The advisory system is a development undertaken during my tenure as the chairman of the two departments.

Added Accomplishments: New course offerings have been developed in all program areas, including a core of course work for each graduate student in the various programs. Expanded out-reach efforts have resulted in doubling the number of off-campus courses made available through school districts, agencies, and private businesses. This produced enough enrollment at the graduate level to help offset a gradual decline in undergraduate enrollment.

We have instituted a systematic review of programs, courses and teachers within the two departments, based upon student and alumni responses, peer reviews of faculty, and systematic, objectives-based conference evaluations by the department chairman. Each of these efforts is the result of initiatives for which I take a major and leading responsibility. During the past two years I have supervised three self-studies that have led to full accreditation of all programs under my direction by the National Association for the Accreditation of Teacher Education and by the Texas Education Agency. The Southern Association of Schools and College continues studies toward accreditation during the coming year.

A review of the academic performance of students in the teacher education programs has led to the development, under my leadership, of a systematic assessment of student performance in reading and writing and the institution of regular courses for all students in the University to improve reading and study skills. These courses now serve about two hundred students annually. In

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addition, I have acted as a member and chairman of the Graduate Council of the University, and on the University Curriculum Committee. Both of these are the principal policy bodies for their respective areas of the University.

I have initiated and carried out the recruitment of new and replacement faculty for regular appointments through nationwide searches.

I have also had the added responsibilities of membership on the Committee on Program Evaluation of the Graduate School and an active role in the Federation of North Texas Area Universities program advisory committees on Bilingual Education (Chairman), Reading and Early Childhood Education.

My current involvements include work with several university-wide, departmental, and Federation-based efforts in faculty development and training in research methodologies. I have also developed new courses and programs in; a) College Teaching, b) Reading for Gifted and Talented, and c) College and Adult Reading.

At Fairbanks Medical and Surgical Clinic during its expansion I assisted in the design of the Physical Therapy Department. During this growth our staff increased to four.

At Pioneer Home I was able to pilot and institute the Physical Therapy program for the residents. I also had the opportunity to act as consultant for the construction of the Physical Therapy Department at the Anchorage Pioneer Home.

At Central Peninsula General Hospital I was able to experience the challenge of developing a full time Physical Therapy Department. In 1976, we started in temporary quarters, housed in a patient room. By 1977, the need for larger housing was pursued. Hence, we were moved to the H & R Block building. Additional staff was required as well, with the increased patient load. By 1979, our staff increased by one and one-half assistants. Also, the desire to be housed once again at the hospital was great. By 1980 that dream became reality. I again was permitted to assist in the design of the space allocated for Physical Therapy. Our staffing increased to two full time assistants and one part-time. As our patient load continued to increase both in-patient and out-patient, the need for another Registered Physical Therapist was seen. By spring of 1982, we had additional staffing of a Registered Physical Therapist. Patient load continued to increase, as did the need to provide more intense weekend coverage, and to increase the hours the department was open. By spring of 1983, we were pursuing both more space and another Registered Physical Therapist on staff. A program with Kenai Central High School was developed, to allow a student (senior) interested in pursuing the field of Physical Therapy to work in Physical Therapy for experience three to four hours a day. We began planning a new department with three times as much space! We moved to our new department in September 1983. But, we had not been successful in locating a third Registered Physical Therapist. Additional aides were hired to help us meet the continued growth in patient numbers. We had eight people under my supervision in Physical Therapy. Growth in patient numbers continues, but more importantly a growth trend is seen in the number of more severely involved patients. These patients require more one on one supervision and are our long term care patients. These patients now are staying in our community for rehabilitation as opposed to going to the "lower forty-eight" for rehabilitation. We are seeing increase in our population both because of people staying and people moving in. One also needs to know that the trend is also toward specialization. We have seen an increase in Physician specialists in our medical community.

In May 1984, I began private practice, Peninsula Physical Therapy, which has grown tremendously in the past fifteen months. We were recently certified as the first Out-patient Rehabilitation Agency in Alaska. In addition to quality long and short term physical therapy, Peninsula Physical Therapy now offers speech and occupational therapy. We also offer the services of a nutritionist and a clinical psychologist. Our department is under contract with Home Health, Kenai Peninsula Borough School District, and the South Peninsula Hospital in order to further serve the Kenai Peninsula.

PRIOR AUDIT RECOMMENDATIONS

Three of the eleven recommendations presented to the Board in a previous audit report "A Performance Review of the Board of Psychologist and Psychological Associate Examiners, October 31, 1978", have been implemented. The following is the status of the remaining recommendations:

Prior Audit Recommendation No. 1

A statutory change should be considered which will increase the number of public members on the Board and allow the public to be represented.

