Sponsor Statement for House Bill 101

Ted Stevens Day

On August 9, 2010 Alaska lost Senator Theodore "Ted" Fulton Stevens, a man who dedicated his life and life's work to the interests of Alaska, the state he called home. He continually fought to build a better future for Alaskans during his six decades of public service in which he served 40 years in the United States Senate.

House Bill 101 establishes the fourth Saturday each July as "Ted Stevens Day." In 2010, Governor Parnell proclaimed November 18th, Ted's birthday, "Ted Stevens Day." While Ted's family and friends considered this a great way of honor his life they asked that the day established for Ted to be in the summer where Alaskan's can spend the day honoring his memory outside, where Ted chose to spend time fishing, hunting and exploring.

Alaskans will be eternally indebted to "Uncle Ted" for always putting Alaska first. By doing so with unwavering dedication and tremendous skill and energy, Ted Stevens transformed Alaska into the great place it is today. Ted's accomplishments are as legendary as he was – and have made possible opportunities for future generations of Alaskans yet to come.

It seems only right and fitting that we should honor Ted with a day of remembrance and celebration when Alaska's great outdoors is in full, most glorious bloom. Amidst unparalleled beauty from majestic fjords and mountain peaks to salmon streams and fish camps, Alaskans will pause and remember the Great Alaskan – who was as grand as any who have come before, or any who will ever come again.

Executive Proclamation by *Governor Sean Parnell*

WHEREAS, motivated by a desire to serve and a passion for the state he called home, United States Senator Theodore "Ted" Fulton Stevens dedicated his life to building a better future for Alaskans; and

WHEREAS, following the call to duty, a young Ted Stevens joined the Army Air Corps during World War II. His passion and respect for the United States Armed Services shaped his later career in the United States Senate, where he established a reputation as a staunch supporter for America's military, and an advocate for our men and women in uniform; and

WHEREAS, from his position in the United States Department of the Interior in President Eisenhower's administration, Senator Stevens advanced Alaska's bid for statehood, and his efforts helped to secure Alaska's place as the 49th star on the United States flag; and

WHEREAS, the Senator's efforts to strengthen Alaska's economy, including the timber, oil and gas, fishing, and telecommunications industries brought prosperity, jobs, and opportunities to the state, and his dedication to the passage of such landmark legislation as the Trans Alaska Pipeline Authorization Act ensured the development of Alaska's natural resources; and

WHEREAS, in addition to building Alaska's economy, Senator Stevens was committed to protecting the rights of Alaska's indigenous peoples, and worked hard to gain passage of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act of 1971 just three years after he joined the Senate; and

WHEREAS, a dedicated husband, father, grandfather, and friend, Senator Stevens treated all Alaskans as though they were his family, protecting and fighting for our futures, jobs, and rights. Known as "Uncle Ted," all Alaskans are indebted to the man who put his state first and built a better future for all.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Sean Parnell, Governor of the State of Alaska, do hereby proclaim November 18, 2010 as:

Senator Ted Stevens Day

in Alaska, and encourage all citizens to honor the memory of Alaska's former Senator by gathering to remember the spirit and vigor with which he served Alaskans for six decades, and to give thanks for his service and the future he forged for Alaskans.

The Twenty-sixth Alaska State Legislature recognizes United States Senator Ted Stevens for over 40 years of distinguished service to the state of Alaska and the United States of America.

Senator Stevens dedicated his life to public service. In World War II he flew planes in support of the legendary Flying Tigers and in recognition of his bravery received the Distinguished Flying Cross and an Air Medal. He served as U.S. Attorney in Fairbanks, after being nominated by President Eisenhower. He later transferred to the Department of the Interior where he served as Legal Counsel and Solicitor General. He was elected twice to the Alaska House of Representatives and served a term as Majority Leader. In 1968, he was appointed to the United States Senate by Governor Hickel to finish the term of Senator Bob Bartlett, and was re-elected six times.

"Uncle Ted" played key roles in legislation that shaped Alaska's development, including the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act, the Trans-Alaska Pipeline Authorization Act, and the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act. His contributions didn't end there.


Recognizing the importance of a military presence in Alaska, he has educated the national public on the geographic importance our state plays on the world stage and secured funding and support for the military in Alaska, including National Guard operations.


Always at the forefront of safe and conscientious resource development, Senator Stevens led the fight for Congressional authorization of the Trans-Alaska oil pipeline and has helped secure federal permits and a federal loan guarantee for the Alaska natural gas pipeline. In addition to these efforts, Senator Stevens promoted safer oil transport through laws requiring double hulled tankers, got funding for an extensive Department of Defense environmental restoration program and promoted sound fishing practices through the Magnuson-Stevens Act, which extended U.S. fishery jurisdiction to 200 miles offshore and established the regional fishery management system.

Whether people remember him for his continued work on the opening of ANWR to responsible development or championing issues such as Title IX which secured equal access for women to education and sports, everyone can be sure that when he dons his Hulk tie, he will aggressively and tenaciously work for what's right for Alaskans. As his motto, "To hell with politics, do what's right for Alaska," can attest.

Senator Stevens' longtime friend Democratic Senator Daniel Inouye, Hawaii, refers to Senator Stevens as "brother." We should only be so lucky. It is with highest respect and admiration that the Twenty-sixth Alaska State legislature salutes Senator Ted Stevens for his 40 plus years of continued service and dedication to the great state of Alaska and the United States of America.
