
Re: SB 184 - Jury Duty Exemption for Certain Teachers

I am writing on behalf of the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District to support Senate Bill 184 that if passed, will direct the Department of Education and Early Development to develop regulations defining low performing schools for purposes of jury duty exemption for teachers.

When considering all the variables that affect a student's learning at school, it is common to conclude that quality instruction by a well-trained teacher is the most important one. We are fortunate on the Kenai to have good teachers who provide such instruction. Despite our best efforts to secure and train substitute teachers, a teacher's absence from school is one that we seek to avoid. While occasional absences by teachers are expected, a prolonged absence due to jury duty can have a negative effect on our students' learning. It is for this reason that KPBSD supports SB184. Further, the students who attend our fly-in schools, which have a smaller substitute teacher pool to draw from, are disproportionately impacted by a long absence. In sum, we need to do all that we can to ensure that we offer our students the very best experience on each and every school day. SB184 will help us do this.

RE: HB 353 – Jury duty exemption for certain teachers

I would appreciate your scheduling of HB 353 for a hearing in the House Special Committee on Education. I've worked on this issue for several years at the request of my home school district, which is greatly impacted by the absence of teachers. Bethel maintains a superior court in the Fourth Judicial District and because of the caseload and geographic challenges, the pool of jurors has placed an undue burden on district teachers.

The court has instituted a pilot project for the Bethel court this year that reduces the time requirements for petit jury duty from three months to one month and grand jury from four months to one month. This eases the burden on the general population but it doesn't solve the problem facing educators and children in classrooms.

I've attached my sponsor statement, a letter of support from the Lower Kuskokwim School District, and a snapshot of comments I've received from teachers themselves on this issue.

SPONSOR STATEMENT

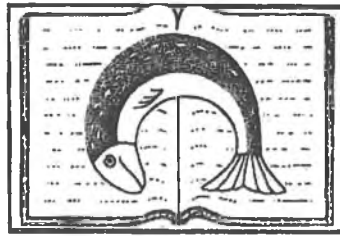
HB 353 provides an exemption from jury duty for teachers in schools that have failed to meet adequate yearly progress under state and federal law.

The role of the classroom teacher has taken on new importance in recent years with the passage of state and federal laws aimed at accountability in education. The ultimate winners or losers of these mandates will be our children. This year high school seniors will be required to pass the high school graduation qualifying exam to receive their diploma. We have added "No Child Left Behind" to our personal vocabulary when we talk about education. NCLB imposes requirements for highly qualified teachers and sanctions on districts that fail to meet "adequate yearly progress."

Jury duty can be lengthy, resulting in a significant impact on classroom learning. When a teacher is absent from the classroom the flow of learning is affected. In many small communities in Alaska, qualified substitute teachers are simply not available, and the person placed in charge of the classroom may be an aide pulled from other responsibilities or an individual who holds a high school diploma. Moreover, ratio of scale in small communities creates an additional burden on the school. For example, five of the eleven certified teachers in one of the schools in my district were called to Bethel for jury duty this year before this school year was half over.

Although jury duty is an important civic responsibility and part of the foundation of our legal system exemptions are appropriate under certain circumstances. HB 353 limits its impact by exempting only those teachers whose school has failed to meet AYP. In a time of so many educational mandates and with a lack of available educational resources in some areas of the state this is a reasonable solution to the problem.

Dear Representative Kapsner,

This letter is in support of HB 353 dealing with jury duty for teachers in schools that have not met the Adequate Yearly Progress requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act. In the Lower Kuskokwim School District we have several schools that are severely impacted by the amount of jury duty that our teachers are required to perform. From September 1 to December 15, 2003, for example, our payroll records show a total of 107.5 days that our teachers were out of the classroom performing jury duty. The negative impact on student learning is further compounded by the fact that certified substitutes are virtually non-existent in our district and in some cases it is not possible to find subs at all.

Quality instruction is the most important component in meeting the high academic standards brought about by legislation at the state and federal levels. The NCLB act recognizes this with its heavy emphasis on "highly qualified" teachers. HB 353 will help ensure that our highly qualified teachers remain in the classroom where they can help our students reach these standards.

Educating our children is the most important responsibility of the State of Alaska. Teachers have the greatest impact on the quality of education, but only when they are in the classroom. Legislators can help to ensure that teachers stay in the classroom by their support of HB 353.

