of the State Affairs Committee:

The Alaska State Hospital and Nursing Home Association supports efforts to make residential and long term care available for Alaska veterans. There is a need for this care.

The Association makes the following recommendations:

- #1. The Alaska Legislature place \$1,825,000 in the Department of Military Affairs budget for fiscal year 1992 to commence immediately to purchase long term care for veterans. (25 veterans @ \$200.00 per day x 365 days = \$1,825,000.00). That a like amount be placed in the DMV budget for residential care, bringing the total appropriation for 1992 to \$3,650,000.00
- #2. On page 2, line 10 of CSSB 44, a new section be added that reads:  
Sec. 5, AS 44.35.020 is amended by adding a new section to read:
  - A. Veterans Home Advisory Board Established. (1) There is created in the department of Military and Veterans Affairs a Veteran's Home Advisory Board composed of seven members consisting of the following persons appointed by the governor and who serve at the pleasure of the governor:
    - (2) A representative of the Department
    - (3) A representative of the Older Alaskans Commission
    - (4) A representative of the Alaska Area Native Health Service
    - (5) A representative of the office of management and budget in the Office of the Governor
    - (6) A representative of veterans' organization
    - (7) A representative of a community health care facility.
  - B. The members of the advisory board shall elect a member of the board as chair.
  - C. Board Duties. The Board Shall:

1. review the plans of the Department to establish and operate a state veterans home including the selection of the site for that home.
2. Advise the Department on making the veterans' home eligible for maximum amount of federal funds.
3. Review the impact of a veterans' home on the access of veterans to quality long term and residential care, including the number of veterans eligible for care.
4. Review the impact on the veteran in having to leave his or her home community to receive care in a veterans home and the impact on the veterans family including the cost of travel to visit the veteran.
5. Review and report to the Legislature and Governor if there will be adverse financial impact to small rural facilities or Pioneer homes if veterans care transferred to a veterans home.
6. After public notice has been given the Department and the board shall, not later than December 1 of each year, beginning in 1991, hold a public hearing on the status of the veterans home and the furnishing of health care, including residential and long term care, to veterans in the state of Alaska.
7. The Department shall transmit to the Governor and the Legislature within the first 10 days of each legislative session a report on the cost, maintenance, budget needs, and other pertinent information on the provision of health care to veterans in the state of Alaska.

We thank you for your consideration of the above recommendations.

Dear Rep. Kubina:

It is my understanding that your committee will be taking up consideration of SB 44 this afternoon at 4:00pm. I would like to suggest that the committee hold a teleconference on this bill to give communities across the state further opportunities to testify as to the both the advantages and disadvantages of the legislation. At this time I would wish to ask the following questions concerning the establishment of a Veteran's Home.

- a) How will this legislation provide greater access for Veterans to health care in their local communities?
- b) Does the legislation contemplate a facility which provides skilled nursing care, or will the facility focus on residential services, i.e., domiciliary care?
- c) As the state is already struggling with "What to Do" with the facilities and staffing at Harborview Developmental Center, wouldn't it be appropriate to include this question with the study which is to be completed in the interim, i.e., are more facilities needed at this time?
- d) Since the state desires to help Veterans with nursing care as contemplated in this legislation, why not simply appropriate the necessary funding for the utilization of existing community nursing care facilities in the communities where the veterans reside with their families and friends. Would that not be both cost-effective and provide the greatest access at the local level?
- e) Since the legislature has focused a great deal of time and energy on health care cost containment, has there been an analysis of the impact such a new facility would have on both the cost and access to care in communities across the state, and most particularly the small rural combined hospitals/nursing homes in Cordova, Kodiak, Homer, Wrangell, Petersburg, Ketchikan and Nome?



Letter to Gene Kubina

There is certainly a need to address the problems for Veterans obtaining access to long term care services. In part, the Veterans are part of a larger question of financing for institutional services. Nationally, there are presently only two major mechanisms. They are the Medicaid System and Individual Self-Pay. In Alaska there is a dilemma of coverage for those persons who because of income do not qualify for Medicaid protection. That dilemma was addressed in the early 1980's through the Medicaid state exception program. Unfortunately, the administration and legislature have been unable to fund that program since 1985.

Thank you for the opportunity to have input. I do hope that this legislation can be held over for the second session. During the interim this question should be part of all discussions with respect to the state's role and commitment to fund health care for the Veteran and for other Alaskans.

