate of \$52.13, or \$1,564/month.

SUBJECT: Fiscal Notes

AS 24.30.035 requires that a bill must have a fiscal note or a statement that there is no fiscal impact before being reported out of the committee of first referral. A copy of the statute is attached. Although the intent of this statute is to avoid having bills proceed through the committee process with no information on fiscal impact, then end up in finance near the end of the session with fiscal information being revealed for the first time, members of the minority have been calling the House on not complying explicitly with the statute in regard to bills with a zero fiscal note.

In order to further show that we are complying with the intent of the statute, I want each of you to make sure that all bills reported out of your committee as first committee of referral have a fiscal note or a statement from the department saying that the bill carries no fiscal impact.

This can be accomplished by making a list of bills out of committee and noting which ones already have fiscal notes attached. For those that do not, you must obtain a statement from the affected department(s) saying there is no fiscal impact, then make sure that a copy of that statement is carried with the bill. Many of our bills already have this information, so it shouldn't be too much work to comply with this.

I am also asking that the committee report form be filled out with a statement saying "no fiscal impact" when appropriate (see sample attached). It is my intention to revise the committee report form to have a box with this statement printed on it; but please bear with me and have it typed in until new forms are received. Use this revised form from now on when bills are passed out of committee.

Prompt response to these requests will do much to minimize potential conflicts on the house floor and keep us from delaying the scheduling of bills.

increase or decrease which would result from enactment of the bill for the ensuing fiscal year and at least two succeeding fiscal years or, if the bill has no fiscal impact, a statement to that effect shall be attached. The fiscal note or statement shall be prepared by the department or departments affected. If the bill is presented by the governor for introduction in accordance with AS 24.30 060(b) and the uniform rules of the legislature, the fiscal note or statement shall be attached to the bill before the bill is introduced. An amendment or a substitute bill proposed by a committee of referral that changes the fiscal impact of a bill shall be explained in a revised fiscal note or statement attached to the bill. (§ 1 ch 153 SLA 1968; am § 1 ch 20 SLA 1972; am § 1 ch 42 SLA 1976; am § 2 ch 60 SLA 1979)

Effect of amendments. — The 1979 amendment, in the first sentence, substituted "is reported from the committee of first referral" for "which would require increased appropriations by the state is reported to the rules committee" and "a fiscal note containing an estimate of the amount" for "an estimate of the probable amount," inserted "or decrease which

would result from enactment of the bill" and added "or, if the bill has no fiscal impact, a statement to that effect shall be attached" to the end. The amendment also substituted "fiscal note" for "estimate" in the second sentence, inserted "or statement" in the third sentence, and added the fourth sentence.





In the last decade natural resource development has spurred growth in Alaska's population and has brought significant changes in what might be called the "Alaskan way of life." By most estimates Alaska will likely experience greater population growth, again primarily due to its great resources of oil, gas, minerals, fish and land.

During the week of January 18 - 22 (exact date as yet unscheduled) the House Resources Committee will hold informal discussions with members of the House and members of the Senate of the Alaska State Legislature on the general topic: How can Alaskans protect their unique way of life while at the same time reap the benefits of economic development? Additionally, we will discuss which resource development issues should be stressed and how. These discussions will help ensure that we're able to take up issues, specific legislation and concepts that are of concern to you during this session.

The following related questions may also be discussed:

- 1) How can we better predict the hidden consequences of economic development?

This memorandum has two purposes, united only by the common bond of asking for money.

First, through lack of communication or a budgeting error, Gail (Nordling) Thibodeau was not included in the House Resources Budget, as she should have been. She was approved by the leadership to be hired as Resources Committee staff, but no money has been allocated to cover that expense. On the enclosed budget print-out you will note that the committee has \$4,249 in the unallocated category. According to Sharon Sturrock in legislative accounting it will take an allocation of \$13,600 to cover Gail.