I believe all of our teachers need to be in the classroom to get ready for testing, as none of our substitutes are trained teachers. Out of 11 certified teachers, 5 have already been requested for jury duty, which is close to half, and the year is not over.

Many of my school staff have been called for jury duty, and often, more than one each quarter. I, myself, have been called several times for service in Bethel, and more recently for federal service in Anchorage.

My experience with the Bethel jury service is that it is not possible for teachers to make "real" lesson plans for the duration of their service. The system is set so that one cannot know until 4:30 if jury members need to appear in Bethel the following morning. By the time you get notice that you have to go to Bethel in the evening to be present for an 8:30 jury call, there isn't time to alter one's lesson plans for a substitute. Therefore, teachers tend to write plans for easy to follow activities for a non-certified substitute.

Village teachers are faced with two problems. First, airplanes must fly in the daylight, and during much of the school year there isn't a great deal of that after school is dismissed. By the time a teacher calls in to Bethel and discovers that s/he must fly to Bethel, there is barely time to grab a change of clothes and run to the airport to catch the mail plane. The second issue is that we don't have any people with teaching certificates sitting around the village waiting to be called in as a substitute. When a teacher is out, the best we can manage is to bring in a recent high school graduate who isn't otherwise employed. The students are the ones who suffer from interruption of their learning.

I've always felt that a well-educated population is less likely to commit crimes, and that effective teachers in the classroom contribute to a lower crime rate. Let the teachers teach, and the students learn, and we might not have need for so many trials and juries.

I just finished the three month long stint of jury duty service last month. I can assure you that it did have a negative impact on my students and our school. Partly because I missed many of my classes and partly because of the stress it caused. I never knew until the morning if I would have to fly into Bethel for jury duty or not. Several times the jury was cancelled at the last minute, sometimes before I left the village and sometimes after I arrived in Bethel. Sometimes ice or weather conditions made it impossible to go and all the time I worried that ice or weather conditions would prevent me from returning home if I did make it in. In the end I was never selected to be on a jury.

I would like to voice my support of the Jury Duty Bill. As the site administrator at Eek School I am very concerned about the impact of having teachers, administrators, and other staff members pulled away from their duties at the school for jury duty. This has a negative impact on our instructional program in terms of student academic growth and achievement.

It is almost impossible to find qualified substitute teachers to fill these vacancies. If we are serious about improving student academic growth and achievement we need to seriously consider exempting school staff (teachers, administrators, aides) from jury duty. It is extremely difficult to run an effective educational program with the constant disruption of having our highly qualified staff members pulled away from their duties.

I am the Director of Special Education for LKSD, which includes 21 village schools and four schools in Bethel and have been in this position for 6 years.

Jury duty has a tremendous impact when a special education teacher or district office special education specialist is called to serve. As you know, special education services are mandated by law. There are times when a student must, by law, be served by a certified special education teacher, not a sub or an aide. When a certified special education teacher is gone, we are out of compliance on some of our students' IEP's. This means that the parents can file a complaint against us with EED or file for due process. Both of these options are extremely costly to the district and stressful to the people involved.

We do the best we can to serve the student appropriately within the law and per their IEP's, but if the certified sp ed teacher or district office specialis is absent for any length of time, then it puts the district into situation of potential liability.

SB 184 **Jury Service Exemption**

SB 184 directs the Department of Education and Early Development to develop regulations defining "low performing schools" for purposes of jury duty exemption for teachers.

Current statute exempts from jury duty those teachers working in schools that do not meet the Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) under No Child Left Behind (NCLB). This provision effectively defines the term "low performing" as not "meeting AYP." In May of 2013 when the State of Alaska received an exemption from NCLB we invalidated our operating definition of low performing.

In 2004, Representative Mary Kapsner introduced HB 353 which created the jury duty exemption based on AYP. While jury duty is a privilege and duty of citizenship, a higher duty is to the welfare of children. A teacher chosen for jury duty on a long term trial might be gone from a classroom for several months. The idea of HB 353 was to provide stability to underperforming classrooms.

