15. The compensation of the governor and lieutenant governor shall be prescribed by law and shall not be diminished during their terms of office, unless by general law applying to all officers of the State.

16. The governor shall be responsible for the faithful execution of the laws. He may, by court action or proceeding brought in the State, enforce compliance with judicial or legislative mandate, or resolution of any constitutional or legislative committee, or right by any officer, department, agency or officer of the State or any of its political subdivisions. His authority shall not be construed to prevent any action or proceeding against the

17. Whenever the governor considers it in the public interest, he may convene the legislature in special session, or the two houses in joint session.

18. The governor shall, at the beginning of each session, and may at other times, give information concerning the affairs of the State and recommend the measures he considers necessary.

19. The governor is commander-in-chief of the armed forces of the State. He may call upon the militia to execute the laws, suppress insurrection or lawless violence, or repel

invasion. The governor, as provided by law, shall appoint all general and flag officers of the armed forces of the State, subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session. He shall appoint and commission all other officers.

SECTION 20. The governor may proclaim martial law when the public safety requires it in case of rebellion or actual or imminent invasion. Martial law shall not continue for longer than twenty days without the approval of a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session.

SECTION 21. Subject to procedure prescribed by law, the governor may grant pardons, commutations, and reprieves, and may suspend and remit fines and forfeitures. This power shall not extend to impeachment. A parole system shall be provided by law.

SECTION 22. All executive and administrative offices, departments, and agencies of the state government and their respective functions, powers and duties shall be allocated by law among and within not more than twenty principal departments, so as to group them as far as practicable according to major purposes. Regulatory, quasi-judicial, and temporary agencies may be established by law and need not be allocated within a principal department.

SECTION 23. The governor may make changes in the organization of the executive branch or in the assignment of functions among its units which he considers necessary for efficient administration. Where these changes require the force of law, they shall be set forth in executive orders. The legislature shall have sixty days of a regular session, or a full session if of shorter duration, to disapprove these executive orders. Unless disapproved by resolution concurred in by a majority of the members

Supervision

SECTION 24. Each principal department shall be under the supervision of the governor.

Department Heads

SECTION 25. The head of each principal department shall be a single executive unless otherwise provided by law. He shall be appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session, and shall serve at the pleasure of the governor, except as otherwise provided in this article with respect to the lieutenant governor. The heads of all principal departments shall be citizens of the United States.

(The amendment to this section was approved by the voters of the state August 25, 1970 and became effective October 10, 1970. The words "secretary of state" were changed to "lieutenant governor".)

Boards and Commissions

SECTION 26. When a board or commission is at the head of a principal department or a regulatory or quasi-judicial agency, its members shall be appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session, and may be removed as provided by law. They shall be citizens of the United States. The board or commission may appoint a principal executive officer when authorized by law, but the appointment shall be subject to the approval of the governor.

Recess Appointments

SECTION 27. The governor may make appointments to fill vacancies occurring during a recess of the legislature, in offices requiring confirmation by the legislature. The duration of such appointments shall be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV

THE JUDICIARY

Judicial Power and Jurisdiction

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the State is vested in a supreme court, a superior court and the courts established by the legislature. The jurisdic-

tion of courts shall be constituted. The courts shall constitute the judicial system. The operation and administration of the courts shall be established by law.

Supreme Court

SECTION 2. The highest court of the State shall be the supreme court. It shall consist of a chief justice and four justices. The number of justices may be increased by law.

(b) The chief justice shall be elected by the voters in a joint vote of the justices of the supreme court. The chief justice shall serve more than one term and shall serve consecutive terms.

(The amendment to this section was approved by the voters of the state August 25, 1970 and became effective October 10, 1970. Subsection (b) was added.)

Superior Court

SECTION 3. The superior court shall be a court of general jurisdiction. It shall consist of five judges. The number of judges shall be prescribed by law.

Qualifications of Justices and Judges

SECTION 4. Supreme court judges shall be citizens of the State, at least 30 years of age, and possessing the qualifications prescribed by law. Justices shall be selected in a manner prescribed by law.

Nomination and Appointment

SECTION 5. The chief justice shall be appointed by the voters in an office of supreme court judge by appointment. Justices shall be nominated by the governor.

Approval or Rejection

SECTION 6. Each superior court judge shall be appointed by law, be subject to confirmation by the voters in a nonpartisan ballot.


Executive Order 60: Transferring the Athletic Commission from the Office of the Governor to the Department of Commerce and Economic Development.

The Department of Commerce and Economic Development concurs with the executive order to transfer the Athletic Commission to this agency.

The Division of Occupational Licensing is the appropriate agency to handle the licensing and registration of the boxers, managers, physicians, trainers and seconds. It is also the appropriate agency to accept bonds and insurance for boxing events, just as it does for other licensing sectors.


Since 1980, when the Athletic Commission was informally transferred to the Department of Commerce and Economic Development, the division has rendered limited administrative support to the Alaska Athletic Commission. The executive order will allow for proper accountability and budgeting for the commission. The commission received its last appropriation in 1977.

Though the commission has been in existence since 1959, regulations governing athletic events have never been adopted. The commission must develop comprehensive regulations for the protection of the participants and public. This is best accomplished in the occupational licensing agency.

2 Under the authority of art. III, sec. 23, of the Alaska Constitution,

4 * Section 1. FINDINGS. As governor, I find that it would be in the

9 (a) There is created an athletic commission within the Depart-

11 The commission consists of four members appointed by the governor.
12 One member of the commission must [SHALL] be appointed from each of
13 the four major senate districts described in sec. 2, art. XIV of the
14 state constitution. The commissioners must [SHALL] be appointed for
15 overlapping two year terms. Members of the commission serve at the
16 pleasure of the governor and must [SHALL] be selected on the basis of
17 their known interest in and knowledge of athletics in the state.

Dear Senator Bennett:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 23, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting an executive order that officially transfers the Athletic Commission from the Office of the Governor to the Department of Commerce and Economic Development.

The Athletic Commission (AS 05.05 and 05.10) is currently assigned by AS 05.05.010 to the Office of the Governor. However, it was informally and unofficially transferred to the Department of Commerce and Economic Development in a July 30, 1980 memorandum by former Governor Hammond. This executive order would make that transfer official.

The transfer places the commission where it logically belongs, with the other occupational licensing and regulatory boards and commissions. The commission will be undertaking the promulgation of regulations governing the increasing number of boxing matches in our state. The Division of Occupational Licensing will provide staff assistance to the commission.

I believe that this transfer will improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the Athletic Commission. I am confident that, along with the funding I have requested for the commission in the budget, the transfer will also improve the quality of the services the commission provides to boxers, promoters, and fans alike.
