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# I. INTRODUCTION

## *Preface*

Leaking underground storage tanks have impacted a number of public drinking water systems in Alaska. Benzene, a petroleum component and known carcinogen, poses a significant threat to human health and the environment. Over 50 percent of all pre-1998 underground storage tank (UST) systems in Alaska leaked over time, impacting soils and groundwater.

### *A. Statement of Purpose*

On June 7, 1990, the Governor of Alaska signed into law House Bill 220 which amended Alaska Statutes, Title 46, Chapter 3. Effective on September 5, 1990, this new law is commonly referred to as the "Underground Storage Tank Statute." Among the provisions in the statute, the Storage Tank Assistance Fund was established to provide technical and financial assistance to tank owners and operators in an effort to prevent new spills and cleanup old spills. The following annual report to the legislature is submitted pursuant to Alaska Statutes Section 46.03.410.

### *B. Federal Law*

Subtitle I to the 1984 Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments to the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) requires, in part, that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulate USTs containing petroleum and hazardous substances. At that time, the EPA estimated that out of several million USTs nationwide, tens of thousands might be leaking; as of 9/30/99, over 400,000 confirmed releases nationwide have proven that initial estimate to

be far too low. The resultant groundwater contamination threatens a major source of the country's drinking water.

Congress directed the EPA to develop regulations for the design, construction, and installation of new tanks, as well as for the addition of leak detection, corrosion prevention, and spill and overflow protection to existing tanks. The EPA regulations went into effect on December 22, 1988. USTs installed on or before that date are considered "existing tanks," and those tanks installed after that date are considered "new installations." New installations must meet the performance standards set out in the regulations at the time of tank installation. Existing tanks were allowed to phase in these standards over a period of 10 years.

Congress also mandated that all UST owners, except state and federally owned or operated tanks, be able to demonstrate specific levels of financial responsibility for corrective action and cleanup associated with releases from their USTs, including third party loss and bodily injury. The most common type of financial responsibility is commercial pollution insurance.

The financial responsibility requirements were phased in according to the type of owner and the number of tanks owned; the final date for most tank owners to meet this requirement was December 31, 1993. Indian tribes owning USTs on Indian lands had until December 1998 to comply. Most tank owners are required to demonstrate \$1 million of financial responsibility per occurrence and \$2 million aggregate.

### *C. State Law*

It was primarily due to the EPA's 1998 UST regulations that the Alaska legislature introduced the Alaska UST Legislation. During the legislative process, the EPA informed Alaskan lawmakers that federal budget cutbacks would prevent the agency from providing owners with technical assistance for complying with the newly mandated performance requirements. The EPA program would consist of enforcement only, and failure to meet performance standards could result in fines of \$10,000 per day. The EPA may authorize states to implement their own UST program in place of the federal requirements if the state's requirements are "no less stringent" than EPA's and provide for adequate regulatory enforcement.

It was evident to lawmakers that Alaska tank owners covered by EPA's UST regulations would be hard pressed to meet the new standards. The lawmakers also recognized that the regulations governing underground storage tanks systems might not be easily understood by the public.

Rather than relying solely on an enforcement program after problems developed, the Alaska legislature passed proactive legislation (HB 220), providing technical and educational assistance as well as incentives for compliance with federal and state requirements by: setting performance standards for both new and existing UST systems; providing for corrective action activities and cleanup standards for leaking USTs; mandating that the Department of Environmental Conservation provide educational assistance to UST owners and operators; requiring the certification of UST workers; requiring registration of all USTs; establishing a Board of Storage Tank Assistance; and providing guidelines for the administration of the Storage Tank Assistance Fund.

Effective July 1, 1999, Senate Bill 128 established a new cleanup loan program, set owner/operator net worth ceilings for grant eligibility, and established a June 30, 1999 sunset date (subsequently extended to 6/30/01 by House Bill 432) for the Board of Storage Tank Assistance.

\*Cleanup applications were accepted through June 30, 1996 for those applicants that had an upgrade and closure application on file on or before December 30, 1994 and disclosed and reported contamination before July 1, 1996 and can prove that contamination occurred before December 22, 1993.

#### D. Storage Tank Assistance Fund

The Alaska legislation establishing the Storage Tank Assistance Fund made funds available for program implementation, staffing, and administration of the following financial assistance programs: reimbursement incentives for tank tightness testing or site assessments (AS 46.03.415); grants and loans for risk assessment, containment, corrective action, and cleanup costs (AS 46.03.420); and grants for tank system upgrades and closure (AS 46.03.430). Table 1 (Summary of UST Financial Assistance Programs), briefly describes the eligible costs and the assistance provided in each of these programs.

Pursuant to legislation, the Department promulgated regulations (18 AAC 78) on the general requirements for financial assistance eligibility, ineligible costs, project priority ranking procedures, application requirements, conditions of financial assistance, and grant payment procedures.

House Bill 513, signed into law on June 9, 1994, modified the UST law by establishing a December 30, 1994 application deadline for the closure and upgrade program, and extending the application period for cleanup assistance for those applicants who have met the closure/upgrade deadline or those who are already on the closure/upgrade waiting list. To be eligible for this extension, the spill had to be reported by July 1, 1996 and must have occurred before December 22, 1993.

Senate Bill 128, effective July 1, 1999, further modified Alaska's UST law, establishing a new cleanup loan program and owner/oper-

tor net worth ceilings for grant eligibility, as well as a June 30, 2000 sunset date for the Board of Storage Tank Assistance.

House Bill 432, effective June 7, 2000, extends the Board sunset date to June 30, 2001; expands Board authority to review of cleanup decisions and issuance of a recommendation to the Department; and exempts non-profit entities from the tangible net worth ceilings of SB 128.

Following are the annual appropriations to the Storage Tank Assistance Fund since inception:

For Fiscal Year 1998, the Fund was budgeted for the first time as a Capital Project rather than under the Operating Budget, recognizing the fact that site remediation, tank upgrade, and closure projects particularly with the short Alaskan construction seasons and long term nature of the projects, are more appropriately budgeted to capital projects than an annual operating budget.

## II. ABSTRACT

This report summarizes:

- (1) the amount and source of money received by the fund during fiscal year 2000 (FY 00);
- (2) the amount of money expended during FY 00 for each type of expense authorized under AS 46.03.410(b);
- (3) the Department activities paid for from the fund during FY 00 including the number of requests for assistance which have been made to the Department to use the fund and the number of requests funded in each activity area;
- (4) the financial assistance program from inception through December 31, 2000.

### III. FY 00 FUND SUMMARY

#### A. Funding & Appropriations

The Oil and Hazardous Substance Response Prevention Fund served as the source of the Storage Tank Assistance Fund's appropriation in FY 00.

Table 2 reflects appropriations from the Fund to finance program operations, fiscal and other services provided by the Department.

**B. Expenditures**

As shown on Table 2, as of June 30, 2000, the unspent balance of the FY 00 storage tank grants was \$5 million.

**C. Program Activities Summary**

**1. Grant Activities**

Table 3 summarizes each type of assistance program for which funds were expended or encumbered in FY 00.

