MEMORANDUM

FROM: Speaker-elect Ben Grussendorf
TO: Majority Members
DATE: December 13, 1984
RE: Proposed Amendments to Majority Goals and Objectives

This is a skeletal structure of the Majority's objectives for the upcoming session. Members should be fleshing out the list and thinking about where legislation can fit under these objectives. The underlined portions of the text are amendments offered for approval by the caucus. Goals and Objectives include:

Re-establishing public confidence in the legislative process through activities and deeds within the constitutional session limit (e.g., T.V. coverage of the House).

Resolving the Longevity Bonus question.

Establishing a school foundation program and in general establishing educational and job training opportunities for Alaskans of all ages.

Enhancing the delivery of human services (such as health care).

Protecting Alaskans of all ages from violence, abuse and other criminal activities.

Diversification of the economy, stressing employment opportunities for Alaskans, such as local hire and local contractor preference.

Assisting depressed areas of the Alaskan economy (e.g., timber industry recovery) and addressing the severe economic conditions that exist in some areas of rural Alaska.

Promoting Alaska's resources in the domestic and world markets, those resources including fish, timber, agriculture, gas and oil, coal and other minerals, as well as tourism.

Pursuing Pacific Rim trade.

Developing equitable energy programs for urban and rural Alaskans and finalizing the Four Dam Pool question.

Living within our revenues and placing more money into the Permanent Fund for the future.

Returning capital budget projects back to the "basics"- roads, water, sewers, schools, airports, ports and harbor development.

Stressing planned development and upgrading of public facilities and transportation systems.

Developing a sound operational budget within our revenues, getting the most for our money, yet providing the necessary level of service to Alaskans.

Reviewing the working and economic relationships between the State and local communities.

Supporting the Governor in protecting the Alaskan fishermen's interest in the salmon treaty negotiations.

Promoting management policies which ensure Alaskan's permanent and stable access to the fisheries resources.

Assisting and supporting the Governor in the E.P.A. waiver requests for the Southeast pulp mills and for the mining industry.

Reviewing consumer protection laws.

Continuing to examine the requirements of the Corrections System of the State.

Addressing the legislative pay raise. Options include appointing an Independent Salary Commission to take the politics out of the issue.

Fine-tuning the ethics legislation that was passed last year.
