One three-day exam, 8 hours per day. The proctor fee is \$10 per hour x 8 hours = \$80 x 3 days = \$240;

The proposed amendment would delete AS 08.48.331 (13) which was added to SB 110 in the House Labor and Commerce Committee Substitute:

Proposed amendment to CS CS SB 110 (L&C):
Section 13, located on Page 12, Lines 11 - 12
[delete section in its entirety]

The remaining exemptions provide adequate scope for exemptions related to architectural landscaping. We have discussed this change with the original sponsor of Section 13, Representative Norm Rokeberg, Chair, House Labor and Commerce Committee and he has indicated that he is satisfied with this deletion.

Re: "Landscape Architect Licensure Amendment"
House CS for CS for Senate Bill 110 (L&C)

At its February 13, 1998 board meeting, the AELS Board recommended deletion of AS 08.48.331(13) contained in the above-referenced proposed legislation. This provision exempts the following activities from the licensing laws:

"(13) a person designing or preparing plans and specifications for the person's own use with respect to property owned by the person."


This exemption is too broad in that it would exempt a business' preparation of structural engineering and architectural plans and specifications for that business' retail or commercial building provided it was located on the business' real property. The exemption, thus, is not restricted to landscaping plans. Such an exemption would expose the public to serious health and safety risks. We do not believe this was the intended purpose of this exemption.

It is important to note that the exemption set forth in AS 08.48.331(10) covers "business owned" property and activities and it expressly prohibits exemption where "buildings or structures whose primary use is public occupancy" are involved. The proposed exemption (13) is not similarly limited.

We propose that exemption (13) be deleted in its entirety. We believe that the other exemptions provide adequate scope for exemptions related to architectural landscaping.





Subject: Request to schedule SB 110.

I would appreciate your consideration in scheduling SB 110, relating to the licensure of landscape architects, before the House Labor and Commerce Committee. I have attached a packet of information which includes a brief sponsor statement, fiscal note and many letters of support.

In order for Alaskan landscape architects to secure federal projects the state must provide landscape architect licensing capabilities. Alaskan landscape architects are currently excluded from participating in securing these federal jobs and these moneys are going to companies located outside of this state. For example, two recent lucrative projects not available to Alaskans were the redesign of the Starrigavan Campground outside Sitka and the redesign of the Mendenhall Lake Campground out of Juneau. This legislation will provide the state with another tool to support the hire of Alaskan workers and companies.

Licensed landscape architects require minimum standards for protection in the design of playgrounds for our children, design of pedestrian paths and bridges and in all types of site development. By combining development projects with health, safety and environmental design, landscape architecture is instrumental in eliminating the negative aspects of potential development projects.

The fiscal note indicates that in accordance with AS 08.01.065, all licensees are required to pay the costs of regulating their profession; Section 3 (included in Page 2) of the L&C CS provides that the Board of Registration for Architects, Engineers and Land Surveyors will pay fees to cover the costs identified in the fiscal note. This program will be paid entirely by General Fund - Designated Program Receipts. *Your consideration of this request for scheduling SB 110 would be greatly appreciated.*

SPONSOR STATEMENT- SENATOR MACKIE
SB 110 - "AN ACT RELATING TO LICENSURE OF LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTS."

SB 110 proposes to amend AS 08.48.011(a) by adding landscape architects to the current State Board of Registration for Architects, Engineers, and Land Surveyors; landscape architects work professionally side by side with these other state registered design disciplines on a daily basis.

Although 45 states currently require such licensing, there are no licensure requirements in the State of Alaska. Similar to architects and engineers, landscape architects must attend accredited universities which are accredited by their national organization (American Society of Landscape Architects) which has rigid accreditation criteria.

Landscape architects provide for the design for improvements of major public facilities, in all types of site development, commercial development and housing. Licensed landscape architects require minimum standards for the protection of public health and safety in the design of playgrounds where safety of children must be guaranteed, the design of bike trails that recognize frozen soil considerations that meet codes for accessibility and safety, the design of landscapes along roadways where roadside safety of motorists must be assured in the advent of an accident and also the design of wetland treatments of storm water runoff.

