Sponsor Statement SB 147

An Act increasing and providing an inflation adjustment to the base student allocation used in the formula for state funding of public education; and providing for an effective date

Funding to schools for staff, course enhancement, and increased achievement has been flat for the past four years. Governor Parnell proposes funding that lags behind inflation in the fiscal year 2015 operating budget. As a result, education funding has fallen roughly 7% behind inflation since fiscal year 2011. Flat funding is the reason Anchorage has lost classroom support positions in past years, and will lay off 200 counselors, support staff and teachers next year. It's the reason class sizes will increase again in Juneau, and why staff and teachers have been cut in the Kenai, the Northwest Arctic Borough School District, and other areas.

The legislature passed legislation roughly five years ago that helps fund the shortfall in the teacher's retirement fund. However, none of that money can be used to hire teachers, staff, or improve curriculum. So, while "spending" has gone up, the funds schools are allowed to use for children in the classroom, and for staff, has fallen in real dollars by roughly 7% over the last three years and under the Governor's proposal for next year.

This legislation, Senate Bill 147, keeps school funding at the same pace as inflation, and makes up the last three years of losses in buying power. This bill will allow districts to avoid the cuts schools are discussing. The provision to inflation proof in statute allows them to rehire lost staff and the predictability in funding allows schools to plan for the future.

Together, these measures will allow districts to continue to improve outcomes and graduation rates. I ask for your support of Senate Bill 147.

Analysis

This bill amends AS14.17.470 Base student allocation (BSA) with an increase of \$404 from \$5,680 to \$6,084 for FY2015.

In the subsequent fiscal years, following FY2015, the BSA will be increased using the inflation adjustment based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI-U) for all urban consumers in the Anchorage metropolitan area with a base index of the first half of 2013.

The projected CPI-U used to calculate FY2016 and out years is 2.5%.

The effective date is July 1, 2014.

Since its creation in 1998 the BSA has been increased eight times, through six statutory amendments. The BSA currently stands at \$5,680.⁴ Table 2 provides a calculation of the BSA, adjusted for inflation, for each state fiscal year since FY2011, the last fiscal year in which the BSA was increased.

As you can see from Table 2, the FY2013 actual BSA (\$5,680) is approximately \$286 less than if the BSA had been adjusted for inflation annually since FY2011, while the FY2014 actual BSA (\$5,680) is approximately \$404 less than if the BSA had been adjusted for inflation annually since FY2011.

(b) To adjust the base student allocation (BSA) for inflation we used the annual consumer price index (CPI) figures for Anchorage, provided by the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development, Research and Analysis Section. The CPI represents changes in the prices of a representative sample of goods and services purchased for consumption by urban households. The Anchorage CPI figures are available in six month increments which we used to produce inflation rates by state fiscal year. We estimate the rate of inflation for FY2014 using the rate of inflation for Anchorage for the last six months of calendar year 2012 (the first six months of FY2013). Generally, inflation is the process of continuously rising prices (or the continuously falling value of money) in a particular economy. We calculated the rate of inflation as the percent difference of the CPI of one year to the CPI of the previous year.

(c) To adjust the BSA for a given fiscal year, we applied the rate of inflation experienced the previous fiscal year to the current year's BSA. In other words, the inflation adjusted BSA for FY2013 (\$ 5,883.24) is the actual BSA for FY2013 (\$5,680), adjusted by the FY2012 rate of inflation (3.05 percent).

(d) To adjust the BSA cumulatively for each fiscal year, we applied the rate of inflation experienced the previous fiscal year to the prior year's adjusted BSA. In other words, the inflation adjusted rate for FY2013 (\$ 5,965.62) is the adjusted BSA for FY2012 (\$5,789.06), adjusted by the FY2012 rate of inflation (3.05 percent).

Estimated Fiscal Impact to the State K-12 Foundation Formula Budget of Including Students Who Currently Attend Private or Religious Schools

Due to limitations on estimating the number of children of elementary and secondary age shown in Table 1, we are restricted to providing an estimate of only the change to the overall Foundation Program budget if the students who currently attend private schools were included in the foundation formula.