Research Request 91.045

You asked for information about the process of applying for a grant from the U.S. Veterans Administration (VA) to build a veterans home in Alaska. You also asked for an estimate of the cost of preparing the application and meeting other procedural requirements, such as obtaining a certificate of need from the State of Alaska.

This memorandum explains the application process for a grant from the VA; it summarizes State requirements for obtaining a certificate of need; it describes what might be included in a feasibility study; and it provides cost estimates for completing these documents.

As you know, an important early step in pursuing a new VA home is to undertake a feasibility study which critically assesses the need for a new facility. A study of this type is not specifically required in the VA grant application process. However, a demonstration of the feasibility of a proposed facility (i.e., proof it is needed and would be economically efficient) is the essence of State of Alaska requirements for obtaining a certificate of need. Furthermore, the VA requires a state to appropriate half of its 35 percent share of the project cost early in the grant application process. A credible feasibility study justifying the need for a veterans home would encourage legislative support for this appropriation.

A complete feasibility study that includes an analysis of the present and future supply and demand of residential and nursing care beds, conceptual design work, and analysis of the financial feasibility of the facility, would cost approximately \$200,000. A feasibility study that primarily addresses the supply and demand for institutional care of this type (a needs assessment) would cost approximately \$50,000.

requirements, using its own staff, in an afternoon.<sup>4</sup> The VA then reviews the preapplication and notifies the state if it appears to be eligible for the grant.

Once the preapplication has been submitted, up to 65 percent of further project costs (including a feasibility study) may be reimbursed under the grant if it is awarded. Therefore, it is important to submit the preapplication before completing detailed studies.

### Application Phase

Although detailed studies must be submitted during the application phase, they are not required for the initial application deadline of August 1. According to Mr. Baker, a state should not have to hire an architect or engineer until its application has been approved. Once the grant is approved, the VA requires submission of specific documents: application forms (SF 424, 424C, and 424D), an updated space program, a letter from the state historic preservation office stating whether the site meets criteria for the National Register of Historic Places, a site plan, design development drawings, a design development outline specification, and design development cost estimates (38 CFR 17.181). An environmental assessment is also required for facilities greater than 75,000 square feet (38 CFR 17.173).

Mr. Baker estimates that the cost of constructing a veterans home is about \$82,000 per bed and that about ten percent of this cost would be used for studies and architectural plans. Experience shows the cost of construction in Alaska may be higher. About 25 percent of the \$10,000,000 cost of the Juneau Pioneers' Home can be attributed to architectural, engineering, and inspection costs. About two percent of the total project costs were associated with initial planning expenses.<sup>5</sup> The Juneau Pioneers' Home cost about \$185,000 per bed.<sup>6</sup>

The VA requires that the state meet certain standards before receiving a grant: the state must operate the facility; sufficient funds must be available to maintain, operate and repair it; the facility must include domiciliary and/or nursing home care beds; and 75 percent of the bed occupants must be veterans. The remaining 25 percent of the beds may be occupied by wives or widows of

Applications for a CON are more likely to be denied for long-term care facilities (nursing homes) than for other types of health care facilities. Nursing homes are expensive to build and require substantial government subsidy to operate. Because a high percentage of long-term health care services is paid by a third party, and not directly by the consumer, traditional economic regulators may not function properly. As a result, it is possible that without some governmental review, such as the CON process, more health care facilities would be constructed than necessary.

The cost of preparing a CON for a veterans home can vary. It depends on the size of the facility, on whether or not the entire cost of the facility or only the state's 35 percent contribution for the project is to be considered, and on the percentage of the facility dedicated to nursing home care beds.<sup>10</sup> Arlene Brobald, an administrative manager for a nursing home in Anchorage, estimates that a private consulting firm would charge from \$6,000 - \$10,000 to prepare an application.<sup>11</sup> We contacted two health care consultants with experience in Alaska who estimated the application for a CON for a veterans home would cost between \$10,000 - \$20,000. An Anchorage-based consultant, Bill Dan, estimates that a CON for a veterans home would cost approximately \$10,000.<sup>12</sup> Lynn Grow, a consultant from Yakima, Washington estimates the cost at \$15,000 - \$20,000 for a new facility such as a veterans home.<sup>13</sup> If the feasibility study described below was already completed, the costs should be less than the foregoing estimates.