However, in phone conversation with Representative Phillips today, he expressed the concern that the committee budget not exceed the \$74,000 cap, and that perhaps Gail could be funded through another source. He suggested as a personal secretary to Rep. Fanning. Rep. Phillips also said he had thought Gail was included in the original House Resources budget, although that was not the case.

At any rate, Gail's employment has been approved by Reps. Fanning, Fuller and yourself, but the funding still needs to be settled. There are a couple of reasons the problem is just now coming to light. Gail was off the month of August (therefore funding would only be five months), and the staff has just received its first print-outs from Accounting.

The second money problem involves the subsistence summit meetings that the Resource Committee staff is arranging. These meetings, the first one of which will take place on Saturday, September 26, are leadership meetings and are to be funded from the leadership budget, which is why we are addressing the question to you.

Our problem is that there is concern that if we expend state money (on communication, travel, per diem, etc.) then the meeting is a public one. It is the intention of Reps. Fanning, Sutcliffe, Barne, and Adams that the meetings be informal gatherings of specific

invited participants, a phenomenon which occurs daily in all branches and aspects of state government. We have gotten an informal, oral opinion from Billy Berrier to the effect that the meetings have to be public. One of his assistant attorneys has expressed a contrary view, says the statute is really not very clear, and has not been definitively contested. He also surmised that if we spent the money, a supposedly aggrieved party could bring suit to have the funds refunded.

So our question is, do we spend the money, hold the meeting, and take our chances, or would you prefer some other approach? Please let us know as soon as you can on this particular question.

At the request of Rep. Fanning, I am forwarding to you the following information regarding the first week of the session, of which you may or may not be aware.

In planning a hearing of the Resources Committee for the first week, a question arose concerning Rule 23 in the newly-adopted Uniform Rules. That rule provides that a committee's weekly schedule of meetings must be provided to the Chief Clerk by 4:00 pm on the preceding Thursday, and that five days notice must be given before the first public hearing on a new bill or resolution can be held, among other things.

We took our question to Billy Berrier. He indicated that, while at first glance the rule appeared to prohibit committee meetings during the first week of session, the Chief Clerk is working now, in fact, and will be on Thursday, January 7. Committee chairmen will be within the rules to provide the Chief Clerk with their schedule of meetings for January 11 - 15, and hold those meetings as planned.

We hope this information will be useful in planning your committee meetings. If we are to end the session in an appropriately short period of time, we ought to make the most of the first week.

The Secretary has asked me to thank you for and respond to your letter of July 14 regarding the meeting on subsistence policy you have scheduled for late September.

It appears that the purpose of the late September meeting is to aid in the establishment of a State subsistence program. This program is solely within the State's authority. As the Secretary has stated, we believe that State management of resident fish and game is the best means of ensuring conservation of those resources. Moreover, the statutory scheme in the Alaska Lands Act makes it clear that the Federal role in subsistence management is limited. Consequently, the initiative rests with the State, and the Department awaits the submission of the State program. Against this background, we are persuaded that Federal participation in your scheduled meeting would be premature.

We sincerely hope that these sessions will help produce a program that all Alaskans can accept and will satisfy the requirements of the Alaska Lands Act. Do not interpret our decision not to participate as reflecting lack of interest in this matter. Very simply, we are anxious not to encroach on the management prerogatives of the State.

Thank you again for the invitation to participate and we trust you will have a successful series of meetings.




I am writing you because I am interested in a position, if one becomes available, as an aide to you or to one of your committees. I have enclosed a copy of my resume for your review.