In Table 3 we show the total education Foundation Program funding and the average daily membership for each fiscal year, FY2007 through projected FY2014. Since the total amount of available state foundation program aid is dependent on several factors, comparing only the total amount of state foundation formula to the average daily membership is somewhat problematic. In an effort to demonstrate the relative per-student change of foundation program funding over time, we calculated a per-student funding amount, which is also included in Table 3. Generally, from FY2007 through FY2014,

The Anchorage School District will cut 219 positions -- including administrators, support staff and classroom teachers -- next school year, Superintendent Ed Graff announced Tuesday. District administrators are working with a \$566 million operating budget for the 2014-2015 school year, \$23 million shy of the funds the district says it needs.

And the funding gap is expected to widen considerably, with an estimated budget gap of \$49 million in the 2015-2016 school year. The budget recommendation is the "best we can offer our students with limited resources," Graff said.

Cutting classroom teachers by 159 positions means an increase in the student-teacher ratio. The loss of 44 teacher positions is due to a decline in student enrollment, a trend that's projected to continue another year.

Graff said the district and the Anchorage School Board are still working through which schools will lose teachers. Before they start determining who will lose their jobs and what schools will lose instructors, the budget needs to be approved by the school board. The school board will deal with the budget twice in February, consider public feedback, and then work through staffing particulars.

The staffing process happens in April. Teachers on the chopping block should be informed of their termination in May, Graff said.

Balancing the budget is a challenge, he said, and the district's top priority is limiting the impact to students. Teachers have calmly weathered the storm over the past year or so, but worries bubble below the surface.

Graff said he went from classroom to classroom at the beginning of the school year and thanked teachers for sticking with it through some rough transitions, which included the swift departure of

the previous superintendent. As Graff handed a letter of thanks to one teacher, she began crying. She thought it was a notice of termination.

School Board President Tam Agosti-Gisler chimed in, adding that the budget woes are “a distraction for teachers.”

Unprecedented reductions

While the conversation tends to focus on teachers and the potential impact to students, the district’s central administration faces the largest reduction.

Twenty percent of those jobs will disappear this year and next. Administrators manage the overall operations of schools, including cafeteria staff and building maintenance employees. They also oversee academic standards and try to ensure schools have the resources to meet those standards.

Ten specialty counseling positions will be cut of the budget proposal passes. Secondary counsellors will be pooled together and assigned based on student enrollment numbers and individual needs of schools. The recommendation came through during last year’s budget process but was avoided.

Over the past four years, the district has reduced its budget by eliminating the equivalent of 491 full-time positions, or roughly 718 employees. That total doesn’t include the more than 200 full-time equivalent positions slated for elimination during the coming school year.

The staff reductions are unlike anything Graff has seen in his 23 years with the district, he said.

“I believe any further reductions will jeopardize our momentum,” he said.

Goodbye to swimming

To offset the loss of teachers and attempt to balance classroom sizes, the district is proposing shifting high schools from a six-period to seven-period schedule.

And the public has made it clear it wants the district to keep as many opportunities for students in place as possible. Graff dubbed the new approach as “Core plus more,” a play on the district’s implementation of Alaska Common Core Standards, a guideline of sorts of what students are expected to learn. The standards are similar to the nationwide Common Core Standards.

The addition of a seventh period will align middle and high school schedules. Middle school teachers currently teach for five of seven periods per day. Now they’ll teach six periods. The district is also proposing getting rid of one of two daily planning periods.

Graff said he believes teachers and support staff will do “everything in their ability to continue to provide learning experiences that meet the needs of every student.”

The only extracurricular classes Graff is proposing to cut next year, for now, are high school swimming classes.

"Swimming is not a required course, nor is there a swim test requirement for graduation," he said. The cut shouldn't impact after-school swimming and diving team activities and rentals.

Sustainable funding

The district's money troubles are the result of flat funding and rising health care costs.

The state's Base Student Allocation (BSA), the number of dollars school districts receive per student, has remained steady at \$5,680 the last three years.

Funding shortfalls have been the new norm the past five years. A \$25 million budget deficit for the current school year was closed by spending some of the district's budget reserves and making cuts to support staff and classroom supplies. Teaching positions were not included in the cuts for the 2012-2013 school year.

