Please consider the following supplemental amendments:

### Operating Supplemental

Sec. \_\_. DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES. Section 12, ch. 2, FSSLA 1999, as amended by sec. 30, ch. 135, SLA 2000, as amended by sec. 73(b), ch. 61, SLA 2001, is amended to read:

Sec. 12. DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES. The unexpended and unobligated balance of the appropriation made in sec. 9, ch. 139, SLA 1998 (DNR appraisal of public school lands - \$432,525) is reappropriated for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2000, June 30, 2001, June 30, 2002, [AND] June 30, 2003, and June 30, 2004, to the Department of Natural Resources and the sum of \$305,000 is appropriated from the public school trust fund (AS 37.14.110(a)) to the Department of Natural Resources for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2002, June 30, 2003, and June 30, 2004 for an appraisal of public school lands to determine the fair market value of the public school trust land where the land was redesignated as general grant land in 1978.

(This provision should be added to the May 14, 2002 effective date section.)

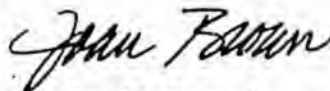
### Capital Supplemental

Sec. \_\_. DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION. The sum of \$2,000,000 is appropriated from federal receipts to the Department of Environmental Conservation, facility construction and operations, for Pribilof landfills.

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) requests that the lapse date for SLA 2001, Ch. 61, Sec 73 (Original Appropriation SLA 1998, Ch. 139, Sec 9 for \$432,525) be extended from June 30, 2003 to June 30, 2004, and additional funding of \$305,000 of public school trust funds to complete the existing school land trust valuation project.

The Legislature originally appropriated \$432,525 from the public school trust fund to the DNR for a title search and fair market value appraisals of public school lands that were redesignated as general grant land in 1978.

The Department developed the budget of \$432,500 to complete the appraisal and valuation process prior to litigation and without the expectation of litigation complicating the process. The Court precluded the Department from simply undertaking the valuation as contemplated, and instead ordered a valuation process conducted jointly with the *Kasayulie* plaintiffs. The process will also require review by the court -- particularly if any disputes arise. While these additional procedures add some additional cost, delay caused by the litigation has had a more significant impact on estimated expenses. The Department's original budget was developed during a time when there was much less demand for appraisal work, so the budget estimated much lower costs. Currently, demand for appraisal work is high, so anticipated costs have correspondingly increased. The cost of completing this project under the new terms agreeable to both the state and the plaintiffs is now estimated to cost an additional \$305,000, resulting in this supplemental funding request.

The Department has been unable to complete the appraisal of school lands as a consequence of the *Kasayulie* litigation that alleged breaches of trust and originally challenged whether the Department should even undertake the appraisal. The Court found certain breaches of trust and problems with state funding for school facilities. Before dealing with a remedy in either the school trust or facilities side of the *Kasayulie* lawsuit, the court has determined that DNR and the plaintiffs must jointly complete the valuation of lands. The remedy will determine the state's obligation to the School Land Trust (whether enough has been paid to the trust, whether the annual allocations of one-half of one percent of land revenues to the school trust can cease, and whether the trust contains excess funds which could potentially be available to the Legislature for appropriation).

The state has been working with the plaintiffs to come up with a valuation process that is agreeable to both sides. The parties are very close to submitting the agreed to processes to the court for approval. Once the valuation is done, it will provide a fair market value of school trust lands that can be given to the court.

\$102,381 has been expended from the original appropriation to accomplish the following:

- a) The title work has been substantially completed. There is very limited work left to be done.
- b) A valuation plan has been developed with the plaintiffs related to using a valuation panel for surface valuation and incorporating other resource valuations. The plan is very close to agreement on both sides. This approach is similar to what was done to value Mental Health Trust land.
- c) The parties have development and made substantial progress on gathering information for the valuation of mineral resources. (Valuation plans for oil, gas and timber are still in the initial phases.)

The supplemental funding request and lapse date extension are necessary to complete the original intent of this project. The additional amount needed is only now being estimated because only recently have DNR and the plaintiffs agreed on the methodologies for appraising the minerals, oil and gas, forestry, and other surface values of the land. Use of these additional public school land trust funds will have no impact on the Department of Education and Early Development's FY2003 foundation formula funding.

**Prior Funding History / Additional Information:**

In order to complete the withdrawal of the U.S. Department of Commerce, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) from the civil administration of the Pribilof Islands, NOAA has been engaged for several years in an extensive environmental remediation effort on the Islands. The intent and scope of this effort are set out in Public Laws 104-91 and 106-562, as well as a legal agreement with the State of Alaska. One element of the overall effort provided for in Public Law 104-91 is the construction of new, permitted landfills to serve the communities of St. George and St. Paul. Public Law 106-562 authorizes appropriation to the U.S. Department of Commerce of up to \$10 million in federal funds to be transferred to the State of Alaska for this purpose. The FFY 2002 budget appropriated \$2 million.

NOAA and the State have reached an agreement that these federal grant funds and landfill construction projects can be administered through the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation's Village Safe Water program. The Village Safe Water program typically receives grant funding from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the U.S. Department of Agriculture – Rural Development, and the State, and makes grants to communities for specific water, sewerage and solid waste projects. The program includes standard procedures for grant management, fund disbursement, National Environmental Policy Act compliance, etc. Administering the St. George and St. Paul landfill projects as Village Safe Water projects will significantly reduce the administrative burden.

All federal grant funds will be passed through to the communities for planning, design and construction. The projects are anticipated to take approximately three years to complete with construction beginning in calendar year 2003. The Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation has applied for the grant funds and has received a grant offer from NOAA for the \$2.0 million in FFY 2002 federal funding. SFY 2002 capital budget authorization is required to receive and expend these funds. It is important that planning and preliminary designs be completed as quickly as possible and that final cost estimates be generated in time to request the balance of the required funding in the FFY 2003 budget process.

Case Name: *Kristen Eyre v. State of Alaska, Department of Public Safety and Darrel McCracken*

**1. Describe the circumstances or events resulting in this case and ultimately this judgment/settlement against the State.**

Kristen Eyre was hired by SEANET, the Southeast Alaska Narcotics Enforcement Team, run by the Alaska State Troopers, to work as an undercover agent and infiltrate the local drug milieu to purchase narcotics and make cases for criminal prosecution against the sellers. Her control officer, i.e., her primary contact and supervisor, was Darrel McCracken, a SEANET employee and retired Juneau police officer. Eyre and McCracken had sexual relations on two occasions in the fall of 1996; Eyre claimed that she was raped by McCracken on the first occasion and coerced with threats of job loss on the second occasion; McCracken claimed that these sexual encounters were consensual and not coerced. SEANET had an unwritten policy against any sexual relations between undercover agents and control officers. When Eyre reported the sexual encounters to the overall commander of SEANET, he fired both McCracken and Eyre. Eyre sued the state for sexual harassment by its agent-supervisor, intentional infliction of emotional distress and several respondeat superior claims (claims against the employer based on the supervisor's conduct). She also sued McCracken individually for emotional distress and assault and battery. McCracken was represented by his own attorney (Tom Nave) at his own expense. The case was settled in a settlement conference with Judge Patricia Collins. The state agreed to pay Eyre \$130,000 and McCracken agreed to pay her \$10,000 for a release and settlement of all her claims, including any worker's compensation claims she might have.