In order for Alaskan landscape architects to secure federal projects, the state must provide landscape architect licensing capabilities. Alaskan landscape architects are currently excluded from participating in securing these federal jobs and these moneys are going to companies located outside of the state. SB 110 would level the playing field for Alaskans competing for federal work performed in this state, thus helping to ensure that moneys spent for design of Alaskan facilities will be utilized by businesses and professionals who reside in our state.

Licensing requirements would ensure that individuals providing these professional services are licensed by the State of Alaska and would give landscape architects their due recognition as qualified professionals for the design and development of the outdoor environment. By combining development projects with health, safety, and environmental design, landscape architecture is instrumental in eliminating the negative aspects of potential development projects.

The new 1998 fiscal note reflects that all licensees are required to pay the costs of regulating their profession; Section 3 provides that the Board of Registration for Architects, Engineers and Land Surveyors will pay fees to cover costs in this fiscal note. This legislation does not add a permanent, voting landscape architect to the board and will meet our intent to have a landscape architect as a resource person during the initial regulations process, but not on a permanent basis.

You have asked how users of landscape architectural services would be affected by CSSB 110(L&C)am and whether individuals or small businesses who have "landscaping businesses" would have to be registered if the bill is enacted into law.

In answer to the first part of your question, I do not see anything in the bill that relates to the users of landscape architectural services. Only the provider of the service has the duty to register and would be in violation of the law if not registered (and not exempt).

In answer to the second part of your question, an individual or business that practices landscape architecture would have to become registered if the law passes and the board determines that the individual's or business' practice includes aspects of landscape architecture that affect the public health or safety. I do not understand the statement in your memo that says "it is not [the sponsor's] intention to prevent homeowners gardening [sic] or small businesses from continuing the status quo [of not being registered]." Maybe I'm missing something in the definition of "practice of landscape architecture" or maybe the definition is missing something, but if individuals and businesses that practice aspects of landscape architecture are not covered by this bill, then I guess I don't know who is. The "public health or safety" provision in AS 08.48.331(b) will cover only some people, but it is not clear who will be covered.

It could be the definition that needs work, rather than the list of exemptions.

You have requested a legal analysis of the effect of the change made in sec. 26 of SB 110 by the Senate floor amendment, which replaced the old language with the following:

The requirement to be registered as a landscape architect under this chapter only applies to a person who practices an aspect of landscape architecture that the board has determined affects the public health or safety.

The "old language" was as follows:

The requirement to be registered as a landscape architect under this chapter does not apply to a person who practices only an aspect of landscape architecture that the board has determined does not affect the public health, safety, or welfare.

There are two changes of note: (1) deletion of the word "welfare," and (2) reversal of the process for determining whether a person must register or not.

The deletion of the term "welfare" may or may not have a significant practical effect, depending on how the board would have chosen to interpret the term. Arguably, the public welfare is fairly synonymous with health and safety concerns. But, to the extent that "welfare" implies improvement rather than just prevention of problems, "welfare" was, arguably, broader than "health and safety", so the deletion of "welfare" may have affected the size of the category being described. That is, there may have been practices of landscape architecture that would have been regulated under the old sec. 26 because of their effect on public welfare that will not be regulated under the new sec. 26 because the board will decide that a health or safety concern is not involved.

The second change is probably the more significant of the two. In reversing the language from "does not apply [if] does not affect" to "only applies [if does] affect," the language creates a situation where no registration will be required for landscape architecture until the board determines that there's an effect on public health or safety. The old language required everyone practicing landscape architecture, as defined in the bill, to register unless exempted by the board. Under the new language, the board will have to act (presumably by regulations, or will it be ad hoc case-by-case?) in order for there to be any registration requirement for anyone. Under the old language, the law set the registration requirement, and the board would have had to act to delineate exemption categories. Essentially, the new language leaves it up to the board to decide whether SB 110 will have any effect in this area and who it will affect.

I have some doubts about whether a court will find that there has been sufficient legislative guidance to the board under the new language so as to avoid improper delegation of legislative power. Under the new language, the board must act to give the law any meaning at all. Without action by the board, the legislature's apparent intent to require at least someone to be registered can be totally thwarted.