#### FEASIBILITY STUDY

It is reasonable and prudent to complete a general feasibility study after submitting a preapplication to the VA and before preparing a CON application. Although a feasibility study is not specifically required, information from such a study could be used during the application process for a VA grant and for a state CON. If a need exists for a veterans home, a feasibility study would indicate the optimum size and configuration of the home. Because some health care professionals question the need for a veterans home in Alaska, a credible feasibility study justifying the need for a home would also enhance the chance of an appropriation passing the legislature.

the number of veterans not currently in a home who would be interested in living in the domiciliary portion of a veterans home;

the willingness of veterans to relocate to a centrally-located facility;

waiting lists for nursing home beds in pioneers' homes and vacant beds in community nursing homes;<sup>20</sup>

demographic projections of the future senior population and likely percentage of veterans who would use a home; and

the effect on community nursing homes if a veterans home were to be constructed.<sup>21</sup>

Should a need for a veterans home be established, it would be helpful if the feasibility study would determine:

the optimum number of nursing home care and domiciliary beds needed;

the approximate cost of constructing such a home;

the costs to the State of operating a veterans home;<sup>22</sup> and

alternatives to constructing a centrally-located veterans home (e.g., home-based services or veterans home wings in existing facilities such as community nursing homes or pioneers' homes).<sup>23</sup>

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between \$25,000 - \$60,000 depending on the level of detail required. A more in-depth, site-specific study might cost up to \$200,000.

The State could apply for a VA grant before a feasibility study is completed or wait until a such a study establishes the need for a veterans home. A positive response from the VA on the preapplication, however, should not be interpreted as an irrefutable need for a veterans home. The VA considers only the demand for nursing home care in state-owned homes (excess capacity in private and municipal nursing homes is not considered). In other words, the waiting lists for Alaska pioneers' homes could be used to show a need for a veterans home, while the number of unoccupied beds in private and municipal nursing homes could indicate that there is no present need for a new veterans home.

Although the regulations may imply otherwise, VA personnel state that information needed for the August 1 application deadline can be gathered by existing State personnel and therefore should involve few costs. To be considered for the priority 1 category, however, the legislature would need to appropriate 17.5 percent of the estimated cost of the veterans home. Information about the size and costs of the home would have to be estimated if the application is submitted before completion of the feasibility study.

Estimates for the cost of obtaining a certificate of need range between \$6,000 and \$20,000. It may be best to wait for the results of the feasibility study before completing the certificate for three reasons: information resulting from a feasibility study could help justify the need for a veterans home; information from the study could be used for the CON application and thereby reduce its cost; and, should the study not support the need for a veterans home, funds will not be spent needlessly.

FISCAL NOTE TO CSSB 44 (FIN)  
DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AND VETERANS AFFAIRS  
May 14, 1991

This fiscal note was prepared relying on information provided by the Division of Pioneer Benefits. There has not been sufficient time to perform an independent and thorough analysis of the impact of this bill on DMVA, and further in depth study may require adjustments to the projected operating costs of a state veterans home.

This fiscal note is based on the following assumptions:

1. Any funding to construct a state veterans home would be the subject of a separate appropriation bill or an appropriation in a capital budget bill. Capital costs are not shown in this fiscal note because the bill is authorizing legislation only.
2. Testimony to date for this bill has assumed a state veterans home the approximate size of the Juneau Pioneers Home, with 32 nursing beds and 20 residential beds. Construction costs for such a home would be approximately \$3,000,000 state funds and \$5,570,000 federal funds.
3. For ease of understanding this fiscal note, the assumed start-up operating date of a state veterans home is July 1, 1993 (i.e., FY94). If capital funds were appropriated in the 1991 legislative session, the actual start-up date could be as soon as April 1, 1993.
4. In the event that capital funds are appropriated in the 1991 legislative session for construction of a state veterans home, DMVA would request that some of those capital funds be used to fund the administrative costs of overseeing the design of the home, and to prepare the requests for proposals to operate the home under contract. These expenses would be from the capital budget appropriation, if there is one, and are not shown on this fiscal note.