**2. Describe issues of State policy or law involved in this case, if they are relevant to and resulted in substantial effort and expense for the department to bring or defend this case.**

At issue was whether Eyre was a victim of sexual harassment and suffered from intentionally inflicted emotional distress or whether the sexual relations were consensual in violation of SEANET's policy.

**3. Did the State prevail on any issues? If so, describe.**

Motions for summary judgment were pending when the case was settled, but no decisions on any of the legal issues were entered and none would have resulted in complete dismissal of all claims against the state.

**4. Did we challenge plaintiffs' request for costs and fees or in other ways seek to reduce the costs to the State? If so, describe to what extent we were successful.**

The settlement figure of \$130,000 represents an attempt to reduce the costs to the state considering that a verdict in the plaintiff's favor could have been in the \$500,000 or higher range.

**5. What was the source of the State's liability in this case?**

Under recent Alaska case law, the state is vicariously liable for conduct such as sexual harassment by an employee who was in a supervisory position over the victim. This case was settled with no admission or finding of wrongdoing by the state.

**6. What, if any, preventative action has been taken by the involved agency to prevent or reduce the potential for such liability in the future?**

The alleged offender was terminated from employment and SEANET reviewed its policies and placed the sexual relationship prohibition in writing.

**7. If the information is available to you, has the agency involved taken any corrective action as a result of this case? If the information is not protected from publication by statute, privilege, or right to privacy, indicate what the corrective action was.**

**8. Any recommendations concerning cases of this type in the future?**

State managers must continue to make it clear to supervisors and others that any kind of sexually harassing behavior will not be tolerated.

Case No.: None; this was an administrative appeal before Public Employee Retirement Board (PERB); Law's work mgt. no. 223-92-0276

1. Describe the circumstances or events resulting in this case and ultimately this judgment/settlement against PERS.

Mr. Cavin claimed low back and neck injury as a result of operating a vessel for the state troopers. He appealed to the PERS Board the denial of occupational disability. He also brought a civil lawsuit against the state alleging maritime work injury under the Jones Act. The PERS appeal was stayed pending the outcome of the civil case. During the settlement discussions of the civil case, PERS was invited to settle the disability case as part of a global settlement of all issues involving Mr. Cavin. The PERS system determined it was in the best interests of the system to settle this case.

2. Describe issues of State policy or law involved in this case, if they are relevant to and resulted in substantial effort and expense for the department to bring or defend this case.

There are no significant state policy or law issues in this case. The merits (whether there was an occupational injury) were at issue. Such cases are occasionally settled for a sum certain because the loss of a contested case may result in ongoing upward adjustments of benefits and may potentially involve higher sums of money.

3. Did the State prevail on any issues? If so, describe.

This claim was settled, and as such, no decision about prevailing issues resulted.

4. Did we challenge plaintiffs' request for costs and fees or in other ways seek to reduce the costs to the State? If so, describe to what extent we were successful.

As this was a settlement agreement, it did not specifically involve costs and fees. The State agreed to the settlement believing that settling a case such as this one significantly reduced the State's potential liability by virtue of the operation of the occupational disability statute vs. the non occupational disability statute.

**5. What was the source of the State's liability in this case?**

This was a routine contested occupational disability case. Where claim is denied, a member has a right to appeal before the PERB.

**6. What, if any, preventative action has been taken by the involved agency to prevent or reduce the potential for such liability in the future?**

## COASTAL IMPACT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM SUMMARY

Background. The Coastal Impact Assistance Program (CIAP) is a one-time federal allocation to coastal states with offshore oil development. Uses of the funds must be consistent with the authorized uses in the federal CIAP legislation, including: conservation, restoration, enhancement or protection of coastal or marine habitat, wetlands, watersheds and water quality; education, mapping and research; and implementation of federal conservation management plans.

Allocation. Under the CIAP, Alaska received a one-time allocation of \$12.2 million. Based on the program formula, \$7.9 million is allocated to the state and \$4.27 million is divided among the state's 14 coastal boroughs and four coastal resource service areas.

CIAP Plan. As required by the legislation, the governor prepared and submitted a plan to the Secretary of Commerce (through NOAA) that describes how the funds provided under the CIAP will be used. The State developed its plan based on public comment and the objectives of providing statewide benefits for coastal areas and producing tangible products. The following projects were proposed for use of the state's portion of the funds:

- \$3.1 million - Competitive Grants Program
- \$1.7 million - Ocean, Coastal and Watershed Information System
- \$1.0 million - Cataloging Anadromous Fish Streams
- \$800,000 - Coastal Resource Inventory Project
- \$750,000 - Regional Coastal Program Planning
- \$235,670 - Implementation and Administration of the CIAP Plan
- \$200,000 - Grant Funds for Alaska Coastal Resource Districts
- \$150,000 - Ocean, Coastal and Watershed Symposium/State of the Oceans Report

The Secretary of Commerce approved the state's plan on December 19, 2001. A copy of the plan is attached.

Previous Legislative Consideration. \$100,000 for plan administration was approved in the FY 2002 operating budget. On September 7, 2001, LB&A approved receipt authority for six of the eight CIAP projects. The committee did not approve accepting funds for the competitive grant program and the symposium, or \$35,000 for plan administration. A total of \$4.5 million was approved in the operating budget. Since the projects are three-year projects, the committee recognized the State would need to request a funding source shift to capital during the legislative session.

Current Budget Request. Because the CIAP projects are three-year projects, the State is seeking to shift the CIAP funds into the capital budget. The State is also seeking approval to accept the remaining \$3.3 million. The funds allocated to the symposium and the remaining administrative funds will be used for the competitive grant program.

Status of Competitive Grant Program. The State solicited grant applications for coastal conservation, restoration, enhancement, protection, and education projects. 150 applications were submitted totaling over \$12 million in requests. Each application will be rated against eight set criteria and ranked through a three-tier process: (1) staff review by DGC and DCED; (2) Coastal Policy Council (CPC) subcommittee review; and (3) full CPC review. The CPC consists of nine local government officials that represent all the state's coastal regions and six state government officials. The staff review is expected to be complete in early April and the CPC subcommittee and full CPC review complete in May. The review rating sheet and the unranked list of grant applications is attached.