Additionally, under the new language, there may be public confusion about whether registration is necessary or not. The law will be on the books indicating a registration requirement, but, since sec. 26 makes that requirement dependent on board action, people will be needing to check regularly as to whether the board has determined that any aspects of landscape architecture are actually subject to the registration requirement.

Let me know if you have further questions about this issue.

Legal Response to this memo follows.

Yesterday the House Labor and Commerce Committee took up CSSB110(L&C) am, Version 0-LS0634V.a committee members raised a number of concerns that need to be analyzed and resolved.

Based on your conversation with Shirley Armstrong on 2/2/98, you indicated that the Halford Senate floor amendment changed more than just changing Section 26 on page 12, from a negative to a positive statement and that a substantive change had been made with regard to the total exemption from registration except in cases of public health or safety to a board decision.

The committee members have requested a legal opinion on what Section 26 actually does now that it has been amended and what it did before the amendment. A discussion of who is not required to register would be helpful. Additionally, Representative Hudson has requested that the opinion also include a discussion of how users of landscape services will be impacted and under what circumstances will they be required to use registered landscape architects.

In addition the committee wants to make absolutely sure that individuals or small businesses who have landscaping businesses do not have to register for a license and are not prevented from continuing their businesses. For example many nurseries provide a number of services contained in the definition of landscape architect i.e. advice, consultation, design, etc. to members of the public on landscaping problems and design, the sponsor of the legislation has indicated it is not his intention to prevent homeowners gardening or small businesses from continuing the status quo.

Please prepare an amendment for the Labor and Commerce Committee, the bill will be up again 2/4/98:

1. Clarification language stating who is exempted by Section 26.
2. A definition of the term "affects public health or safety" used by the State of Alaska.
3. Addition of an exemption (11) revegetation, restoration, reclamation, rehabilitation or erosion control for disturbed land.
4. Addition of an exemption (12) for maintaining and directing the placement plant material.
5. Addition of an exemption (13) for property owners who design, prepare plans and specifications for their own use.



Enclosed is an amendment you requested for SB 110. It addresses items 3 - 5 at the bottom of your memorandum.

The language in paragraph (11), added by the amendment, is problematical. What is "disturbed land?" Without further definition, it could be argued that any land that a person digs in or walks on is disturbed. This exemption seems to vitiate most of the aspects of the definition of landscape architecture identified in (17)(A), (C) and (D) on page 12 of the bill.

The language in paragraph (12), added by the amendment, is also problematical. The definition of landscape architecture specifically includes "maintaining...plantings." If you do not wish for this activity to be covered, why not remove the term from the definition on page 12?

The language of paragraph (13), added by the amendment, overlaps with the exemption already provided in paragraph (6)(A) on page 11 of the bill. Maybe the language in (6)(A) should be expanded to property owned by a person rather than occupied by the person, and include more than single-family residences. Is paragraph (13) supposed to be limited to landscaping or should it be general (as is)?

I have not included item 1 from the bottom of your memo in the enclosed amendment because I do not know how you wish to clarify section 26. I need further instructions.

I have not included item 2 in the amendment because I have not found any definition "used by the State of Alaska" for the term "affects public health or safety." The phrase "public health or safety" occurs twice in the Alaska Statutes (AS 27.21.240 and AS 39.90.140), in both places undefined. I also looked for separate definitions of "public health" and "public safety" and found none.

Page 10, Line 26

(2) workers in building trades crafts, earthwork, groundskeeping, nursery operations, superintendents, supervisors, or inspectors in the performance of their customary duties.

(Note: This should address much of Rep. Cowdery's concern about those in the trades)

Page 11, Line 9

(6) a person preparing drawings or specifications for

(A) a building for the person's own use and occupancy as a single family residence and related site work for that building;

(B) farm or ranch buildings and their grounds, unless public health, safety, or welfare is involved;

(C) a building and its grounds that is intended to be used only as a residence by not more than four families and that is not more than two stories high;

(D) a garage, workshop, or similar building and its grounds that contains less than 2,000 square feet of floor space to be used for a private noncommercial purpose;

(Note: These changes should also assist in addressing Rep. Cowdery's concerns.)

