A BILL

FOR AN ACT ENTITLED

1 "An Act relating to applying military education, training, and service credit to
2 occupational licensing and certain postsecondary education and employment training
3 requirements; providing for a temporary occupational license for qualified military
4 service members; and providing for an effective date."

5 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:**

6 * **Section 1.** AS 08.01 is amended by adding a new section to read:

7 **Sec. 08.01.064. Military education, training, and service credit; temporary**
8 **license.** (a) Notwithstanding another provision of law, the department or applicable
9 board shall accept military education, training, and service for some or all of the
10 qualifications otherwise required of an applicant for a license or certificate issued
11 under this chapter if

12 (1) the department or applicable board determines that the military
13 education, training, and service is equivalent to some or all of the qualifications
14 otherwise required of an applicant for a license or certificate issued under this chapter;

1 and

2 (2) the applicant provides satisfactory evidence of successful
3 completion of the education, training, or service as a member of the armed forces of
4 the United States, the United States Reserves, the National Guard of any state, the
5 Military Reserves of any state, or the Naval Militia of any state.

6 (b) If the department issues temporary licenses or certificates as authorized by
7 the department or applicable board under AS 08.01.050(a)(9), the department or
8 applicable board shall issue a temporary license or certificate to a person who

9 (1) applies to the department or applicable board in a manner
10 prescribed by the department or board;

11 (2) meets the requirements in AS 08.01.063(a)(3) - (6); and

12 (3) while on active duty in the armed forces of the United States or any
13 state, as described in (a) of this section,

14 (A) held a current license or certificate in another state, district,
15 or territory of the United States, practiced in the area of the license or
16 certificate, and maintained the license or certificate in active status before and
17 at the time of application for a license or certificate under this subsection; or

18 (B) was awarded a diploma or certificate by a branch of the
19 armed forces of the United States or any state, as described in (a) of this
20 section, that met standards for an equivalent license or a certificate of technical
21 training.

22 (c) The department or applicable board shall expedite the procedure for
23 issuance of a license or certificate under (b) of this section for an applicant who is on
24 active duty.

25 (d) A license or certificate issued under (b) of this section is valid for 180 days
26 and may be extended at the discretion of the department or applicable board for one
27 additional 180-day period if the holder of the license or certificate applies for an
28 extension on a form approved by the department or applicable board.

29 (e) The department or applicable board may adopt regulations necessary to
30 implement this section.

31 * **Sec. 2.** AS 14.40.210 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

1 (c) The president of the University of Alaska shall implement a policy and
2 procedure for the acceptance of academic credit toward a degree or technical program
3 offered by the university if an applicant provides satisfactory evidence of successful
4 completion of relevant military education, training, or service as a member of the
5 armed forces of the United States, the United States Reserves, the National Guard of
6 any state, the Military Reserves of any state, or the Naval Militia of any state.

7 * **Sec. 3.** AS 14.48.060(b) is amended to read:

8 (b) A postsecondary educational institution must be maintained and operated,
9 or, in the case of a new institution must demonstrate that it can be maintained and
10 operated so that

11 (1) the quality and content of each course or program of instruction,
12 training, or study are such as may reasonably and adequately achieve the stated
13 objective for which the course or program is offered;

14 (2) the institution has or has access to adequate space, equipment,
15 instructional materials, and personnel where applicable to achieve the stated objective
16 of the course or program of study and to provide education of good quality;

17 (3) the education or experience qualifications of directors,
18 administrators, supervisors, and instructors are such as may reasonably ensure that the
19 students will receive education consistent with the objectives of the course or program
20 of study;

21 (4) the institution provides a catalog or brochure containing
22 information describing the programs offered, program objectives, length of program,
23 schedule of tuition, fees, and all other charges and expenses necessary for completion
24 of the course of study, cancellation and refund policies, and other material facts
25 concerning the institution and the program or course of instruction that are reasonably
26 likely to affect the decision of the student to enroll, together with any other disclosures
27 specified by the commission by regulation; and that this information is provided to
28 prospective students before enrollment;

29 (5) upon satisfactory completion of training, the student is given
30 appropriate educational credentials by the institution, indicating that the course of
31 instruction or study has been satisfactorily completed by the student;

