






May suspend or revoke certificates of educators based on reasons set out in AS 14.20.030; in case of an administrator, the commissioner must concur.

Chair: Commission selects

Special facts: Quasi-judicial. May be removed for misconduct, malfeasance or nonfeasance in office, or incapacity.

Compensation: Standard Travel and Per Diem. Admin leave; state reimburses district for more than 15 days

Meetings: 3 meetings per year; 1-1.5 days per meeting.





Student Regent - Job Description

Consider this position the greatest volunteer work EVER!

The student Regent serves a two-year term beginning in June through May. The student Regent participates in all of the duties and responsibilities of a Regent (i.e. attends all meetings of the Board and its Committees) and has full voting powers on the Board of Regents.

The ultimate authority in governance of the University of Alaska System is vested in the Board of Regents. The Regents establish policy in areas such as personnel, campus development, student fees, admissions, and financial aid. The duties of the Regents include overseeing the financial management of the University, its investments, and its property holdings as well as appointing the President of the University.

Necessary Characteristics

- the ability to communicate effectively with a wide range of people
- the ability to think in the abstract, seeing the big picture
- the ability to apply strong analytical thinking to policy issues
- the ability to process large volumes of information
- the ability to reach consensus on complex issues
- a willingness to take a very public role
- skills and comfort level required to interact with various policy-makers, business, political, and civic leaders
- a willingness to devote large amounts of time working on complex academic and administrative issues

Responsibilities

The Student Regent is a full member of the board. This includes participation in all meetings and voting in all matters. Some of the items the Board of Regents consider include setting tuition and fees for attendance at the institutions; approving capital and operating budgets; issuing bonds; approving new degree programs; and reviewing and approving mission statements of the System institutions.

The Board of Regents meets eight times a year, usually, in two day meetings. Occasionally there are topics that warrant special meetings of the board between regular meetings. Further, the Student Regent will be appointed to serve on board committees. These committees typically meet during the regularly scheduled meetings.

The Student Regent is expected to attend all meetings of the Board of Regents and the committees assigned. The Student Regent also serves as head of the Coalition of Student Leaders giving reports on the activities of the Coalition. The Student Regent can then act as a conduit to the Board of Regents. The Student Regent is expected to advance the concerns of all students in the System and to approach issues with a system-wide perspective. Because of this responsibility, the Student Regent is expected to limit his/her role in home institution activities and issues.

The Student Regent routinely interacts with various leading Alaskans and policy-makers. This includes state and local elected officials: the Governor and administration, and significant local officials. The Student Regent also interacts with officials in higher education and UA System institution administrators. Lastly, the Student Regent participates in activities that involve business and civic leaders, dignitaries, and special guests. Since the Student Regent represents the University of Alaska at ceremonial events, and at other times and places where such representation is deemed desirable, it is imperative that the Student Regent positively represent students and the University of Alaska System to all people he/she interacts with.

The Student Regent serves without compensation but will be reimbursed for expenses incurred.

Time Commitment

The time commitment required of the Student Regent is significant. Duties of the office may require the Student Regent to routinely miss scheduled classes and make other schedule adjustments. The time required to effectively serve as Student Regent will vary from week to week. Time is required to prepare for meetings, participate in meetings, follow-up, visit System institutions, and various other activities.

Some previous student Regents have completed their studies in the original projected time frame. Other student Regents have selected to take a reduced work load and extend their studies by a semester or year. Some student Regents have even been able to maintain a part-time job in addition to the duties of the Board of Regents, yet others chose to invest their non-classroom time focusing only on Regent duties.