Page 11, Line 23

(8) a person furnishing drawings, specifications, instruments of service or other data for alterations or repairs to a building or its grounds that do not change or affect the structural system or the safety of the building, or that do not affect the public health, safety, or welfare;

(Note: These changes should also assist in addressing Rep. Cowdery's concerns.)

Page 12, Line 6

(b) The requirement to be registered as a landscape architect under this chapter applies only to the definition of landscape architecture as it affects the public health and safety within public rights-of-way, on school grounds, on public lands, or on sites that provide for public access except as otherwise exempted.

(Note: This makes this requirement parallel to Page 11, Line 23 above. The determination may then be made by administrative regulation, by the AELS Board, or by a court of law, as appropriate, just as is applicable to the other professions.)

Also, add:

(c) The requirement to be registered as a landscape architect under this chapter does not apply to those in revegetation and reclamation work acting within their technical or formal training in the earth or biological sciences. Neither shall this act be construed to prohibit those engaged in nursery occupations or as gardeners or landscape contractors from preparing planting plans and items incidental thereto provided the project scope does not jeopardize the public health and safety. The USDA Forest Service, until recently, was the largest employer of landscape architects in the country. Such is no longer the case due to recent budget and personnel cutbacks.

Landscape architects in the Forest Service have primary responsibility for overseeing the planning, design, and construction of recreation sites and facilities in the National Forests in Alaska, as elsewhere. They also have primary responsibility for assessing the potential visual impacts of proposed projects and, when needed, developing visual simulations to display these impacts for managers and the public.

It has been common for the last few years to contract out design and construction document preparation for the rehabilitation of existing facilities and the development of new facilities. Contracting regulations, as well as the inherent need to ensure designs are functional, safe, and meet codes, and simulations are pictorially and spatially accurate, lead selection teams to contractors with licensed professionals. The lack of professional licensing of landscape architects in Alaska has contributed to our contracting with landscape architect firms outside the State for such lucrative projects as the recent redesign of Starrigavan Campground outside Sitka and the redesign of Mendenhall Lake Campground outside Juneau. For information, Alaska is one of only five states in the country which does not license landscape architect professionals.



Dear Senator Mackie:

I urge you and the Finance Committee to approve SB 110 and move it on for final adoption. It is likely that most citizens are unaware of the expectations and capabilities of landscape architects. I suspect most folks just think of them as glorified gardeners. However, I have worked with several landscape architects and this is far from the case. Landscape architects take training that is every bit as complex and challenging as that of architects and engineers and their work is every bit as crucial for successful development and safe facilities as the work of the other disciplines.

The practice of landscape architecture must address human and vehicular safety as well as the proper functioning of the site and its improvements. An LA produces plans upon which contractors must bid and upon which contracts are signed. Such plans, just as those of a building, must be clear and reliable so that materials may be purchased, work scheduled, machines made available at the right time, and so that work in the field can proceed. A poorly drawn plan will waste money and create confusion. The LA's clients, including public clients, depend on good plans in order to achieve their objectives. Most important of all, the LA puts his or her name on plans for which human and vehicular safety is a vital concern.

There is a risk of charlatany in any discipline which is not well-understood by the public. SB 110 will thwart those who would take advantage of public unawareness of landscape

architecture and will, by its implementation, help make the public more aware of the capabilities and services of this profession.

I understand there is currently under consideration a bill that will require those who practice landscape architecture to obtain a professional license from the State of Alaska and that the State of Alaska administer the issuing of such licenses.

It is my understanding that this bill will allow local professionals recognition of their talents. These locals, when licensed as professional landscape architects, will be able to satisfy requirements written into Federal contracts requiring the services of registered professional architects. Currently, work on federal contracts is being assigned to those in other states where landscape architecture is regulated as a professional occupation.

This bill will also bring credibility to an occupation that is often misunderstood. Many times have I have approached intersections where landscaping was improperly designed and visibility was restricted or that signs were obscured due to plant growth not considered in landscape design. Such conditions are unsafe. Properly trained landscape architects will assist in the development and maintenance of safer streets.