Agosti-Gisler said the board is calling all public education supporters to tell the state's legislators about what they value in Anchorage's public education system and urge them to increase the base allocation.

Graff said the district needs consistent, sustainable funding to keep the district afloat. "We're a people-intensive business," he said, a business that requires human resources to provide quality education. Still, in meetings with lawmakers, Graff said he hasn't heard "comments as to what we need to do to secure funding."

Soaring health care costs

Rising health care costs dry up district dollars far more than salaries, and classroom supplies are a mere fraction of the funding total.

"There's active medical and retiree medical," said Mark Foster, the district's chief financial officer. "Those are the two dominant factors in cost growth" over the past two decades. It's not uncommon for employees' health care costs to see increases in the double-digit percentages on an annual basis, he said.

Outside states have healthier, competitive prices when compared to Alaska. Foster said that 10 percent of Alaskans' income went toward staying healthy around 1990. Now, 20 percent of their wealth is going into health care, he said.

"It's not just that health care costs are rising everywhere; they're rising in Alaska much faster," Foster said.

The district is working with employee unions, trying to get them to pay a higher portion of the cost. Its teacher-compensation package is an ongoing point of contention for some educators, especially given the new demands and standards they are facing. Officials say their plans moving forward focus on improving performance in the classroom, a balancing act that means doing more with less.

A recent three-year agreement between the teachers' union and district have helped contain some of the rising health care costs, Graff said.

Juneau schools look to cut \$4.8M

Public says new curriculum not needed, save class sizes

The Juneau School District is starting to get a clearer picture of next year's financial standing now that the two biggest fiscal unknowns — the cost of its teachers and state funding availability — have dollar figures attached.

But for a district facing nearly \$4.8 million in budget cuts, clearer does not mean easier, JSD Superintendent Glenn Gelbrich said after a budget committee meeting Tuesday evening.

"There's still such a large gap between what we want to provide for students and what we can afford to provide," Gelbrich told the Empire.

The school board's budget committee will be working to cut the full \$4.8 million from the budget because the status of a funding increase of about \$900,000 will not be known by the time the district's budget is due to the City and Borough Juneau.

"There's still sufficient ambiguity — we're still very early in the legislative session," Gelbrich said. "We'll plan for what we know, and we don't know if we'll have the (base student allocation) increased or not."

He added that the committee and school board will develop a plan or priority list of items to be reinstated first if the budget gap ends up being less than the projected amount when the budget is sent to the CBJ for final approval.

Three weeks ago, Juneau schools were facing a \$3.1 million shortfall as work began on next year's budget, but that number ballooned last week to \$4.5 million after the new teachers' contract was estimated to have a \$1.3 million impact. The bump to \$4.8 million is a result of the district's tentative agreement with the teachers costing an estimated \$230,000 more than anticipated a week ago. The tentative agreement is expected to be approved by the board and full teachers union.

"They're comfortable with what we've got, and we're comfortable, too," Gelbrich said of union negotiations while guest speaking at a Rotary Club of Juneau luncheon earlier on Tuesday.

Tuesday night's committee meeting was the first in which the committee heard comments from the public, and the forum focused almost exclusively on one topic: the district's proposal to spend more than \$1 million on new curriculum. The proposal includes nearly \$600,000 on a new elementary language arts curriculum and about \$500,000 on a new secondary math program.

Seven or eight people who spoke at the meeting, including Juneau teachers and parents, said the district should not be purchasing new curriculum that may not work as hoped when there are other more pressing needs.

"If we can't afford smaller class sizes, we shouldn't be buying new books," said Juneau teacher Amy Jo Meiners.

"Those programs don't teach children to read. Teachers teach children to read, and they have their own ways of doing that," added Karen Doxey, a Riverbend Elementary School teacher.

Gelbrich defended the cost by pointing to a different number: the percentage of students who are not meeting literacy and math standards.

"The 35-to-40 percent, by far, overshadow the budget number to me," Gelbrich said. "That's not to undervalue the question before the committee, but I'm really, really worried about the 35-to-40 percent."

Several members of the budget committee voiced support for the notion of waiting a year or more to purchase new curriculum so school officials could be sure that the \$1.1 million investment would directly lead to improved student success.