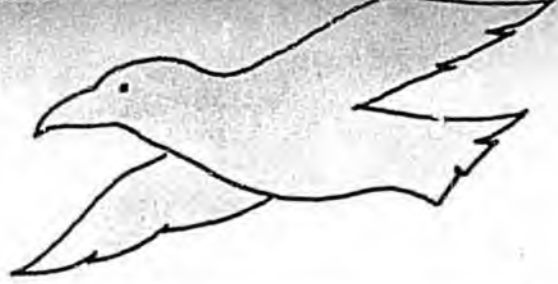

Bottomfish Community Development Program

The State of Alaska's program for the development of the bottomfish industry has its roots in the U.S. Fisheries Conservation and Management Act of 1976 that extended U.S. jurisdiction over fisheries resources to the 200 mile limit. The Act provided for preferential allocation of resources to U.S. participants in the off-shore bottom fishery, a fishery that has traditionally been dominated by the foreign fleet. Governor Hammond viewed the bottomfish resource as the foundation of a long term renewable resource industry for the state and formed the Bottomfish Task Force composed of a number of state legislators and state department commissioners. The Task Force was charged with the formulation of a plan to encourage the development of an Alaskan bottomfish industry. The resulting program was coordinated initially by the Office of the Governor and more recently by the Alaska Department of Commerce and Economic Development (Office of Commercial Fisheries Development). With the goal of supporting an expanded fishing industry, several state agencies have been actively involved in developing marketing strategies, formulating educational and labor programs, evaluating gear and vessel needs, assessing resources and developing public facilities and services to support an expanded fishing industry. The support provided has not been in the form of direct subsidy to the industry, but has been aimed at providing the social and economic climate in which the industry can develop.

The Bottomfish Community Development Program is administered by the Community Planning Division, Department of Community and Regional Affairs (DCRA) and is part of the state's overall Bottomfish Program. Insufficient community facilities and services have slowed on-shore development of the industry. Many communities do not have the capability to develop on their own the infrastructure needed to support major industrial development. DCRA assists communities in planning for and developing the facilities and services needed to attract and support a viable Alaskan bottomfish industry. The program has been coordinated with other community assistance programs administered by the Department of Community and Regional Affairs (e.g. HUD 701 comprehensive planning program, Alaska Coastal Management Program, Coastal Energy Impact Program). Funding from those sources has often supplemented bottomfish funds in providing assistance for community development programs addressing fisheries. The program includes the following elements.

Community Needs Assessments

After several studies, the Bottomfish Task Force selected five communities as potential sites for major on-shore bottomfish development: Unalaska, Kodiak, Seward, Yakutat, and Sitka. DCRA was asked to further assess each of the five communities with regard to their potential as sites for major port development. A report was completed that recommended the enhancement of each community's ability to attract and sustain a bottomfish

harvesting and processing industry. The study included an investigation of different concepts of community development appropriate for the encouragement of the industry. Recommendations were made against the concept of a major "model" bottomfish port development at this time and for more limited special purpose port facilities and targeted community assistance programs.

A second round of community assessments is currently underway. Communities under study include Cordova, Sand Point, Cold Bay, Akutan, and St. Paul and St. George in the Pribilof Islands. The needs of each community are being identified along with specific opportunities and constraints that could affect a bottomfish industry.

Technical Assistance

Staff technical assistance has been provided to targeted communities to help in preparation for fishery related development in response to local requests for basic planning assistance. Professional staff has been working directly with local communities to assist with capital improvement planning and programming and with comprehensive planning and work program development. A "guidebook" is currently being prepared that will assist communities in formulating capital improvements programs. The program has also included the provision of technical assistance to state and federal agencies concerning community development issues related to bottomfisheries.

Local Planning Programs

Financial assistance has been made available to communities to establish planning programs with professional staff. The purpose of this assistance is to provide a local capability to plan and implement community development programs needed to accommodate a shore-based bottomfish industry. These programs have been continuing with progressively larger local financial support and the goal is that the programs will soon be entirely supported by each community's own resources. Professional planning programs have been established in the Cities of Unalaska, Sand Point, King Cove and Yakutat. The Yakutat program has also been partially supported by Alaska Coastal Management Program funds. These planning programs have resulted in the development of capital improvement programs, comprehensive plans, special capital project plans, land control systems, zoning and subdivision ordinances to encourage marine related development.