Generally I do not promote the addition of regulations that restrict business and business opportunities. I have been told, however, that this bill does not require the services of registered professional landscape architects in one specific situation or another. This bill, I was told, stipulates that those who call themselves landscape architects meet certain standard criteria. Then when a person hires a landscape architect, he is, in fact, hiring a professional.

I believe the bill to require those who practice landscape architecture to obtain a professional license from the State of Alaska and to require the State of Alaska to administer the issuing of such licenses is a positive step and should be passed.




I am writing this letter to support the registration and licensure of landscape architects for practice in Alaska. I understand that SB110 An Act Relating to the Licensure of Landscape Architecture will achieve this.

I am a professional civil engineer. Civil engineering and landscape architecture practice overlap, most notably in site and pathway design. I have not reviewed SB110, but I have heard that this does not reduce the scope of practice for civil engineers. In particular, I do not want the role of the civil engineer to be diminished in pedestrian facilities planning and design by this bill. Civil engineers have a long history of pedestrian projects, and in fact both the American Society of Civil Engineers, and the Institute of Transportation Engineers (a civil engineering speciality) dedicate substantial resources to pedestrian safety and capacity. I would support SB110 if the bill is crafted so that the practice of the civil engineering is not changed by the licensure of landscape architects.

Having expressed my concern, let me say that I work with landscape architects and find them to be professional and competent. Their work is necessary for public safety and welfare, especially in playground standards. Moreover, they often provide the artistic and beautification elements of a project which improve our quality of life. Their inability to legally seal their drawings puts an undue burden on other design professionals in that we must review and provide our seals for their work.

I would like to thank you for introducing SB110, "An Act Relating to Licensure of Landscape Architecture." I work with professional landscape architects and believe that they should be licensed in the same manner, and for the same reasons, as architects and engineers. Licensure of their profession would ensure that minimum standards of competence are maintained. There are too many cases of landscape architects unfamiliar with Alaskan conditions producing poor designs which are either dangerous or expensive for their clients to fix.

Most people are familiar with the all too common case of plants along roadways which don't last through the first winter. While this is an expensive, and unsightly, problem for the owners and users of the roadways, it alone might not necessitate licensure for landscape architects. However, their involvement in the design of pedestrian and play spaces warrants licensure to assure that the health and safety of the users of these spaces is provided for in design projects. This is particularly true given the effects of winter conditions on walks, trails, and other pedestrian areas. On one local project, an Outside consultant specified a smooth trowel finish on a sidewalk, rather than a rough finish. This resulted in a slipping hazard when the sidewalk was covered in snow and ice and caused one lady to fall and break her hip. Licensure will ensure that landscape architects would have a knowledge of arctic conditions before practicing in the state.

A couple of fringe benefits of licensure may be that more work on projects in Alaska, especially Federal projects, would be done by landscape architects who reside here and that those designs still done by Outside landscape architects will be more responsive to local conditions. A majority of Federal projects are designed Outside, partly because Federal agencies require licensure for designers on their projects. This is not available to Alaskan landscape architects, unless they get one from one of the 45 states that do license landscape architects, so they are put at a competitive disadvantage. This will be lessened by an Alaskan licensure law but not eliminated, since some Outside landscape architects will get licensed in Alaska so they can continue to practice here. While their selection to work on a project may still come down to the fact that they live in the same town as the bureaucracy in charge of the facility, Alaskans will be assured that these designers have met some minimum competency requirements.

I am in support of Senate Bill 110, the Landscape Architecture Licensure bill. I am a small business owner who provides landscape architectural services. The proposed licensing bill would assist my business in two ways. It would assure trained professionals are accomplishing work and it would keep work (jobs and dollars) in Alaska.

I understand the basis of the bill is health and safety. This issue can not be understated. Our work involves site planning, trail design, grading and drainage, playground design, and the design of landscape amenities that affect the public's health and safety. The training and education we receive, similar to that an engineer or architect receives, allows us to understand accessibility requirements for the disabled, reducing potential health and safety concerns (as well as lawsuits). Our training enables us to assist on roadway projects by placing landscaping so it is not a hazard to motorists and later an expense to the public. Our training provides the skills so when we must locate a playground adjacent to a road or a pedestrian crossing across a busy intersection, we are able to provide safe and efficient solutions.