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## Coastal Impact Assistance Program – Background

The federal Coastal Impact Assistance Program (CIAP) provides a one-time appropriation to states with off-shore oil activities. Alaska will receive an appropriation of \$12,208,723. Based on the CIAP legislation, thirty-five percent, or \$4,273,053, will be divided among eighteen coastal boroughs and Coastal Resource Service Areas with the remaining \$7,935,670 allocated to the State.

To be eligible to receive the appropriation, the Governor must prepare and submit to the Secretary of Commerce by July 2, 2001, a Coastal Impact Assistance Plan. Funds received by the State may only be used for the purposes authorized in the CIAP legislation and for the uses specified in the plan.

The CIAP legislation provides that:

The Secretary shall approve the plan if the Secretary determines that the plan is consistent with the uses set forth in the legislation and if the plan contains each of the following:

- (A) The name of the State agency that will have the authority to represent and act for the State in dealing with the Secretary.
- (B) A program for the implementation of the plan which describes how the amounts provided under the program will be used.
- (C) A contact for each political subdivision and description of how coastal political subdivisions will use amounts provided under the program, including a certification by the governor that such uses are consistent with the program's authorized uses.
- (D) Certification by the governor that ample opportunity has been accorded for public participation in the development and revision of the plan.
- (E) Measures for taking into account other relevant federal resources and programs.

This document is the State's Coastal Impact Assistance Plan as required under the CIAP legislation.

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## I. DESIGNATED STATE AGENCY

The CIAP legislation requires that the Coastal Impact Assistance Plan provide the name of the state agency that will have the authority to represent and act for the State in dealing with the Secretary for purposes of the program (§31)(d)(2)(A)).

The Office of the Governor, Division of Governmental Coordination (DGC), is the point of contact for the Coastal Impact Assistance Program. DGC is the lead agency for the Alaska Coastal Management Program and is experienced in coordinating the involvement of local communities, state and federal agencies, and the public in managing Alaska's coastal resources. DGC coordinated development of this plan and will remain the point of contact for administering the program following plan approval.

## II. CERTIFICATION

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### III. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

#### A. Public Process

The State of Alaska involved the public in the development of the Coastal Impact Assistance Plan as follows:

February 14, 2001: DGC sent a letter to eligible coastal political subdivisions requesting a contact for local and state plan development. All eighteen subdivisions responded.

April 3: The CIAP coordinator presented an overview of the coastal impact assistance program to the statewide coastal conference in Juneau -- approximately 100 people from all areas of the coast were in attendance.

April 5: The State conducted a coastal community CIAP workshop open to the public in Juneau. 24 people attended either in person or by phone. Twelve of the 24 attendees were designated coastal political subdivision contacts.

April 12: A public notice initiating a 15-day comment period soliciting public input under the CIAP was published in Alaska newspapers, posted on the internet and e-mailed to almost 300 organizations (including federal agencies, Native organizations, fishing groups, conservation groups, industry representatives, private industry and other potentially interested organizations). An information packet explaining the program was attached to the e-mail messages and posted on the coastal management program website.

April 17: An update to the public notice was e-mailed to the distribution list and posted on the web. The update provided notice of the official allocation from NOAA that was received by the State on April 16.

May 17: A public notice announcing the availability of the draft Coastal Impact Assistant Plan and providing for a 30-day public comment period was published in Alaska newspapers, posted on the internet and e-mailed to almost 300 organizations and other interested parties. The draft plan was attached to the e-mail messages and posted on the coastal management program website.

#### B. State Decision-making Process

A state working group was formed to consider public and agency comments and to develop a list of recommendations for use of the state portion of CIAP funds. The working group consisted of the following state officials:

The initial public notice solicited input on statewide coastal issues and the types of projects that might address those issues through use of CIAP funds. Forty-six comments from a range of individuals, organizations, and government agencies were timely received. The comments are summarized in Appendix C. Comments identified the following possible uses for CIAP funds: coastal resource education; easier accessibility to available coastal resource information; additional coastal resource information (including mapping and aerial photography); additional funds for implementing the Alaska Coastal Management Program; coastal erosion control; habitat protection, restoration, conservation, and enhancement; and additional funds for specific research projects. Many commenters proposed specific projects to address coastal issues and included approximate project costs. Funding requests totaled over \$14 million.

The overall objectives for use of the state portion of the CIAP funds are to provide funding for projects that are most likely to provide a statewide benefit for the state's coastal areas and that will produce tangible products. For state projects, the goal is that products can be expanded upon should additional CIAP funds be made available in the future. The working group based its recommendations on these objectives and on consideration of public comments.

Several commenters requested funds for research projects. A decision was made to not use CIAP funds for research projects because there are multiple sources of research funds with established grant review procedures already in place, including the Gulf Ecosystem Monitoring Program and the newly established North Pacific Research Board. These entities will receive annual appropriations to provide grants for research activities regarding fisheries or marine ecosystems in the North Pacific Ocean, Bering Sea, Arctic Ocean, and the Gulf of Alaska. Considerable time and effort would be required of the State to establish an appropriate review board and the type of review process necessary for selecting research projects to receive CIAP funds. In addition, research in Alaska is costly. Just a few research projects could easily consume most, if not all, of the one-time \$8 million appropriation. The State will reconsider the decision to exclude funding for research projects should additional CIAP funds be made available in the future. Meanwhile, the State will facilitate use of research information through establishment of a shared information system (described below).

Nine comments were submitted in response to the solicitation for comment on the draft plan. Appendix D contains a summary of the comments and the State's response to the comments. A copy of the comments is provided in Attachment 1

#### IV. IMPLEMENTATION PROGRAM

The CIAP legislation requires that the state plan contain "a program for the implementation of the plan which describes how the amounts provided under the [legislation] will be used" (§31(d)(2)(B)).

This plan provides general information regarding the projects that the state intends to implement with CIAP funds. Specific project details will be developed following submission of the plan to NOAA. The State may develop a Memorandum of Understanding with NOAA for the efficient disbursement of funds under the coastal impact assistance program.

##### A. Trust Fund

The legislation gives the State (or a coastal political subdivision) the authority to deposit CIAP funds in a State (or local government) administered trust fund dedicated to uses consistent with the legislation. In its guidance to states, NOAA asserts that any interest generated from a trust fund must be returned to the federal government. While the State would like to establish a trust fund, the administrative costs of returning interest to the federal government would exceed the benefit of having such a fund. The State does not believe that in permitting trust funds, Congress intended that interest must be paid back to the federal government. The State will continue investigating the possibility of putting the state's portion of CIAP funds into a trust fund. Whether the State establishes a trust fund will depend on whether the matter of interest earned is resolved to the State's satisfaction. Additional considerations will also include administrative and management requirements, and the cost of setting up and administering the trust fund. If a trust fund is established, use of the fund will be dedicated to the uses listed in this plan.