Appendix A provides additional detail of the program expenditures by grant and facility location. Tank cleanup project are typically the most expensive and, in the past, accounted for the great-

est amount of funds expended. During FY 99 the Department focussed efforts toward assisting tank owners and operators with their tank closures and upgrades prior to the December 1998 deadline by devoting twice as much funding to upgrade and closure projects as was committed to cleanup projects. Further, the Department entered into Compliance Orders By Consent (COBCs) for owner/operators who did not meet the 1998 deadline. The COBCs established new schedules which clearly outlined the tank activities to be accomplished, deadlines for the accomplishments of project milestones, and penalties.

As a result, FY 00 activities involved managing the FY 99 grants that were issued (processing amendments and payment requests) and reviewing net worth eligibility for future grant applicants.

## 2. Program Activities

The following activities illustrate what it takes to administer the state Underground Storage Tank Program to prevent, detect and correct leaks as well as to provide technical, educational and financial assistance to regulated underground storage tank owners and operators.

- Completed modifications necessary in the grant and loan program to satisfy requirements of SB 128, which changed the eligibility requirements for grant applicants, and established a new loan program.
- Sent net worth certification forms to 348 waitlisted grant applicants for Tank Cleanup, Upgrade and Closure grants. Reviewed responses for eligibility under SB 128 guidelines.
- Initiated changes to regulations consistent with SB 128. Revised after public comment, with an effective date of April 16, 2000, and also revised the UST Procedures Manual.
- Initiated FY 01 priority ranking of the grant applicants eligible under SB 128 and prepared the initial priority ranking lists. (The FY 00 ranking had been tabled due to the need for eligibility determinations and regulatory changes).
- In anticipation of the FY 01 grant cycle, processed high priority grant applications, reviewed each for regulatory compliance, and prepared checklists of documents needed for top ranked applicants.
- For active prior-year grants, processed over 202 grant payment requests, totaling just over \$794,000. This required staff review of each invoice and backup documentation for all invoices in excess of \$100.
- Initiated an electronic file scanning pilot project to allow statewide accessibility and improve security of Storage Tank Program files.
- Renewed the reimbursable services agreement with the Department of Community and Economic Development, Division of Investments, to administer the loan portion of the Tank Cleanup Program.
- Continued refining and optimizing performance of the UST database. This Microsoft Access 97 application links Financial Assistance and Priority Ranking with the UST/LUST scores and Time Accounting System databases. This streamlines the data entry and retrieval process. Made improvements to increase speeds of operation and added new SB 128 loan/grant options to the Financial Assistance module to record status.
- Participated in the Board of Storage Tank Assistance meetings while providing information to the Board as requested and participating in appeal and grievance hearings.
- Operated the UST Telephone Hotline to answer technical questions from callers.

- Published and distributed to over 1500 customers, the Alaska Tank News, a quarterly newsletter.
  - Maintained a public service oriented Storage Tank Program Web Page, [http://www.state.ak.us/dec/dspar/stp\\_home.htm](http://www.state.ak.us/dec/dspar/stp_home.htm) (8,000 hits in FY 00). This web page contains information about tanks, including: regulations, notification forms, qualified contractors, approved laboratories, certified tank workers and inspectors, risk based decision making, financial responsibility, leaking underground storage tanks, frequently asked program questions, priority ranking lists for the Tank Cleanup, Upgrade and Closure Programs, UST database reports, photos, and many more helpful links.
  - Maintained a list of tank owners who have not paid tank registration fees and worked with the Attorney General's office to negotiate collection of delinquent registration fees and the associated late fees.
  - Reviewed applications for candidates seeking certified tank worker licenses as well as qualified party approvals for site assessment and remediation work.
  - Worked through the first year of a separate capital project to cleanup spills associated with state-run USTs. Latest estimates show over 80 state-owned sites with spills.
  - Managed EPA grants for staff oversight of over 1000 tank upgrade, assessment and remediation actions in the state.
  - Began third party inspection program for 425 active regulated USTs. Tanks must pass an inspection for release detection, spill prevention equipment, and corrosion control. Tanks passing inspection will receive a tag. Tanks that do not pass will be prohibited from receiving fuel until they are brought into compliance.
  - Continued certification process for third party inspectors which includes training, handbook, inspection forms, and testing. Maintained a list of over 1000 qualified scientists doing work under our program.
  - Program staff sent out the annual request for proof of financial responsibility to all private, commercial and local government UST owners and operators. Since 1997, the Department has seen compliance with financial responsibility rise sharply from almost zero to 70% in 1998 and about 80% in 1999 and 90% in 2000. We hope to achieve 98% compliance for the year 2001.
  - Confirmed 59 new LUST sites during FY 00, and closed 112 LUST sites for which the Responsible Parties received No Further Action letters.
  - Monitored 226 UST closures and 22 new tank installations.
- D. Assistance Requested and Funded for FY 99***
- Grant applications are priority ranked for funding annually in accordance with the regulatory criteria set out in 18 AAC 78. Regulations had to be changed, incorporating SB 128 changes. The new regulations became effective April 16, 2000. Therefore, no new grants could be issued until the regulations were finalized, and eligibility (under the new net worth criteria) could be determined. To arrive at the list of facilities to receive potential funds, all unfunded FY 99 applicants were sent

eligibility (net worth) certification forms as mandated in SB 128. Those eligible under this criteria were reranked with updated information as of March 2000. In order to rerank sites, applicants were advised that they did not have to respond to be ranked; they could retain their historical ranking score (though not necessarily the rank). However, if they had updated information or had self initiated work completed since the previous ranking, they needed to provide the new information in order for their score to reflect those efforts. Sites were ranked separately for closure activities or upgrade activities, resulting in a priority ranking list for each activity.

The applications were ranked according to Article 5 of 18 AAC 78. Advertised by the Board of Storage Tank Assistance for a thirty day public comment period, the initial priority ranking list was revised and finalized after pertinent public testimony.

Historically, top priority ranked facilities were contacted for funding based upon the amount of funds available for each program and the preliminary cost estimates submitted by the list

of applicants. Once the initial groups of applicants responded, if funds were available, the department then notified applicants further down the list of funding availability.

However, as explained above, the FY 00 funding was not allocated nor funds expended for new grants during FY 00.

Appendix A is a detailed list by owner/operator of all projects funded during FY 00 by prior year funds and is divided into grant activities by appropriations. Within each prior year appropriation, the amount encumbered or expended per program during FY 00 is listed as well as specific activities paid for by grant funds.

### 1. Tank Cleanup Program

Appendix B is the list of FY 01 Priority Ranked Cleanup Projects. Of the 51 projects listed, approximately 39 of them are expected to require FY 01 funding for a total of \$2.0 million. The rest of these projects are not expected to require funds until FY 02.

Appendix A, pages 1 and 2, shows the amount expended or encumbered for cleanup grants and the specific activities for each site from prior year grants. Some facilities may be listed more than once since each grant, and amendments to prior year grants, are listed separately. Cleanup grants generally paid for the costs of assessment, testing, and containment, and soil and water remediation.

Grants for cleanup exclude 10% of the total project costs, up to a maximum of \$25,000; the grant applicant is responsible for payment of these excluded costs. The Tank Cleanup Loan Program is available to finance this excluded portion of costs with loans repayable over a five-year period.

### 2. Tank Upgrade and Closure Program

Appendix A, page 3, is a detailed list of all owners and operators receiving upgrade or closure grant funding from the prior year appropriation.