Licensing will not limit the practice of engineers or architects, rather it will enhance their efforts. We have recently completed two projects where our work identified additional engineering services necessary for a project. As a result, our client has increased his budget to increase the efforts of the engineer.

Although the Alaska Native Hospital is a fine design, the landscaping services were contracted out of state. These services represent \$30,000 to \$50,000 that left the state. Licensing would give the federal government in Alaska the ability to hire an Alaskan-licensed landscape architect. Currently it is easier for a licensed landscape architect from the lower 48 to get work on federal contracts.

Landscape architecture is a young industry in Alaska (although we have practiced here over 30 years). Licensing will help to keep the industry Alaskan and keep jobs and money for local economic. Certainly Alaskan landscape architects understand the climate and soils here and related safety issues better than outside landscape architects, or worse, of untrained practitioners.

I appreciate your assistance with this bill.



I am writing in regard to the landscape architecture licensing legislation sponsored by Senator Mackie and soon to be considered by your committee. As the national organization representing landscape architects, we work closely with the other design professions and from that perspective we believe there are national trends that have bearing on the issue before you.

First is the impact of design technology on public safety. The digitization of design information in the form of CAD, GIS, and GPS puts us into a situation where the work of the engineer, architect, landscape architect, and land surveyor is fluid in the sense that each profession adds value in a far more integrated fashion. That the devil is in the details now means our old nemesis is a cyber-lord. The public safety implications of this fluid exchange of information requires greater integration in our licensing perspectives. The legislation before you advances that very notion.

Second is the human side of the equation. We are very aware of the few remaining states where relations among the four design professions still have – how shall we say it – misunderstandings. It is clear that in states where the licensing boards are as integrated as the technology is becoming, with all parties at the table, harmony becomes a design feature. (If I might add a personal note, I spent eighteen years of my career as a licensing advocate for professional engineers before joining the staff of ASLA and can say with conviction that harmony among the design professions is an attribute of public safety.)

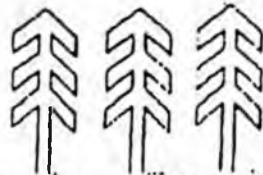

As an individual who holds a Bachelor of Landscape Architecture and currently practices in the State of Alaska, I support SB 110. Having worked in Canada, England and now Alaska, I find it difficult to believe that our great State of Alaska does not yet have professional licensing for landscape architects. Currently Colorado and Alaska are the only two states in the United States which do not have state legislation for landscape architects. There are definite benefits to the public, State and economy for licensing these professionals.

1. Landscape architects design public spaces. This can have an effect on public safety, sense of place and the functionality of a development. Landscape architects are not gardeners or tree planters. We design a variety of spaces from recreation facilities to urban parks, cityscapes and playgrounds. We are involved in the master planning of large developments and the designing of exterior spaces surrounding your local Federal and State buildings, commercial developments and your schools. Spaces people use everyday.
2. Landscape architects in Alaska are currently not licensed and cannot submit proposals on federal and state projects which require a licensed landscape architect. As a result, many projects in our State are being awarded to licensed landscape architects outside of Alaska. This means that Alaskan dollars and jobs are being lost to outside states.
3. Currently there are no State minimums or requirements for landscape architects. This means that a wide array of individuals with varied education and experience are designing spaces which the public use


everyday. Minimums need to be established to guarantee continuity for clients and public safety.

4. Landscape architects are land stewards and understand the natural environment. This allows us to integrate the existing natural features with the program set forth by the client to create a design which is effective and addresses the existing site features. This can overcome the clearing and leveling of potential development sites and the destruction of Alaska's unique natural ecosystems, flora and fauna. In many instances good environmental design can make a negative development a positive place.

Similar to architects and engineers, landscape architects attend universities which are accredited by their national organization which has rigid accreditation criteria. In the case of landscape architects it is the American Society of Landscape Architects. Upon completion of a five year program, landscape architect graduates must intern/work for two to three years depending on state requirements and then write a series of national exams monitored by CLARB. This system has been in place for many years and is a successful national program for setting landscape architecture requirements in many states.