*NOTE: A Trust Fund was not established because the state could not retain the interest.*

##### B. Summary of Uses for State CIAP Funds.

The State of Alaska will dedicate coastal impact assistance program funds to the following uses (described below):

1. \$3.1 million - Competitive Grants Program.
2. \$200,000 - Grant Funds for Alaska Coastal Resource Districts.
3. \$1.7 million - Ocean, Coastal and Watershed Information System.
4. \$800,000 - Coastal Resource Inventory Project.
5. \$1.0 million - Cataloging Anadromous Fish Streams.
6. \$750,000 - Regional Coastal Program Planning.
7. \$150,000 - Ocean, Coastal and Watershed Symposium/State of the Oceans and Watersheds Report.
8. \$235,670 - Implementation and Administration of the CIAP Plan.

TOTAL = \$7,935,670

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C. Description of Uses for State CIAP Funds.

1. Competitive Grants Program

Through the initial solicitation of comments under the coastal impact assistance program, commenters provided examples of numerous projects that would benefit the state's coastal area and populations. In order to provide a fair process for determining projects that will be funded with coastal impact assistance funds, a competitive grant fund and review process will be established.

The existing Coastal Policy Council (CPC) will establish grant criteria, solicit project proposals, and select projects to receive CIAP funds (the council consists of nine local government officials that represent all the state's coastal regions and six state government officials). The grant program will be open to applications from coastal resource districts, state and local government agencies, tribal organizations, non-profit organizations, individuals, private industry and other interested parties. The program will be in place until the grant funds are expended.

The grant fund will be dedicated to funding the following categories of projects:

- a. Education, particularly of young people, to develop an understanding and appreciation for coastal environments and watersheds. Examples of eligible activities include, but are not limited to: improving school curriculum materials about coastal resources and their management; program development or expansion by coastal education organizations; and developing school based monitoring programs.
- b. Conservation, restoration, enhancement or protection of coastal and marine areas, including wetlands and watersheds. Examples of eligible activities include, but are not limited to: coastal erosion control; mitigation of impacts from off-road vehicles on wetlands; improving fish passage in anadromous fish streams; coastal resource protection through habitat protection, including land acquisition; marine debris removal; and coastal resource inventory, mapping and monitoring.

Criteria for grant funds will include the following (the CPC may develop additional criteria as needed and appropriate):

- (1) Project can be implemented within two (2) years.
- (2) Project meets one or more of the categories of uses authorized in the CIAP legislation and is consistent with the intent of the legislation.
- (3) Project is coordinated with other federal and state resources and programs when possible.
- (4) Duplication of projects or program activities is avoided.
- (5) Collaboration with state and federal agencies, non-profit organizations and other entities is considered and incorporated when appropriate and beneficial to the project.

- (6) Project request is not an alternative or replacement for existing resources and funding sources.
- (7) Project justification demonstrates the need for funding.
- (8) Project will not pose or create environmental or public health problems.
- (9) Assurance is given by the applicant that all costs beyond the approved allocation can and will be borne by the applicant.
- (10) Applicant has demonstrated a commitment and ability to maintain and monitor the project.
- (11) Applicant has demonstrated meaningful public involvement in project selection.
- (12) The project has a high likelihood of success.

**Allocation:** \$3.1 million for grants and grant administration.

The proposed competitive grant fund is consistent with the following authorized uses:

- conservation, restoration, enhancement or protection of coastal or marine habitats including wetlands, estuaries, coastal fishery resources and coral reefs, including projects to remove abandoned vessels or marine debris that may adversely affect coastal habitats.
- protection and restoration of natural coastline protective features, including control of coastal erosion.
- projects that promote research, education, training and advisory services in fields related to coastal and Great Lakes living marine resource use and management.
- projects and activities for the conservation, protection or restoration of wetlands.

2. Provide grant funds for Alaska Coastal Resource Districts

\$200,000 of CIAP funds will be used to increase the amount available for the state's thirty-five coastal resource districts to conduct special projects (such as updating coastal district management plans) under section 306 of the federal Coastal Zone Management Act. All coastal districts may apply for these funds in the same manner as they apply for section 306 grants except that no local match is required and proposed uses must be consistent with the uses authorized under the CIAP legislation. Coastal resource districts may also apply for the competitive grants described above.

**Allocation:** \$200,000 for grants.

The proposed grant fund is consistent with the following authorized uses:

- activities which support and are consistent with National Estuary programs, including National Estuarine Research Reserve programs, the National Marine Sanctuary Act, the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act, or the Coastal Zone Management Act.

- implementation of Federally approved marine, coastal, or comprehensive conservation management plans.
  - assistance to local communities to assess, plan for and manage the impacts of growth and development on coastal or marine habitats and natural resources, including coastal community fishery assistance programs that encourage participation in sustainable fisheries.
3. Establish an information system for useable and accessible shared oceans, coastal and watershed information.

In order to maintain the health and economic viability of Alaska's oceans, watersheds and coastal areas, it is critical that management and policy decisions be based on sound scientific information. When scientific information does not underlie decisions, there is a risk of lost economic opportunities or, alternatively, there may be irreversible damage to ocean and coastal resources and environments. Yet, much of the ocean, coastal, and watershed information scientists have already produced is not easily accessible or useable by state, federal, local government or tribal resource managers, industry, policy makers, non-governmental organizations and the public.

As one public commenter stated:

Reports, studies, maps, surveys, aerial photos, satellite images, and associated information have been produced by many sources over the years. Much of this information is used for one project and then filed and forgotten. This data would be useful for many additional purposes over many years if people could find and use it. When this information is not used, the value of the unseen data is wasted. Decisions are made without appropriate information, redundant information is unnecessarily recreated, project costs are increased, efficiency and time is lost . . . There is a growing need for a coordinated comprehensive approach to providing baseline and updated information about coastal resources, including the uplands and watersheds that affect the coastal resources . . . .

To address this need, State CIAP funds will be used to establish an information system that will provide Alaska ocean, coastal and watershed information and data in a manner that is readily useable to state, federal, local and tribal agencies, industry, policy makers, non-governmental organizations and the public.

Several systems are currently being developed to centralize ocean, coastal and watershed related information (for example, the multi-agency Cook Inlet Information Management and Monitoring System (CIIMMS) and ADF&G's Integrated Coastal Resources Database System). Most systems being developed are region or project specific but have the potential for statewide expansion. The project proposed here will not duplicate existing efforts, but rather will strive to coordinate those efforts, reduce the duplication that currently exists, and cover all state ocean, coastal and watershed areas. In addition, the project will include training for state, local government, and tribal resource managers, policy makers, educators, industry, and the public in the use of the system.