1 (6) adequate records are maintained by the institution to show
2 attendance, progress, or grades, and that satisfactory standards are enforced relating to
3 attendance, progress, and performance;

4 (7) the institution is maintained and operated in compliance with all
5 pertinent ordinances and laws relating to the safety and health of persons upon the
6 premises of the institution;

7 (8) the institution is financially sound and capable of fulfilling its
8 commitments to students;

9 (9) neither the institution nor its agents engage in advertising, sales,
10 collection, credit, or other practices which are false, deceptive, misleading, or unfair;

11 (10) the chief executive officer, trustees, directors, owners,
12 administrators, supervisors, staff, and instructors of the institution are of good
13 reputation and character and have not been convicted of a violation of AS 14.48.020
14 or 14.48.150 or AS 45.50.471 - 45.50.561 or a comparable law in another state or
15 province;

16 (11) the student housing owned, maintained, or approved by the
17 institution is appropriate, safe, and adequate;

18 (12) the institution has a fair and equitable cancellation and refund
19 policy; [AND]

20 (13) the charges set by the institution for tuition, fees, books, and
21 supplies are fair and equitable; **and**

22 **(14) the institution accepts military education, training, or service**
23 **credit or hours toward a degree or technical program offered by the institution if**

24 **(A) the institution otherwise accepts transfer credits or**
25 **hours; and**

26 **(B) the credit or hours transfer process meets the**
27 **requirements of the accrediting body of the institution or the commission.**

28 * **Sec. 4.** AS 23.15.820(a) is amended to read:

29 (a) The Alaska Workforce Investment Board shall

30 (1) administer the Alaska technical and vocational education program
31 established in AS 23.15.820 - 23.15.850;

1 (2) facilitate the development of a statewide policy for a coordinated
 2 and effective technical and vocational education training system in this state and, to
 3 the extent authorized by federal and state law, plan and coordinate federal, state, and
 4 local efforts in technical and vocational education programs;

5 (3) adopt regulations under AS 44.62 (Administrative Procedure Act)
 6 to carry out the purposes of AS 23.15.820 - 23.15.850, including regulations that set
 7 standards for the percentage of a grant that may be used for administrative costs; the
 8 regulations must clearly identify and distinguish between expenses that may be

HB 282 - MILITARY CREDIT

FOR THE RECORD, I AM CHRIS CHRISTENSEN, ASSOCIATE VICE PRESIDENT FOR STATE RELATIONS AT THE UNIVERSITY OF ALASKA. IT FEELS VERY STRANGE TO INTRODUCE MYSELF THAT WAY, AFTER 21 YEARS OF REPRESENTING THE JUDICIARY IN THIS BUILDING. AFTER THREATENING TO DO SO FOR A NUMBER OF YEARS, WENDY REDMAN FINALLY RETIRED SEVERAL MONTHS AGO. REALISTICALLY, IT'S IMPOSSIBLE TO REPLACE THE 40 YEARS OF INSTITUTIONAL MEMORY AND THE UNPARALLELED KNOWLEDGE OF HIGHER EDUCATION THAT WENDY MADE AVAILABLE TO YOU. I HAVE A STEEP LEARNING CURVE BUT I WILL DO MY BEST NOT TO SLOW YOU DOWN. I DO APPRECIATE YOUR INDULGENCE.

I'M HERE TODAY TO TALK ABOUT SECTION 2 OF THIS BILL, WHICH DIRECTS THE UNIVERSITY'S PRESIDENT TO ADOPT POLICIES AND PROCEDURES TO AWARD CREDIT FOR MILITARY TRAINING, EDUCATION, AND SERVICE.