I would like to thank you for sponsoring SB 110, "An Act Relating to Licensure of Landscape Architecture". As an owner of the largest landscape architecture firm in Alaska, I feel that this bill will go far in protecting the public health and safety while providing jobs for Alaskans.

Landscape architecture provides for public safety in a number of arenas. Good landscape architecture provides for safety of children by ensuring that play equipment is sited with proper separation between potentially dangerous surfaces and obstructions. Good landscape architecture provides for appropriate plant materials along roadways where inappropriate material could inflict harm to drivers of errant vehicles. And good landscape architecture ensures that appropriate plant materials are chosen for storm water treatment systems where plants are performing increasing roles in the purification of water runoff. Your bill, SB 110, will help ensure that those charged with performing these tasks in Alaska meet *minimum* standards of knowledge for doing "good" work.

Your bill will also provide job security for Alaskan landscape architects with the potential for job creation. Currently, virtually all work that has been contracted to landscape architects by the National Park Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the U.S. Forest Service has gone to Outside landscape architects. As the owner of the largest firm in Alaska, it has been frustrating to see job after job go to Outside firms because of the perception that landscape architects in Alaska are not qualified to perform work in the state. I appreciate this opportunity to respond to the concerns raised by yourself and Mr. Fred Brov. n regarding SB 110, relating to the licensure of landscape architects.

I will begin by responding to your concerns regarding the ability of civil engineers and architects to continue to provide planting design services ancillary to civil and architectural design. The landscape architects agree that where there is no health and safety concern, engineers and architects should be able to continue providing planting design services. SB 110 contains specific language that states that others may provide planting design unless specific health and safety issues are present. Also included in this legislation is specific language that states that the act shall not... "be construed to prevent the practice of any other legally recognized profession as governed by applicable law." To date, these exceptions have satisfied every architect or engineer that has raised a concern and is the reason that the Alaska Professional Design Council (representing approximately 1500 licensed engineers, architects, and engineers throughout the state) endorses this bill.

The issue, with respect to the restriction of professions to do work currently, much more greatly affects landscape architects than it does engineers or architects. Often, landscape architects must hire civil engineers or architects to stamp drawings prepared by the landscape architect. This is costly to clients and in many cases has eliminated landscape architects from consideration for work in the state. You have indicated that you want to do all aspects of landscape architecture without demonstrating competence, but you also support requirements for civil engineers for work that landscape architects are fully competent to perform. I suggest that as long as public health and safety can be demonstrated, clients should have an option to choose either a landscape architect or an engineer, dependent on the work requirements.

In response to your suggestion for the inclusion of a grandfathering clause that would allow engineers and architects to practice all aspects of landscape architecture; this raises the question of the protection of health and safety. I have no questions in respect to your

ability to provide planting design within certain parameters, however, there are other aspects of the landscape architecture profession such as playground design where the safety of children must be guaranteed. The national Landscape Architect Registration Exam that will be required of all landscape architects is available for you to take. The national testing process is a fair and reasonable way of demonstrating competence in public health and safety concerns.


Regarding your concerns relating to the possibility of municipal, state and federal agencies requiring landscape architects as part of their work requirements. Although licensing of landscape architects does not currently exist, all three governmental levels have already specifically requested landscape architects on requests for proposals. The body of work of landscape architects has demonstrated that there is a difference in buildings that architects design versus those designed by engineers, there is a difference in work that is designed by landscape architects versus that designed by engineers.

Your suggestion that landscape architects could get licensed in another state would not stem the leakage of work in the private sector by Outside interests that have no knowledge of northern climates. If architects, engineers and land surveyors were also required to test out-of-state, this would be an acceptable proposal.

Mr. Button, I assure you that you will be able to continue doing the work that you have done in the past. There is nothing within SB 110 that prevents you from continuing the work that you currently provide. This bill provides specific exceptions for not only yourself, but also others in the nursery, science and landscape industries.

I appreciate this opportunity to discuss these issues with you and to convey to you that the interests of the Alaskans currently doing this work are adequately protected.

