REVENUE & FUND SOURCE: Revenue will be generated by licensing fees sufficient to cover program costs. Approximately 100 licensees are expected to seek licensure and renew licenses biennially. Licensing fees must cover direct costs plus approximately \$100 per licensee for division/departments overhead for the two-year period. Based on 100 licensees, licensing fees are estimated to be \$410.00 for the first biennium, and adjusted to actual costs based on positive timekeeping for the first renewal.

1 "An Act relating to licensure of dietitians and nutritionists; and providing for an
2 effective date."

3 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:**

4 * Section 1. AS 08 is amended by adding a new chapter to read:

5 **Chapter 38. Dietitians and Nutritionists.**

6 **Sec. 08.38.010. License required.** (a) An individual may not, unless licensed
7 as a dietitian or nutritionist by the department, use the title "dietitian," "licensed
8 dietitian," "nutritionist," "licensed nutritionist," or an occupational title using the word
9 "dietitian" or "nutritionist."

10 (b) The only penalty that may be imposed on an individual who engages in
11 conduct that violates (a) of this section is a fine of not more than \$1,000 under a
12 citation issued under AS 08.01.102 - 08.01.104.

13 (c) An individual who obtains or attempts to obtain a dietitian or nutritionist
14 license by dishonest or fraudulent means or who forges, counterfeits, or fraudulently

1 alters a dietitian or nutritionist license, is punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000
2 under a citation issued by the department. For a citation under this subsection, the
3 department shall use the citation procedures applicable to citations for unlicensed
4 practice under AS 08.01.102 - 08.01.104, and an individual who receives a citation
5 under this subsection is subject to the same requirements as an individual who receives
6 a citation under AS 08.01.102 - 08.01.104.

7 **Sec. 08.38.020. Dietitian licensure.** The department shall issue a dietitian
8 license to an individual who pays the required fee, applies on a form provided by the
9 department, and submits evidence satisfactory to the department of being certified as
10 a Registered Dietitian by the Commission on Dietetic Registration.

11 **Sec. 08.38.030. Nutritionist licensure.** The department shall issue a
12 nutritionist license to an individual who pays the required fee, applies on a form
13 provided by the department, and submits evidence satisfactory to the department that
14 the individual either

15 (1) has qualified as a diplomate of the American Board of Nutrition or
16 as a Certified Nutrition Specialist with the Certification Board for Nutrition Specialists;
17 or

18 (2) meets the following qualifications:

19 (A) has received a master's or doctoral degree from an
20 accredited college or university with a major in human nutrition, public health
21 nutrition, clinical nutrition, nutrition education, community nutrition, or food
22 and nutrition; and

23 (B) has completed a documented work experience in human
24 nutrition or human nutrition research of at least 900 hours.

25 **Sec. 08.38.040. Grounds for suspension, revocation, or refusal to issue a**
26 **license.** The department may refuse to issue a license or impose a disciplinary
27 sanction authorized under AS 08.01.075 on an individual licensed under this chapter
28 when the department finds that the license applicant or licensee, as applicable,

29 (1) secured or attempted to secure a license through deceit, fraud, or
30 intentional misrepresentation;

31 (2) engaged in deceit, fraud, or intentional misrepresentation in the

1 course of providing professional services or engaging in professional activities;

2 (3) advertised professional services in a false or misleading manner;

3 (4) has been convicted of a felony or of another crime that affects the
4 licensee's ability to continue to practice competently and safely;

5 (5) failed to comply with this chapter, with a regulation adopted under
6 this chapter, or with an order of the department;

7 (6) continued dietetics or nutrition practice after becoming unfit due to

8 (A) professional incompetence;

9 (B) addiction or severe dependency on alcohol or a drug that
10 impairs the licensee's ability to practice safely;

11 (C) physical or mental disability; or

12 (7) engaged in lewd or immoral conduct in connection with the delivery
13 of professional service to patients.

14 **Sec. 08.38.050. Licensure by credentials.** The department may issue a
15 license to an applicant who holds a current unrestricted license as a dietitian or
16 nutritionist in another state or political jurisdiction of the United States or Canada if,
17 in the judgment of the department, the standards for licensure in the other jurisdiction
18 are not less stringent than the requirements in this chapter.