The attached letter from Barbara Bathony, the Director of the Division of Pioneer Benefits, provides an estimate of the normal annual operating costs of the state veterans home being proposed, if the operation of the home were contracted out to the maximum extent possible. This letter is used as the basis of the DMVA fiscal note, with the following exceptions for the reasons noted:

1. Because of the lack of a health care infrastructure of professionals in DMVA, we will need the administrative person charged with monitoring the contract with the health care organization running the veterans home to be at least an Admin Officer, with an increase in cost of \$15,000 per year.
2. We foresee a need to draw on the expertise in the Division of Pioneer Benefits a great deal in the establishment, start-up, and continued operation of the veterans home. This will require a reimbursable services agreement, at a rough estimated cost of \$20,000 per year. The RSA for this purpose would be charged to the capital budget for the first two years, until the veterans home was operational.
3. Travel costs are expected to be higher than indicated in Ms. Bathony's letter because of the need for the Veterans Affairs director and Administrative Officer to visit Juneau a few times each year to consult with the Division of Pioneer Benefits on operation of the veterans home.

4. Federal operating revenue projections are based on per diem paid by Department of Veterans Affairs (32 nursing residents @ \$22/day; 20 domiciliary residents @ \$9/day)

5. State operating revenue projections are based on collecting room rent from residents based on charges of \$800/month for nursing beds, and \$525/month for residential beds. Based on experience of Pioneers Homes, it is assumed that approximately 80% of the possible revenue can be collected due to vacancies and inability to pay.

This letter is in response to your request to calculate the cost projections for the operation of the Veterans Home in Palmer under full management contract. This would include the labor, all professional and other subcontracts, all supplies, except building maintenance and capital expenditures.

The cost reductions are based on the savings of about 19% in the food service/laundry/housekeeping section, a savings of about 10% in the cost of nurses aides and office personnel, an increase of 15% for the Administrator, and an increase in the cost of licensed nursing personnel. All costs are based on FY 1992.

## 28. Indian Health Service Eligibility Regulations

### *Findings*

- 64,000 Alaska Natives currently are eligible to receive primary and acute health care services from the Indian Health Service (IHS).
- New Indian Health Service eligibility regulations, if implemented in Alaska, could mean that more than 10,000 Alaska Natives will not be eligible for IHS care.
- In response to concerns voiced from Alaska and other affected regions, Congress imposed a temporary one-year moratorium on implementation of the new regulations; the moratorium will end September 30, 1988; Congress is expected to enact an additional moratorium of 1-3 years.

### *Recommendation*

The Governor should urge Congress to make permanent the temporary moratorium on implementation of the new Indian Health Service eligibility regulations in Alaska.

The Indian Health Service has promulgated new eligibility regulations regarding tribal enrollment and access to care limited to the region of enrollment.

The Commission shares the deep concerns of the Native people across Alaska regarding these new eligibility regulations. It is apparent that these new regulations are generally ill-conceived and were developed with little regard to their impact when applied in Alaska. The respective local Alaska Area Directors of both the IHS and the Bureau of Indian Affairs have joined this criticism and pointed out that the new regulations will likely lead to the arbitrary cut-off of tens of thousands of Alaska Natives, regardless of the circumstance of medical need, in derogation of the federal government's trust responsibility. In addition, these eligibility changes would have a large impact on the state's Medicaid and General Relief Medical budgets.

In response to nationwide concerns, Congress has imposed a temporary, one-year moratorium

on implementation of the regulations. The Commission recommends that the Governor urge Congress to make this moratorium permanent. If new provisions are warranted that would affect the eligibility of Alaska Natives and other Native Americans for those health care services which form a core element of the federal government's trust responsibility, Congress alone should consider how such a major shift in that trust

responsibility is to be crafted, and should do so only after having extensive hearings in Alaska and all other affected areas of the country.

**Cost:** Changing the IHS eligibility regulations would force those Alaska Natives affected by the changes to pay for care now provided by the IHS. Some of these people qualify for Medicaid or General Relief Medical. Keeping the current eligibility regulations would save money for those affected by the proposed changes and for the state.

**Implementation:** The Governor should convey the state's opposition to changing IHS eligibility to the Alaska Congressional delegation.

## 29. Veterans Administration Policy

### *Findings*

- Anchorage has sufficient hospital beds to meet the future demand of all patients. The addition of new beds by the Veterans Administration (VA) will drive up the cost of health care for all payors.
- Alaska veterans receive nursing care in the state for only six months; after this period, they must leave the state to continue receiving

nursing coverage from the VA. This policy causes disruption in care and hardship for families.

### *Recommendation*

The state should encourage the Veterans Administration to change the following plans and policies:

The policy of providing nursing care for veterans in Alaska for only six months; and

plans to add new Veterans Administration hospital beds in Anchorage.