Prior to June 5, 1980, the Board was composed of three psychologists and two public members. In questionnaires returned by State licensed psychologists, 39% of the respondents believed that the Board had not operated in the public's best interest.

The Board had been inconsistently licensing applicants even though an Attorney General's opinion and a prior Division of Legislative Audit report, dated August 5, 1975, noted prior inconsistencies and made recommendations to change these practices. Also, the Board had been conducting its meetings and making its deliberations in secrecy. Such actions not only exposed the State to lawsuits, but also threaten recruiting efforts of State mental health institutions for qualified psychologists and counselors.

Legislative Audit's Current Position

With the enactment of Chapter 58 SL 1980, the Board is now composed of four psychologists and one public member. The public member has a doctorate in counselor education, a strong background in psychology and is a member of the American Psychological Association. While this is not a violation of the statutes, it contradicts the spirit of the law requiring public members. ✓

The Board continues to have the problems noted above. We have found inconsistencies in granting of licenses, approving applicants to take the examination, and in the testing of applicants (see Prior Audit Recommendation No. 2). In addition, the Board has continued to conduct its meetings and making its decisions in secrecy (see Prior Audit Recommendation No. 3).

If Recommendation No. 1 is not implemented, then we recommend that the Board be composed of a majority of public members to help ensure that the Board acts in the public's best interest.

Board of Regents President Herb Lang responds to employee concerns

(Editor's Note: The Board of Regents, meeting in Ketchikan early last month, heard an executive session report described by one participant as "an icy shower." The report consisted of information gathered when over 270 middle managers from throughout the university system were asked how they and their staffs felt about working for the University of Alaska.

President O'Dowd identified the major employee concerns in his October 22 letter to all staff members. In addition to those problems, many specific complaints were voiced about the board of regents. Board President Herb Lang contacted University Report and asked to use these pages to reach staff members.)

UniRep: You've identified certain categories of comments about the board, President Lang, would you care to outline those for us?

Lang: Certainly. There seems to be a general misunderstanding of who we are and what we do. We were accused of neglecting to do many things a board has no business doing. A wide variety of complaints fell into that category. I'd like to correct the misunderstandings about who we are and what we do. Pay was a big issue, two aspects—merit pay and pay raises. Another category was a bit of a shock; the idea that we don't care about employees.

UniRep: You've expressed a desire to have the board of regents introduced and explained. We shall do so in a related story in this issue (See page 3.), but we'd like to hear your thoughts on the other issues. Would

you first explain about the proposed pay raise employees are not presently receiving?

Lang: The pay increase should have been funded last year. The regents have been committed to a pay raise from the beginning. When we voted not to grant an unfunded pay increase, we also voted to ask for money from the legislature in 1985 to fund a retroactive pay increase at the first opportunity. We've already made that request. In the FY86 operating budget request, the first increment (that is, increase over what we received for FY85) and our highest priority, includes funding for a retroactive FY85 salary increase for non-covered permanent employees and increases in staff benefits costs. It also includes increases for FY86. We voted to delay providing a pay increase, not against an increase.

UniRep: You sent a letter to that effect to all faculty and staff late last June. We know now that the method of distribution of a pay raise may be an even greater concern than the money. Please comment on the merit pay system which has been described as "pushed through by the board."

Lang: Regent Ruth Burnett probably expressed the feeling of all regents when she said at the committee meetings in Ketchikan, "I thought the system we voted to implement had the support of the employees." We know now it doesn't. Right now on each campus, through local assemblies, employees are discussing the system. We expect a recommendation from the administration at our December 13 and 14 meeting. I've no idea what they will have learned by then, but I do know we will have

Board of Regents

What does it do?

The University of Alaska Board of Regents is the governing body responsible for university policy and for management through the president. Regents are appointed by the governor for eight-year terms, subject to legislative confirmation. A student regent is appointed for two years from candidates nominated at each university campus. Board members serve without compensation but are reimbursed for expenses incurred in performing their duties.

The eleven regents appoint the university president, who serves as the boards' chief executive officer. Responsibilities of the board include establishing policy and approving degree programs, campus development plans, the management of university property and the operating and capital budget requests.

The board does not have direct responsibility for day-to-day administration of the university. It is obligated to monitor the effectiveness of university administration.

The full board regularly meets four times a year, more often when necessary. Much of its work is accomplished during meetings of standing committees held approximately one month prior to each regular full board meeting. The board standing committees are Campus Planning and Development; Community Colleges, Rural Education and Extension; Educational Policy and Program; Finance and Business Management and Human Resources.