I'D LIKE TO BEGIN BY NOTING THAT THE UNIVERSITY IS COMMITTED TO OFFERING QUALITY EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCES TO ACTIVE MILITARY, VETERANS, AND THEIR DEPENDENTS. *GIJOBS*, WHICH IS A MAGAZINE AND WEB PORTAL THAT EXISTS SPECIFICALLY TO SERVE PEOPLE WHO ARE TRANSITIONING FROM THE MILITARY BACK TO CIVILIAN LIFE, HAS DESIGNATED BOTH UAA AND UAF AS "GI JOBS MILITARY FRIENDLY SCHOOLS". ONLY 15% OF ALL THE COLLEGES, UNIVERSITIES, AND VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS IN THE COUNTRY HAVE EARNED THIS DISTINCTION, WHICH IS BASED ON AN INSTITUTION'S FINANCIAL AND NON-FINANCIAL COMMITMENT TO RECRUIT

AND RETAIN MILITARY AND VETERAN STUDENTS. IT IS A PRETTY SAD COMMENTARY ON THE LOWER 48 THAT ONLY 15% OF SCHOOLS ARE RATED "MILITARY FRIENDLY." THAT'S PROBABLY WHY THE DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE IS PROMOTING THIS LEGISLATION AROUND THE COUNTRY. THE WEB PORTAL "GUIDE TO ONLINE SCHOOLS.COM," WHICH BILLS ITSELF AS THE MOST COMPREHENSIVE AUTHORITY ON DISTANCE EDUCATION AND ONLINE LEARNING, JUST RELEASED ITS 2012 RANKINGS OF THE MOST MILITARY-FRIENDLY ONLINE COLLEGES IN THE COUNTRY, AND OUT OF THE MULTITUDE OF SCHOOLS THAT OFFER ONLINE EDUCATION, UA WAS RATED #5. WE'RE PROUD OF THAT, AND AS THE ENTITY THAT MADE THAT RATING POSSIBLE BY YOUR FUNDING DECISIONS AND OTHER SUPPORT, YOU HAVE EVERY RIGHT TO BE PROUD, TOO.

WHILE TRYING TO LEARN THE UNIVERSITY OVER THE LAST FEW MONTHS, THE SINGLE ISSUE I HAVE HEARD ABOUT THE MOST IS TRANSFER OF CREDIT. EVERYBODY'S GOT A STORY. IT IS A SUBJECT THAT AROUSES GREAT PASSION, AND MILITARY TRANSFER CREDIT IS A PIECE OF THIS BIGGER ISSUE.

THE BOARD OF REGENTS HAS ADOPTED A WRITTEN POLICY THAT THE CAMPUSES MUST ACCEPT IN TRANSFER AS MUCH CREDIT AS IS APPROPRIATE TO A STUDENT'S NEW DEGREE AND GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS. ALL THREE CAMPUSES HAVE ESTABLISHED TRANSFER CREDIT POLICIES DESIGNED TO GIVE MAXIMUM CREDIT FOR COURSES AND TRAINING TAKEN ELSEWHERE, INCLUDING IN THE MILITARY. KEEP IN MIND THAT A DEGREE FROM AN INSTITUTION IS A REPRESENTATION TO POTENTIAL EMPLOYERS AND TO OTHERS THAT THE HOLDER HAS ACTUALLY LEARNED WHAT THE DEGREE INDICATES THEY HAVE LEARNED AND THAT THEY CAN DO EVERYTHING THE DEGREE INDICATES THEY CAN DO. THE CREDIT TRANSFER POLICIES HAVE EVOLVED OVER TIME TO MAKE THE PROCESS AS STREAMLINED AS POSSIBLE WHILE STILL PROTECTING THE INTEGRITY OF

THE DEGREES THAT ARE AWARDED.

WE BELIEVE THAT AWARDING APPROPRIATE CREDIT FOR MILITARY TRAINING IS ONE OF THE UNIVERSITY'S RESPONSIBILITIES, AND ANOTHER WAY WE CAN SHOW OUR COMMITMENT TO RECRUIT AND RETAIN MILITARY AND VETERAN STUDENTS.

THERE ARE APPARENTLY A LOT OF MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT WHAT WE DO FOR MILITARY STUDENTS, SO I WOULD LIKE TO GIVE THE COMMITTEE A BRIEF RECAP.