"If we spend money on this curriculum and cut teachers, we're taking a real gamble," said Jennifer Lindley, one of the budget committee members. "What happens if curriculum doesn't give us the results we're seeking? Now we've hurt our community."

If the district were to invest the same amount of money in teaching positions, there would be 10 fewer positions cut, Gelbrich said in answer to a question on the matter.

"Losing teachers in lieu of a new curriculum seems like a huge risk right now," Lindley said.

The idea of reducing the number of teaching positions to be cut instead of proposing the new curriculum was discussed prior to the district proposing the first draft of next year's budget, said Gelbrich, who added that school principals and the district-level staff view the update as "extremely important."

"We brought it forward knowing the costs," he said.

The most common concern expressed Tuesday night about the proposed budget was the implications reducing teaching positions would have on class sizes, particularly at the elementary level.

"We cannot balance the budget on the backs of our 6-year-olds," said Marie Marks, a parent of two JSD students and a member of the Dzantik'i Heeni Middle School site council.

Aside from removing the curriculum upgrades from the budget, several members of the public and committee pointed to the six instructional coach positions as possible cuts to prevent elementary-level class sizes from increasing.

"Let's get our priorities straight, and keep our priority in funding classroom teachers," Carrie Macaulay said in an email to the budget committee.

In that email, she proposed reducing the number of instructional coaches from six to three and having the coaches each handle two schools.

The district considered cutting the instructional coaches program but didn't believe it could be effective if cut, Gelbrich said.

"We consider instructional coaches an essential part of our plan in developing our teachers," he said.

The committee's next meeting will be next Tuesday at 6 p.m. in the DHMS commons.

Fairbanks school district projects \$8 million budget shortfall

FAIRBANKS — More than 200 people packed the multi-purpose room at Ryan Middle School on Thursday to hear from school district administrators how bad next year's budget would look. Though the news laid out by Superintendent Pete Lewis wasn't unexpected, it wasn't good for the district either.

The Fairbanks North Star Borough School District will face a budget shortfall of about \$8 million next fiscal year if the district's projections are accurate.

To balance its budget, the district plans to eliminate about 50 regular classroom teachers — 18 at the elementary school level, 12 at the middle school level and about 22 at the junior high school level.

The layoffs would cause class size increases for the second time in two years, a measure the district had previously touted as one it had been able to avoid for many years. Projections show average class sizes increasing from 24 to 25.5 in grades one through three.

Because the district has to be working on its 2015 budget so early, administrators don't know yet how much funding the state legislature or the borough assembly plan to provide. The district's budget proposal, which it released for the first time Thursday evening, assumes a \$100 increase per student to the Base Student Allocation from the state and an \$888,280 increase in the local contribution from the borough.

The \$100 BSA increase equates to about \$2.6 million; however, the district would not receive that much extra over next year because of enrollment reductions. Enrollment in FNSB schools has decreased by about 200 students from last year.

The district requests the additional funding from the borough to offset losses of state funding because of property value increases. The borough's last full value determination increased by \$335 million, which means the state will reduce its contribution to the school district by \$888,280.

Despite the additional funding factored into the district's proposal, the increases are not certain. The state legislature has not increased the BSA in four years.

Gov. Sean Parnell proposed a BSA increase of \$85 per student as part of his omnibus education bill this session, but if the bill passes with its present number, the district would have to plan for about \$400,000 less from the state. That would mean state funding to FNSBSD would stay essentially the same from the year prior.

If no BSA increase at all makes it through the legislature, the district stands to have a budget shortfall of about \$2.6 million greater than what it already has projected.

Lewis called on all those present Thursday to express their concern to their legislators.

“We need your help. We need you to really kind of take on that ambassador role,” Lewis said. “Can you reach out to the state Legislature? Can you reach out to the governor? Can you ask yourself what you want for your kids, what you want for your neighbor’s kids, what you want for your future?”

Lewis stressed the fact that, even though Fairbanks has been one of the most successful districts in the state, if it keeps having to increase class sizes and cut teachers the effects will catch up to it as they have in other places.

“As we perform well, you will hear sometimes the argument ... ‘It’s not you, it’s someone else,’” Lewis said. “The point is, at some point, it is going to be us because resources, the allocation of those resources ... is going to tip the scale.”