Local Planning Grants

Grants have been made to communities to assist with specific planning projects related to the development of community facilities and services. Grants for feasibility studies and plans for marine industrial parks and waterfront development projects have been provided to Craig and Klawock, Yakutat, Cordova, Sand Point, and Akutan. In addition, to provide the minimum foundation for land use planning and capital improvement programs, base mapping projects were supported in the cities of Sand Point, King Cove, and Akutan. Assistance was also provided


Dear Rep. Fanning:

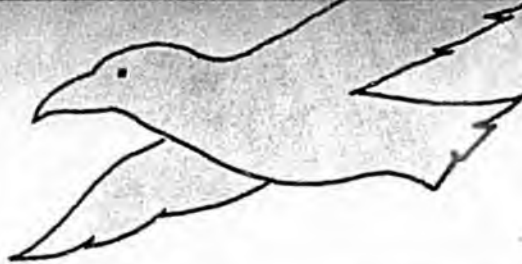
While conflicts obviously still exist, it is apparent to me that viable solutions to many of the problems also exist, and we'll try to see those solutions enacted.

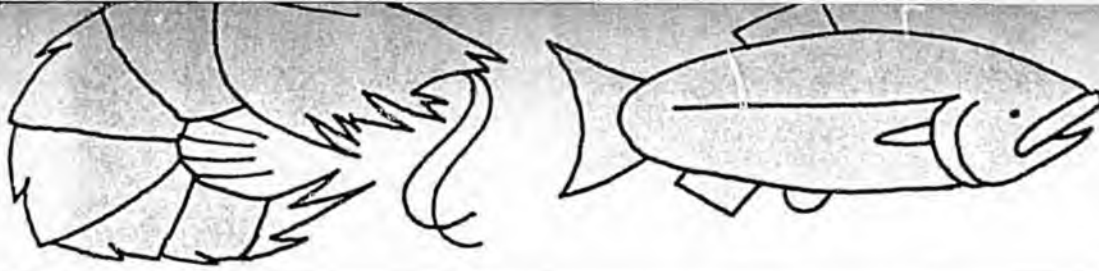

to the cities of King Cove, Sand Point, and Port Lions for comprehensive development plans, to the City of Unalaska for a water system master plan and to the City of King Cove for a sewer system assessment.

Special Projects

A special port management options study evaluating the possible structure of port agencies in the state, especially in the unorganized borough, is underway. Products from the study will include a paper outlining options currently available to municipalities for the management of ports in addition to the major report evaluating existing and potential local, regional, and statewide management alternatives.

In conjunction with other housing development planning efforts, an effort is being undertaken to formulate strategies for housing needed for fisheries development. In addition, facility siting studies are being developed to consider the appropriateness of fisheries development in areas outside of existing communities. Close coordination with facilities siting studies concerned with outer continental shelf oil and gas development will be maintained. Finally, because of the community's importance to the fishing industry as the air transportation center of the Aleutian Islands Region, a graphic Community Profile for Cold Bay is being prepared. This Profile will supplement Profiles previously prepared for other communities in the Region.

Editor's Note: While projects currently underway will be continuing throughout Fiscal Year 1982, additional funding for the Bottomfish Community Development Program was not appropriated by the Twelfth Legislature.

Federal Grant Update

OCM's FY 82 federal grant application for the ACMP has been approved by the federal Office of Coastal Zone Management, (OCZM) & currently is pending approval of the Secretary of Commerce. A grant award is expected by mid-August. This grant award represents the third year of funding under Section 306 of the federal Coastal Zone Management Act and covers the period through June, 1982.

The federal OCZM also completed its annual evaluation of the ACMP. In its evaluation report OCZM determined that "the State of Alaska is implementing the provisions of its approved coastal management program." The report further stated that "achievements in coastal management are occurring in Alaska as a result of implementing the ACMP."

Areas were identified during the evaluation where improvement in ACMP implementation would enhance the capability of the state to deal with coastal issues. The district program development process "continues to be uneven & slower than anticipated," according to OCZM. OCM & the Department of Community and Regional Affairs are establishing closer liaison to ensure that districts have adequate policy guidance & develop plans as efficiently as possible.