19 **Sec. 08.38.080. Exemption.** The requirements of this chapter do not apply to

20 (1) an animal nutritionist whose activities are limited to the nutritional
21 care of animals; animal nutritionists may use the title "nutritionist" as long as they
22 provide nutrition services only to animals; or

23 (2) a person who is serving in the armed forces of the United States or
24 is an employee of the federal government whose job title includes the term "dietitian"
25 or "nutritionist."

26 **Sec. 08.38.090. Regulations.** The department may adopt regulations under
27 AS 44.62 (Administrative Procedure Act) to implement this chapter.

28 **Sec. 08.38.100. Definitions.** In this chapter,

29 (1) "accredited college or university" means a college or university
30 accredited by the regional or national accrediting agencies recognized by the Council
31 on Post-Secondary Accreditation and the United States Department of Education at the

1 time the degree was conferred;

2 (2) "Commission on Dietetic Registration" means the Commission on
3 Dietetic Registration of the American Dietetic Association that is a member of the
4 National Commission on Health Certifying Agencies, which establishes national
5 standards of competence for individuals participating in the health care delivery
6 system;

7 (3) "dietetics or nutrition practice" means the integration and
8 application of scientific principles of food, nutrition, biochemistry, physiology, food
9 management, and behavioral and social sciences to achieve and maintain human health
10 through the provision of nutrition care services.

11 * Sec. 2. AS 08.01.010 is amended by adding a new paragraph to read:

12 (36) regulation of dietitians and nutritionists under AS 08.38.

13 * Sec. 3. AS 08.02.010(a) is amended to read:

14 (a) An acupuncturist licensed under AS 08.06, an audiologist licensed under
15 AS 08.11, a person licensed in the state as a chiropractor under AS 08.20, a dentist
16 under AS 08.36, a dietitian or nutritionist licensed under AS 08.38, a marital and
17 family therapist licensed under AS 08.63, a medical practitioner or osteopath under
18 AS 08.64, a direct-entry midwife certified under AS 08.65, a registered nurse under
19 AS 08.68, an optometrist under AS 08.72, a licensed pharmacist under AS 08.80, a
20 physical therapist or occupational therapist licensed under AS 08.84, a psychologist
21 under AS 08.86, or a clinical social worker licensed under AS 08.95, shall use as
22 professional identification appropriate letters or a title after that person's name that

"An Act relating to licensure of dietitians and Nutritionists"

The Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 88 codifies professional title licensure of dietitians and nutritionists. Senate Bill 88 increases public access to the services of dietitians and nutritionists, helps to ensure the quality of such services, and protects consumers.

Senate Bill 88 represents sound public policy because it protects Alaskans from the potential harm that could be caused by untrained individuals. It accomplishes this by allowing Alaskans to differentiate between individuals who are qualified nutritionists and dietitians and those who are not. Also, with the advent of managed care and HMO's, it is necessary to make sure that the work of dietitians and nutritionists will be performed by experts in that field. There is legislation pending in Congress, which includes reimbursement for nutrition services within the Medicare Program, but only to those recognized by the state as nutrition professionals.

Senate Bill 88 contains provisions which ensure that individuals with nutrition practice experience and bachelor's, master's, or doctoral degrees from accredited schools may continue to work in Alaska. There are over 120 registered dietitians and nutritionists that live throughout Alaska. They work in hospitals, nursing homes, public health clinics, school nutrition programs and with athletic programs. In hospitals and clinics they are part of the health care team (physicians, nurses and therapists) providing education in diabetes, heart disease, kidney failure, digestive disorders, eating disorders, high risk pregnancies, AIDS and cancer treatments, to name just a few.

The licensing of dietitians and nutritionists enables the public to identify individuals who are qualified by education, experience and examination to provide nutrition care services. Recognition defines the dietetics and nutrition practice which includes the integration and application of the principles derived from the sciences of nutrition, biochemistry, food physiology, management, and behavioral and social sciences to achieve and maintain the health of the citizens of Alaska through the provision of nutrition care services.

Sponsor Statement

Senate Bill 88 corrects the current situation where any person can call themselves a "nutritionist" or "dietitian" without even one day of formal education or experience. This can endanger the consumer with harmful, expensive or even dangerous advice and unproven therapies. Senate Bill 88 would reduce this danger to the public, through the licensing of dietitians and nutritionists.