Currently, the state rates schools using the 5 star Alaska School Performance Index. The measurement tool takes in consideration such factors as school achievement, progress, attendance, graduation rate. While the Department could use this 5 star system, we believe it makes sense to allow them flexibility for determining the performance measure and to not have to seek a statute change for the jury duty issue any time a performance metric is changed.

I would appreciate your support in this clean-up legislation.

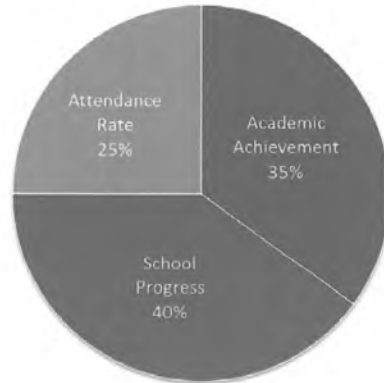

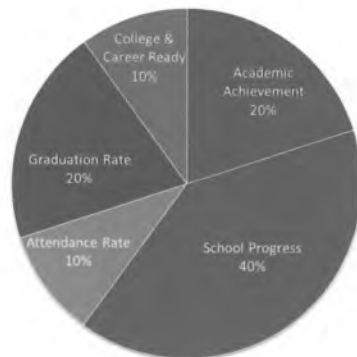

Progress in meeting AMO Targets

- Reported annually by EED for each school and district, and the state
- Progress in meeting AMO targets used for:
 - Consideration of designating schools as Priority or Focus schools.
 - Requirement for designation as Reward school.
 - Determines areas of need for school improvement plan if 3-star, 4-star, or 5-star school is not making progress in meeting AMO or graduation rate targets for school as a whole or in subgroups.

As of September 10, 2012 the ASD had 2,126 active current substitute teachers in the Sub Dispatch system. Of that number 449 had valid Alaska teaching certificates. The 2,126 number follows a “culling” of over 800 sub teachers who worked less than five days during the 2011-2012 school year.

- The district had an average need for approximately 350 subs per day during the 2011-2012 school year.
- There is an announced effort by the ASD to decrease the number of teacher pull-outs for training and/or release during the 2012-13 school year, so we anticipate a reduced number from the 350 of last school year. To date we have been running an average of 150 sub teacher jobs per day.
- There is an ongoing effort to increase the quality of our substitute teaching force.
- Training and Professional Development (TPD) will not be able to provide similar training support for the online training/test for substitute teachers in 2012-13. Likewise, due to budget reductions, TPD can no longer provide as many face-to-face sub trainings.
- We have averaged a 98.7% fill rate over the last three years and most of the 1.3% that did not fill were either nursing jobs, or very-late sub job submissions.
- In a nutshell, we have a plethora of active substitutes and will be facing a decreased number of available subbing jobs.

Therefore, beginning on September 17, 2012 the ASD will only accept and process substitute teaching applicants from individuals who hold a valid Alaska teaching certificate (Initial, Professional, or Master), or a student teacher authorization form (allowing a student teacher to sub for their host teacher during their final student teaching experience).

Any current ASD substitute teacher who is an active substitute may remain in the pool without an Alaska teaching certificate, as long as the individual substitutes the required five day minimum during the upcoming school year. However, the district will not accept *new* applications unless the applicant holds an Alaska teaching certificate. A “yellow” card from the Department of Education and Early Development (DEED), an actual copy of a sub’s teaching certificate, or the student teacher authorization form is required. This documentation will be required at the time the paper portion of the application is completed and submitted by the applicant.

The ASD will monitor the situation through-out the school year to gauge and analyze the positive and negative impacts of this decision.

Worksheet Explanation

This document describes the Alaska School Performance Index (ASPI) worksheet used to provide data for each public school in the State of Alaska. This document is designed to help describe the components on the ASPI worksheet that can be found online at the Department of Education & Early Development website.

ASPI Rating: Located in the upper left side of the worksheet. This is a star representation of the overall ASPI rating for the school. The ratings go from 1 to 5 with 5 being the highest rating.

Name of District/School: The School District name is located on the left side above the chart and the School name is located in the center above the chart.

School Grade Span: Located in the upper right side of the worksheet, just above the chart. This indicates the official grade span served by the school regardless as to whether the school has students in each grade level this year.

Note: The worksheet chart is broken into three sections: Participation Rate, K-8 Performance and 9-12 Performance. Each section is bordered by a thick, black line to help identify one section from another. The following fields are all located in the chart sections.