Subject: Pediatrician and Mom Plea for increase BSA in ASD

I am writing as a pediatrician, mom and concerned citizen requesting you support an increase in the BSA and vote No on a constitutional ammendment authorizing vouchers.

My husband grew up in Anchorage and the ASD schools. We moved here upon completion of our medical training to raise our family and build practices. This move was inspired by the unique opportunities available to us as parents hoping to bring up children connected to the natural world and their community. The quality and diverse educational options in the ASD were a large part of this decision.

I fear for the future of our city. I am afraid we will not attract industry and high quality professionals to a town with struggling public schools and few private school options. If I were reading the paper and considering a move to Anchorage at this point, I would likely make a different choice.

I fear for my children's educational future. I do not know where we will send our oldest, soon to enter middle school. There will be even fewer adults in the building and those who are there will be increasingly stressed by demands of the District, students and administration. This sounds like a set-up for our children to fail. Chugach Optional School has educated our children in ways I never could have dreamed. My children are part of a community where they feel responsible for other children at school and the wider world. In kindergarten, my son brought in an extra pair of gloves for a child who had none. My 10 year old yearns to travel to Malawi where our school sends financial support (through a program started by our incredible school nurse). The custodian high-fives kids on their way into school and knows them by name. Our teachers somehow find a way to make all kids find their "gifts." We can only stretch school staff so far and still expect this level of involvement in children's lives.

Most of all, I fear for my patients. In my work as a pediatrician I see kids daily who rely on their school communities to see the possibility in the world, to know that there is more than what happens in their often chaotic homes and even for basic human kindness. When I saw a homeless family last month in which all 3 children were infested with scabies, lice and bed bugs picked up at the hotel they were living in, I knew who to call for help. I called their school nurse who sees them daily and helped formulate a plan to be sure they were treated and bathed. She had a stash of fresh clothes for them so they wouldnt have to attend class in an unkempt state.

I fear that the many, many wonderful things that happen in ASD schools each day which do not directly relate to a test score are being at best overlooked and possibly even ignored. It is a reality of our time that schools do

more than educate. As a community we need to own this and fund the employment of people who make the difference in young people's lives.

PLEASE, PLEASE, PLEASE take a page out of the elementary school primer and treat others the way you would like to be treated. Please fund the ASD to educate our kids well by increasing the BSA.

I am writing to strongly oppose any efforts to give money to private schools in Alaska. I am opposed to changing the Alaska Constitution for this reason, and I appreciate your efforts on the behalf of public schools. Here is why I am opposing the voucher program.

First, we are facing an estimated \$2 BILLION dollar deficit this year alone. Why you are proposing to give money away in this current fiscal reality is a mystery. Nobody even mentions a price tag, which cannot be good news. We cannot pay for the schools we already have!

Second, school is not a capitalist system that might be improved by competition or "choice." This is because no child can be rejected from public schools. We teach every child that comes. Some of them are difficult to teach, and yet, they will not be turned away.

"Vouchers" would isolate poor and difficult children into apartheid schools. Encouraging people to leave public schools simply makes them worse for the students who remain. Notice that Anchorage already has school choice (charters, optional programs), and it is no accident that the "best" schools also have the lowest rates of economically disadvantaged students. (For example, Chugach Optional: 4% economically disadvantaged while the district rate is 46%) Middle and upper class parents know how to navigate the system, and they can provide transportation. These schools are only "the best" because of who attends them, not because they have a secret formula for success.

What they are proposing will take us back to the days of Plessy v. Ferguson. I support fully-funded, diverse public schools governed by the public and accountable to the public.

I am a working mother, married to a public school teacher, super voter, educated in the Anchorage School District, and a concerned citizen. I make my home in Spenard (Anchorage) and have one son attending kindergarten at Aquarian Charter School (my daughter is 2 and attends pre-school at Puffin Heights Montessori School.)