## IV. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR FY 01

All applicants remaining on the FY 99 waiting list were required to complete eligibility certifications as required under SB 128. These responses were priority ranked as described in more detail under Section III, D, of this report. The FY 01 priority ranking lists are included as Appendices B, C and D.

It should be noted that any eligible FY 99 priority ranked cleanup grant applicant is eligible to apply for a loan under the new provisions of AS 46.03.422. The FY 99 Tank Cleanup Grant and Loan Program priority ranking list is included for informational purposes as Appendix E, and also included in this group are applicants considered "Continuation Cleanup" projects. Appendix F is a listing of the FY 99 Continuation Cleanup Rank List.

This list does not reflect any withdrawals or applicants found ineligible since the list was finalized in FY 99. Appendix C reflects applicants who have expressed interest in the new loan program.

For FY 01 the Department was directed by the Board to fund all upgrade and closure projects, which were estimated to cost \$120,000. As shown in Table 4 below, the actual cost to completely fund three tank closure projects in FY 01 amounted to \$32,287 (upgrade funding was declined.) For the cleanup projects, \$2 million is the anticipated expenditure. The remaining \$3 million in the capital account has been budgeted for grants and loans during FY 02.

## V. PROJECTED COSTS AND UNFUNDED REQUESTS

The repeal of the Reimbursement Program (Section 14, SB 128) and the certification of net worth requirements for the grant programs have dramatically impacted the waiting lists for funds.

Prior to the change in legislation, 158 applicants with requests totaling \$3,388,400 were waitlisted under the Reimbursement Program. These applications were received by the March 5, 1991 deadline for cleanup, closure or upgrade activities occurring on or after December 22, 1988 and before September 5, 1990. When making annual grant program allocations, the Board of Storage Tank Assistance was required to consider the Reimbursement Program as the lowest funding priority. These 158 applicants are no longer eligible for funding now that this part of the program has been repealed.

At the end of FY 99 the grant waitlist shown in Table 5 consisted of 215 new cleanup applications totaling \$23.9 million; 29 continuation cleanup projects totaling an estimated \$1.65 million (Appendix F); 37 upgrade applications for \$1.5 million and 96 tank closure applications amounting to \$1.1 million. Appendix B, C, and D list FY 01 priority ranked applicants.

Of the total 244 cleanup grant applicants (29 continuation and 215 "new" cleanups) only 51 projects responded and were found eligible under the new net worth certification requirements. Two upgrade and three closure projects were ranked for funding.

Table 6 summarizes the current status of applications since the implementation of SB 128 program changes.

As mentioned in Section IV, the Board of Storage Tank Assistance allocated the \$5 million from the FY 00 allocation to fund grants for all priority ranked projects for FY 01. The Department is phasing work on projects, and budget plans are detailed under Section IV. Three closures have been funded during FY 01 and up to 39 new cleanup grants are planned.

## VI. PROGRAM SUMMARY SINCE INCEPTION

From the inception of the Underground Storage Tank Financial Assistance Program on September 5, 1990 until December 31, 1999, over \$27 million has been expended in grants and loans to pay a portion of the costs of tank tightness testing, site assessment, cleanup, upgrade or closure of USTs in Alaska. Of the over 2,000 applications originally received, almost one-half (1005) have been funded.

Grant and loan activity for all grant programs from inception of the Financial Assistance Program through December 31, 1999, is summarized on Table 5, next page.

Table 6 summarizes the status of applications after the transition to SB 128 and estimates future funding needs.

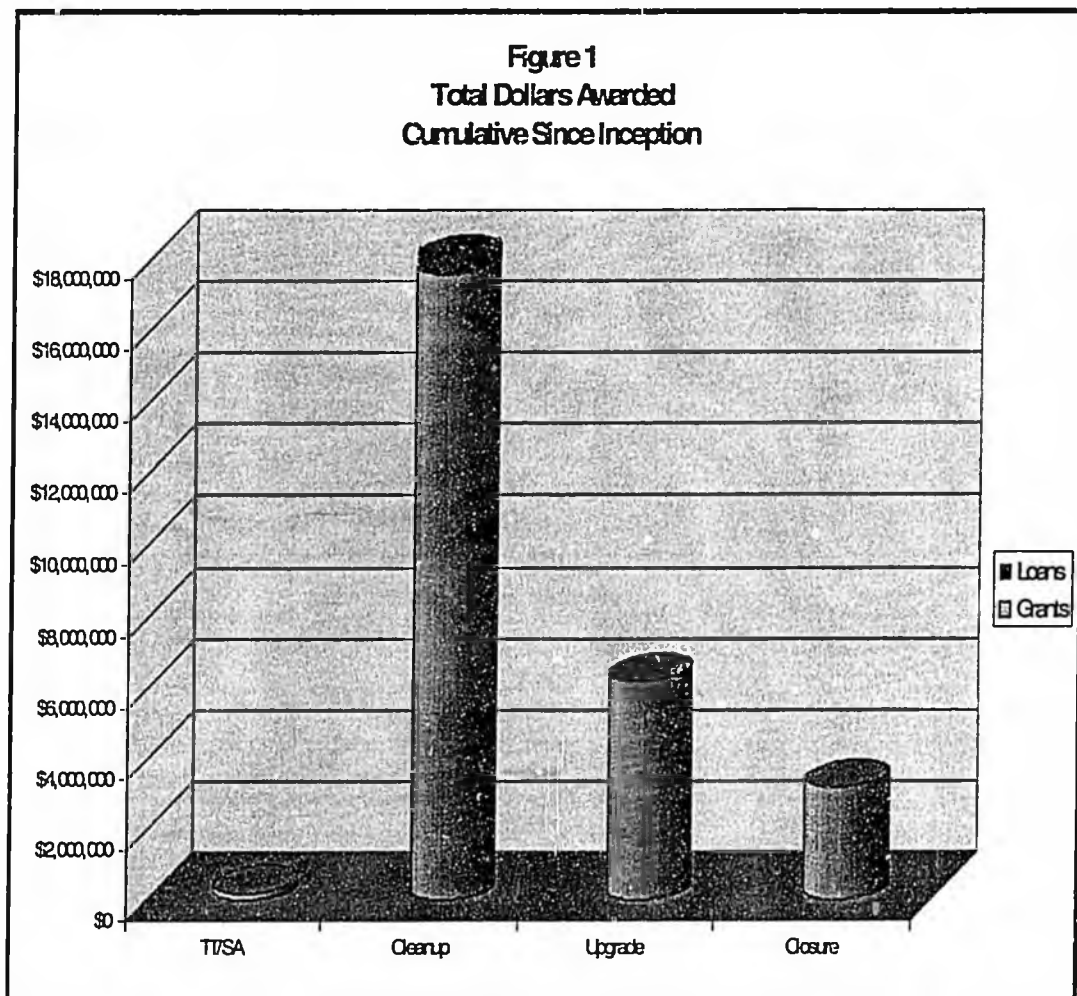

Note1. Any Cleanup Grant applicant *may* be eligible to apply for a loan under the new program established under SB128. Of the potential pool of 244 applicants, 57 have responded positively to the Department's survey with regard to interest in the loan program. A few applicants have already completed their cleanups making them ineligible for a loan, and have withdrawn from the program.

