Dear Governor Sheffield:


I wish to formally request appointment on the Board of Fish & Game. I understand that there will be three slots available this January.

September 1975-Present: NANA Regional Corporation-Vice President of Operations. Work directly for the President of NANA in overseeing day to day business operations. Also am responsible for lobbying efforts both in Juneau and Washington, D. C. on matters such as oil and gas taxation and land claims issues. In May 1977, I was transferred to the NANA Development Corporation office in Anchorage to work as Vice President of Operations. My duties continued in a similar vien, except that I have no responsibilities for our operations in Kotzebue. I work directly for the President of NANA Development Corporation in administering NANA's construction company, pipeline and oilfield services, utilities, and security companies.

September 1, 74-May 1975: Alaska Community College (part-time) - taught a 3 credit course on the history and interpretation of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act.

December 1972-August 1975: Alaska Federation of Natives - served as Executive Vice President and was responsible for overseeing the financial and administrative matters of the Alaska Federation of Natives including 10 million dollars worth of grants and programs. These programs provided services in the fields of health, education, housing, and business technical assistance. I also assisted in lobbying and working with the Congress, the Alaska State Legislature, and various State and Federal organizations on matters relating to the TransAlaska Pipeline, Native Land Claims, Coastal Zone Management and OCS impact.

November 1969-December 1972: Rural Alaska Community Action Program - served as Deputy Director for a little over a year and then was hired as Executive Director. Was responsible for overseeing the programs of the Community Action Program for Rural Alaska including Headstart, Village Development, Heavy Equipment Program, Emergency Food and Medical Services Program, and several other programs. Budgets totaled annually approximately \$4 million dollars.

May 1969-November 1969: Alaska Federation of Natives - served as a consultant to set up the health program which I developed while working for the Greater Anchorage Area Community Action Agency.

September 1968-May 1969: Greater Anchorage Area Community Action Agency - developed and worked on funding for a major health grant for the communities of Nome and Bethel.

July 1965-August 1968: Vista Volunteer - served as a Vista Volunteer working in Bethel, Alaska, Yakutat, Alaska, and Fairbanks, Alaska. Worked primarily with youth groups and the court system in Bethel. Worked as Assistant to the Mayor and with youth in Yakutat. Was a supervisor of 30 VISTA Volunteers for northern and western Alaska while stationed in Fairbanks.