While I have a child attending a charter school program, I would like to express my support for funding ALL public schools in our State. I am concerned by proposals being put forward that would possibly reallocate funding to charter schools and away from neighborhood schools. I think all schools need a bigger "piece of the pie" and not just charter schools (I also think we need a bigger pie). I am very happy with Aquarian Charter School, but feel that we should look for solutions that benefit the entirety of our educational system. Much of the data shows, that specialty schools draw a population of families that are more affluent, have the luxury to be more engaged in their children's educational experience, and whose children will have better educational outcomes because of this. I worry that charter schools and other specialty schools become reservoirs of privilege. In fact, if we really support school choice we would offer transportation to students to go to whichever school they want within their school district. I see this as a major barrier to some families who would perhaps like their children to attend a charter school or specialty school (but this is another issue for another time.)

An issue you could tackle with HR 278 is to, at a minimum, raise the BSA to keep up with inflation. If you are interested in being truly visionary and investing in our future leaders, workforce, Alaskans - I would suggest you raise the BSA beyond inflation proofing and really make an investment in Alaska's kids.

Dear Honorable Representative Gardner:

I am writing to request that you fund public education. Adequately funding education is more important than any other policy issue. Today's children are tomorrow's leaders. Free public education is one of the greatest American institutions and every child deserves an education. Radio storyteller Garrison Keller said the following: "When you wage war on the public schools, you are attacking the mortar that holds the community together. You're not a conservative, you're a vandal."

Please vote against Senate Resolution 9 (SJR 9) that would put an initiative on the November ballot that would change the Alaska Constitution to allow the state to spend public money on private and religious schools. There is separation of church and state in the USA and in Alaska. The Alaska Constitution states: "No money shall be paid from public funds for the direct benefit of any religious or other private educational institution." I do not want the state's constitution changed.

I live in the highest mill rate area in the city of Anchorage. I absolutely do not want my tax dollars going to support private or religious schools. Churches pay no income tax; why should they receive tax dollars to pay for their schools? Churches should provide a free education to those who want a religious education. Private schools could take funding and disappear in the night like thieves.

In the worst-case scenario, this is what I predict will happen. Public education disappears. Only the rich can send their children to school. But then the government will decide that tax payers again need to subsidize the poor and will expect the tax payers to pay for the education of those who cannot afford private schools. Or those children won't attend school at all, which would lead to more kids roaming the streets and committing crimes, and needed social welfare support. I have observed this situation directly in the private school system in Mexico.

Among ASD teachers, moral is at an all-time low. Why are teachers treated so poorly? I cannot think of another profession where the members are at the whim of others. Every year, teachers cringe, are stressed and worry that they might be displaced. New teachers are already scrambling for jobs because they know they will be cut. That leaves the teachers with years of experience and masters degrees who are the most expensive.

In the 1980's, Alaska used to be the best state for teachers. Now it is one of the worst. Why would anyone want to become a teacher here? What would be the incentive? Low pay, added work load for the same pay, large class sizes, low moral, and annual stress about whether or not a few dollars more might be spent on education.

I have four college degrees, one a masters of fine arts. I am also a middle school teacher. I could teach in college but I prefer to instruct adolescents because I believe that I can make a difference in their lives. Years ago, I taught in a junior high school. The difference between the middle school model and junior high is distinct. Junior high is not student-centered; it is academic centered. Support for adolescent issues was non-

existent. Teaching six classes a day left no time for collaboration between teachers. There were no warm and fuzzy programs like Social Emotional Learning, AVB, and Differentiation. Whatever happened to kids happened.

Middle school is a welcoming, student centered model, where everyone works together to help students make it through the rough adolescent years, to learn that there are consequences to choices, and to achieve academic success. I am an elective teacher and I frequently talk to team teachers to trouble shoot issues with students, and we work together to solve problems.

With the proposed changes to the school day, here are some of the changes that will occur. Think about the impact this will have on the children who are our future and our most important resource. The following is a direct quote from the PTSA at Goldenview Middle School where I teach:

Here are some of the changes that would most likely occur if teachers are asked to teach 25 more students and have half the planning and collaboration time. The public deserves to know of possible changes ahead. We will not be a Middle School anymore (whole student centered). Unfortunately, few noticeable changes will be visible to the public next year. Results of these drastic changes sometimes take three or four years to present their unintended consequences. We may find at that time that the district and state have backed the education of their youth into a seemingly inescapable corner, which will take many years of painful work to reverse.