Note 2: Of the 51 eligible/interested applicants after SB128, 39 are expected to take advantage of grant funding offers during FY01. During FY02, up to 40 of the 51 projects are expected to require initial or continuation funding.

# Board of Storage Tank Assistance

## About the Board

- The Board is a seven-member board comprised of one Commissioner's designee and six citizens from the private sector.
- Board members serve without compensation and have one contracted employee.
- The Board is an appeal board that resolves disputes between the regulated community and the Department of Environmental Conservation thereby saving the state thousands of dollars in potential legal costs.
- The Board mediates disputes regarding eligibility for financial assistance, eligible costs, priority ranking positions and cleanup plans for sites with contamination resulting from leaking underground petroleum storage tanks.
- The Board provides technical and educational assistance to petroleum storage tank owners and operators throughout Alaska
- Limited annual funding requires applications for financial assistance grants and loans to be priority ranked annually using a Board scoring system that emphasizes imminent threats to public health. Additional criteria include proximity to alternate fuel, rural or urban location and other factors determined relevant by the Board.
- The Board has been very successful ensuring that smaller businesses, those with the greatest need, have received a higher priority for financial assistance from the State. Although larger businesses have received financial assistance in the past, a recent change in the enabling statutes has allowed only those owners and operators that have relatively small operations to be eligible for future financial assistance grants. Loans are currently available to all size operations.

## 2000 Board Activities

The Board resolved numerous disputes and continued to mediate between regulated underground petroleum storage tank owners and the Department of Environmental Conservation during FY 00 and calendar year 2000. Regulations were promulgated pertaining to a revised financial assistance program and all forms and application packets were updated to reflect those changes. The Board was audited by Legislative Audit at the start of FY 01 and a recommendation to extend the Board to June 2003 was submitted to the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee.

- The Board conducted 4 formal meetings and 3 teleconference meetings during FY 00 and calendar year 2000.
- Board staff responded to numerous questions received from regulators, the regulated community and legislative staff regarding the changes implemented by the passage of SB 128 effective at the start of FY 00.
- The Board resolved 2 formal appeals during FY 00 and Calendar Year 2000:
  - Northstar Truckstop (cleanup grant termination appeal)
  - Tope Equipment (eligibility appeal)
- The Board ruled in favor of the appellant in all appeals resolved during FY 00 and calendar year 2000.
- The Board addressed several additional appeals that were settled prior to the scheduled formal hearing date and subsequently withdrawn.
- The Board currently has no appeals pending but 2 disputes have yet to be mediated.
- Regulation changes were reviewed and adopted throughout FY 00 and calendar year 2000.
- Forms for certifying net worth to qualify for financial assistance were developed, reviewed by the regulated community and adopted. These forms were distributed in FY 00.
- Loan application forms and information packets were developed and adopted and are currently awaiting distribution during FY 01.

- In July of 2000, the Board again contracted with the private sector to provide staff support services to the Board. In 1999, The Board determined that privatizing Board support services would demonstrate a significant cost savings to the State. The Board subsequently awarded a contract to Capitol Resolve of Douglas, Alaska to provide staff support to the Board of Storage Tank Assistance through FY 00. Capitol Resolve was contracted again in June 2000 to provide support through FY 01. This action is estimated to save the State approximately \$56,000 for FY 01 when compared to FY 99 expenditures.
- The Storage Tank Program's Financial Assistance Program for regulated underground petroleum storage tanks continued to undergo dramatic changes during 2000 due to the passage of Senate Bill 128 in the 1999 Legislature. Significant changes occurred within the existing UST Financial Assistance Program beginning July 1, 1999 (the beginning of FY 00) that are still being implemented. The loan program is expected to issue it's first loans during the upcoming 2001 field season in FY 02. A number of disputes are then expected to arise related to eligibility, eligible costs, phased loans, and other problems related to the implementation of a new program.
- The Board of Storage Tank Assistance was extended by the Alaska State legislature during the 2000 Legislative session with the passage of House Bill 432. The bill was sponsored by the House Resources Committee at the request of the Alaska Underground Storage Tank Owners and Operators Association, (AUTOO). The legislation revised the sunset date of the Board to June 30, 2001. This provides for the Board's actual termination date to be 12 months following the sunset date, to June 30, 2002. AUTOO had originally requested a sunset date of 2003 but the Alaska State Senate changed the date to 2001 with a promise to revisit the issue in subsequent sessions if necessary.
- In addition to extending the Board's sunset date, House Bill 432 allowed for financial assistance eligibility exemptions for certain types of non-profit organizations and also expanded the authority of the Board to review cleanup decisions. The non-profit organization exemption is limited to those companies that are currently on the waiting list for funds from the Storage Tank Assistance Fund that are also classified as 501(c)(3) charitable organizations under the Internal Revenue Service Code.
- The expanded authority of the Board to review cleanup decisions was a section in HB 432 that was also requested by AUTOO in addition to the extended sunset date. The Board of Storage Tank Assistance may now hear disputes and grievances relating to delays or requirements associated with cleanup decisions (no further action letters) issued by the Department of Environmental Conservation. The cleanup decision reviews are limited to those facilities currently involved in the financial assistance program that have received grants or loans from the Storage Tank Assistance Fund. In these cases, the Board can now mediate disputes between UST owners, operators and the Department and make recommendations to the parties as to how best to resolve the problem.

- The Board was audited by Legislative Audit during the first half of FY 01. This exhaustive and comprehensive audit was necessary to determine whether the Board should continue beyond its statutorily required June 30, 2001 sunset date. Legislative Audit has determined that the Board should be extended two more years to June 2003 in order to complete the program changes implemented by SB 128 in 1999.
- Throughout FY 00 and calendar year 2000, the Board of Storage Tank Assistance has continued to provide technical and regulatory assistance to underground petroleum storage tank owners and operators. The Board's contracted support staff continues to be available to underground petroleum storage tank owners and operators for technical assistance 7 days per week, 24 hours per day via phone, fax or email.

