Dear Representative Adams:

I am writing to you, in your capacity as co-chairman of the operating budget free conference committee conferees, to advise you that the submission of the budget for the office of the ombudsman does not include provision for estimated salary increases for FY'83.

The omission is due to no fault of ours. An October 6, 1981, memorandum of Jim Stey, Deputy Director of the Division of Budget and Management, that provided detailed information about budgeting for proposed salary increases was circulated to agencies but not provided to the office of the ombudsman. After making inquiries, the administrative officer was provided a copy of the memo on May 27, 1982. Her estimate of the increment required for staff of the office of the ombudsman for FY'83 has been completed in accordance with instructions of that memo and is provided with this letter.

I regret the omission and especially my having to call this to your attention at this late hour. Thank you for your consideration.

Meeting of

June 4, 1982

Juneau, Alaska - State Capitol

The meeting was convened by Chairman Malone in the Butrovich Room, Second Floor of the Capitol, at 11:17 a.m., Friday, June 4, 1982.

Roll call was taken and in attendance were Council members Beirne, Brown, Eliason, Hayes, Kelly, Kerttula, Miller, Phillips, Ray, Rodey and Chairman Malone. Member Bennett arrived late. Members Dankworth and Vaska arrived late. Staff members in attendance were King, Harrison and Vogt.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Senator Kerttula moved and asked unanimous consent that the minutes for the Council meeting of April 7, 1982 and May 12, 1982, be approved. No objection was voiced and the minutes were approved.

LEGISLATIVE TELEVISION COVERAGE COSTS AND MAINTENANCE COST

Chairman Malone presented the memorandum of May 25, 1982 in which all Council members signed for the allocation of \$10,000 from Legislative funds to continue television coverage. Representative Brown moved and asked unanimous consent that this memorandum, dated May 25, 1982, be officially ratified by the Council. No objection was voiced and the motion passed.

Chairman Malone explained that the coverage of the Legislative session had run past the amount allocated. Chairman Malone stated that since this was a session cost, that it should come from SB 895. Mr. Rowark gave a report that the cost of maintenance on the State owned equipment came to \$5,915.00.

Chairman Malone suggested to the Council that the RSA be funded at the daily rate of \$1,605.58 per day, plus reimbursement of the maintenance cost not to exceed \$6,000.00. Senator Kerttula moved and asked unanimous consent that the figures suggested by Chairman Malone be allocated from the bill not yet signed by the Governor (SB 895). No objection was voiced and the motion passed.

These Minutes supersede those previously sent to you for the June 4, 1982, Council Meeting.

LEGISLATIVE TELEVISION EQUIPMENT

Senator Rodey expressed concern that the satellite window be left open for use by the Legislature during the Interim. Senator Kelly moved and asked unanimous consent that all video equipment owned by the Legislature be stored and no one could use said equipment without express consent by the Legislative Council. Objection was noted. After lengthy discussion on the satellite window and the satellite transmission equipment "the black box", Senator Ray moved to amend Senator Kelly's motion, that the Legislative Affairs Agency make the satellite transmission equipment "the black box" available for use. The Legislative Affairs Agency will retain control and allow access, along with the customary charge for maintenance. There were questions about the motion and amendment. Chairman Malone restated the motion. All equipment, except the equipment necessary to access the satellite window, be held in storage by the Legislative Affairs Agency. The equipment held in storage could not be used, without 8 votes of the Legislative Council. Chairman Malone suggested that the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House appoint 2 members of the Legislature for the purpose of recommending a policy to the Council and that policy being ratified at the next Council meeting. Senator Rodey asked unanimous consent. No objection was voiced and the motion passed.

Speaker Hayes appointed Representative Phillips and President Kerttula appointed Senator Ray to recommend a policy of use of the satellite transmission equipment and to make a report to the Council at the next meeting.

SALARY INCREASE FOR FY 83

Chairman Malone pointed out to the Council that the original budgets of the Legislature and the Court System did not have the salary increases included in their budgets and there was no legislation adopted providing the extra funds for those branches of government. Senator Kerttula moved and asked unanimous consent that the Director of Administrative Services prepare an accounting of what the deficit will be and during the interim draft legislation to be introduced and acted on either the first or second day of the next session. No objection was voiced and the motion passed.

SELECTION OF AUDITOR

After discussion, Senator Kerttula moved and asked unanimous consent that Council approve Chairman Malone's recommendation to select Price Waterhouse & Company to perform the annual audit of the Agency for the current fiscal year. No objection was voiced and the motion passed.

VOTING MACHINES

Senator Kerttula moved and asked unanimous consent that the voting machines in the chambers not be replaced. No objection was voiced and the motion passed. Senator Ray asked unanimous consent that the

Legislative Affairs Agency be given authority to re-negotiate the existing contract for the voting machines. No objection was voiced and the motion passed.

Chairman Malone requested a report on the negotiations of the contract to be presented at the next Council meeting.

HOUSE SOUND SYSTEM

Mr. Vogt briefly reported to the Council the approximate costs of a new sound system for the House Chambers. Chairman Malone moved and asked unanimous consent that the Council authorize the Speaker of the House to investigate and take appropriate action using FY 82 funds to upgrade the House sound system. Senator Ray objected.

RECESS

The meeting was called back to order. The roll was taken and the motion passed by the following vote:

Yeas: Beirne, Brown, Eliason, Hayes, Kelly, Miller, Phillips and Malone	8
Nays: Kerttula, Ray and Rodey	3
Absent: Bennett, Dankworth and Vaska	3

Chairman Malone requested a full report of his findings by the next Council meeting. Speaker Hayes appointed Representative Miller and Representative Phillips to investigate the costs of the sound system so the necessary amount can be encumbered before the end of this fiscal year.

SPACE POLICY - ANCHORAGE OFFICE

Chairman Malone explained to the Council that the Legislature has leased the upstairs area of the Anchorage Information Office. Chairman Malone suggested the policy that the unreserved space be allocated by the Speaker and the President or their designee. Senator Kerttula moved and asked unanimous consent. No objection was voiced and the motion passed.

MEDICAL SUB-COMMITTEE

Chairman Malone explained to the Council that Representative Gardiner had observed that the Legislature works in a high stress environment and that Council appoint a sub-committee consisting of physicians and other interested persons to give their recommendations as to what the Legislature could do to protect the health of those who work

and serve in the Legislature. Speaker Hayes moved and asked unanimous consent that Representative Beirne and Representative Miller be appointed to look into this problem and report back to Council. Speaker Hayes further stated that any unallocated funds from FY 82 designated by the Speaker and the President be used to fund this program. No objection was voiced and the motion passed.

OTHER BUSINESS

Senator Kelly asked about the status of moving Legislative Affairs to the AOB. Mr. Harrison gave a brief status report. After a lengthy discussion on encumbering lapsing funds to cover the move, a quorum was not present, Chairman Malone held this item of business over until the next Council meeting.

STATEHOOD COMMISSION

Chairman Malone brought to the Council's attention that Mr. Miles Davic had filed for state office and that other people had contacted him regarding appointment to the Commission. After discussion, this item held until next Council meeting.

ADJOURNMENT

Chairman Malone announced the next meeting of the Council would be on Friday, July 9, 1982 in Anchorage. Senator Kelly suggested the meeting be held at the Library in Eagle River. There were no objections. There being no further business to come before the Council, Chairman Malone adjourned the meeting at 12:28 p.m.