Senate Bill 88 does not establish a new board. The licensing program will be conducted by the Division of Occupational Licensing, and will have no cost to the state, since licensing fees from the dietitians and nutritionists will pay for all of the program's administrative costs. It is also important to note that Senate Bill 88 will in no way impact other professions practicing nutrition or health food retailers unless they refer to themselves as a nutritionist or dietitian without meeting the standards that this bill would codify.

"An Act relating to licensure of dietitians and nutritionists"

Section 1: Adds a new chapter to AS 08. The new chapter is Chapter 38 that is entitled *Dietitians and Nutritionists*.

The following are the new sections of Chapter 38:

Sec. 08.38.010. License Required (page 1)—This section stipulates that a person may not use the title of "dietitian," "licensed dietitian," "nutritionist," "licensed nutritionist," or an occupational title using the word "dietitian" or "nutritionist".

Also, covered by this section are the penalties for meeting the stipulations of this section.

Sec. 08.38.020. Dietitian Licensure (page 2)—This section stipulates that the department shall issue a dietitian license to individuals completing the requisite criteria.

Sec. 08.38.030. Nutritionist Licensure (page 2)—This section stipulates that the department shall issue a nutritionist license to individuals completing and meeting the requisite criteria.

Sec. 08.38.040. Grounds for suspension, revocation, or refusal to issue a license (page 2)—This section allows the department, after a hearing to impose a disciplinary sanction or refuse to issue a license to an individual licensed under this chapter if they commit one of the listed offenses.

Sec. 08.38.050. Licensure by credentials (page 3)—The department may issue a license to an individual it determines as having sufficient credentials from another state.

Sec. 08.38.080. Exemptions (page 3)—This section allows exemptions to the requirements of this chapter. The exemptions include: an animal nutritionist or a person serving in the armed services or who is a federal employee whose job title includes the term “dietitian” or “nutritionist”.

Sec. 08.38.100. Definitions (page 3)—This section sets out the relevant definitions to this chapter.

Section 2: (page 4)—This section adds conforming language to AS 08.01.010 to include regulation of dietitians and nutritionists to the applicability of Title 08 Business and Professions.

Section 3: (page 4)—This section adds conforming language to AS 08.02.010(a) Professional designation requirements.

Sections 4 & 5: (page 5)—These sections set out the effective dates of this Act.

Evidence on the Cost Effectiveness of Medical Nutrition Therapy

Findings both from randomized controlled clinical trials and from case studies show that medical nutrition therapy can save health care dollars and improve outcomes when provided to patients with diseases or injuries that place them at high risk of malnutrition -- being inadequately nourished. Almost 17 million patients each year are treated for illnesses or injuries that stem from or place them at risk of malnutrition. Whether in hospitals, long-term care institutions, or scattered throughout the community, medical professionals recognize that medical nutrition therapy is a key factor in improving outcomes and speeding recovery for at least 40 percent of hospital patients in the U.S. who are malnourished based on clinical nutrition evaluations (Roubenoff, Roubenoff, Preto & Balke, "Malnutrition among hospitalized patients: A problem of physician awareness," *Archives of Internal Medicine*, 1987).

An internal analysis of nearly 2,400 case studies submitted by ADA members shows that on average more than \$8,000 per patient can be saved with the intervention of medical nutrition therapy. Case studies show that, for diseases and conditions in which medical nutrition therapy is appropriate, the average annual or one-time savings per case include:

- For cancer, \$10,535 savings per case because specialized nutrition therapy enhances effectiveness of chemotherapy and radiation therapy;
- for heart disease, \$9,134 savings per case because medical nutrition therapy reduces the need for drugs and other artery-clearing procedures and/or surgery;
- for type I diabetes (insulin-dependent), \$9,049 savings per case because diabetic complications that result in hospitalization are reduced;
- for type II diabetes (non insulin-dependent), \$1,994 savings per case because medical nutrition therapy reduces or eliminates the need for insulin or oral agents;
- for kidney disease, \$18,467 savings per case by postponing the need for dialysis;
- for high cholesterol, \$2,709 savings per case by reducing the need for drugs;
- for hypertension, \$4,075 savings per case by reducing drug use and preventing complications such as stroke; and
- for a variety of other conditions -- such as burns and surgery -- requiring tube or intravenous feedings, \$7,051 savings per case by transitioning the patient to less invasive and less expensive nutrient sources.

A survey of 2,337 patient records at 19 hospitals indicates that early nutritional interventions and regular clinical nutrition services reduce hospital stays for malnourished and at-risk patients. The reduced hospital days translate into \$8,200 per bed per year average cost savings according to *Cutting Hospital Costs with Clinical Nutrition Services*, a new report by the Nutritional Care Management Institute (NCMI) of Tucker, Georgia.