Changes for students:

- Higher class sizes
- Lower teacher to student contact time
- Lower individual attention to student needs
- More independent work with less teacher guidance
- Less and slower feedback on performance
- Communication and parent meetings less frequent
- Less time for student interventions, lost in masses
- Student absence follow-up less effective
- Fewer elective choices and higher elective conflicts
- Team projects and collaboration will discontinue
- No field trips or team activities
- Fewer science labs
- Less "fun stuff" (demos, class speakers, etc.)
- Less writing, more book work, more homework, and more whole group instruction
- Teams may only be in common by location, if that is possible
- Feeling of lack of connectedness - SEL drops
- More students will fall through the cracks, less identification of special needs
- More student failures

Changes for Parents:

- More difficulty in contacting teachers
- Slower feedback in communication
- Less personal teacher-student-parent connection
- Fewer opportunities for teacher meetings
- Lowered availability of counselors
- Lack of ability and flexibility to meet with teams
- No ability to meet with teachers as a team, parents will have to have many individual meetings before or after school
- Less opportunity to participate in school activities (aide/volunteer, chaperone, observe)
- More involvement in planning student academics for the future

Changes for School:

- More discipline issues - less coverage
- Lowered "family" feel
- Scheduling conflicts and difficulties
 - Higher work load with fewer people
- Higher teacher turnover – less experience in district
- Loss of mentor/experienced teachers
- More substitutes
 - Aesthetic decline (less classroom care/maintenance/decoration)
 - More difficulty in getting extra-curricular sponsors
- Few to no grants or fund raising

Changes for Community:

- Higher dropout rate – against 2020 goals
- Lowered student achievement – against district goals
- More community responsibilities in educating our youth
- More community/parent involvement necessary for student success and support
- Lowered faith in public education – against district goals
 - Lack of future support for public education
 - Increased demand for private education
 - Higher teacher burn out

Changes for Teachers:

- 20% more work with half the available time (25% more if you are talking about core classes)
- More STRESS
- More preps, some not in qualified disciplines
- More sick days
 - Lower morale
 - Teachers do not feel the district supports or values them
 - Less teacher collaboration

The school district and school board should be obligated to inform the public of the actual changes that will take place due to the current fiscal situation. To not inform the public of these changes reinforces the notion that this district is opaque in its handling of fiscal and policy matters.

Why is education not prioritized? It should be. The State of Alaska has a lot of money, but chooses to throw it away on other 'more important' expenditures. Imagine this: What if schools were fully funded and the military had to have bake sales to buy weapons? This is such a skewed priority system. What if an education fund similar to the permanent dividend fund was established? Then the yearly begging for dollars would not happen.

To quote Lars Danner, whose *Guest Opinion* was published in the Anchorage Press: "A quality public education is important to attract well-educated, skilled workers to live in Anchorage and the rest of the state. We need to build a city where people want to live. Education is the key to personal success and to Alaska's continued economic development. Educated workers are critical to staffing oil fields, banks, and other local businesses. Education reduces poverty and crime while increasing health, life-span, and civic participation. Good education spending is not about building new facilities—it is about keeping good teachers in the classrooms—teachers who can motivate and inspire their students."

You asked about student enrollment and staffing levels in recent years for the following school districts: Anchorage, Dillingham City, Fairbanks North Star Borough, Juneau Borough, Kenai Peninsula Borough, Lower Kuskokwim, Mat-Su Borough, and Sitka Borough.

The Alaska Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) collects enrollment and teacher staffing information for each school district in the state, and calculates student-teacher ratios for each. As of the date of this report, the DEED is in the process of finalizing enrollment data for the 2012-2013 school year.¹ We present in Table 1 DEED enrollment data for the selected districts for the most recent school years available and also attach DEED reports of teacher staffing and teacher-student ratios for the 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 school years.² The DEED does not currently collect staffing information about non-certified staff. In order to obtain information about the current school year, as well as information about non-teacher staffing levels, we queried the selected school districts for their budgeted teacher positions and other staff positions for the 2010-2011, 2011-2012, and 2012-2013 school years.

