4 SIXTEENTH LEGISLATURE - SECOND SESSION

5 A BILL

6 For an Act entitled: "An Act making appropriations for the operating and  
7 loan program expenses of state government; and pro-  
8 viding for an effective date."

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

10 \* Section 1. Included within the general fund amounts appropriated in  
11 this Act, the following amounts are from the unreserved special accounts in  
12 the general fund:

13	Highway Fuel Tax Account	\$20,500,000
14	Aviation Fuel Tax Account	10,000,000

15 \* Sec. 2. Federal or other program receipts that exceed the amounts  
16 appropriated in this Act are appropriated conditioned upon compliance with  
17 the program review provisions of AS 37.07.080(h).

18 \* Sec. 3. If federal or other program receipts exceed the estimates  
19 appropriated by this Act, the appropriation from state funds for the af-  
20 fected program may be reduced by the amount of the excess if the reductions  
21 are consistent with applicable federal statutes.

22 \* Sec. 4. Except as provided in sec. 5 of this Act, if federal or other  
23 program receipts fall short of the estimates appropriated by this Act, the  
24 affected appropriation is reduced by the amount of the shortfall in re-  
25 ceipts.

26 \* Sec. 5. If the federal receipts under 42 U.S.C. 1397 - 1397f (Title  
27 XX of the Social Security Act) fall short of the estimate, the amount of  
28 the shortfall is appropriated from the general fund.

29 \* Sec. 6. (a) Amounts equivalent to the amounts to be received in

1 settlement of insurance claims for losses are appropriated from the general  
2 fund to the state insurance catastrophe reserve account established by  
3 AS 37.05.289.

4 (b) Amounts equivalent to the amounts to be received in settlement of  
5 claims against bonds guaranteeing the reclamation of state land are appro-  
6 priated from the general fund to the agency secured by the bond. This  
7 appropriation is made for the purpose of reclaiming state land affected by  
8 a use covered by the bond.

9 (c) The appropriations made in this section are contingent upon  
10 compliance with the program review provisions of AS 37.07.080(h).

11 \* Sec. 7. The amount required to pay interest on revenue anticipation  
12 notes issued by the commissioner of revenue under AS 43.08.010 is appropri-  
13 ated from the general fund to the Department of Revenue.

14 \* Sec. 8. The amount required to be paid by the state for the principal  
15 of and interest on all issued and outstanding state-guaranteed bonds is  
16 appropriated from the general fund to the state bond committee to make all  
17 payments by the state required under its guarantee for principal and inter-  
18 est.

19 \* Sec. 9. The sum of \$8,652,862 is appropriated from the international  
20 airports revenue fund to the state bond committee for payment of debt  
21 service and trustee fees on outstanding international airports revenue  
22 bonds.

23 \* Sec. 10. The amount of the rebate requirement, as defined by Resolu-  
24 tion No. 86-5 of the state bond committee, is appropriated from the Inter-  
25 national Airports Revenue Fund to the state bond committee for deposit in  
26 the rebate fund established by Resolution No. 86-5 of the state bond com-  
27 mittee.

28 \* Sec. 11. The sum of \$12,100,976 is appropriated from the general fund  
29 to the state bond committee for lease payments to the Alaska State Housing  
CSHB 500(Fin)

1 Authority; City of Seward; Delta Fox, Ltd.; and City of Palmer.

2 \* Sec. 12. The sum of \$95,562,980 is appropriated from the general fund  
3 to the state bond committee for payment of debt service and trustee fees on  
4 state general obligation bonds.

5 \* Sec. 13. The income of the Alaska permanent fund allocated annually  
6 to pay permanent fund dividends as provided in AS 43.23.045(b), estimated  
7 at \$493,000,000, is appropriated to the dividend fund (AS 43.23.045(a)) for  
8 the payment of the 1990 permanent fund dividend and administrative and  
9 associated costs.

10 \* Sec. 14. (a) The amount calculated under AS 37.13.145 to offset the  
11 effect of inflation on the principal of the Alaska permanent fund (estimat-  
12 ed to be \$501,000,000) is appropriated to the permanent fund principal from  
13 the income of the permanent fund remaining after funds are transferred to  
14 the dividend fund.

15 (b) If the amount appropriated under (a) of this section is not  
16 sufficient to fully offset the effect of inflation, then the additional  
17 amount necessary to fully inflation-proof the principal of the Alaska  
18 permanent fund (estimated at \$48,000,000) is appropriated from the earnings  
19 reserve account to the principal.