A report in the July 1995 issue of *The American Journal of Medicine* highlights a study which found that the use of a diabetes team, led by an endocrinologist working with a nurse diabetes educator and dietitian, resulted in a 56 percent reduction in length of hospital stays among patients hospitalized with a primary diagnosis of diabetes compared with patients treated by an internist alone. Currently, hospital care of diabetic patients costs an estimated \$65 billion a year. The potential 5-day reduction in hospitalization found by this study translates into billions of dollars per year in potential health care savings.

Dear Senator Donley:

I am writing to let you know I support Senate Bill 88. I am a family physician working at Valley Medical Care here in Juneau. I have had the opportunity to work with registered dietitians both here in Juneau and during my years of training in New York State and find their services critical as part of patient health care, including diabetes (both in pregnant woman and in non-pregnant persons), hypertension, hyperlipidemia, obesity and coronary artery disease.

Although doctors are being educated in nutritional topics more than before, we do not have the time to give the nutrition education that the patient needs and value the services provided by registered dietitians. However, I do not want to refer my patients for that dietary teaching to a person who may not be properly educated themselves and would need to rely on a licensure system to check on the qualifications of each person wanting to be licensed as a dietitian.

Hello Mark -First off, I better apologize for the length of this monologue.

I wanted to pass on to you as few thoughts I had about the Dietitians & Nutritionists licensing bill.

They are mine alone, but I feel are creditable arguments to consider on why there should be licensure and to counter any points from the opposition.

In each of the states the passed licensure and/or attempted to pass licensure (including the 1995 effort here in Alaska), the argument made by the Health Food industry was that Dietitians were trying to create a monopoly in the job market for nutrition information. A close examination of Sec. 08.38.080. Exemptions clearly counters this argument. 13 exemptions, specific in nature, speak to the fact that if this bill becomes law - it is "business as usual" for the health food industry in Alaska and everyone else for that matter. But see exemption #8:

Exemption #8 an employees of food stores, health food operations, food supplement outlets can

 distribute information as long as they don't hold
themselves out as nutritionists
 or dietitians

But I don't see this bill as an effort to interfere with others. Purely - I see this bill as an effort to save the jobs of 120 people within the state of Alaska who have chosen to make Nutrition their career and who have chosen to live in Alaska.

Health Care is changing. Some years ago "Health Reform" was the big push in Washington and at the state level. While that specific term is no longer heard nowadays, make no mistake about - health care in America is being "reformed". This is happening via the insurance companies and by Federal programs like Medicare and Medicaid. We call it "Managed Care". It is varied and shows up differently in each region of the country. But, in short, it attempts to put severe fiscal limits on the health care machine (and rightfully so). So the situation is created where 3rd party payors (insurance companies) and Fiscal Intermediaries (who represent Medicare to the health providers) are saying, in effect - we will reimburse you "x" amount for "x" service. Plus we will only provide reimbursement to those specific providers who that individual State recognizes as the expert in that specific field. Or in other words - who is licensed within that state as the nutrition professional. Without licensure, dietitians run the risk to being left out of the reimbursement wheel, thus, they run the risk of not being employed.

-These are people with at the least baccalaureate degrees. Many with masters, some with doctoral degrees. They have completed internships and passed a registration exam. They are required to maintain a minimum of 75 continuing education hours every 5 years. If you look into the requirements of the Nursing profession, you will see that the education and testing structure is almost exactly the same.

Dietitians don't want to put health food stores out of business. They don't want a monopoly. As it is this day, within the health care field, we already have a "monopoly" - Just like Nurses have a "monopoly" within their specific field of health care. We simply want to save out jobs and our career.

Might this information be helpful to Sen. Donley? also, I am FAXing to you the 1995 Fiscal Note from the first attempt at licensure. thanks - John

The dietitians and nutritionists work in hospitals, nursing homes, public health clinics, school lunch programs, maternal and child health programs, sports medicine, the University system and in private consulting.

On behalf of the Alaska Association of Hospitals and Nursing Homes, I am writing in support of SB88. As health care facilities look for persons to fill job vacancies in the area of dietetics and nutrition, it would be of assistance if one was assured that the person possessed a license and that the State certified they met the professional standards required.