A concurrent effort will involve working with government research entities to ensure that the results of scientific research are summarized in a manner that is meaningful and useable for decision-makers and the public. The information will be incorporated into the centralized information system. Another component of the system will be to gather and make available local knowledge that may assist coastal resource decision-making and research. To assist in this effort, funds may be provided to tribal and non-profit organizations engaged in collecting and disseminating local knowledge.

CIAP funds will be used for state staff, contractors or consultants, and the equipment necessary to establish, implement and maintain the information system. Funds may be provided to on-going state efforts as appropriate. To ensure a broad-based approach in the development of the system, the project will be located within the state Division of Governmental Coordination.

**Allocation:** \$1.7 million for personnel, contractual, equipment, travel and other associated costs.

The proposed information system is consistent with the following authorized uses:

- activities which support and are consistent with National Estuary programs, including National Estuarine Research Reserve programs, the National Marine Sanctuary Act, the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act, or the Coastal Zone Management Act.
- addressing watershed protection or other coastal or marine conservation needs which cross jurisdictional boundaries.
- assessment, research, mapping and monitoring of coastal or marine resources and habitats, including, where appropriate, the establishment and monitoring of marine protected areas.
- projects that promote research, education, training and advisory services in fields related to coastal and Great Lakes living marine resource use and management.

#### 4. Coastal Resource Inventory Project

Baseline coastal resource inventory information is needed to provide information to coastal resource districts, government and tribal agencies, industry, non-governmental organizations and the public for planning purposes. Federal, state, and municipal agencies collect a wide range of environmental and socioeconomic resource information regarding coastal areas and the surrounding environment. However, at the present time, this data collection is not coordinated with local needs and many agencies and local governments may not be aware of some of the information that is collected. CIAP funds will be used to initiate a resource inventory project with the following initial products:

- a. compilation of a catalogue of existing coastal resource inventory data (will be incorporated into the information system described above),

- b. an assessment of information needed by local, state, federal and tribal agencies and user groups for ocean, coastal and watershed management and planning;
- c. identification of resource data gaps; and
- d. development of a strategy for multi-agency coordination to maintain and add to existing information.

Gathering data to fill identified gaps will occur as additional funds become available or through other funding sources. Consideration will be given to developing a program for gathering resource inventory data on an annual basis by schools or other local entities. For example, there is a need for monitoring water quality around the coast. With funding from the coastal impact assistance program, the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation could provide schools with the equipment and training needed to gather water quality data annually. The information would be fed into the ocean and coastal information system so it is accessible to resource managers and the public.

Commenters identified a need for satellite imagery and updated maps, such as floodplain, habitat and hazard maps, for coastal areas. Funds are currently insufficient for a statewide effort. However, smaller projects may be considered based on the resource inventory needs assessment conducted above and if additional funds become available. In addition, the State will participate as much as possible in any federal remote sensing or mapping projects to help focus the projects on areas and issues important to Alaska. The State will work to ensure the information is generally available.

In order to coordinate across agency lines, the project will be located in the Division of Governmental Coordination.

**Allocation:** \$800,000 for personnel, equipment, contractual, travel and other associated costs.

The proposed coastal resource inventory project is consistent with the following authorized uses:

- activities which support and are consistent with National Estuary programs, including National Estuarine Research Reserve programs, the National Marine Sanctuary Act, the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act, or the Coastal Zone Management Act.
- addressing watershed protection or other coastal or marine conservation needs which cross jurisdictional boundaries.
- assessment, research, mapping and monitoring of coastal or marine resources and habitats, including, where appropriate, the establishment and monitoring of marine protected areas.

- projects that promote research, education, training and advisory services in fields related to coastal and Great Lakes living marine resource use and management.

#### 5. Cataloging Anadromous Fish Streams

The State of Alaska and local governments are committed to protecting fish habitat and water quality. Fully functioning fish habitat is necessary to maintain and rebuild the fish stocks that support a significant component of the state's economy as well as being critical for subsistence and recreational life-styles.

Alaska Statute 16.05.870 provides the Alaska Department of Fish and Game with the authority to protect anadromous fish habitat. However, that authority is limited to only those waters that have been formally listed in the Anadromous Waters Catalog. Listing occurs through a lengthy biological and public review process. ADF&G has very limited authority to protect anadromous habitat not listed in the Anadromous Waters Catalog.

Previous fish habitat assessments in Alaska demonstrated significant data gaps in the understanding of the distribution and condition of fish habitat. The current edition of Alaska's Anadromous Waters Catalog contains 15,209 water bodies for which there is documented evidence of anadromous fish use. However, field work indicates that the number of streams and lakes in Alaska actually used by anadromous fish may be three to five times higher than the currently reported tally.

CIAP funds will be used to assist ADF&G in continuing field efforts to inventory and list anadromous waters, focussing on areas at risk from future development activities. In addition, the field inventory will collect information on the habitat requirements of Alaska's resident and anadromous fish so as to better ensure that in-water, riparian, and watershed activities do not impact the ability of these habitats to produce healthy fish runs.

Since 1998, the ADF&G has been developing the technological tools necessary to allow the effective distribution of the collected field data. As part of this project, ADF&G will continue to seek systems to conveniently share collected information with federal, state, and local and tribal agencies, non-governmental organizations, and the public.

**Allocation:** \$1 million for personnel, equipment, contractual, travel and other associated costs.

The proposed cataloguing project is consistent with the following authorized uses:

- protection, restoration and enhancement of coastal water quality consistent with the provisions of the Coastal Zone Management Act (16 U.S.C. 1451 et seq.), including the reduction or monitoring of coastal polluted runoff or other coastal contaminants.
- assessment, research, mapping and monitoring of coastal or marine resources and habitats, including, where appropriate, the establishment and monitoring of marine protected areas.

6. Regional coastal program planning for areas not covered by coastal district coastal management plans

Three regions of the state are not currently covered by local coastal management plans; Prince William Sound, Northern Southeast Alaska, and Southern Southeast Alaska. CIAP funds will be used to develop regional coastal management plans for these areas. Regional plans will provide site-specific policies to address coastal resource development in the three areas. The plans will be developed either by a locally elected Coastal Resource Service Area (CRSA) Board, or by the state Department of Community and Economic Development, depending on whether a CRSA is formed by the voters in that region.

**Allocation:** \$750,000 for personnel, equipment, contractual, travel and associated costs.

The proposed planning effort is consistent with the following authorized uses:

- activities which support and are consistent with National Estuary programs, including National Estuarine Research Reserve programs, the National Marine Sanctuary Act, the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act, or the Coastal Zone Management Act.
- addressing watershed protection or other coastal or marine conservation needs which cross jurisdictional boundaries.
- assistance to local communities to assess, plan for and manage the impacts of growth and development on coastal or marine habitats and natural resources, including coastal community fishery assistance programs that encourage participation in sustainable fisheries.
- implementation of Federally approved marine, coastal, or comprehensive conservation management plans.