*Update: In May 1988, the Veterans Administration confirmed that it will not build a hospital in Alaska; nor will it be a major participant in a hospital modernization project at Elmendorf Air Force Base.*

There are no Veterans Administration nursing facilities in Alaska; as a result, veterans who need nursing care for more than six months must move out of the state. Veterans should be able to obtain nursing care in or near their home communities. Alaska has enough nursing beds to meet the needs of veterans. The VA should change its policy to buy bed space in Alaska facilities for longer than six months.

The VA has proposed adding new hospital beds in Anchorage, although Anchorage has sufficient hospital beds to meet demand. The most effective use of resources is for the VA to use existing beds in non-VA facilities, not to add new beds. Additional beds will lower the occupancy rates of Anchorage hospitals, driving up costs.

*Implementation:* The Governor and the Legislature should convey the state's opposition to the construction of new VA hospital beds in Anchorage to the Alaska congressional delegation and the VA.

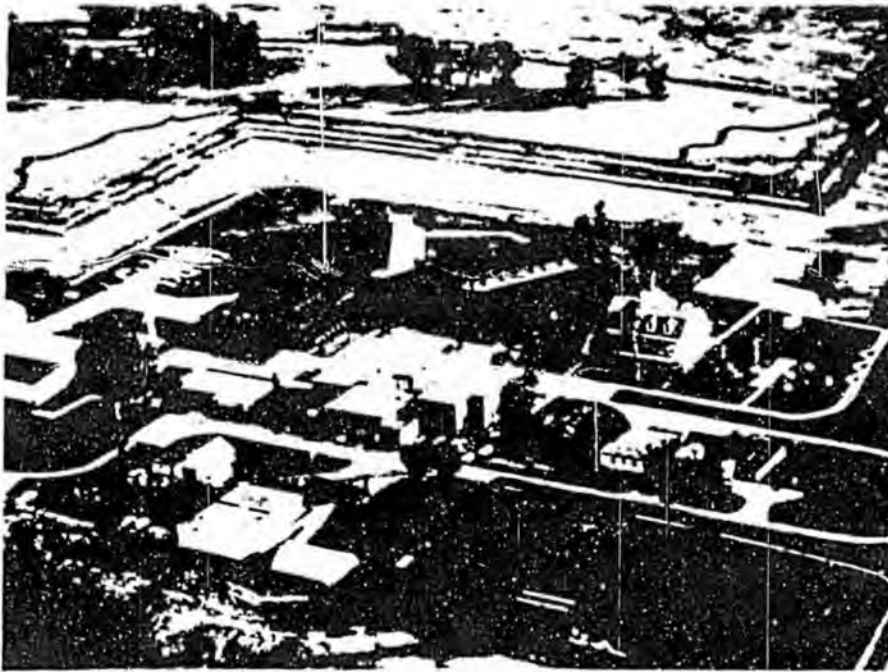

# VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

- I. The VA promotes the care and treatment of veterans in state veterans' homes as one means to attain the goal of developing and maintaining the highest possible quality of patient care with an appropriate scope of services to meet the eligible veteran's health care needs. Two programs are established as follows:

## GRANTS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF STATE HOME FACILITIES

This program is authorized by Title 38 U.S.C. 5031-5037. The objective is to assist the several states to construct or acquire state home facilities for furnishing domiciliary or nursing home care to veterans, and to expand, remodel or alter existing buildings for furnishing domiciliary, nursing home, or hospital care to veterans in state homes. Project grants are made by the VA which may not exceed 65 per centum of the estimated cost of construction including the provision of initial equipment for any such building.

## PAYMENTS TO STATE HOMES

This program is authorized by Title 38 U.S.C. 641-643. The objective is to assist the states in providing for the care and treatment of eligible veterans in recognized state veterans' homes which meet such standards as the VA Administrator shall prescribe. Per diem payments are made by the VA for domiciliary, nursing home, and hospital care provided to eligible veterans at rates prescribed by law but not exceed one-half of the cost of veterans' care in such state homes.

# VETERANS ADMINISTRATION STATE HOME PROGRAM

## Questions & Answers

1. What is a State Home?

The term "State Home" means a home established by a State for veterans disabled by age, disease, or otherwise, who by reason of such disability are incapable of earning a living. It also includes a home which furnishes nursing home care for such veterans.