20 \* Sec. 15. The interest earned during fiscal year 1991 on revenue from  
21 the sources set out in AS 37.13.010 while the revenue is held in trust,  
22 escrow, or otherwise before receipt of the revenue by the state is appro-  
23 priated to the principal of the Alaska permanent fund.

24 \* Sec. 16. Fifty percent of all mineral lease rentals, royalties,  
25 royalty sale proceeds, net profit shares under AS 38.05.180(f) and (g),  
26 federal mineral revenue sharing payments, and bonuses received by the state  
27 during fiscal year 1991 is appropriated to the principal of the permanent  
28 fund.

29 \* Sec. 17. The income earned during fiscal year 1991 on money awarded

1 to the state after trial in State v. Amerada Hess, et al., 1JU-77-847 Civ.  
2 (Superior Court, First Judicial District) is appropriated to the principal  
3 of the Alaska permanent fund.

4 \* Sec. 18. The lapsing balance of the employment assistance and train-  
5 ing account (sec. 3, ch. 95, SLA 1989) on June 30, 1990, is appropriated to  
6 the unemployment compensation fund (AS 23.20.130) on July 1, 1990.

7 \* Sec. 19. All unrestricted mortgage loan interest payments and all  
8 other receipts, including, without limitation, mortgage loan commitment  
9 fees, received by or accrued to the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation  
10 during the period of July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991, and all income  
11 earned on assets of the corporation during that period, are appropriated to  
12 the Alaska housing finance revolving fund (AS 18.56.082) for the purposes  
13 described in AS 18.56.

14 \* Sec. 20. The sum of \$5,757,300 is appropriated to the general fund,  
15 as an additional revenue source, from the following enterprise funds:

3 substance release response fund (AS 46.08.010).

4 (b) The appropriation made in (a) of this section and the June 30,  
5 1990, balance of the oil and hazardous substance release response fund are

23 from third parties as Exxon Valdez oil spill related expenses.

24 (d) A balance contained within the oil and hazardous substance re-  
25 lease response fund in excess of those amounts allocated by (b) of this  
26 section may be allocated to the spill reserve identified in (b)(8) of this  
27 section.

28 \* Sec. 23. The sum of \$257,000 is appropriated from federal receipts to  
29 the Department of Fish and Game, oil spill impact assessment and

1 restoration division, for assessments of natural resource damage resulting  
2 from the Exxon Valdez oil spill, as set out in 43 C.F.R. 11, for the fiscal  
3 year ending June 30, 1991.

4 \* Sec. 24. The sum of \$10,000,000 is appropriated from the general fund  
5 to the Alaska Student Loan Corporation, student loan fund (AS 14.42.210) to  
6 capitalize the fund.

7 \* Sec. 25. The sum of \$897,100 is appropriated from the general fund to  
8 the fisheries enhancement revolving loan fund (AS 16.10.505) for the fish-  
9 eries enhancement loan programs.

10 \* Sec. 26. The sum of \$16,800,000 is appropriated to the Alaska clean  
11 water fund (AS 46.03.032) for the Alaska clean water loan program from the  
12 following sources:

15 \* Sec. 27. The sum of \$230,400 is appropriated from the general fund to  
16 the Department of Health and Social Services for fiscal year 1991 costs of

19 share of taxes and fees collected under the following programs are appro-  
20 priated to the Department of Revenue from the general fund for payment in

Adopt Legislative Intent - It is the intent of the Legislature that the Department submit proposed legislation to the 1991 Legislature that will address resolution of troubled ARLF debt. In the interim, the ARLF should make maximum use of the authority of the Office of the Attorney General to settle litigation, and to use foreclosure authority when borrowers do not make best efforts to resolve their debt problems.

## AGRICULTURE REVOLVING LOAN FUND

The Agriculture Revolving Loan Fund (ARLF) is the responsibility of the Department of Natural Resources. The Division of Agriculture processes the loan applications.

AS 03.10.010-.060: enacted in 1953; amended in 1955, 1961, 1966, 1970, 1974, 1975, 1976, 1979, 1980, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1986, and 1988.

The ARLF is charged by statute with promoting more rapid agricultural development through the use of long term, low interest loans. The function is to provide credit for sound agricultural ventures which are determined to have a reasonable opportunity for success.

Beginning in 1987, ARLF under the direction of a new loan fund board began to scrutinize loan practices. While this reduced the loan volume dramatically, it has reduced the default rate to 15.1% for loans made over the past three years compared to a default rate prior to January 1, 1987 of 90% for non-project borrowers with total loans in excess of \$500,000 and 71% for non-project borrowers with total loans less than \$500,000.

