A BILL

For an Act entitled: "An Act establishing the birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr., and Presidents' Day as legal holidays."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

* Section 1. AS 44.12.010 is amended to read:

Sec. 44.12.010. LEGAL HOLIDAYS. The following days are legal holidays:

- (1) the first of January, known as New Year's Day;
- (2) the third Monday of January, known as the birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr. [THE 12TH OF FEBRUARY, KNOWN AS LINCOLN'S BIRTHDAY];
- (3) the third Monday in February, known as Presidents' Day [WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY];
- (4) the last Monday of March, known as Seward's Day;
- (5) the last Monday in May, known as Memorial Day;
- (6) the fourth of July, known as Independence Day;
- (7) the first Monday in September, known as Labor Day;
- (8) the eighteenth of October, known as Alaska Day;
- (9) the 11th of November, known as Veterans' Day;
- (10) the fourth Thursday in November, known as Thanksgiving Day;
- (11) the 25th of December, known as Christmas Day;
- (12) every Sunday;
- (13) every day designated by public proclamation by the President of the United States or the governor of the state as a legal

CSHB 56 (SA)

The House State Affairs Committee has heard House Bill 56, establishing Martin Luther King, Jr. day as an official holiday, and has replaced the original bill with CSHB 56 (SA).

By replacing HB 56 with a committee substitute, the House State Affairs Committee has established Martin Luther King, Jr. day as an official holiday. The committee substitute also combines Washington's and Lincoln's birthdays into a single Presidents' Day holiday, thus avoiding an increase in the total number of legal holidays.

Recognizing that holidays are a negotiated benefit with the State's bargaining units, the State Affairs Committee does not intend to interfere with the negotiations process. In approving a zero fiscal note, however, the State Affairs Committee intends that there be no increase in total holidays for employees covered by collective bargaining or those exempt from collective bargaining.

FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

FOR CSHB 56 SA

This Fiscal Note is prepared based on the motion adopted by the House State Affairs Committee on February 11 to amend the bill to provide for Martin Luther King, Jr., Day as a State holiday on the third Monday in January; combine Lincoln's Birthday and Washington's Birthday holidays as President's Day on the third Monday in February; and adopt a Letter of Intent that there would not be a net increase in State employee holidays. This Fiscal Note is prepared before the final versions of CSHB 56 SA and the committee Letter of Intent have been adopted.

Based on no net increase in holidays for State employees, the Fiscal Note reflects a zero cost.

A Letter of Intent is the mildest manner in which the Legislature can advise the Executive Branch of its desires regarding an issue subject to collective bargaining. A Letter of Intent maintains the maximum reliance on the collective bargaining process to achieve a result consistent with the will of the Legislature. Accordingly, the Department of Administration will give full consideration to the Letter of Intent in bargaining sessions. To the extent that any agreement addresses changes in holidays that result in a net cost increase, those costs will be considered costs of the contract. Necessary funding will be addressed under existing statutory mechanisms dealing with contract costs. In any event, those costs will not be attributable to the passage of CSHB 56 SA. The Fiscal Note properly shows a zero cost for this reason.

the money for conservation. His concern is that the Exxon bonanza will be just a good excuse for Congress to go along with Reagan budget requests to choke off energy-conservation assistance for the states.

On a spot survey, I found New York and Massachusetts set to use almost all the cash for conservation. Gov. Thomas Kean (R-N.J.) said he'd do the same because "we have plenty of valid energy conservation needs to which we can put the money to use, within the court guidelines."

And Gov. Toney Anaya (D-N.M.) said he welcomed the court guidelines: "They give me a measure of protection against my own conservative legislature, which would otherwise use the money to supplant existing conservation programs."

The toughest question may be: What sense does energy conservation make in times of apparent abundance? The smart answer is: Plenty, maybe more than ever.

Energy analysts predict today's cheap energy prices may be short-lived. The American Petroleum Institute projects a perverse scenario: Lower prices, discouraging U.S. oil exploration at the same time it induces Americans to use more petroleum will increase dependency on foreign oil. By the early 1990s, OPEC may be positioned again to dictate higher prices because this country will have no other major source.

"Oil prices are going to turn around, maybe in two or three years," says New Mexico's Anaya. "The drop now is more of a political issue in the Middle East than an economic issue in the world."

Anaya's solution: Plan now, when we don't have a crisis, to promote energy alternatives, to develop conservation programs, "so that when the next turnaround comes in oil, we won't be facing a crisis." Not only would that make sound domestic sense, it would "send a signal out to the Middle East that they aren't going to manipulate our economy."

ONE WOULD think the governors, who've been making a big show of their long-term, preventive approaches to every problem from social services to education, would understand that philosophy. The question is — will all of them and, perhaps more critically, will their legislatures?

WHAT IS WHY THE EXXON money in the hole for states to maintain, and energy conservation programs so vital strength and economic futures.

The Reagan administration won't reap the whirlwind for failing to conserve the states will be; so will many of the voters and legislators. Their responsibility miss.

State recognizes King holiday

JUNEAU — Activities ranging from essay contests to renaming streets are scheduled around Alaska next month to commemorate the first national holiday in honor of slain civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr.

The third Monday in January has been set aside as the official federal holiday for King, who was gunned down on a Memphis motel balcony April 18, 1968.

"Festivities will begin on Jan. 15th, his birthday, but the official federal holiday is Jan. 20th," said Jim Kelly, a special assistant to Gov. Bill Sheffield who is helping to coordinate the activities.

"All kinds of recognition programs are being planned across the country, most of them symbolizing his philosophies of love and peace," Kelly said. "It's not being planned as a black type thing, but a people type thing."

A variety of events have been scheduled in Anchorage, Juneau, Fairbanks and Sitka, he said.

"Some of them will begin the 15th, with presentations, memorial services and essays in schools," Kelly said. "Sunday will be a big day with a celebration planned at Sullivan Arena in Anchorage.

"We're expecting 8 to 10,000 people," he said. "The Rev. Ralph Abernathy, head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and King's right-hand man, will be keynote speaker. A 600-voice choir will sing and that will be broadcast later in rural areas."

An Anchorage street is to be renamed for King with ceremonial ribbon-cutting and parade, tributes are scheduled in both houses of the Alaska legislature, films and exhibits will be set up in public buildings around Juneau and the original cast of the off-Broadway play "I Have a Dream" will perform in Fairbanks, Kelly said.

Assumptions:

1. Creation of one additional holiday will result in a productivity loss worth \$1.96 million in Executive, Judicial and Legislative branches (.38% of straight-time payroll) but will not require additional funding for the day of absence, per se.
2. \$423,600 in additional funds will be necessary for Executive branch overtime/benefits, based on agency survey.
3. No payroll increases in ensuing fiscal years; no increase in overtime in ensuing fiscal years.
4. Funding distribution of General Fund at 83.1%, federal funds at 4.1%, and "other" funds at 12.8%.
