CONSUMER HEALTH QUESTIONNAIRES - 1981 INTERIM

The Senate Health, Education and Social Services Committee sent out 5,000 questionnaires concerning health care matters to individuals selected at random from the voter registration list. 191 responses were returned to the committee representing 73 communities in the state.

54% of the respondents considered health care unaffordable, with another 15% stating that insurance was the only possible way for them to afford care. The family health care dollar of those represented is spent primarily on Dental care, physician office calls and medication. The availability of dental and optical care in Alaska, particularly in rural areas where visits occur yearly, was often mentioned.

Concerning activities of the state in health areas, 14% opted for state sponsored health insurance while an equal number want the state out of the area and health care left to the private sector. Wellness promotion, prevention and elderly care were frequently mentioned needs, along with a concern for equity in insurance plans and charges of physicians and hospitals.

Health planning is favored by the Alaskans who responded, with 56% of them favoring state funding of the Health Systems Agencies, although 76% have had no contact with their HSA. Wellness promotion, elderly care and dental and optical services once again were prioritized as concerns for health planners.

83% of the respondents have health insurance, 61% employment related, however, only 52% of those with coverage were happy with their plans with almost as many stating that insurance rates are unreasonably high for the coverage received.

Responses are broken down into areas relating to census groupings in the report, with respondents' remarks about what services are available in their locale. 26% stated that the kinds of health care they need are unavailable locally, and transportation emerged constantly as a problem to those outside of urban areas(28%).

Another 4% stated that Emergency Medical Services were unavailable to them. There was almost unanimous agreement by those who have EMS that they function well, and there is much concern over maintaining the quality of services through training and equipment upgrading.

The average Alaskan views inflation, the salaries of health care personnel and Insurance as the top factors affecting the rising cost of health care. Wellness promotion and nutrition, including screening and school health education, seem to be foremost in health care needs mentioned which follows the national trends in solving our health care problems.

Dear Mr. President:

This letter is to inform you of plans for interim activity by the HESS Committee. One thing that has become increasingly clear during my tenure in the Legislature is that there is no completely integrated health care system in the State. Our effort in this direction is fragmented; although there has been some improvement since the creation of the State Health Coordinating Council and the three health care systems agencies.

There seems to be reason to believe that the Federal Government will drop all funding for these agencies. This fact, together with the pending Battelle Study on Health Care Financing and the fairly recent sunset reviews of the various health boards, makes this an appropriate time to review the structure of the system.

It is my intent, during the interim, to investigate the following:

- 1 - Availability, accessibility and affordability of health care in the State.
- 2 - Relationships between various health professions.
- 3 - The need for regulation of presently unrecognized and unregulated groups, such as naturopaths and lay midwives.

May 27, 1981

- 4 - The provision of emergency medical service and financial problems of volunteer agencies furnishing this service.
- 5 - Actions which the State might take to remedy deficiencies.

I propose to use questionnaires to members of the various health professions, and to the general public, to research the actions of other States, and to hold some committee hearings. The Committee has received Parts I and II of the Battelle Study and will maintain liaison with the persons working on that study in order not to duplicate. (It should be noted that the Battelle Study is concentrating much more heavily on payment for health care than on availability and accessibility).

It is expected that legislation will be introduced at the beginning of the 1982 Session as a result of the interim work of the Committee.

I talked with Luann Cutler about her Interim study of IHS on August 19. She said she has been busy with "politics" and has not yet begun work. She plans a document to be completed Nov. 1 or 15 with chapters on the following:

1. Historical overview of Federal/State role in health care for natives.
2. Description of services and their funding sources.
3. Key people involved in delivery of services.
4. Review of studies already completed and medical journal related articles.
5. Legal and political climate on the National and state level, spending limits and Federal Trust responsibilities.
6. Consumer survey had been planned but they have opted out because of our health questionnaire.
7. Community description of services to be subcontracted.

They are planning a 12 person Advisory Committee who are scheduled for 4 meetings, however they have not as yet been appointed.