Some districts were more able than others to provide specific staffing data within our timeframe.³ Due to differences in the way data were provided to us, we present each district's report separately, and we urge caution when comparing staffing data across different sources. Unless otherwise noted, "teacher" positions are certified positions providing direct instruction to students, which include, for example, classroom teachers, librarians, and special education teachers. "Other staff" positions include, among others, administrators, aides, secretaries, and custodians. All position totals are "full-time equivalency" (FTE)—that is, two half-time positions would be counted as one full-time position, and as such position totals do not reflect the number of individuals employed by each district. Unless otherwise noted, budgeted staffing numbers provided here do not differentiate among funding sources (for example, some positions may be funded by grants instead of state funds). Numbers are rounded for ease of comparison; otherwise, we present the information as we received it from each district. In general, most of the larger districts reported decreases in both teacher and other staff positions during recent years, as did some of the smaller school districts.

As you know, Alaska's public K-12 school funding is determined using a statutorily defined formula to calculate the amount of state aid paid to each individual school district each year. Adopted in 1998, the formula is intended to equitably distribute aid for education throughout the state.⁴ Incorporated into the formula are factors intended to account for variations in school size, geographic cost differences, student populations with special and intensive needs, correspondence programs, federal aid, and the ability of communities to provide local contributions.⁵

Selected Alaska School District Enrollment

Table 1 shows Kindergarten through 12th grade enrollment figures from the DEED for selected Alaska school districts from the past three school years, the most recent years for which data are available. The Anchorage School District, with enrollment approaching 50,000 students in Kindergarten through 12th grade, is by far the largest in the state. The next two largest school districts are the Mat-Su Borough, with approximately 17,000 students, and the Fairbanks North Star Borough, with approximately 14,000 students. The smallest school district we include here is the Dillingham City School District, with fewer than 500 students.⁶ As you see in Table 1, most of the districts we examined had small fluctuations in enrollment during these years, with the most significant change in enrollment occurring in the Mat-Su Borough School District.

Budgeted Teacher and Staff Positions

School districts differ in the types of positions they typically consider as teaching positions in their budgeting processes. As such, we caution against comparing staff and teacher counts across school districts, and present data individually by school district.

Anchorage

The Anchorage School District (ASD) is by far the largest in the state, with nearly 50,000 students. Chad Stiteler, ASD Chief Financial Officer, notes that teacher numbers include classroom teachers as well as support teachers (that is, teachers of classes such as music, art, and physical education at the elementary level), certified special education teachers, librarians, school nurses, counselors, and psychologists.⁷ Table 2 shows teacher and staff positions budgeted for the Anchorage School

District from 2010-2013. You will see that teacher positions declined from 3,571 in 2010-2011 to 3,412 in 2012-2013, and total staff positions declined from 2,665 to 2,605.

Dillingham City School District

Table 3 shows teacher and staff positions budgeted for the Dillingham School District (DSD) from 2010-2013. As you can see, the DSD experienced an increase in teachers during these years. Superintendent William McLeod noted that if reductions are required for the 2013-2014 school year, they will be addressed with employee attrition for both teachers and other employees.

Fairbanks North Star Borough

The Fairbanks North Star Borough provided staffing information disaggregated by job position. Staffing levels provided are from operating funds only, plus 22 federally funded ("jobs bill") teachers included in 2011-2012, but do not include food service staff or grant-funded staff. Table 4 shows teacher and staff positions budgeted for the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District from 2010-2013. Overall, there are only slight fluctuations in both certified teachers and support staff. However, between 2010-2011 and 2012-2013 there was an increase in special education teachers and staff, and a decrease in elementary and middle school teachers and staff, for example.

Juneau Borough

The Kenai Peninsula Borough School District provided detailed budgeted staffing information for both certificated staff and support staff. Dave Jones, Assistant Superintendent, notes that budgets are based on projected enrollment, and actual enrollments result in variances from the budgeted staffing. The budgeted staff levels presented below include all funding sources (general fund, student nutrition services, and special revenue funds). As you see, the number of budgeted teacher positions dropped by 41 between last year and this year.

Totals include only positions funded by operating funds or general funds, and do not include any positions funded by grants to the district. Both teacher and staff positions declined from 2010-2011 to 2011-2012. As shown in Table 1 above, according to DEED figures, enrollment in the district increased from 16,869 to 17,268 during these years.