I wrote this letter last year and am resending the same again to you this year as a licensed civil engineer (CE5031) in the State of Alaska. This letter is written to express my displeasure and opposition to Senate Bill 110 titled "An Act Relating to Licensure of Landscape Architects." This Senate Bill will come up before you soon and I urge you to vote "NO". You should know that the professional community is deeply divided on this issue, and there are many of us that feel that this licensing is unnecessary, unwarranted, and an intrusion into our own personal practices. Many civil engineers are not aware this bill is before you for consideration.

My understanding of the purpose of professional licensing is to set standards of competency for occupations or trades that directly impact the life, health, and/or safety of the general public. The civil engineering profession in which I am licensed needs to be competent because it provides engineering for the design of highways, bridges, building structures, water and sewer systems among others. If any of these systems are not designed properly, there could be loss of life (building collapse) or a serious threat to health (public water service).

This is not true in the case of landscape architecture. There is no compelling life safety threat involved in this discipline. There are architecture and/or engineering professionals including myself who do landscape design as part of their practice. For several years prior to my license I owned a store that sold indoor and outdoor plant material. This gave me plenty of practical experience and knowledge about the plant materials used for landscaping in Alaska. I have provided this service on private and commercial projects since I have been a licensed engineer, and this bill as written will no longer allow me to perform this service on any type of public job.

When the issue of licensing landscape architects first came up, the primary reason that was given was that federal jobs required a licensed landscape architect to do their landscaping, so the work was going to out of state licensed landscape architects. That fact is probably true. However, there are many architects and engineers registered in Alaska who carry professional licenses in other states. There is nothing that would prevent a landscape architect from taking the licensing exam in a neighboring state, Washington for example, thereby satisfying the federal requirement.


It was also stated, when the idea was first presented, that this license would not preclude other professionals from practicing landscaping design on city and state projects. Naturally, I knew that this was not true, and that as soon as a license was established for "landscape architects" all city and state work would be tied up, and the use of these architects would be required. This is exactly what has happened.

Please don't misunderstand me, I have nothing against anyone who practices landscape architecture. There are plenty of design offices that use landscape architects, and that is their choice. What I am against is creating another license which is not necessary and that prevents those of us that already practice landscape design from continuing to do it on city and state projects. At a minimum, there should be a grandfather clause in the bill for licensing anyone that is currently doing landscape design. Senate Bill 110 requires a degree in landscape architecture, which would effectively preclude all architects and engineers from taking the test. It also has no provisions for "grandfathering."

It should also be pointed out that there are many non-degreed professional landscapers who do landscape and design who are very talented and do a wonderful job. In fact many of the most outstanding examples of landscape architecture have been done by people other than landscape architects.

I strongly urge you to oppose any effort to license landscape architecture in the State of Alaska. Please do not add another layer of regulation in an area where it is not needed in the first place, and where the present system is working fine. This is legislation that the State of Alaska does not need.

Dear Representative Mackie:

I am writing this letter as a licensed civil engineer in the State of Alaska and office manager of Shannon & Wilson, a consulting engineering firm with offices in Anchorage and Fairbanks. While my firm does not provide landscape architectural services, we provide support to architectural and civil engineers who do, several with landscape architects on staff. As a result I have been exposed to both sides of the issue and felt that over the last two years many of the issues and languages had been resolved to everyone's satisfaction. I have therefore supported this proposed licensing legislation.

Yesterday, I received a call from Rick Button, a civil client that I work for. He was concerned that this bill would limit his practice by not allowing civil engineers and architects who have been providing landscape architecture for years to continue to do this work nor would it, as written, allow other engineers to take the exam to become registered because they do not possess degrees in landscape architecture. If this is the case, I would urge you to not support this bill or make sure that the bill has a grandfather clause to protect those architects and engineers who currently provide these design services.

The bill should also add provisions as necessary to allow a registered civil engineer or architect to take the exam or an abbreviated exam to demonstrate proficiency in landscape architecture and become a registered landscape architect. Once the bill develops a new registered profession, it is important that you protect those who currently do this type of work by providing pathways or methods to allow them to continue to do this work particularly on state and municipal projects where there may be a tendency to require that certain work be performed by a registered landscape architect.

In summary, before you vote for the above bill, please check to see that the interests of the people currently doing this work are adequately protected.