Over the last two years, the ARLF has been spending most of its efforts on restructuring non-performing loans, disposing of foreclosed property, protecting collateral, foreclosing on bad loans and attempting to settle long standing debt disputes.

Legislative evaluation of the program requires consideration of the following issues:

### APPROPRIATIONS

1. Over \$10 million has been appropriated or reappropriated from the ARLF to the General Fund during the last three fiscal years. In addition, OMB has recommended an appropriation to the General Fund of \$1,257,500 for FY91. This appropriation would make a total adverse impact on the ARLF of \$11,502,700 over a four year period.

At the current rate of appropriations from the ARLF to the General Fund, the ARLF plus a significant portion of the Division of Agriculture will be out of business in approximately twenty-four months. This course of action will essentially shut down 100% of the agricultural lending in the State of Alaska.

## RECOMMENDATIONS:

This change of funding source better reflects the cost of government services which apply to more than just ARLF borrowers within the agriculture industry. This also reduces the drain on ARLF capital to allow for more funds available for direct farm financing.

## LOAN ANALYSIS

The large project loans made prior to January 1, 1987 adversely affect the total performance of the portfolio. Legal costs alone are now running at about \$300,000 a year and the total cost of servicing these delinquent loans could easily amount to \$1,000,000 per year.

According to ARLF staff, the vast majority of effort is spent on loans made in the 1978-86 period. Costs associated with loans made over the past three years account for less than 25% of all ARLF expenditures. Expenditures on new loans are estimated at \$306,100 on a loan demand of approximately \$2,900,000. The remaining 75% of the ARLF expenditures are for management, protection, and disposal of assets and litigation.

## INTERIM MEASURES

The ARLF needs to address and correct some of their house-keeping and administrative procedures. These management controls must be in operation at the earliest possible date - current staffing permitted. These necessary measures are primarily in the servicing area with particular emphasis on notices of delinquency to the borrower and protection of collateral.

The following policies and procedures have been or are soon to be implemented by the ARLF:

**AGING SCHEDULE** - all loans are now being identified for 30, 60, 90, and 120+ day delinquency.

**LOAN EXAMINERS** - all loans will have an assigned Loan Examiner who will be responsible for all loan activity.

**COLLATERAL INSPECTIONS** - Loan Examiners will be responsible for conducting an on-site inspection of collateral once a year. If workloads, travel budgets, and/or personnel availability prevents 100% compliance then each Loan Examiner is to prioritize the collateral inspections.

**DELINQUENCY NOTICES** - a procedure has been established to send notices of delinquency to each borrower. These notices are in a monthly sequence from an initial copy of the account ledger to the final notification of default and subsequent recommendation to the ARLF Board for referral to the AG's office.

**SETTLEMENTS** - it will be the policy of the Director of Agriculture, ARLF Loan Manager, and ARLF Loan Examiners to make maximum use of the settlement process with one-on-one negotiations. The resulting recommendations will be channeled through the Director and ARLF Board to the AG's office as possible considerations for settlement. All negotiations will be addressed on a case by case basis except for those loans that have had ARLF imposed constraints, such as project loans. These loans may receive more preferential treatment because of possible lender liability.

**FORECLOSURE** - it will be the policy of the Division of Agriculture to recommend immediate foreclosure action on those borrowers who do not make a best effort to negotiate a settlement.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL** - The Division of Agriculture will recommend to the AG's office that foreclosure action and/or the settlement process be accelerated so that the loan can be put in a performing status or the asset recovered - settlement being the preferred action.

**REWRITE** - under existing statutes and regulations, the rewrite program has not proven to be an effective tool to reduce delinquency. The age of some loans prohibits rewrites for

operating and chattel type loans and in some cases the loans are already at the maximum terms allowable. Additionally, most loans in this category were asset based loans and still do not have sufficient cash flow to support a rewrite.

**RESTRUCTURE** - legislation was approved in 1988 which allowed for a restructure of those loans made before January 1, 1987. The maximum terms available were 30 years at 1% but no reduction of principal or accrued interest. This program did help both project and non-project farmers to a limited degree but has had little positive impact on the overall performance of the fund. A new restructure program would not be a viable solution if debt could not be reduced.

**LOAN DEFERRAL** - under the provisions of AS 01.10.202 the Department of Natural Resources has the authority to delay the payment of principal and interest for up to five years if the borrower can show the ability to repay at the end of the delay period. However, the authority can only be exercised if there has been a farming disaster declared - such as an area wide crop failure, closing of market sources, or the destruction of a transportation facility. This option could be a possible consideration but only if the disaster constraint was deleted.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Adopt Legislative Intent - It is the intent of the Legislature that the Department submit proposed legislation to the 1991 Legislature that will address resolution of troubled ARLF debt. In the interim, the ARLF should make maximum use of the authority of the Office of the Attorney General to settle litigation, and to use foreclosure authority when borrowers do not make best efforts to resolve their debt problems.