TRANSFER CREDIT PROCESSES AT THE UNIVERSITY ARE MANAGED AT THE CAMPUS LEVEL, ALTHOUGH THERE IS INTENTIONALLY A GREAT DEAL OF UNIFORMITY IN THE SYSTEM. WITH RESPECT TO CREDIT FOR MILITARY TRAINING, ALL THREE CAMPUSES TRANSFER CREDIT BASED ON RECOMMENDATIONS MADE BY "ACE," WHICH IS THE ACRONYM FOR THE AMERICAN COUNCIL OF EDUCATION. FOR OVER 65 YEARS, ACE HAS HAD AN AGREEMENT WITH THE DEFENSE DEPARTMENT TO REVIEW MILITARY TRAINING AND EXPERIENCE FOR THE AWARD OF EQUIVALENT COLLEGE CREDITS. ITS RECOMMENDATIONS ON EQUIVALENT COLLEGE CREDITS ARE UTILIZED BY THOUSANDS OF COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES ACROSS THE COUNTRY. OUR THREE CAMPUSES HAVE WRITTEN AGREEMENTS WITH THE DEFENSE DEPARTMENT TO USE THE ACE RECOMMENDATIONS.

OUR THREE CAMPUSES ARE ALSO MEMBERS OF THE SOC CONSORTIUM. "SOC" STANDS FOR THE SERVICEMEMBERS OPPORTUNITY COLLEGES. THIS IS A CONSORTIUM OF OVER 1,000 COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES THAT ENROLL MILITARY, VETERANS, AND DEPENDENTS IN SPECIAL DEGREE PROGRAMS, BOTH ON-CAMPUS AND THROUGH DISTANCE LEARNING. ITS PURPOSE IS TO LET THE MILITARY GET DEGREES, RATHER THAN JUST ACCUMULATE CREDITS AS THEY MOVE FROM BASE TO BASE. TO BE PART OF SOC, OUR CAMPUSES

SIGNED WRITTEN AGREEMENTS TO, AMONG OTHER THINGS, FOLLOW SPECIFIC GUIDELINES TO EASE TRANSFERABILITY OF CREDIT BETWEEN THE MEMBER INSTITUTIONS AND TO LIMIT THE NUMBER OF CREDITS MILITARY STUDENTS HAVE TO EARN AT UA, IN ORDER TO GET A UA DEGREE. FOR EXAMPLE, MILITARY STUDENTS WORKING ON AN ASSOCIATES DEGREE AT UAA ONLY NEED 3 UAA CREDITS TO EARN THE DEGREE; UAA WILL TAKE ALL THE REST OF THE CREDITS FROM OTHER SCHOOLS IN THE SOC CONSORTIUM.

UAA IS CURRENTLY ACCEPTING APPROXIMATELY 51 CREDITS PER STUDENT FROM THOSE MILITARY STUDENTS WHO ATTENDED THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE OF THE AIR FORCE, THE SERVICE ACADEMIES, AND OTHER REGIONALLY ACCREDITED MILITARY INSTITUTIONS.

AT UAF, A MILITARY STUDENT CAN USE APPROXIMATELY 30 CREDITS OF TYPICAL TRAINING FOR THE BACHELOR OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DEGREE, OR 90 CREDITS FOR A GENERAL STUDIES BA THAT DOESN'T REQUIRE SATISFYING PARTICULAR MAJOR REQUIREMENTS.

NEITHER UAA NOR UAF HAVE ANY LIMITATION ON THE NUMBER OF MILITARY TRANSFER CREDITS THEY WILL AWARD. THEY USED TO; THEY'VE DONE AWAY WITH IT, UAA AS RECENTLY AS LAST YEAR, AS PART OF OUR CONTINUAL PROCESS TO REVIEW THE SYSTEM AND MAKE IT MORE STUDENT-FRIENDLY. RIGHT NOW, FOR EXAMPLE, UAF IS IN THE PROCESS OF DEVELOPING A MINOR BASED ON TYPICAL MILITARY CREDITS, WHICH WILL SATISFY 18 CREDITS TOWARDS ANY BA DEGREE.