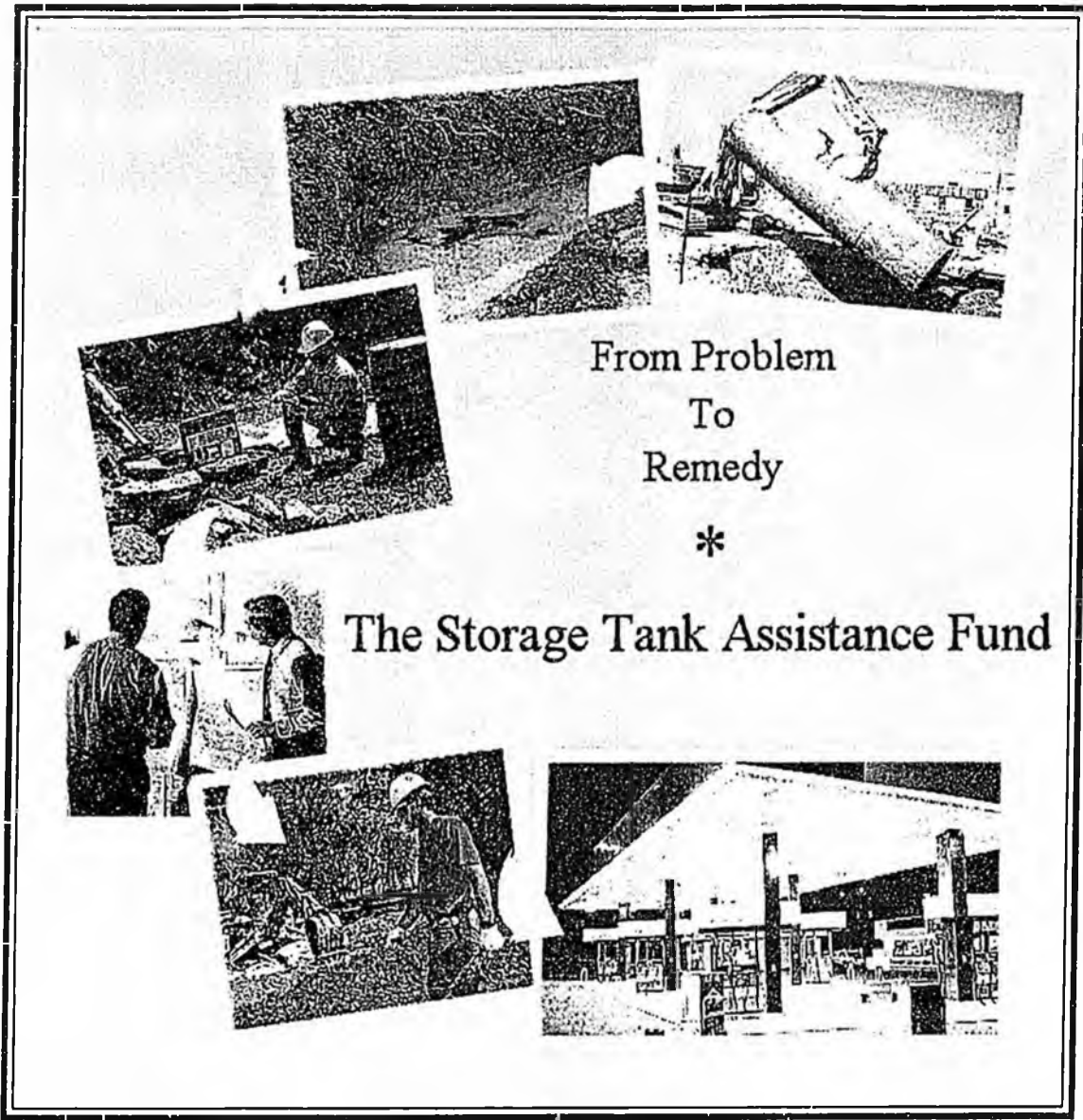

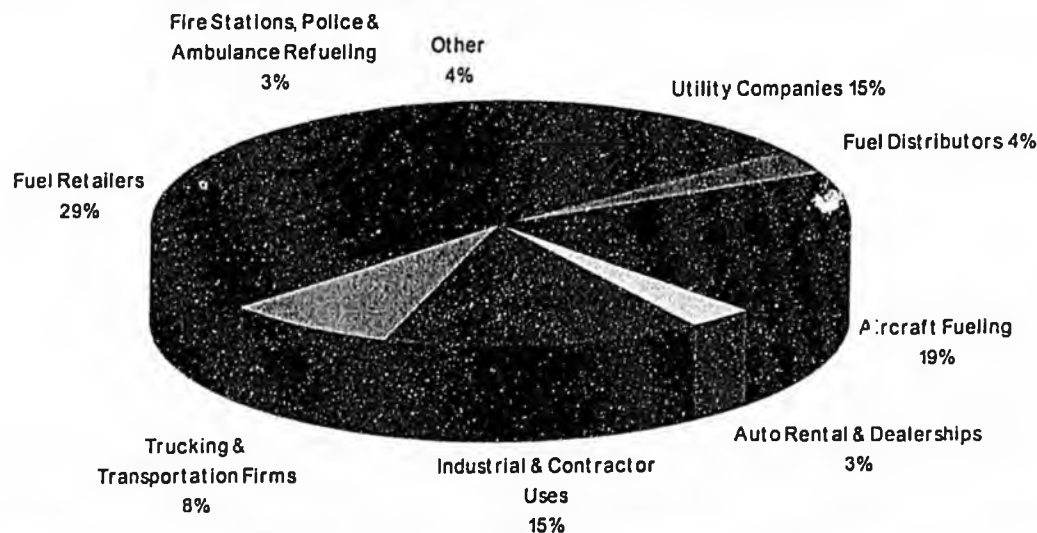

## WHAT AGENCY ADMINISTERS THE STORAGE TANK ASSISTANCE FUND?

- \* The Department of Environmental Conservation administers the Storage Tank Assistance Fund. The Department is responsible for advertising the application periods, receiving the applications, processing the requests, administering the grants and auditing the project costs. The Division of Investments in the Department of Commerce and Economic Development works in partnership with the DEC to provide cleanup loans for eligible UST owners and operators.
- \* The Department of Environmental Conservation has a staff of three Environmental Specialists in Anchorage to process the actual grant applications. A Grants Administrator and a Clerk Typist provide additional support for the program.
- \* The 1990 Legislature established the seven-member Board of Storage Tank Assistance with one government member and six public members. Members are appointed by the Governor and serve without compensation other than per diem and expenses when traveling. They have an Executive Director, contracted from the private sector, who is their sole employee. The first duty of the Board was to write regulations relating to financial assistance for UST owners and operators. The Board also jointly developed regulations with DEC pertaining to cleanup standards and allowable technologies to be used in the cleanup of contamination resulting from leaking tanks. Before adopting a regulation that sets a standard for the level of a contaminant that is allowed to remain in soil or groundwater after cleanup of a release from or associated with an underground petroleum storage tank, the department shall consult with the board. Before the department may adopt a regulation specifying allowable technologies for testing, containment and cleanup, or corrective action, the regulation must be approved by the board.
- \* The Board is an Appeal Board to mediate disputes between the Department of Environmental Conservation and regulated underground petroleum storage tank owners and operators. In regard to disputes arising over eligibility, priority rankings and eligible costs, the Board's decisions are binding upon the department and the owner or operator. On a cleanup decision, the owner or operator may apply to the board to review the dispute and the board may issue a recommendation to the department which may include a suggested time limit for completing appropriate cleanup activities or reaching a cleanup decision.
- \* Although the Board developed the financial assistance regulations, the Department of Environmental Conservation actually implements those regulations by physically processing each applicant's request for financial assistance. This enables the Board to remain objective and unbiased when a dispute arises. The Board is then tasked with resolving the matter in a prompt and conscientious manner.

## **AREN'T MOST OF THE LEAKING TANKS OWNED BY BIG COMPANIES?**

\* Just because a facility is named "Alaska Chevron" does not mean it is owned by Chevron. The name usually signifies the brand of product sold. Most businesses covered by the EPA's underground storage tank regulations are small, "Mom-and-Pop" businesses. DEC estimates that of the 7,258 tanks that have been identified in Alaska, there are 1,112 presently in use of which most are privately owned. It is estimated that over two-thirds of the privately owned tanks in Alaska are owned by small, independent companies.