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Fine Print - (The RULES)

Requirements for the Positions and Rules Governing the Election of Nominees for Student Regent (University of Alaska) and Student Commissioner (Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education)

Alaska law stipulates that each campus will select two nominees for student regent and student commissioner through an election held under rules established by the Governor. The following are the requirements for the position and rules to carry out the election of nominees. **The appointment term is June 1, 2011 through May 31, 2013.**

POSITION REQUIREMENTS

A student must:

- be enrolled and remain enrolled as a full-time student (12 credits undergraduate, 9 credits graduate) [Alaska Statutes 14.40.130 and 14.42.015.e].
- carry a cumulative 2.5 G.P.A. (or if freshman status, must have proof on high school transcript of 2.5 cumulative G.P.A.) [Office of the Governor]
- be a student at the particular campus [Alaska Statutes 14.40.150 and 14.42.015.e].
- be a United States citizen [Alaska Statute 14.40.130].
- be a resident of Alaska [Alaska Statute 14.40.130].
- if 18 years of age or older prior to the last general election, must be a registered voter in the State of Alaska [Alaska Statute 39.05.100].

REQUIRED APPLICATION MATERIALS

Failure to submit the below listed documentation will result in deletion from the list of nominees submitted to the Governor!

- election certification;
- names of all candidates in the local election and the number of votes they each received;
- letters of recommendation;
- proof of cumulative 2.5 G.P.A.;
- resume or brief personal biography.
- copy of Alaska Driver's License or other Alaska State I.D.

ELECTION RULES/PROCEDURES

- The University of Alaska Board of Regents' Office will disseminate instructions regarding the nomination, election and reporting of the student regent and student commissioner elections. The campus director or chancellor will appoint an ad-hoc student appeal board in cases of alleged voting irregularities.
- Only students may appear on the ballot and be nominated for the position of student regent.
- An election will be held on each campus; this may occur in the fall or spring semester. A campus is defined by the Board of Regents as a university institution in any of the following locations: Anchorage, Bethel, Dillingham, Fairbanks, Homer, Juneau, Ketchikan, Kodiak, Kotzebue, Nome, Palmer, Sitka, Soldotna, and Valdez. For the student representative position on the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education, Alaska Pacific University is included as a campus.
- Elections will be conducted by local student associations on each campus. In the case where no established student association exists, an ad-hoc student group will be appointed by the local administration (campus director or chancellor).
- Each local student association or group will provide nominating petitions, advertising, and adequate polling time(s) and place(s) for the election.
- The nominating petitions will contain the requirements for the position, a minimum of three signatures of students who endorse the nomination of the candidate, the deadline for submitting the petition, and the date of the election.
- The local student association or group will establish an election committee to oversee the election, polls, and counting of ballots if such is not provided for in the organization of the group. Voting discrepancies will be resolved by the election committee or appealed to the ad-hoc student appeal board for final settlement within 24 hours after the election. If not appealed, the election results will be attested to by the election committee and become final 24 hours after the election.
- The local student group is responsible for meeting the following timetable in relation to the election:
 - Nominating Petition Deadline - minimum of one week prior to election.

- Elections should be advertised at least one week prior to election. Nomination petition availability should be advertised at least one week prior to petition deadline.
 - **Elections must be conducted by February 18, 2011.**
 - Results and application material must be received by the Board of Regents' Office **at the close of business on March 4, 2011.**
-
- Each student may vote as determined by the requirements of local student associations or groups. No student may vote more than once. Each student will cast a vote for only one candidate for each position. Students may vote only for candidates from their respective campus.
 - All elections will be by secret ballot.
 - Each voter must satisfy election or polling officials of their status as qualified students to vote in the election.
 - A campus will be allowed to submit, through the Board of Regents' Office to the Office of the Governor, the names of two nominees for each position who receive the greatest number of student votes in a campus election.
 - In a situation where there is a tie vote between a second and third place candidate, the local student association will elect, or if there is no organized group, the ad-hoc student group will elect, by secret ballot, the second candidate for its campus from among the tied candidates.
 - Local student associations are responsible for forwarding results to the Board of Regents' Office. The requested information will be forwarded to the Board of Regents' Office, University of Alaska, Suite 202A Butrovich Building, Fairbanks, AK 99775-5300 or faxed to (907) 450-8012. The office telephone number is (907) 450-8010. If faxed, the information must be legible to be accepted.
 - The Board of Regents' Office will be responsible for delivering the names of the candidates to the Office of the Governor by **March 18, 2011.**