7. Ocean, Coastal & Watershed Symposium and Report

The State will sponsor a symposium bringing together scientists, state and federal agencies, universities, stakeholders, and members of the public to assess the state of Alaska's oceans, coasts and watersheds. Results of the symposium will be incorporated into a State of the Oceans and Watersheds Report that will include policy recommendations for addressing ocean, coastal and watershed management. The agenda for the symposium is currently being developed.

**Allocation:** Up to \$150,000 for costs associated with the symposium and report, and a travel fund to ensure broad geographic and interest group participation.

The proposed symposium and report is consistent with the following authorized uses:

- addressing watershed protection or other coastal or marine conservation needs which cross jurisdictional boundaries.
- assessment, research, mapping and monitoring of coastal or marine resources and habitats, including, where appropriate, the establishment and monitoring of marine protected areas.
- projects that promote research, education, training and advisory services in fields related to coastal and Great Lakes living marine resource use and management.

8. CIAP Plan Implementation and Administrative Costs

Due to time constraints, this plan is written in general terms. Additional staff time is needed to develop the details for each proposed activity, including working with coastal communities on local project details, and possibly to develop the memorandum of understanding with NOAA for disbursement of funds. In addition, once the plan is approved and the activities undertaken, there will be a need for administration of the funds, particularly the competitive grant funding. CIAP funds will be used for continuing costs of plan development and for administrative costs when the funds are disbursed.

**Allocation:** \$235,670 for the first year (July 1, 2001 to July 1, 2002) for plan development and fund administration. Future administrative costs will be funded as necessary from funded activities.

The proposed administrative allocation is consistent with the following authorized use:

- planning assistance and administrative costs of complying with the provisions of the coastal impact assistance legislation.

V. **COORDINATION WITH OTHER FEDERAL RESOURCES AND PROGRAMS**

The CIAP legislation requires that the state plan contain "measures for taking into account other relevant federal resources and programs" (§31(d)(2)(E)).

Federal agencies have had the opportunity to review and comment on this plan. The State will consider existing federal resources when implementing the activities proposed in this plan and, to the extent feasible, will coordinate with federal agencies conducting similar activities.

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## VI. COASTAL POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS

### A. Background

Under the CIAP legislation, thirty-five percent, or \$4,273,053, of the state's total allocation will be distributed to the state's coastal political subdivisions. A coastal political subdivision is defined as a "county, parish, or any equivalent subdivision" (§31(a)(1)). In Alaska, a coastal political subdivision equivalent is an organized borough or coastal resource service area (CRSA). There are eighteen eligible coastal subdivisions in Alaska. The allocation to each eligible community is based on the following formula:

(A) 25% allocated based on the ratio of the coastal political subdivision's coastal population to the coastal population of all coastal political subdivisions in the state;

(B) 25% allocated based on the ratio of the coastal political subdivision's coastline miles to the coastline miles of all coastal political subdivisions in the state;

(C) 50% allocated based on the relative distance of the coastal political subdivision from any OCS leased tract used to calculate the allocation using ratios that are inversely proportional to the distance between the point on the coastal political subdivision closest to the geographic center of each leased tract or portion, as determined by the Secretary.

NOAA calculated the funding allocation for each borough and CRSA. Official allocations were provided to the state and communities on April 16, 2001.

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**B. Coastal Political Subdivisions - Use of Local CIAP Funds**

Under the CIAP legislation, the state plan must include "a contact for each political subdivision and description of how coastal political subdivisions will use amounts provided under the program" (§31(D)(2)(C)).

Coastal political subdivision uses proposed by each subdivision are summarized in Appendix A. Subdivision contact information is provided in Appendix B. Coastal political subdivision project back-up material, some of which includes specific budget detail, is provided in Attachment 2. Due to the short time frame for plan development, some coastal political subdivisions submitted a list of possible projects for CIAP funding that exceed their allocation, others provided only general descriptions of the type of projects they will undertake. Specific project selection by the local government will be made following submission of the Coastal Impact Assistance Plan and in conformance with the Memorandum of Understanding that may be developed between the State and NOAA.

The local governing body for each coastal political subdivision has submitted a resolution approving acceptance and use of CIAP funds. The resolutions are included in Attachment 2.

PATRICK GALVIN, Director, Governmental Coordination, commented that the Division of Governmental Coordination (DGC) was requesting \$7,835.7 million dollars in federal authority to implement the Coastal Impact Assistance Program (CIAP) to help mitigate effects of the outer continental shelf oil and gas exploration and development activities. Uses of the CIAP funds would include:

- Conservation
- Restoration
- Enhancement or protection of coastal or marine habitat, wetlands, watersheds and water quality
- Education and training
- Mapping and research
- Implementation of federal conservation management plans

Mr. Galvin continued, under the CIAP, Alaska would receive a one-time allocation of \$12.2 million dollars. Based on the CIAP legislation, 35% of the total, or \$4.27 million dollars, would be divided among 18 coastal boroughs and Coastal Resource Service Areas (CRSAs). The community funds would be disbursed directly from the federal government to the communities. The remaining \$7.9 million dollars would be allocated to the State of Alaska. He pointed out that the Division of Governmental Coordination (DGC), FY02 operating budget does contain \$100.0 of the CIAP funds. Consequently, the RPL addresses only the \$7.8 million dollars allocated to the State.

Mr. Galvin discussed the designation of the monies:

Mr. Galvin noted that the Grant Program would establish the grant criteria, solicit project proposals and select projects to receive the funds. The grant program would be open to applications from coastal resource districts, State and local government agencies, tribal organizations, non-

profit organizations, individuals, private industry and other interested parties.

Mr. Galvin further noted that the Coastal Impact Assistance Program was a one-time appropriation that was part of the compromise reached in the closing negotiations last year in the Congress of the Conservation and Reinvestment Act (CARA). The Coastal Impact Assistance Program is part of what is now commonly referred to as the CARA-lite package.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER asked how the members of the Coastal Policy Council (CPC) would be selected.

PATRICK GALVIN replied that the Council already exists and oversees the Alaska Coastal Management Program. He advised that there are six State agencies represented and nine locally elected officials from coastal communities within the State. These people make up the Coastal Policy Council and that they make the policy decisions for the coastal management program. He emphasized that it was important to establish a mechanism for administration of the potential coastal impact grants without creating a new group specifically for that one-time concern.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER responded that two categories had been established, education & conservation and restoration & enhancement. He questioned the need to include "education".

LISA WEISSLER, Project Analyst, Coastal Impact Assistance Program, explained that the Division has solicited public input for ideas and that education had been one of the proposed criteria to be included.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER understood that during the 30-day public comment period, the Division received only thirty to forty responses. He commented that those people providing services in those areas were sure to give "feedback" to the Division. He stated that he did not support that aspect of the program.