Dear Charlie,

When you were here in Juneau, you asked me what I thought might be possible action for the committee this session. I have been thinking about that for a long time and wanted to share my thoughts with you.

The only thing I really had in mind when we talked was expanding Medicaid coverage to different options, this is also recommended in the Battelle study.

My overall impression of the Battelle study that I have read is that it is recommending HB 41, not in so many words of course, but the language suggests the same ideas. The rural section is being rewritten.

My understanding of optional groups added to Medicaid is that the first priorities (children under 21, and intact families) would provide medical coverage to a heavily native population, leaving IHS funding to cover other services, and the Federal Government would still be picking up the tab 100% because they are native.

Picking up the medically needy group is more desirable now with recent regulation changes, since the state can opt to serve the groups it selects rather than all groups as in the past.

Picking up other optional services would put Federal dollars in place of state dollars since the GRM program now picks up 100% of these costs.

It seems illogical to me that these services/groups were not added in the past. The Dept. will not initiate any action on these, nor does it seem likely that it will come from the Governor's office. I am not very astute in the underlying political ramifications of this...I have been told that the purpose of the Battelle study was that Fred McGinnis wanted to eliminate the Medicaid program entirely, so I am confused.

I think that planning a long range program for the growing population of elderly is important, especially in providing support for keeping the people active and in their communities. In the next few decades we will be facing an enormous senior citizen population, and alternatives to institutionalization

should be well in place by that time. The Homemaker services need to be expanded to more localities, the questionnaires showed support of local LTC facilities. Of course, Alaska has the highest LTC rates in the country, and the highest percentage of Medicaid going to LTC so it would be logical to try to make facility care the last alternative. I don't have any real plan, it just seems that this is a neglected area, and there should be ways to encourage family or community responsibility for the aging--adult day care, respite care, foster homes etc.

I think the legislature should demand better cooperation between H&SS and IHS. The Oct. Quarterly meeting is an excellent example of things going awry, when being touted as a meeting seeking solutions to the Native health problems, and all reports are that all controversial subjects were ignored. It would seem that the Department needs to establish a policy and outline the responsibilities of the state, and plan cooperatively with IHS. In contrasting the Nome and Bethel hearings, I see a highly organized structure in Nome with a clear understanding of past accomplishments and future objectives, and a grasp of the important issues. All this was so lacking in Bethel and could be the same in other areas. Perhaps the Native Organizations need assistance in organization and development, and successful ones, such as Norton Sound, could assist others in reaching their level of competency.

Continuing education received so much notice in the questionnaire that I feel it is a very important issue in maintaining high quality health care, should we investigate this more? In relation to the University?

Also, I don't know why professional licensing is not done with the National tests rather than locally. I have requested a followup on the Performance Review of the Board of Psychologists which is just now being completed. The 1978 review pointed out some very serious problems supported by info gleaned from the questionnaires.

Hope this makes some sense, sorry it takes me so long to digest things. See you soon,

NCSL notes on home care to Nancy

HEALTH PLANNING

Authorizations for the health planning program for FY 82 are contained in the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981 signed by the President on August 13. The Act sets upper limits on amounts that may be appropriated. The law (P.L. 97-35) authorizes appropriations of \$102 million for health planning for 1982 (\$65 million for local agencies, \$35 million for state agencies, and \$2 million for health planning centers).

The health planning provision would:

1. Reduce minimum funding levels from \$245,000 to \$100,000 for local planning agencies.
2. Allow local agencies to accept operational funds in contributions from health insurance companies.
3. Enable a governor to eliminate any and all HSAs if assurances are given to the Department of Health and Human Services that the purposes of the program can be met without them and if the HHS Secretary approves the proposal.
4. Raise the threshold for Certificate of Need reviews to \$600,000 for capital expenditures, \$400,000 for major medical equipment, and \$250,000 for new institutional services.
5. Allow local departments with HHS approval to stop appropriateness reviews, reviews of proposed uses of Federal funds, and the collection and dissemination of charge information for the 25 most frequently used hospital services.

