Sponsor Statement

SB 202: Resuscitation Protocol Documents

Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) standards are updated regularly based on new research. Unfortunately, due to the slow process of changing agency regulations, current state regulations reference outdated and incorrect CPR standards.

For example, when the current resuscitation regulations were adopted in 2002, the gold standard for adult CPR was 15 chest compressions for every two breaths administered. Today, the American Heart Association recommends for trained rescuers two breaths for every 30 compressions, and compressions only for an average bystander. Pediatric standards have also changed significantly since the time current CPR regulations were established.

The International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation (ILCOR) is an international group of scientists that reviews studies, makes treatment recommendations, and publishes its findings. The addition of the ILCOR findings to AS 47.05.012 would allow Emergency Medical Services offices and instructors to teach the most current and appropriate resuscitation standards without having to go through the lengthy process of revising agency regulations.

This bill is necessary to maintain a high standard of emergency medical care in Alaska.

Analysis

The bill amends AS 47.05.012 by adding resuscitation protocols to the list of materials that may be incorporated by reference in regulations. This will allow Emergency Medical Services (EMS) instructors to teach the most appropriate cardiopulmonary resuscitation techniques without the delay in adopting new statutory changes when new standards are published. The state EMS office has to choose between teaching and testing EMTs on current best practices or according to current state regulations which reference outdated and incorrect medical standards.

There is no fiscal impact to the department. The cost to update training materials to the current ILCOR standards is expected to be minimal and can be absorbed with existing resources.

The International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation (ILCOR) is an international consensus group of scientists that reviews studies, makes treatment recommendations for resuscitation, and publishes its findings when appropriate, usually every five years.

We are deeply appreciative and excited that this bill is going forward. The Governor's Alaska Council on Emergency Medical Services (ACEMS) feels the responsibility of ensuring the most up to date information is utilized in the instruction of the state's first responders throughout Alaska. The ability to do that with cardiopulmonary resuscitation training (CPR) has been hindered by a seemingly minor road block in the state regulatory process.

We feel that SB 202 will remedy this situation.

The members of ACEMS feel there would be a significant benefit in adding the ILCOR scientific findings to the list in AS 47.05.012. This would allow the EMS Unit of the Section of Emergency Programs (the lead agency for EMS training in Alaska) and EMS instructors in the State to teach the most current, appropriate resuscitation standards as they are published, without having to go through a succession of regulatory changes to adopt new curricula for their training programs. This bill is vital to help maintain the high standards of emergency care in Alaska.