## **IS THERE MUCH DEMAND FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE?**

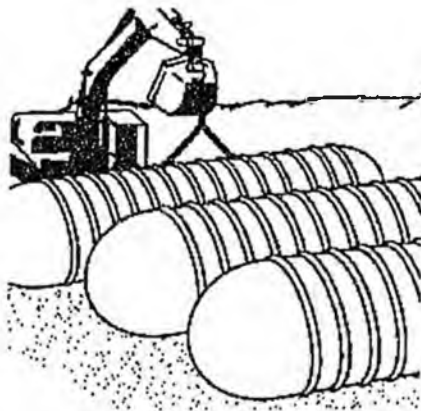
\* Presently, there are 51 requests for financial assistance grants and 57 financial assistance loan requests for cleanup activities in the State of Alaska.

## **HOW MUCH MONEY HAS THE PROGRAM RECEIVED SO FAR?**

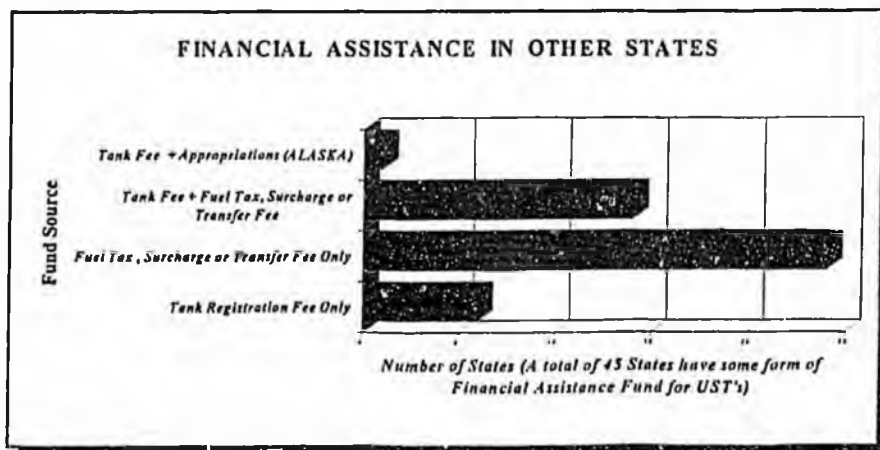
\* The Storage Tank Assistance Fund received an initial capitalization of \$6 million in fiscal year 1991. In fiscal year 1992, no new monies were appropriated to the Fund. For fiscal year 1993, the Alaska Legislature appropriated \$5 million to the Storage Tank Assistance Fund. The Alaska Legislature appropriated \$4.5 million to the UST Financial Assistance Program for fiscal year 1994 and \$2.9 million for fiscal year 1995. For fiscal years 1996 & 1997 the Program received \$1.9 million each year and in Fiscal Year 1998 the Fund received \$ 5 million. In FY 99, the program received \$5 Million and a statutory change directing the department and the Board to establish a Cleanup Loan program as well as new standards for eligibility for grants.

\* Funds appropriated by the Alaska State Legislature to the Storage Tank Assistance Fund are allocated annually by the Board of Storage Tank Assistance to different financial assistance programs, the tank cleanup program, the tank cleanup Loan program the tank upgrading program and the tank closure program. The Board of Storage Tank Assistance makes the annual allocations after taking into consideration the amount of money in the Fund, the money required to meet the needs for each program, as supported by approved applications and the requirement that the greatest priority be given to funding UST's that present the greatest threat or potential threat to human health.



## WHY DID THE STATE GET INVOLVED?

- \* During the years 1986 through 1990, increased federal regulations and aggressive EPA enforcement action forced numerous Alaska tank owners out of business. Many of these tank owners could not afford the high cost of cleanup of contamination from their leaking tanks. If an owner cannot pay the cost of cleanup, the State actually undertakes the task using Response Funds. The 1990 Legislature determined that the State should have an assistance-based tank program to keep these affected businesses "in business" as productive members of the Alaska economic community.
- \* Many of the facilities affected by the EPA requirements are in outlying areas of the State, on the Alaska Highway, remote lodges, rural community airstrips and remote fishing villages. Although protecting drinking water supplies in urban areas such as Anchorage and Fairbanks is critical, maintaining essential fuel services for the State is undeniably an important consideration for stable economic growth, tourism and access.
- \* Since December 31, 1993, most tank owners have been required to demonstrate \$1 million of financial responsibility per occurrence and \$2 million aggregate. Failure to comply may result in \$10,000 daily fines from EPA. Alaskan tank owners can meet the financial responsibility requirement by purchasing pollution liability insurance. Pollution liability insurance is available but very expensive for most small tank owners. The problem still involves the question of eligibility for insurance. Is a facility actually insurable? Many insurance plans call for a clean site to be demonstrated. However, most of these facilities have had numerous incidents of overfilling and spillage during fuel deliveries or in some cases, actual leaks. The Storage Tank Assistance Fund helps owners help themselves by assisting owners of contaminated sites to undertake proper cleanup and become insurable. Insurance policies can then be purchased from the private sector, thereby allowing a tank owner to meet the federal financial responsibility requirement.
- \* Developing an assistance-based program was considered to be the best way to promote strong pollution prevention practices to avoid future contamination of drinking water supplies. By providing assistance to tank owners to cleanup contamination and to promote the upgrade of their facilities to federal standards, the regulated community was more willing to step forward and report old spills or leaks without the fear of fines and penalties from the EPA. Although the "big stick" approach from EPA got attention, the State's "white hat" approach got results.
- \* Alaska was not the only state that recognized the problem tank owners were facing with the new federal requirements. Currently, forty-five states have financial assistance programs for underground storage tanks. Seventeen of these states have recently expanded their programs to include aboveground tanks as well.



## **AREN'T THESE PROBLEMS THE TANK OWNERS FAULT?**

\* Although the leak originates from an owner's facility, the leak is very rarely caused by negligence on the owners part. The facility was usually installed and operated to a standard of practice that was considered sound and conscientious at the time of installation. Many times the facility owner or operator is treated as a criminal, when in fact the leak or spill might have been caused by natural processes such as corrosion over time or by an accident caused by a passerby. Just a simple case of accidentally spilling waste oil on the ground or repeated overfilling of vehicle gas tanks by customers can add up to a serious contamination problem for a facility owner.

\* It is worth noting that petroleum contamination was not considered a serious health hazard until just a few years ago, long after these facilities had been installed. The State of Alaska only recently halted routine oiling of roads, now considered dangerous to public health and critical habitats. The underground storage tank rules imposed by EPA are "after the fact" environmental regulations that have caused a notable and detrimental economic impact to small businesses.



## **AREN'T THESE PROBLEMS JUST THE "COST OF DOING BUSINESS"?**

\* The requirements to upgrade or clean up contamination from leaking tanks are relatively new "after the fact" regulations from EPA that did not exist when these businesses started nor during most of their existence. Many businesses acquired facilities with existing contamination. These owners are now faced with the formidable task of "making right what wasn't a problem before". The cost to clean these contaminated sites has skyrocketed beyond the reach of an average business in Alaska. The cost can easily reach several hundred thousand dollars per site. Investigating the extent of contamination, soil and water sampling, excavation, contaminated soil disposal, total tank and piping system replacement, interim business shutdown, loss of revenues and threats of penalties regarding contamination that occurs through natural corrosion, customer negligence and accidents were not a consideration when these businesses began.