Participation Rate: The Participation Rate is calculated at the school level only and it drives the calculation used for the Achievement score. If the school meets or exceeds 95% participation in the standardized tests, only the students who assessed are included in the calculation for the Achievement score. If the school does not meet 95% participation, any students who were not assessed but were enrolled will be counted as not proficient in the Achievement score calculation. If a school has 40 or fewer students enrolled in the assessed grades (3-10), the requirements for participation are satisfied if two or fewer students do not participate in the state assessments.

Number Enrolled: Reports the number of students who were enrolled in the tested grades (3-10) on the first day of testing as reported in the Participation Rate file submitted to the department by each district.

Number Tested: Reports the number of students who tested in at least one content area (Reading, Writing, or Math).

Participation Rate: Calculated by dividing the number of students tested by the number of students enrolled.

Met Participation Rate: Indicates if the school met 95% participation based on the number of students enrolled and tested. This also takes into consideration the accommodation for schools with 40 or fewer students enrolled in the tested grades.

Factors for K–8 Performance:

Academic Achievement:

Count Proficient: Reports the number of students who were proficient in this content area (Reading, Writing, or Math).

Percent Proficient: Reports percent of proficient students calculated by dividing the number of proficient students in this content area by the number of students who tested in this content area (Reading, Writing, or Math).

Achievement Score: If the school has “Yes” in the “Met Participation Rate” cell, this field is calculated by dividing the count of students who were proficient in reading, plus those proficient in writing, plus those proficient in math divided by the number of student

who tested in reading, plus those who tested in writing, plus those who tested in math. If the school has “No” in the “Met Participation Rate” cell, the denominator is increased by the number of students who were enrolled on the first day of testing, but did not test in reading, plus the number who did not test in writing, plus the number who did not test in math.

School Progress: This element looks at student test scores over two consecutive years to see if there is improvement (growth) in their scores. It is calculated for all students in this grade span and is also calculated separately for the following four subgroups: Alaska Native, Economically Disadvantaged, Students with Disabilities, and LEP (Limited English Proficient) in this grade span. A subgroup must have at least five eligible students assessed in one or more subjects in order to be considered. See *Appendix A* for a more detailed description of the school progress indicator.

Attendance Rate: Calculated by taking the combined Aggregate Days of Attendance for all students in grades K-8 divided by the combined Aggregate Days of membership for all students in grades K-8 as reported in the Summer OASIS file submitted to the department by each district.

Points: Represents the raw score out of 100 based on the school’s performance on the element.

Weighting: Reflects the degree of weight assigned to the element (*e.g.*, the multiplier for Academic Achievement is 0.35; therefore, in most schools that serve grades K-8, Academic Achievement will be worth 35% of the total score).

ASPI Points: Reports the final ASPI points earned in this area. This is calculated by multiplying the Points by the Weighting.

Total K-8 Points: Calculated by taking the sum of ASPI points, and dividing by the sum of the multipliers times 100. *Formula: sum of ASPI Points / (sum of multipliers * 100)*

Factors for 9-12 Performance:

Academic Achievement:

Count Proficient: Reports the number of students who were proficient in this content area (Reading, Writing or Math).

Percent Proficient: Reports percent of proficient students calculated by dividing the number of proficient students in this content area by the number of students who tested in this content area (Reading, Writing, or Math).

Achievement Score: If the school has “Yes” in the “Met Participation Rate” cell, this field is calculated by dividing the count of students who were proficient in reading, plus those proficient in writing, plus those proficient in math divided by the number of student who tested in reading, plus those who tested in writing, plus those who tested in math. If the school has “No” in the “Met Participation Rate” cell, the denominator is increased by the number of students who were enrolled on the first day of testing, but did not test in reading, plus the number who did not test in writing, plus the number who did not test in math.

School Progress: This element looks at student test scores over two consecutive years to see if there is improvement (growth) in their scores. It is calculated for all students in this grade span and is also calculated separately for the following four subgroups: Alaska Native, Economically Disadvantaged, Students with Disabilities, and LEP (Limited English Proficient) in this grade span. A subgroup must have at least five eligible students assessed in one or more subjects in order to be considered. See *Appendix A* for a more detailed description of the school progress indicator.