I COULD GO ON, BUT WHAT IS THE BOTTOM LINE? I DON'T HAVE FIGURES FOR THE ENTIRE SYSTEM, BUT LAST YEAR, UAA ALONE AWARDED OVER 15,000 HOURS OF MILITARY TRANSFER CREDIT FOR TRAINING, FOR EDUCATION, AND EVEN FOR TIME SPENT IN THE SERVICE. APPROXIMATELY 99.5% OF THE

STUDENTS WHO REQUESTED MILITARY TRANSFER CREDITS RECEIVED THOSE CREDITS.

ALASKA IS WIDELY KNOWN TO SERVICEMEMBERS AS A STATE THAT WELCOMES AND APPRECIATES THE MILITARY. I THINK THAT ALASKA'S UNIVERSITY, AS DEMONSTRATED BY OUR EXISTING CREDIT TRANSFER POLICIES, REFLECTS THOSE PREVAILING SOCIAL VALUES PRETTY DARN ACCURATELY.

Page 1, Line 9

DELETE: Relevant

Page 1, Paragraph (a)

SECTION REORGANIZED

ADDS SUBSECTION 1: "the department or applicable board determines that education, training, and service is equivalent to some or all of the qualifications otherwise required of an applicant for a license or certificate issued under this chapter:"

-stronger/clearer language

ADDS SECTION 2: "The applicant provides satisfactory evidence of successful completion of the education, training, or service as a member of the armed forces of the United States, the United States Reserves, the National Guard of any state, the Military Reserves of any state, or the Naval Militia of any state."

-restates language from Section 1 of version B which deals w/ occupations who issue temporary licenses.

Page 2, Paragraph (b)- ADDS: citation AS 08.01.050(a)(9)

Page 2, Line 11

ADDS: citation for subparagraphs 2-5

-Language refers licensing practices already in statute

Page 2, Subparagraph (A)

ADDS: maintained the license or certification in active status before and at the time of application

-Makes clear that the license needs to be current when they apply for a temporary license.

Page 2, Subparagraph (B)

REWORDED TO: "was awarded a diploma or certificate by a branch of the armed forces of the United States or any state, as described in (a) of this section, that met standards of an equivalent license or a certificate of technical training."

-Recognizes military certificates of technical training

Page 2, Paragraph (c)

ADDS: for an applicant who is on active duty

-Expedited licenses only apply to individuals who already hold a license and are on active duty.

Page 3, Line 12

DELETES: paragraph (d)

-Was not appropriate guidance for the Postsecondary Education Commission.

Page 4, Paragraph (b)

ADDS: Institution accepts military education if the institution already accepts transfer credits and is approved by their accrediting body.

-Language suggested by the Postsecondary Education Commission.

-Protects the institution from jeopardizing their accreditation.

Page 5, Section 5-

ADDS- Guidance for DCCED and applicable boards to immediately promulgate necessary regulations.

Page 5, Section 6-

ADDS: Effective date of December 31, 2013 for section 1-4.

-Gives department time to research military training and promulgate regulations.

ADDS: Immediately effective for Sec 5

“An Act applying military education, training, and service credit to occupational licensing and certain postsecondary education requirements; and providing for a temporary occupational license for a qualified military service members.”

Section 1: Military education, training, and service credit; temporary license.

- (a) Credit will be given for military education and training to an applicant who is applying for an occupational license if determined by the applicable board.
- (b) Requires the department to issue a temporary license if the applicant meets current statutory requirements and while on active duty:
 - a. held a current license in another state and has maintained that license, or
 - b. holds an equivalent military license or certificate of technical training
- (c) Applications for active duty members who hold a current license will be expedited.
- (d) temporary licenses will be valid for 180 days and maybe extended once with the approval of the department

Sec. 2: Adds a new subsection: University of Alaska

- (c) The president of the University of Alaska shall implement a policy to accept academic credit toward a degree or technical program if an applicant provides satisfactory evidence of relevant military education, training or service.

Sec. 3: Adds a new subsection: Post-Secondary Education Commission

- (d)The commission shall implement policies and procedures that require a postsecondary education institution to accept academic credit toward a degree or technical program if an applicant provides satisfactory evidence of relevant military education, training or service.

Sec. 4: Adds a new subsection: Alaska Workforce Investment Board

- (5) The Alaska Workforce Investment Board shall implement a statewide policy that requires a vocational training center to accept academic credit toward a degree if an applicant provides satisfactory evidence of relevant military education, training or service.