## WHY DO TANK OWNERS HAVE TO UPGRADE THEIR TANKS?

\* In 1984, federal law (Subtitle I of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act) mandated that owners of certain kinds of underground storage tanks (USTs) containing petroleum products and other regulated substances meet standards which would prevent leaks and assure adequate cleanup where leaks occurred. That law was followed by federal UST regulations in December of 1988.

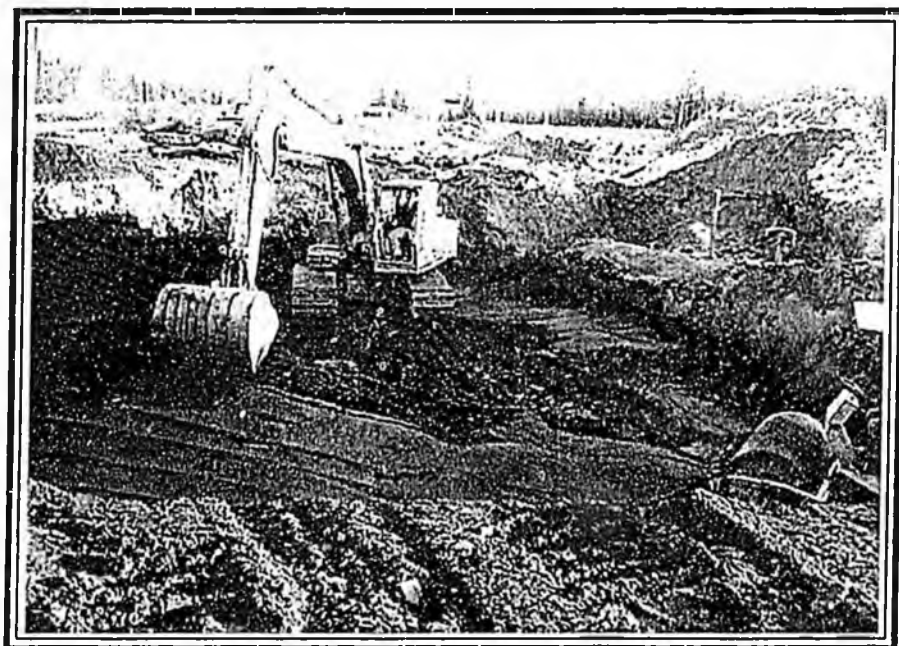
\* 7,258 underground petroleum storage tanks have been identified in the State of Alaska. Of that total, 1,112 tanks are currently in use. Other tanks probably exist which have not been reported. Most of these tanks are not protected from leaks and spills. These tanks may be unknowingly damaging the State's drinking water supplies. Since groundwater provides drinking supplies for nearly 70% of the population in Alaska, any contamination that reaches groundwater could cause a serious public health threat. Additionally, the vapors from leaks may seep into basements of homes and buildings and may cause other safety and health hazards.

## WHY DO WE HAVE CONTAMINATION FROM TANKS?

\* Piping leaks, overfills and spillage during deliveries are common problems.

\* Leaking tanks or piping can be nearly impossible to detect without special equipment. A considerable number of leaks occur due to failed fittings between the tank and piping, spillage during filling, overfilling or corrosion.

\* Corrosion holes in steel tanks cannot be seen until the tank or piping has been removed or exposed. A corrosion hole that causes a tenth of a gallon per hour leak would release over 800 gallons of fuel per year into the lands of the state. The leak could go unnoticed for years, slowly percolating through the soil and possibly into the water table. This leaking fuel can eventually migrate toward a private or municipal drinking water well.

\* The tank owner or operator actually receives the funds and is directly responsible for supervising the funded activity and for insuring that the work is conducted in accordance with applicable laws and regulations. The Department of Environmental Conservation only provides guidance and oversight to insure all work is completed properly and consistent with customary practice and costs. Private sector consulting firms that are approved by the Department or contractors certified by the State conduct work for the owners and operators. The owner or operator contracts directly with the contractors and consultants.

#### **DON'T LARGE FIRMS GET MOST OF THE FUNDS THAT ARE AVAILABLE?**

\* No. Since the program was changed in 1999, only small companies are eligible for **grants** from the program. Larger companies with assets exceeding \$1,000,000 are only eligible for **cleanup loans**. Upgrade **grants** are only issued to those owners and operators that can demonstrate total assets under \$250,000. All applicants are priority ranked for funding according to regulations and criteria established by the Board of Storage Tank Assistance. The ranking system emphasizes public health threat foremost followed by numerous other considerations such as nearest alternative fuel source and whether the facility is in a rural location. Several other criteria are used to rank applications with an emphasis on small rural tank owners that pose an imminent public health threat and have acted in good faith to undertake as much of the work as possible on their own. This usually means that unless an imminent public health threat exists, larger companies tend to rank lower on priority ranking lists.

#### **WHY CAN'T OWNERS AND OPERATORS JUST GET A BANK LOAN?**

\* Banks do provide loans for certain activities such as closure or upgrading of a facility. The cost of an upgrade ranges from \$120,000 to \$200,000 or more to meet the federal standards. Banks will provide loans to cover that portion of the upgrade that is not covered by a grant from the Storage Tank Assistance Fund. Without assistance from the state, many small tank owners would not have sufficient resources to undertake an upgrade even with bank financing.

\* Banks do not generally provide loans for cleanup purposes. The total cost of a cleanup is not known until the actual cleanup is complete and extremely difficult to estimate. Most Alaska tank owner's principal asset is the actual property that requires cleanup. A parcel of land that is contaminated essentially has no value until clean and actually represent a significant liability. Since collateral is required for nearly all loans, tank owners with contaminated sites normally cannot provide sufficient collateral to back a loan large enough to undertake the cleanup. The average cost of cleanup in Alaska is presently \$140,000 per site with some cleanups currently approaching \$500,000. These very high cleanup costs are virtually impossible to cover for the average Alaska tank owner.

\* Joint and several liability laws also provide a detriment to bank financing for cleanup activities. Banks that foreclose on contaminated property become liable for completion of the cleanup. Many times the cost of the cleanup will be 3 or 4 times the clean site value of the property. Banks also will not provide a loan to a tank owner if the business itself must be shutdown to conduct the cleanup. If a business has no income, it cannot repay a loan. Many businesses have been closed for a year or more while cleanup activities are completed. In numerous cases, the loss of revenues has caused bankruptcy and foreclosure, a fact that banks understand all too well.

## WHAT KIND OF ASSISTANCE IS AVAILABLE?

- \* Technical assistance is available through the Department of Environmental Conservation. Staff provide guidance documents and technical assistance on the proper handling of stored products, system upgrading or closing and cleanup of contamination resulting from leaking tanks.
- \* Educational Assistance is provided by both the Department of Environmental Conservation and the Board of Storage Tank Assistance. Workshops are conducted annually and staff are provided to assist nationally recognized training courses for presentation in Alaska. A quarterly newsletter "Alaska Underground", is published by the Department to provide timely information on technical and regulatory aspects of tank ownership and maintenance, installation and closure, as well as the latest developments in cleanup and remediation techniques. The newsletter also provides information to contractors and consultants actually conducting tank work.
- \* Financial Assistance is provided in the form of grants and loans to offset the high cost of tank upgrades to meet EPA standards and to cover proper closure and release investigation, corrective action and cleanup costs.