Attendance Rate: Calculated by taking the combined Aggregate Days of Attendance for all students in grades 9-12 divided by the combined Aggregate Days of membership for all students in grades 9-12 as reported in the Summer OASIS file submitted to the department by each district.

Graduation Rate: The score may be based on either the 4- or 5-year cohort rate, depending on which rate yields the higher ASPI score.

4 Year: Calculated by dividing the number of graduates in the 4-year cohort group by the number of students in the 4-year cohort group.

5 Year: Calculated by dividing the number of graduates in the 5-year cohort group by the number of students in the 5-year cohort group.

If either the 4- or 5-year cohort group contains 0, 1, or 2 students then the graduation rate of the other cohort group will automatically yield the ASPI score. If both cohort groups contain 0, 1, or 2 students then Graduation Rate will not be considered as part of the school's overall ASPI score.

College Career Readiness: Calculated by dividing the combined value of all grade 12 student college and career readiness scores divided by the combined count of grade 12 students who attempted any qualifying test.

- Qualifying tests are WorkKeys, ACT, and SAT. WorkKeys certificates may be earned through multiple test administrations. ACT and SAT scores are based on the highest composite score from a single test administration.
- School roster includes all 12th grade students enrolled at the school on October 1 of the given school year as reported in the Fall OASIS file submitted to the department by each district.
- If a student attempts multiple different tests, the test score leading to the highest number of ASPI points will be used.
- If no 12th grade students attempted a qualifying test, the school will be assigned a null value for College Career Readiness.

WorkKeys Participation: Calculated by dividing the number of 11th grade students enrolled on October 1 of the given year who attempted the WorkKeys assessment by the number of 11th grade students enrolled on October 1 of the given year. October 1 counts are obtained from the Fall OASIS file submitted to the department by each district.

Points: Represents the raw score out of 100 based on the school's performance on the element.

Weighting: Reflects the degree of weight assigned to the element (*e.g.*, the multiplier for Academic Achievement is 0.20; therefore, in most schools that serve grades 9-12, Academic Achievement will be worth 20% of the total score).

ASPI Points: Reports the final ASPI points earned in this area. This is calculated by multiplying the Points by the Weighting.

Total 9-12 Points: Calculated by taking the sum of ASPI points, and dividing by the sum of the multipliers times 100. *Formula: sum of ASPI Points / (sum of Weightings * 100)*

The following fields are located below the final chart section on the lower right corner.

K-8 Enrollment Ratio: Represents the percentage of students enrolled in grades K-8. This is calculated by dividing the number of students enrolled in grades K-8 by the total number of students enrolled in K-12.

9-12 Enrollment Ratio: Represents the percentage of students enrolled in grades 9-12. This is calculated by dividing the number of students enrolled in grades 9-12 by the total number of students enrolled in K-12.

ASPI Score: The ASPI score is calculated by multiplying the K-8 ASPI score by the percent of the school enrollment that is represented by students in grades K-8 plus the 9-12 ASPI score multiplied by the percent of the school enrollment that is represented by students in grades 9-12.

Appendix A: School Progress

The school progress indicator utilizes the index score methodology (formerly “AKSPIP”), with the modified score tables, later developed for the Moore Settlement.

An index score is developed for the all students group and up to four subgroups: Alaska Native/American Indian, Economically Disadvantage, Students with Disabilities, and Limited English Proficient (LEP). A subgroup must have at least five eligible students assessed in one or more subjects in order to be considered.

The index scores for the All Students group and the subgroups are individually capped at 100, then the scores weighted as follows:

- Each eligible subgroup is weighted at 10% of the assigned score
- The All Students group is weighted in accordance with the number of eligible subgroups
 - No eligible subgroups: All Students = 100% of score
 - One eligible subgroup: All Students = 90% of score
 - Two eligible subgroups: All Students = 80% of score
 - Three eligible subgroups: All Students = 70% of score
 - Four eligible subgroups: All Students = 60% of score

In this sample, there are three eligible subgroups, so the all students group is weighted at 70%. The Alaska Native/American Indian group has a score exceeding 100, so that score is capped at 100 points *prior to weighting*. After all the weights are applied, this school would have a score in the ASPI School Progress indicator of 93.80 points.