2. Can a State Home furnish more than one level of care?

Yes. A State Home may furnish domiciliary, nursing home and hospital levels of care. A home which furnishes more than one level of care must provide such care in clearly designated areas within the home so that the levels of care are not intermingled.

3. Who establishes a State Home?

The establishment, control, and administration of a State home is the responsibility of the State which it serves.

4. How is a State Home established?

Generally, veteran service organizations and interested State officials encourage the State legislature to enact legislation for establishment of a State Veterans Home and to appropriate funds for its operation.

5. What assistance from VA is available in the establishment of a State Home?

a. The VA will provide guidance and consult with representatives of the State to insure that the facility will meet regulations for VA recognition and Federal aid payments under provision of Title 38 U.S.C. 641 (as amended).

b. The VA cannot participate in the cost of land.

6. Can a building in an existing State facility be approved as a State Home?

A building or buildings in an existing facility may qualify provided that they are established and operated as a separate entity (State Home). It is permissible to purchase services, i.e., dietetic, engineering, laundry, and professional care from an existing facility.

7. Can a facility providing only hospital care be recognized by VA as a State Home?

No. A State Home must provide primarily domiciliary and/or nursing home care for veterans.

8. What are the veteran admission requirements to a State Home?

a. Admission requirements are determined by the State.

b. Following admission, an "Application for Medical Benefits", VA Form 10-10, is forwarded to the VA to establish a veterans eligibility for payment of VA per diem.

9. What Federal funds are available to a State for the operation of a State Home?

Under provisions of Title 38 U.S.C. 641, the VA participates by making per diem payments to the States for the three levels of care furnished veterans as follows:

a. Domiciliary Care - up to one-half of the cost of care not to exceed \$8.70 per day.

b. Nursing Home Care - up to one-half of the cost of care not to exceed \$20.35 per day.

c. Hospital Care - up to one-half of the cost of care not to exceed \$20.35 per day.

10. Can the State assess or charge veterans for the cost of their care?

Yes. The state operated facility may establish a maintenance charge system and collect from the pension, compensation, or other income of veterans.

11. Is there a limit on the amount collected from veterans?

No. However, income collected from veterans is subtracted from the total allowable costs during fiscal verifications. VA aid payments may not exceed this difference nor may VA aid payments exceed one-half the aggregate cost of maintaining veterans in a home.

12. If a veteran in a State Home requires hospitalization in a VA facility, can VA continue per diem payments?

No. VA per diem payments are not made if a veteran in a State Home is transferred to a VA Medical Center for hospital care or to a non-VA hospital at VA expense.

\*Provision - VA per diem payments are continued up to 96 hours for a veteran transferred from a State Home to a hospital at non-VA expense.

13. Can the VA participate with States in the construction or acquisition of State Home facilities?

Yes. Under Title 38 U.S.C. 5031-5037 (as amended) the VA is authorized to participate in up to 65% of the cost of acquisition and construction of new domiciliary or nursing home buildings, and/or the expansion, remodeling, or alteration of existing domiciliary, nursing or hospital care buildings, provided VA standards and regulations are met. Acquisition and renovation costs may not exceed the cost of construction of an equivalent new facility.

b. Such cost may include architect fees, supervision, inspection, cost of final audit, and initial equipment not to exceed 10 percent of the cost of construction.

c. The VA may not participate in projects for maintenance and repair except as they are involved inextricably in remodeling patient care areas.

14. Can the VA reimburse a State for the Federal share of completed construction project? What are the conditions?

Yes, providing the VA receives a preapplication/application and approves all bid documents (drawings and specifications) before construction begins or early in the construction phase.

15. How can a state obtain VA regulations, instruction and application forms for construction projects?

16. Is there a limit on the number of beds that can be constructed with VA participation?

Yes. Nursing home care beds cannot exceed 4 beds per 1,000 veteran population in the State. The State must provide justification, acceptable to the Administrator, for nursing home beds in excess of 2 1/2 per 1,000 veteran population of a State. Domiciliary beds cannot exceed 2 beds per 1,000 veteran population in the State.

17. Who is responsible for a construction project?

The State is primarily responsible.

The State employs an architect and submits plans for review and approval by the VA prior to awarding the contract. During construction, which is supervised by the State, reimbursement claims may be submitted to the VA for payment based on incurred costs.

18. May other than veterans occupy facilities constructed under Title 38 U.S.C. 5031-5037.

Yes. Twenty-five percent (25%) of the bed occupants at any one time may be veteran related family members, i.e. spouses, surviving spouses, and or gold star parents who are not entitled to payment of VA aid. When a State home accepts grant assistance for a construction project, 75% of the bed occupants at the facility must be veterans.