Dear Representatives Larson and Hoffman:

Attached are proposed amendments to the front sections of House Bill 500. These amendments are for a variety of purposes.

1) Amendments for FY91 oil spill related activity. Included are amendments to provide FY91 on-going funding for continued natural resource damage assessment work and fisheries management for the Department of Fish and Game, continued supervision of oil-spill related activity and accounting documentation for the Office of the Governor, additional OSHA enforcement and job placement services under the Department of Labor, and completion of the oiled communities impact study by the Department of Community and Regional Affairs. (Continued litigation expenses are already proposed for the Department of Law in sec. 26 of HB 500).

Work by the Departments of Labor and Community and Regional Affairs will be completed in October. All other activities, including funding already included in HB 500 for the Department of Law, are costed for the period ending March 1, 1991. This provides for completion of an additional field season of damage assessment with an evaluation of on-going needs for presentation to the next legislature. Any additional funding required for FY91 will be requested as a supplemental at that time.

2) ANWR lobbying efforts. Additional funding is requested for continued work at the federal level regarding opening ANWR to oil exploration and drilling.

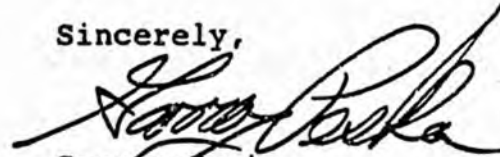
3) Permanent fund deposits. Additional language is suggested to clarify appropriations made to the permanent fund.

4) UI trust. In creating the State Training and Employment Program (STEP), the legislature provided that funds appropriated to the program which would otherwise lapse may be reappropriated to the UI trust. These funds are collected as a portion of employers costs specifically for the purposes of the STEP program. Appropriation back to the trust offsets the need for future increases in employer rates.

Your consideration of these amendments as you complete your work on House Bill 500 is appreciated.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO FRONT SECTIONS OF HB 500

1. Amendments for FY91 oil spill related activity.

\* Sec. \_\_\_\_\_. The sum of \$530,622 is appropriated from the general fund to the Office of the Governor, Oil Spill Coordinating Office, for continued oil spill response coordination activities for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1991.

\* Sec. \_\_\_\_\_. The sum of \$244,600 is appropriated from the general fund to the Department of Labor for occupational safety and health monitoring and increased job service activity during the clean-up work associated with the Exxon Valdez oil spill for fiscal year ending June 30, 1991.

\* Sec. \_\_\_\_\_. The sum of \$1,121,200 is appropriated from the general fund to the Department of Fish and Game for additional costs of management of fish and wildlife resources and habitats, including those used for subsistence purposes, and for review of updated oil spill contingency plans, resulting from the Exxon Valdez oil spill, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1991.

\* Sec. \_\_\_\_\_. The sum of \$11,659,400 is appropriated to the Department of Fish and Game, Oil Spill Impact Assessment and Restoration Division, for assessments of natural resource damage resulting from the Exxon Valdez oil spill, as set out in 43 C.F.R. 11, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1991, from the following sources:

Federal Receipts	\$257,400
General Fund	\$11,402,000

\* Sec. \_\_\_\_\_. The sum of \$22,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs, Municipal and Regional Assistance Division for costs associated with coordinating the community oil spill socio-economic study for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1991.

2. ANWR lobbying efforts.

\* Sec. \_\_\_\_\_. The sum of \$837,900 is appropriated from the general fund to the Office of the Governor, Executive Operations, for increased advocacy efforts to open the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1991.

3. Permanent fund deposits.

\* Sec. \_\_\_\_\_. Interest on revenue from sources listed under AS 37.13.010 earned while the revenue is held in trust, escrow, or otherwise before receipt of the revenue by the state shall be appropriated to the principal of the Alaska permanent fund.

\* Sec. \_\_\_\_\_. Amounts received by the state to which AS 37.13.010(a)(2) applies, shall be deposited into the principal of the Alaska permanent fund.

\* Sec. \_\_\_\_\_. Interest earnings from deposits made to the Alaska permanent fund under AS 43.23.045 shall be deposited into the principal of the permanent fund.

4. UI Trust.

\* Sec. \_\_\_\_\_. The balance on July 1, 1990 of the employment assistance and training account in the general fund is appropriated to the unemployment compensation fund (AS 23.20.130).