LISA WEISSLER responded that there were two public comment periods. The first one lasted for fifteen days and following that, the Division put the plan out for the public for a thirty-day comment review period.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER interjected that the plan states that the funds could be used for conservation, restoration, or enhancement of coastal marine habitat. He stressed that was all encompassing considering that 25% of Alaska is wetlands. He added that there are a number of capital projects each year which the State has not been able to fund. He believed that this funding could help with those projects. Representative Mulder reiterated his opposition to including the educational projects.

PATRICK GALVIN explained that included in the federal legislation, no more than 23% of the funds could be used for infrastructure, and only infrastructure, which is directly related to mitigating the impact of offshore oil and gas development. The only oil and gas qualifying for that would be off the North Slope.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER asked if the Cook Inlet would be included in that section.

PATRICK GALVIN responded that the definition of offshore oil and gas excludes anything that is within the area between three and six miles from the shore. He stated that would significantly limit the ability of DGC to look at the infrastructure project.

Mr. Galvin continued, a large portion of the Coastal Impact Assistance Program that go directly to local governments would be directly to the North Slope Borough. He commented that it would be inappropriate to look for other infrastructure projects within the borough using the State's portion of the fund.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER advised that he had not heard of that portion of the offshore impact reference. He pointed out that he had spoken directly with the U.S. Secretary of the Interior and the Governor's Chief of Staff and that point had not been brought up. He requested a reference for that.

LISA WEISSLER read from Authorization Section of that U.S. Legislation: [Copy on File].

"(6) Mitigating impacts of Outer continental Shelf activities through funding of (A) onshore infrastructure projects and (B) other public service needs intended to mitigate the environmental effects of Outer Continental Shelf activities: *Provided*, that funds made available under this paragraph shall not exceed 23 percent of the funds provided under this section."

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER asked if that amount would apply to the entire appropriation.

LISA WEISSLER responded that it would.

CHAIR THERRIAULT inquired if it would be ongoing funding.

PATRICK GALVIN replied it would not.

CHAIR THERRIAULT voiced his concern if it would turn into ongoing funding through the operations of CARA, then the Committee would want to be careful how to set up the

expending mechanism. He believed that there should be a "sensible" way to break the costs down for the development.

Chair Therriault questioned the amount requested for the implementation and administration of the plan.

LISA WEISSLER pointed out that only four months had been allocated to develop the plan. For the past several months, the Division has been working on a detailed implementation plan. She added that there would be continuing work associated with the competitive grant program.

CHAIR THERRIAULT asked if there would be a problem performing development of that plan before the grant money had been received.

LISA WEISSLER responded that the Division would be uncomfortable with the solicitation of proposals if the funds were not available.

SENATOR HOFFMAN questioned how fish stock rebuilding and the cataloging of fish streams would be accomplished. He questioned who would be contracted to do the work and why there was a need for two new positions.

PATRICK GALVIN explained that the Department of Fish & Game would do the contractual work as they provided the work plan.

CHAIR THERRIAULT interjected that contractual services would not be issued to a non-State entity. All contracting must be from one State agency to another.

SENATOR HOFFMAN reiterated his query of how the fish stocks would be rebuilt.

ELLEN FRITTS, Deputy Director, Division of Habitat and Restoration, Department of Fish & Game, (Testified via Teleconference), explained that the intent of the cataloging would be so that the Department could provide additional information to the current catalogue of the anadromous waters. That action would place those waters under the protection of Title 16, Section .870, which requires permitting. The point of the increment would improve protection of the spawning and rearing areas and all of the critical places which need to be rebuilt because of current problems.

SENATOR HOFFMAN referenced Page 4, "rebuilding" of fish stocks.

ELLEN FRITTS explained that money had not been designated for rebuilding of fish stocks. She believed that statement indicates the State's need to do a "better job" of

protecting fish stocks and the habitat that those stocks need.

SENATOR HOFFMAN pointed out that the State already has a cataloguing of 15,209 water bodies, including documented evidence of anadromous fish use. He asked why an additional million dollars was necessary.

ELLEN FRITTS acknowledged that a catalogue currently does exist; however, the Division estimates that Alaska has less than 60% of its anadromous fish habitat catalogued. She emphasized that 40% of the fish habitat is not protected by a permit program.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER referenced the statement read by Ms. Weissler, which specifically refers to the mitigating of the outer continental shelf activities. He did not believe that percentage was applicable to the projects for conservation and protection of the wetlands and the comprehensive management plans. He questioned if they would be subject to the 23% limitation.

PATRICK GALVIN agreed that they were not and added that was why they had been included in the grant description.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER stressed that these were one-time funds and that he would like to see those funds used more beneficially for the State as opposed to looking at this as an ongoing revenue stream.

PATRICK GALVIN inquired if it was the will of the Committee to receive the applications for review in order to understand the actual projects proposed.

CHAIR THERRIAULT recommended that should be a policy call of the Coastal Policy Council determining the percentages used for each category.

SENATOR WILKEN referenced Page 7 of the handout. He asked about the nine new proposed positions and what would happen with them next year when the funding was gone.

LISA WEISSLER advised that this was to be a three-year project and when the money goes away, the positions would go away.

CHAIR THERRIAULT commented that in order for it to become a three-year project, the Division will need to request a funding source shift.

SENATOR WILKEN referenced Page 9 of the handout, warning that the full impact on the general fund will not be known, until the CIAP projects are completed.

PATRICK GALVIN addressed the "positive" impact of the project on the State's budget. He projected that there could possibly be a decrease from requested amounts.

SENATOR WILKEN referenced Page 15 of the handout, Section 6-Coastal Political Subdivisions, Paragraph A.

"In Alaska, a coastal political subdivision Equivalent is an organized borough or coastal resource service area (CRSA)."

Senator Wilken asked where that designation had occurred.

PATRICK GALVIN replied that there is not a designation in State law that a CRSA is a political subdivision. However, the intent of the Division was to comply with the intent of the federal statute that makes "county-equivalents" eligible for that "other" portion of the fund. It refers back to the previous sentence:

"A coastal political subdivision is defined as a 'county, parish, or any equivalent subdivision' (~31(a)(1))."

Mr. Galvin acknowledged how that would apply to Alaska is debatable. He stated that the Division felt that the intent was to have the money available for as much of the State's coastal communities as possible, and that the regional coastal management entities in those service areas should also receive the funding. A new definition of coastal political subdivision has been included in the current CARA bill going through Congress, and it would allow coastal cities not within a regional entity to share in the local portion of the funding.

SEANTOR WILKEN voiced his concern that the CRSA's not be eliminated.

PATRICK GALVIN acknowledged that CRSA's would be included.