Sec. 5: Adds a new Subsection:

Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development may promulgate regulations immediately.

Officer Basic Course (OBC). Upon commissioning, an officer is assigned a career branch in which the emphasis for training and development during the officer's first 7 to 8 years of active duty occurs. Graduates of all commissioning sources receive training in their assigned or detailed branch at an OBC immediately after commissioning. The OBC prepares newly commissioned officers for their first duty assignments with instruction on methods for training individuals, teams, squads and platoons. Branch detail program. Upon commissioning, selected lieutenants branched Signal, Quartermaster, Ordnance, Transportation and Finance are detailed to a combat arms branch for 2 years. Selected Military Intelligence and Adjutant General officers are detailed for 4 years. Lieutenants under the branch detail program attend the OBC and participate in branch specific training for the branch to which they are detailed. On completing the 2-year detail, officers attend a 4-week branch transition course before they return to their designated branch. Officers in the 4-year program receive transition branch training in conjunction with their enrollment in the Captains Career Course. All officers continue to participate in branch specific training once they are reassigned back to their designated branches.

Captains Career Course. The branch Captains Career Course prepares company grade officers to command and train at the company, battery or troop level and to serve as staff officers at battalion and brigade levels. There is a 1-year active duty service obligation for attendance at a branch Captains Career Course. The course is divided into two phases.

(1) The first phase provides advanced branch training and common core instruction. The branch specific courses provide selected company grade officers an opportunity to acquire the skills and attributes required to lead company-sized units and serve on battalion and brigade staffs. This instruction prepares students to:

- (a) Establish and maintain a disciplined command climate.
- (b) Execute the unit's assigned missions.
- (c) Command, control, lead, supervise, discipline, train, develop and mentor subordinate leaders and care for subordinates and their families.
- (d) Develop the unit's Mission Essential Task List (METL) and training plan.
- (e) Schedule, resource, supervise, execute and evaluate unit and sub-unit individual and collective training.
- (f) Plan, supervise and evaluate unit leader training and development, and personnel, administration, supply, maintenance, safety and security actions.
- (g) Plan, supervise, and evaluate the safe use, maintenance, security, storage and accountability of unit material.

(h) Administer the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ) at the company level.

(i) Advise the battalion commander and staff on the status of company, platoon and squad-level training, equipment, and personnel readiness.

(2) The second phase provides staff process training. It uses battalion, brigade, division and installation scenarios to train officers to serve on battalion and brigade level staffs. It develops officers to function effectively as staff officers by improving their abilities to analyze and solve military problems, communicate, interact as staff members, and broaden their understanding of Army operations, organizations and procedures. This course is unique in that it provides an officer's first integrated instruction with officers from different branches of the Army. The phase provides the skills necessary for success in Army, joint and multinational environments.

Analysis

HB 282 would require the department or board to accept relevant experience, training or service acquired while serving in the armed forces. The bill would allow greater flexibility for those exiting military service to become temporarily licensed in Alaska.

The following is a detailed cost analysis:

Personal Services consist of a long term non-perm Regulations Specialist I (Range 13) and an Administrative Assistant (Range 14). The Regulation Specialist I will work with boards, commissions, and staff to create regulations for new "temporary license" types for all licenses, and will craft clarifying regulations for programs with existing temporary licenses. The Administrative Assistant II will work with the Regulations Specialist and existing Publications Specialist II to draft correspondence to boards and commissions, create new forms and applications, liaison with the Department of Law regarding these regulations changes, and ensure timelines are maintained. This position will administer the military licensing program, including the receiving and tracking of military applications to ensure they are expedited, providing administrative support to licensing staff, customer support to military personnel, and organizing an accurate structure of the new license types into the licensing database. Once these regulations are in place, updates can be managed by existing staff and the Regulations Specialist position will be eliminated.

Services include the initial legal and start up costs, and ongoing support services.

Commodities include general supply costs.

Under the self-sufficiency statute of AS 08.01.065, regulatory programs are required to pay the cost of regulation through licensing fees. The funding source in establishing this position is Receipt Supported Services funded entirely from licensing fees.