19. How are construction grants awarded?

The VA establishes a priority list of applications on August 15 for funding the next Fiscal Year beginning October 1. After the appropriation for the construction grant program, projects will be funded from the priority list until Federal funds are spent.

20. What is the first priority on the August 15 list?

First priority is accorded to applications for which States have provided sufficient State funds so that the project may proceed upon award of the grant without further State action being required to make such funds available.

21. Is there a deadline for consideration for the August 15 priority list?

Yes. Applications must be received by August 1.

22. What are "sufficient" funds for purposes of being ranked in priority 1? Are there other requirements for being ranked in priority 1?

"Sufficient" funds are at least one-half of the State's 35 percent matching share. These funds must be available and a letter from an authorized State official is required stating that these funds are available, that no further State action is required to make these funds available, and how long the funds will remain available. A copy of the approved legislation appropriating the funds for the specific project must accompany the certification.

23. What are the other priority categories?

Second priority is accorded to States which have not received a construction or acquisition grant; third priority is based on an unmet need of 91 to 100 percent; fourth priority is based on an unmet need of 0 to 90 percent; fifth priority is hospital renovations; and sixth priority is hospital expansion. Hospitals cannot be assigned values for ranking on the priority list.

24. Where can I find the Federal regulations for the priority system?

Title 38, Code of Federal Regulations, 17.170 through 17.177.

## THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF STATE VETERANS HOMES

DEFINITION: The term "state home" means a home established by a state primarily for veterans disabled by age, disease, or otherwise, who by reason of such disability, are incapable of earning a living, and who require domiciliary care, nursing home care, and hospital care (or treatment). States operating such homes, which meet VA standards and are recognized by the Administrator of Veterans Affairs, are eligible to receive VA per diem payments for each eligible veteran provided care. Also, the state may receive up to 65% VA funding for construction or acquisition of state home facilities.

PURPOSE: The National Association of State Veterans Homes was conceived at a New England organizational meeting in 1952 because of a mutual need of state homes to: (1) promote legislation on the national level and (2) share common problems and experiences.

BACKGROUND: Following the Civil War, large numbers of indigent and disabled soldiers and sailors, who were no longer able to earn their own livelihood, needed care. The federal government operated national homes for disabled volunteer soldiers providing domiciliary care and hospital care, but were unable to meet the demand for care and only veterans who served for the Union forces were eligible. In recognition of this need, a number of states established state homes for the care of disabled soldiers and sailors at state expense because of the debt which a grateful state owed its defenders.

To further preserve the family unit, several of the state homes admit wives, widows, and dependents of veterans -- a program not yet adopted by the Veterans Administration. An increasing number of states have established homes and several of them operate more than one home in their state for the convenience of the veterans. Today, state homes are the second largest providers of medical care to veterans. Last year the Association furnished over four million days of care in fifty-one homes located in thirty-four states.

The first enactment to provide for payment of federal aid (\$100 per year) to such states was on August 7, 1888, which authorized a federal sharing of costs to alleviate the burden upon state taxation. With the establishment of the Veterans Administration in 1930 and the large number of World War II veterans, this program was expanded to three levels of care, increased per diem payments, and federal funding for construction of facilities.

### ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

1. The efforts of the Association since 1952 have resulted in legislation to increase the federal reimbursements and reimbursement rates to states for care provided.
2. There has been more liberalized federal participation in the cost of construction of state home facilities.
3. The Association is a medium through which common problems and experiences can be shared on a nation-wide basis resulting in better services and better care throughout the country.
4. There has been an improved relationship between the Veterans Administration, the Congress, and the state home officials.

GOALS: The Association recognizes the rapid increase in the age of our veteran population and that the Veterans Administration may not be able to provide adequate care for the elderly veteran. Our Association has adopted the following goals:

1. To provide appropriate quality care services to eligible disabled and elderly veterans and their dependents in state veterans homes.
2. To provide a clearing house for techniques and expertise in the care of veterans and the management of our institutions.
3. To ensure solidarity in the presentation of our requirements to the Congress and the VA and of their responsibility of meeting these needs.
4. To encourage continued financial participation of the Federal Government in the construction of state home facilities and the care of veterans in state homes.
5. To encourage and assist other states to establish new state homes.