## WHAT TYPE OF FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE DOES THE PROGRAM PROVIDE?

- \* The Storage Tank Assistance Fund provides grants for upgrading or closing up to 60% of the eligible costs with a maximum combined grant of \$60,000 per facility for owners for operators that can demonstrate total assets of \$250,000 after deducting the estimated cost to upgrade and cleanup their tanks.
- \* Grants for cleanup of petroleum contamination are provided for a maximum of \$250,000 for owners or operators that can demonstrate total assets of \$1,000,000 after deducting the estimated cost to upgrade and cleanup their tanks. The owner is responsible for 10% of the cost up to a maximum of \$25,000.
- \* Loans are available for the 10% not covered by the cleanup grant up to a maximum of \$25,000. Owners receiving loans must pay back the loan to the state over five years.
- \* For owners and operators that cannot qualify for a cleanup grant, a loan may be obtained to a maximum of \$500,000. Owners and operators that exceed the cleanup grant cap may also apply for loans. The total allowable combined grant and loan cannot exceed \$500,000.

## DOES THE PROGRAM ENCOURAGE PRIVATE PARTICIPATION?

- \* Most upgrades involve multiple tanks and costs usually range from \$120,000 to well over \$200,000. Typically a grant from the Storage Tank Assistance Fund actually covers only 30% to 40% of the owners cost. The owner must pay the majority of costs involved.
- \* The balance of the upgrading cost is provided by banks in the form of direct loans to the tank owner or operator. Many banks require that an owner or operator be eligible to receive funds from the Storage Tank Assistance Fund and that a letter be provided from the Department stating that the owner will be receiving financial assistance. The banks are then assured that the work will be conducted according to standard practice and in compliance with applicable laws and regulations.

# Questions and Answers

## **WHAT IS A REGULATED UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANK?**

- \* Regulated tanks are predominantly motor fuel tanks.
- \* In general, gasoline, diesel and waste oil tanks greater than 110 gallons are regulated, although there are exemptions.
- \* Heating oil tanks are NOT regulated.
- \* Residential motor fuel tanks less than 1100 gallons for farm or residential use are NOT regulated.
- \* Several other types of tanks are not regulated depending upon their use.

## **WHO REGULATES UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANKS?**

- \* EPA regulates tanks under 40 CFR 280 and 40 CFR 281.
- \* State of Alaska regulates tanks under Title 46 and 18 AAC 78 and 18 AAC 75.
- \* Local governments may regulate tanks under the Uniform Fire Code and the National Fire Protection Association.

## **WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE?**

- \* Any commercial or private owner or operator of underground storage tanks regulated by the Underground Storage Tank Regulations, 18 AAC 78, is eligible for some form of financial assistance. Essentially, if a tank owner pays into the program, through a registration fee, then the tank is eligible for assistance. Only certain owners and operators qualify for grants, while all owners and operators can qualify for loans.
- \* Village, City, Borough or municipally owned tanks are NOT eligible, although specific appropriations can be legislatively granted to these entities from the Fund.
- \* State and Federal owned tanks are NOT eligible.

## **WHAT KIND OF TANKS ARE ELIGIBLE?**

- \* Industrial, Contracting, Auto Dealerships, Car Rental Agencies, Trucking and Transportation firms comprise 26% of the eligible tanks.
- \* Nearly 20% of the eligible tanks are used for aircraft refueling, both commercial and private.
- \* Utilities, Fire Stations, Police and Ambulance services total another 19% of the eligible tanks.
- \* Less than 30% of the eligible tanks are fuel retailers such as gas and service stations.

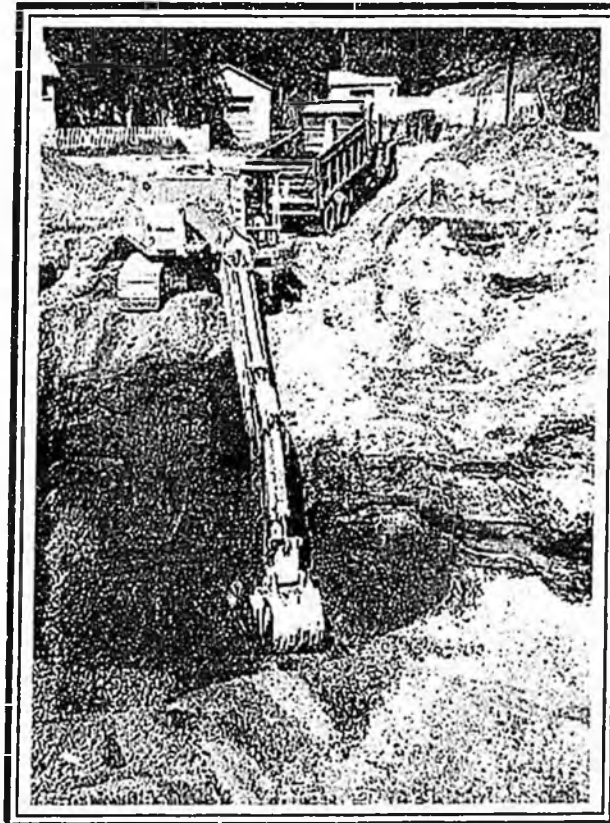

*Cleanup activities at an Anchorage gas station.*

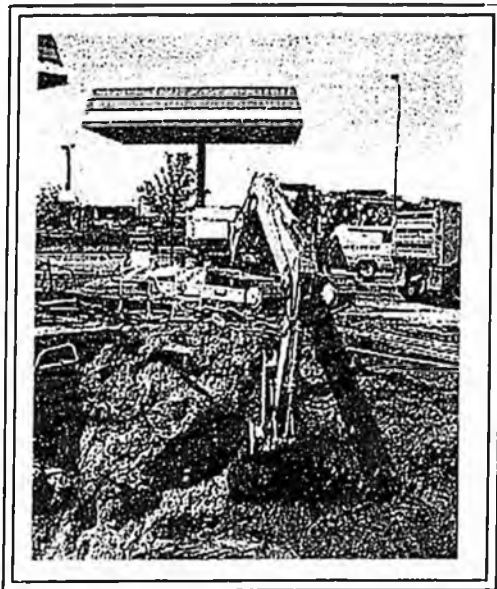

Many of these tank owners could not afford the high cost of cleanup of contamination from their leaking tanks. The 1990 Legislature determined that the State should have an assistance-based tank program to keep these affected businesses "in business" as productive members of the Alaska economic community.*



## The Problem

Headlines are commonplace throughout the state concerning underground storage tank owner problems and pollution resulting from leaking underground storage tanks. Many tank owners are reducing their liability and cutting back on services while others have simply gone out of business altogether.

The Storage Tank Assistance Program was established to protect Alaska's drinking water supplies and to help Alaska's regulated underground storage tank owners and operators meet EPA's tough new environmental laws and regulations pertaining to underground petroleum storage tanks.



The goals of the program were simple:

- \* cleanup existing leaks,
- \* prevent future leaks, and
- \* help Alaska's tank owners and operators through educational, technical and financial assistance.