There is every reason to believe that funding for HSAs will cease in FY 83, and because of budget limitations it is unlikely that H&SS will be able to increase funding to local planning agencies. Local input remains important in advising the state agency, but no plans have yet been made for implementing regional planning in 1983. It would seem likely that the Legislature would be approached for supplemental funding in this area.

BLOCK GRANT INFORMATION - DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES

The final Block Grant regulations have fallen far short of the Reagan administration's promises of flexibility on the state level, with the Budget Reconciliation Bill listing complete specifications for spending Federal funds. Although the paperwork has been streamlined, the administrative responsibility falls almost totally to the state financially. The Department of Health and Social Services has already hired a full-time coordinator for the Block Grants, John Taber, who came onboard in August.

The scope of the Block Grants has diminished since the original plans, as many targeted programs have retained categorical funding status. Alaska has a particular problem, as many programs are funded through the state or IHS (particularly in the Preventive Health Block Grant), and the Department anticipates major budget cuts in IHS monies in 1982 which will further burden the state in financial obligations. All told, the amount of Federal money is small for all Block Grants, less than 1% of the National total. H&SS has already notified the Federal Government that they are ready to take over the administration of Block Grants, though C&RA has requested the next year to prepare for administering the Community Services Grant.

I have identified the following as important points:

1. Very little regulation will need to occur for the Block Grants since the Budget Reconciliation Bill clearly specifies how funding, reporting and auditing will be accomplished.
2. Most of the Grants require that the Legislature hold public hearings throughout the state following the end of FY 82 and the beginning of FY 83, with reports to the Secretary.
3. Five of the Block Grants specify that any native organization may request that they receive their share of the Block Grant on a yearly basis. The Native Lands Settlement Act recognized over 300 such organizations in Alaska, and although a request for an individual Grant will not exempt them from other state services and funding in that area, it will complicate planning for H&SS. It will be very important to the Department to obtain some agreement with tribal entities on this issue.
4. The Primary Care Block Grant will not go into effect until

FY 83. There is some concern over the funding of the Anchorage Community Health Center, as it is operating on 45% carry-over funds from FY 80, which will not be counted when the Block Grant allocation for FY 83 is figured.

Please note: BIA general assistance money will cease in mid-November affecting at least 4,000 Alaska residents. This will have a definite affect in the rural economy, and there is no state program to cover this loss. There will be a meeting in Anchorage in the Native Health Building solarium concerning this and other native health issues. I am enclosing a copy of the agenda, you may find it very helpful to attend this meeting.

authorized HSA's to review and make recommendations on all major capital expenditures

Certificate of Need

studies indicate that:

1) Not significant in lowering hospital cost because:

a.) hospitals make major purchases in smaller increments which actually increases cost of equipment.

b) Doctors buy equipment and rent to hospitals.

c) hospitals proceed with plan anyway

1) no follow-up by CON.

2) info. system poor so that the CON people don't know what hospital does.

3) No significant financial penalties for not following CON.

D) A burst of buying/construction before CON regulation went into effect.

e) manufacturers sell items just below CON purchase price cut off for mobile units which are not included.

- No real data to evaluate "NEED"

- CON people not expert enough (1/2 of HSA surveyed had no staff, training in data gathering and analysis)

- too much concentration on bed complement

- Applications reviewed in light of hospital and NOT total catchment area/other facilities

- time limitations - Plan to review CON applications?

- guidelines for ancillary services & ambulatory care are not specific
- no means of est. an overall limit to how much of hospital resources should be committed to capital investments.
- need years to see significance in cost containment & to est. program. although studies reveal no signif. in mature programs.

- * HHA's are 40% providers who are frequently more dominant and influential than consumers.
 - no limited ^{fixed} budget so there is no motivation to find most cost effective method.
- * number of hospital beds has been reduced but total capital growth is no different in states w/o CON. - only changed the investment composition to special services/equipment.
- * CON could prevent hospitals from competition if regulators turn down applications for new facilities.
- * enhances availability of investment funds from commercial market
- decisions are actually very political and not in the realm of the planning groups.