Index Score Methodology

Index scores are assigned by subject at the student level if the following conditions are met:

- The student received a valid subject score on the SBA in both the current year and the prior year
- The student has progressed one grade from the previous year
 - *e.g.*, a student who was administered the grade six test in the current year must have been administered the grade five test in the previous year to be included in the growth calculation
- The student was enrolled in the same school for the full academic year
 - Full academic year is defined as October 1 until the first day of the Statewide testing period.

Student performance is divided into seven proficiency level categories, ranging from **Far Below Proficient Minus** to **Advanced**. Point values are assigned by subject at the student level as follows:

Student 5 repeated 3rd grade and does not receive any subject score in any subject area. Student 2's math assessment was invalidated in the prior year, so a subject score is only calculated in reading and writing for this student. Student 7 was absent during the current year's writing assessment, so a subject score is only calculated in reading and math for this student.

In total:

- Six students received a combined 520 points in reading
- Five students received a combined 430 points in writing
- Five students received a combined 475 points in math

The growth score for this subgroup is equal to the total sum of valid subject scores divided by the combined count of subject scores.

$$(520 + 430 + 475) / (6 + 5 + 5) = 1425 / 16 = 89.06$$

The raw index value for the K-8 Economically Disadvantaged subgroup is **89.06**.

Alaska Receives No Child Left Behind Waiver

JUNEAU – The U.S. Department of Education has granted Alaska a waiver from major provisions of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act, commonly known as No Child Left Behind. The waiver will take effect next school year.

“I am pleased that we have been able to remove ourselves from an accountability model that has inaccurately labeled Alaskan schools,” said Alaska Education Commissioner Mike Hanley. “In its place we will implement a system that will incorporate data that includes but goes beyond test scores to present a more accurate picture of the health of our schools across the state.”

Alaska is the 37th state (plus Washington, D.C.) to receive a waiver. Under the waiver, states agree to:

- adopt standards in English/language arts and mathematics that prepare students for education and training after high school, often referred to as college-ready and career-ready standards;
- devise their own system for holding schools accountable for students' academic success, including student populations that traditionally underperform; and
- require school districts to evaluate teachers and principals partly on student achievement.

In exchange for meeting these requirements, states are allowed to opt out of NCLB's accountability system known as Adequate Yearly Progress.

NCLB's goal was that all assessed students be proficient in reading and math by spring 2014. Schools and districts were held accountable in up to 32 categories. If schools and districts underperformed in any category to any degree, they were subject to consequences.

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School districts around the nation were concerned they would soon face consequences for not meeting unattainable goals. States were concerned they would have to implement consequences that are expensive, disruptive, and in some cases unjustified.

Alaska was in a position to apply for a waiver because it had been working for two years on new standards and on methods of evaluating educators. The State Board of Education & Early Development adopted Alaska's own college-ready and career-ready standards in June 2012. See <http://education.alaska.gov/tls/assessment/GLEHome.html>.

The State Board adopted new regulations for school districts' evaluations of educators in December 2012. See http://education.alaska.gov/news/releases/2012/board_actions_dec2012.pdf.

The State Board is scheduled to vote June 6 on proposed regulations to implement Alaska's own accountability system.

Alaska has proposed an accountability system for schools based on data about student achievement and progress in reading, writing and mathematics; attendance; performance on work-ready and college-entrance assessments in high school; and high school graduation. This formula, called the Alaska School Performance Index, will rank schools from one star to five stars.

Additionally, each school and district will have the goal of reducing its percentage of non-proficient students by half over six years, including in each subgroup of students: economically disadvantaged students, students with disabilities, limited English proficient students, and ethnic groups. Districts will be required to implement improvement plans in one-star and two-star schools and in any school with substantial achievement gaps among subgroups of students.

As required by the U.S. Department of Education, the state will recognize high-performing and high-improving schools; require the lowest-performing 5 percent of Title I schools (recipients of federal anti-poverty funds) to implement a significant program of improvement aligned with comprehensive turnaround principles; and require the next 10 percent of low-performing Title I schools to implement appropriate interventions to address specific deficiencies revealed through data analysis.

Parents will continue to receive reports about their children's results on state assessments. Assessment results for schools and districts, broken down by subgroups of students, will continue to be made public.