CHAIR THERRIALT referenced the spreadsheet listed on Page 3 of the handout, pointing out that regional coastal planning was one of the components. He advised that the definition was listed on Page 5:

"Three regions of the state are not currently covered by local coastal management plans; Prince William Sound, Northern Southeast Alaska, and Southern Southeast Alaska."

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REPRESENTATIVE DAVIES asked if the areas were exclusive boroughs or if they would include coastal cities.

PATRICK GALVIN explained that within the definition of eligibility, a municipality within a borough could not be included and that there would be no overlap.

REPRESENTATIVE DAVIES addressed the education project, recommending that it be a separate category.

PATRICK GALVIN agreed that was a good idea.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER referenced the computer based information system. He commented that once a computer system is established, someone needs to be available to maintain and operate it.

LISA WEISSLER stated that the data would be centralized within the agencies that collect and maintain it. She added that there is potential for future federal grants for that type of system. In response to Representative Mulder, Ms. Weissler added that there is much information currently collected by the State. The computer system would network all the inter-agency information and make it available at one site.

PATRICK GALVIN added that the computer system would provide an "entry point" that would indicate where permittees and applicants would need to go to gather the information that they need to complete the process.

LISA WEISSLER responded to concerns voiced by Representative Mulder, explaining that the federal government would be willing to help with that funding in the future. The feds are interested in the State's proposal and they are building Alaska into their budget. The State does not want to lose the momentum they have achieved to date.

CHAIR THERIAULT pointed out that the funds would become available in the federal fiscal year.

PATRICK GALVIN commented that the proposed funds are available in the current federal fiscal year and will be available in October 2001, if there is approval of the State plan by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

CHAIR THERIAULT asked if the Committee provided partial approval, would a delay jeopardize the remaining money.

PATRICK GALVIN replied that if the projects proposed were accepted, the funding would not be jeopardized.

SENATOR WARD asked if the funds could lapse.

PATRICK GALVIN replied they would not.

LISA WEISSLER explained that NOAA has indicated that they may establish a three-year limit.

PATRICK GALVIN stressed that the plan needs Committee approval.

REPRESENTATIVE DAVIES inquired if the three-year limit was on the total expenditure for that project.

LISA WEISSLER replied that she did not know for sure, however, believed that it would be funded for the time spent on the total project.

CHAIR THERRIAULT asked about the language referencing establishing of a "trust fund".

PATRICK GALVIN explained that the word "trust" was used in the description of the authorized use of the funds. In discussing that option with NOAA and the agencies that have experience with trusts, there were two primary issues. The first was if the State administrative burden would be eased and second, if there would be interest accumulated on that part, which the State could spend in the future. Absent other federal language, NOAA lawyers have indicated that the State would not accumulate the interest. Based on this, it is unlikely that the State will pursue a trust structure.

CHAIR THERRIAULT referenced the breakdown for the competitive grant program. He asked if the competitive grants portion was not approved, could the Division still move forward with the program.

PATRICK GALVIN advised that the \$16 thousand dollars for travel would be needed for the scheduled meetings of the Coastal Policy Council to review the grants for approval; however, he believed that amount could be merged into the CPC's current budget for the time being.

LISA WEISSLER explained that the contractual amount of \$168.1 thousand dollars would be used for the grant administrator position within the Department of Community & Economic Development. She indicated that amount was not essential until there are grants to manage.

PATRICK GALVIN explained how that program would work.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER asked for a description of the coastal resource inventory project request in the amount of \$800.0 thousand dollars.

LISA WEISSLER explained that during the public comment period, people understood that there was a lot of information available but they did not know what it was or where it was located. She indicated that the project has two components. The first would be to determine what is available, leading to the information system. The remaining portion would be to create an information identification system and determine information needs.

PATRICK GALVIN interjected that the component is critical, as relevant and important information exists for making decisions but it is not currently accessible. He reiterated that there is no mechanism currently available in the State system, which makes that information readily available.

SENATOR WARD referenced the competitive grant fund component. He asked if there was a reason that fund did not extract funding from one of the other components.

PATRICK GALVIN clarified that NOAA is currently reviewing the plan for approval. To amend the plan, the State would have to go back to NOAA. The proposed plan includes described categories and the projects associated with each.

SENATOR WARD asked what the process would be to go back to NOAA and change the current agreement.

PATRICK GALVIN understood that would mean going back out for public comment. That is an obligation under federal law.

SENATOR WARD inquired if the local communities had recommended that amount be allocated for the resource inventory project.

PATRICK GALVIN stated that the local communities indicated that they would like information available and a place to access that information. He added that the proposed project summary was the one agreed to by the local communities.

SENATOR WARD asked if a list of projects proposed by the local communities was available.

PATRICK GALVIN responded that there are two different lists. One is part of the proposed State plan and the other is a list of "other" projects.

LISA WEISSLER listed some of the cementers who provided input during the comment period:

- University
- Alaska University Fisheries Center
- Gulf of Alaska Coastal Community Coalition
- Joseph Bader

- National Wildlife Refuge
- Regional Guide Fisheries Association
- Cook Inlet Aquaculture Association

Ms. Weissler noted that there was no criteria or application available to select projects proposed by those that commented. In order to deal with them and recommend specific projects, funding for the competitive grant fund needed to be set aside. She added that there had been \$14 million dollars worth of projects proposed.

CHAIR THERRIault recommended deferring projects for the full Legislature to consider. He added that there will be another two LBA Committee meetings scheduled over the next few months.

REPRESENTATIVE MULDER MOVED to DELETE the request of \$3,100.0 thousand dollars for the Competitive Grant Fund until actual projects are determined. He added to delete the Symposium & Report project in the amount of \$150.0 thousand dollars.

Representative Mulder MOVED to ADOPT the request for the Information System in the amount of \$1,700.0 thousand dollars; \$1,000.0 dollars for Cataloguing the Streams; \$800.0 thousand dollars for the Resource Inventory; \$750.0 thousand dollars for the Regional Coastal Planning; and \$200.0 thousand dollars for the Coastal District Grants.

Representative Mulder MOVED to REDUCE the Plan Implementation to \$50.0 thousand dollars.

REPRESENTATIVE JOULE asked if the full Legislature would be addressing the two projects being recommended for deletion.

CHAIR THERRIault responded that perhaps they would if the Program had proposals for the full Legislature to consider.

DAVID TEAL, Director, Division of Legislative Finance, [Testified via Teleconference], interjected that all the projects are likely to be before the full Legislature in FY03. He pointed out that the proposal is an operating RPL and that the timeline is for three years. He noted that it was the intent of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) to come back before the full Legislature and have the operating money converted into a capitol project.

Mr. Teal added that because this is an operating RPL, it does not matter what the LBA Committee specifies the money can be technically used for. It is just an operating appropriation and they can use it for anything they want.