OCZM thought that as a part of the overall implementation of the ACMP, "monitoring & enforcement remain of concern." In order to address this concern, OCM agreed to fund a project which will result in the development of a monitoring & enforcement system for the ACMP by next fiscal year.

OCM is looking forward to another year of coordinating the ACMP in the comprehensive management of coastal resources. A copy of the completed grant application and the federal evaluation report are available from OCM upon request.

CPC Subcommittee Approves Work Program

At their May 27-28 meeting, the Coastal Policy Council created a sub-committee to work with the Interim Senate Resources sub-committee and Senate Community and Regional Affairs subcommittee on possible improvements to the ACMP. The public members of the Coastal Policy Council subcommittee are Jon Halliwill (Northern Southeast), Abi Dickson (Kodiak-Aleutians) and Lidia Selkregg (Upper Cook Inlet). State members are Jim Souby (DPDP), John Katz (DNR) and Ernst Muller (DEC).

The Council subcommittee has held two teleconferences since the Council's May meeting with a third scheduled for August 28. The first teleconference was held on June 19 to agree upon a work program for investigating the strengths and weaknesses of the Alaska Coastal Management Program (ACMP). The second teleconference on July 23 was held to hear and discuss OCM's progress on the work program. The consensus of the subcommittee is for the Office of Coastal Management to prepare a report to the Coastal Policy Council covering three areas of study:

1. a comparison of local planning powers and limitations between the Alaska Coastal Management Act and the standard planning powers provided to local government under Title 29 of the Alaska Statutes;
2. a series of case examples where local governments have used ACMP to solve local problems (as distinguished from what they may have been able to do without ACMP);
3. a series of case examples where Alaska, other states, or local governments have benefited from the requirement that federal agencies only take actions which are consistent with coastal management programs.

The report will first identify how local land and water use authorities in coastal communities have been changed by the ACMP. An analysis of the authorities local governments possess both with and without the ACMP should help answer the question of whether local governments gain or lose authority and autonomy under the ACMP. The second part of the report will describe a number of specific examples where the ACMP had helped local, state and federal officials and the public agree on plans to develop or protect Alaska's varied coastal resources.

Two more research items were requested at the July 25 teleconference. One of these items is OCM's summary of problems or issues related to ACMP that were expressed during the 1981 Legislative session, together with a report on the current status of those issues (i.e., resolved or not) and what options are available to resolve the remaining problems. The second request was to investigate if the coordination benefits provided by OCM via consistency reviews could be provided by another review system.


Dear Rep. Fanning:

Immediately following the special session I spoke with you concerning the possibility of holding a joint hearing with the Senate Resources Committee on the legislation introduced during the last regular session regarding state forests. Specifically, HB 281 and SB 582.

At this time we are recommending a joint hearing be held in Fairbanks on October 9, 1981. This would provide the committee members an opportunity to accompany the members of the Board of Forestry on a tour of the forest product related activity in the Interior. The Board of Forestry has a meeting planned for October 7 & 8. Naturally, if a different date would be more appropriate for the hearing, a similar tour could be arranged.

It is the feeling of the Association and of former members of the House Resources Committee that a hearing on this issue be held in Fairbanks. The House Resources Committee is seeking information regarding the most effective placement and use of the Division of Fish and Wildlife Protection's new 120' patrol vessel, tentatively named the Woldstad. We hope you can provide some pertinent answers to our questions, particularly from the perspective of the biological management of the resources.

Could you analyze the effectiveness the boat would have based in Kodiak, as opposed to Unalaska, on the Bering Sea fisheries? It would be helpful to document the effect Protection has had in the area's fisheries, and what potential resource losses can be anticipated if policy remains as it is. If you have any correspondence on file that is pertinent to the issue of the home port of the new vessel, that might be helpful, also.

Please respond as soon as you can, as it is important to us to have the question settled before the infrastructure for the vessel is in place. That should happen some time in advance of the actual delivery date.






This is in response to your correspondence concerning negotiations to resolve the priority subsistence issue.
