A BILL

FOR AN ACT ENTITLED

1 "An Act relating to big game hunting with children."

2 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:**

3 * **Section 1.** AS 16.05.255(i) is amended to read:

4 (i) For the purpose of encouraging adults to take children hunting, the board
5 shall establish annual hunting seasons in appropriate areas of the state for big game,
6 other than bison and musk ox [, THAT ARE OPEN BEFORE SCHOOLS START IN
7 THE FALL AND BEFORE REGULAR HUNTING SEASONS BEGIN]. Only a
8 resident child accompanied by a resident adult or a child accompanied by the child's
9 resident parent, resident stepparent, or resident legal guardian may take big game in an
10 area where a season established under this subsection is in effect. The adult, parent,
11 stepparent, or legal guardian who accompanies the child may only assist the child in
12 taking big game. A big game animal taken under this subsection, except for a Sitka
13 blacktail deer when the harvest limit for the deer is one for each person, must be
14 counted against the bag limits of both the child and the adult, parent, stepparent, or
15 legal guardian who accompanies the child. In this subsection,

- 1 (1) "adult" means an individual who is 21 years of age or older;
- 2 (2) "child" means an individual who is not more than 17 years of age
- 3 and not younger than eight years of age.

CS SB 77 (RES) "An Act Relating to Big Game Hunting With Children."

Since long before statehood, Alaska has enjoyed a long history rich with the subsistence, social and cultural benefits, as well as the generational outdoor traditions derived from Alaska's hunting culture. Such traditions and the outdoor legacy in the best interest of all Alaskans, is most effectively passed on to the next generation by encouraging young people to hunt responsibly.

The Board of Game currently possesses the ability to establish special hunts to ensure the responsible instruction and indoctrination of young hunters. This bill will give the board more flexibility to establish youth hunts. The bill will also make an exception to the rule that both the youth hunter and the adult hunter's tags must be punched whenever an animal is harvested in a youth hunt.

In the specific case where the hunt is for black-tailed deer in areas where the annual limit is one deer, only one tag would have to be punched. This exception would allow a family to harvest a deer for each tag rather than one deer for two tags. Without this provision, it is likely that there could be low or non-existent participation in youth deer hunts in these areas.

Encouraging youth to responsibly participate and carry on Alaska's great hunting tradition and outdoor heritage is very important for youth development and quality multi-generational outdoor experiences. I hope you will consider supporting this important bill.

Dear Senator Kelly:

Thank you for the original legislation promoting youth hunting in Alaska, and for sponsoring new legislation, SB 77, providing modifications to the youth hunting law. Board of Game (Board) members have been strong supporters of providing youth hunts but have met some difficulty authorizing seasons that begin before school starts with recent, earlier opening dates. Your amended language, to change "shall" to "may" and remove the season requirement, will help immensely in our effort to establish youth hunting opportunities.

The Board has also encountered a second issue related to the requirement for both the child and accompanying adult to validate their harvest tag when a big game animal is taken. When harvesting moose and caribou which yield a large amount of meat, this has not been an issue. At our recent meeting in Sitka, a proposal was adopted to establish a youth deer hunt and the question came up concerning both hunters validating their harvest tags for one deer. Since this area, Subunit 5A near Yakutat, has a one deer bag limit we were concerned that by combining the bag limit, it may discourage adults from participating in youth hunts since they would only be allowed to harvest one deer for the family. The estimated maximum yield of meat posted in the Department of Fish and Game regulation book, is 68 pounds for a deer. Suggested wording in lines 12 through 14 of the proposed bill should read: "A big game animal taken under this subsection, except for Sitka black-tailed deer where the bag limit is one, must be counted against the bag limits of both the child and the adult, parent, stepparent, or legal guardian who accompanies the child."

Board members were also concerned about the age range allowed in this statute of 8 to 17 years of age. It is our understanding that the Board has the authority to be more restrictive than the enabling legislation, therefore this concern can be addressed without needing any word changes. An age range of 10 to 17 has been used by the Board since we require youth hunters to have successfully completed a hunter education program prior to hunting.

Larry please express the Board of Game's appreciation to Senators Micciche, Giessel and Kelly for their support and efforts to help youth hunters. As you know, the future use of our abundant wild resources is dependent on building support from the public, and from public testimony the majority of Alaskans support special hunts for young hunters. The Board recently adopted a youth hunt for antlerless moose in the area north of Fairbanks providing an allocation of 20% of the available tags going to hunters between the ages of 10 to 17. In the first year, 78 youth hunter permits will be available for this hunt. Youth hunters will be required to have successfully completed a state hunter education course, be accompanied by an adult 21 years old or older and both will be required to validate their harvest ticket for the one moose. Due to the current enabling legislation, the season had to be set in early August before school begins which is not a desired time to hunt moose or care for meat in warm weather. With passage of SB77 the Board will have flexibility to adopt seasons with a higher probability of success.
